M. W. Rosenheimer, Chairman of Board, Past President of Bank of Kewaskum Dies

BUSINESS AND CIVIC LEADER, PROMINENT CITIZEN STRICKEN

Maurice W. Rosenheimer, 71, of Kewaskum and Big Cedar Lake, chairman of the board of the Bank of Kewaskum and former president of the firm many years, a business and civic leader and prominent citizen of the community, passed away unexpectedly Monday afternoon, Aug. 7, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend.

Mr. Rosenheimer was stricken with an apparent heart attack while at work at the bank and was rushed to the hospital in the fire department ambulance. He died shortly after admission to the hospital.

A native of Kewaskum, he was born here Sept. 25, 1895, a son of the late Adolph and Elizabeth Petri Rosenheimer, and was a resident of the area most of his life. Mr. Rosenheimer was widely known throughout the county.

He attended the Kewaskum public school, graduated from Kewaskum high school and attended the University of Wisconsin at Madison, where he was a track and cross country star. He was an outstanding basketball player during his high school career and later played on the Kewaskum village team many years. An ardent sail boat enthusiast, he was a past champion of the Cedar Lake Yacht club, winning the 1923 and 1928 regattas.

Associated with the Bank of Kewaskum almost 50 years, Mr. Rosenheimer served as president of the bank for 25 years, from 1940 to 1965, and then became chairman of the board. He was vice-president of the L. Rosenheimer Malt & Grain Co. of Kewaskum, a former president of the Kewaskum Mutual Insurance Co. and a former official of the Kewaskum Aluminum Co. (now Regal Ware, Inc.). He was a former member of the village board and school board and served six years on the consistory board of Peace United Church of Christ.

He served his country overseas during World War I and held the rank of lieutenant in the U. S. Army. He was one of the first to enlist from Washington county. Mr. Rosenheimer was a member of the Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion.

He was also a 32nd degree Mason of the West Bend lodge and a Shriner of Tripoli lodge in Milwaukee; also a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum.

Mr. Rosenheimer was married to Gladys Clark on Sept. 18, 1928. They have two daughters, Jean (Mrs. John Schumann) of Wauwatosa and Susan (Mrs. Burns Nelthorpe) of Kewaskum. In addition to his wife and daughters, he is survived by two sons-in-law, five grandchildren, Jeffery, Rock, Jennifer, Burns E. and Wendy. His parents, one sister and three brothers preceded him in death.

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Local Young Lady Spending Summer In Europe Writes

Following are excerpts from letters received by her folks from Miss Jeanne Felix, Kewaskum, who, together with Miss Jean Schuppel, R. 1, Allenton, joined the summer WSA (Work or Study Abroad) program and are now employed in England:

June 26, 1967

We arrived in New York Sunday morning at 9:30 a. m. We stayed at the Pan American Motor Inn in Long Island. We're rooming with two other girls who are going to England. They're both from Georgia. This morning we had breakfast with all the other students from W.S.A. There really are quite a few in all. Mr. Cooper, the supervisor, said there are 250 people in the programs. In about 15 minutes we're going into downtown New York again. At 6 p. m. we'll take a chartered bus to the airport and then at 11 p. m. we'll take off for Paris. By 10:30 tomorrow morning we'll be in Paris.

July 3, 1967

We arrived in England on June 29 and are now busily at work at Butlin's camp. This place really is terrific. It has everything you could imagine, amusement park, golf, skiing, shopping centers, indoor and outdoor pools, night clubs, etc. Besides that it's in the middle of the greatest scenery you could imagine. It's right next to the Bristol Channel and we can see the country of Wales on the other side. It's right next to the city of Minehead, which is a very charming and quaint little city. The best part about the arrangement is that we get everything free, all golf, skiing, rides in the amusement park, etc., etc. The work isn't really as bad as we had thought it might be. We work about 46 hours a week.

We've met so many interesting people already, most of the people come here to work for the summer and they come from Scotland, Ireland and Wales. We have quite a bit of trouble understanding the people because they all speak a different dialogue. The only bad thing about this place is the weather. Most of the time it's about 70 degrees but with the wind coming off the channel it's equal to our fall season. Another thing we don't like too well is the food. The first thing I want to eat when I get home is an American hamburger. These English hamburgers are for the birds. Besides that you don't get anything to drink with your meals except tea and I'm not too fond of their tea. Other than these few problems I just love it here. All the British people are so nice to us and they are all very friendly. Two of the girls from Ireland have invited us to their homes in Ireland but I don't think we'll have time to make it. I could go on for hours and hours just writing about Butlin's camp, much less England, but if I go into detail it will take pages and pages, so you'll have to wait until I get home to hear the

Village Hires Two New Full Time Policemen

FLORIDA, BELOIT OFFICERS TO BEGIN DUTIES TUESDAY

At the regular monthly meeting Monday evening, the Kewaskum Village Board approved hiring two new police officers, expanding the Kewaskum police force to three full-time men.

The expanded force of three patrolmen will provide complete 24-hour police protection. The force previously consisted of Chief of Police Roland Pledl and two part-time patrolmen. One of these officers, Marriner Frank, passed away recently.

The new officers are Donald J. Hlavaty of Beloit, age 28, weight 215 pounds, height 6 feet, who has had two years of experience on the Beloit police force, and Dennis J. Scott of Redington Beach, Fla., age 27, weight 208 pounds, height 6 feet, 1 inch, a native of Milwaukee, who has had four years of experience on the police department at Redington Beach, Fla.

Both are married and will serve under Chief Pledl. They will be sworn in at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Aug. 15, at the municipal building.

Other business was transacted and approved by the board and will be published when the official minutes are released.

Firemen Answer Three More Calls

After answering three calls last week, one a serious barn fire at the Stoffel farm, busy Kewaskum firemen were called three more times this week.

The firemen were summoned twice Monday afternoon to extinguish burning autos. At 1:30 p. m. they made a run to the John Hefter salvage yard on Hwy. 45 at the south village limits. Hefter had been replacing a motor in an older model car in his garage at the rear of his home. While he was in the house for lunch, flames were seen coming from the garage, door by persons in a service station across the highway. They notified Hefter, who pulled the burning car from the garage with a tractor and then called firemen, who put out the blaze. The interior burned out completely and most of the outside of the vehicle was damaged. There was no damage to the garage.

At 5:30 p. m. firemen responded to a call on North Fond du Lac ave. Allen Thill, a mechanic at Honeck Chevrolet, was driving a new model car owned by the firm when smoke came from the hood. A passing motorist stopped and had the fire practically out with an extinguisher when firemen arrived. It is believed a short in the wiring caused the blaze. Some of the motor wires burned and there was minor damage to the motor.

At about 2:30 a. m. Wednesday firemen answered a call to Regal Ware, Inc. where fire broke out in the buffing room. The flames were confined to the buffing tunnel beneath the floor where dust ignited, probably from sparks from one of the machines. There was more smoke than fire and the

Miss Erdmann to Leave Aug. 14 for Okinawa to Teach

Miss Cheryl Erdmann, daughter of Mrs. Marion Erdmann, R. 2, Kewaskum, will be leaving for her teaching assignment in Okinawa on Aug. 14. Her scheduled departure flight from Travis Air Force Base in California is for 11:00 p. m. on that date.

Miss Erdmann will be teaching first grade at Mercy Elementary school, which is located 11 miles north of Naha, an important city in southern Okinawa. Mercy school is just one of the Department of Defense Dependents Schools in the Ryukyus Islands operated by the Air Force.

The DOD Dependents Schools are designed to provide an educational program equal to the better school systems in the United States. There are currently over 500 staff members assigned to the program in Okinawa, and most of the states of the United States are represented. There are currently over 13,500 pupils enrolled in grades one through twelve in the schools. Courses of study parallel those of public schools in the United States. Standard approved and up-to-date textbooks and supplies are used.

For the past two years, Miss Erdmann has been teaching second grade at Koenig school, Two Rivers, Wis. She also taught remedial reading during the 1967 summer session at Koenig.

Lakeland College, Sheboygan is where Miss Erdmann graduated from in 1965, and in 1961 she graduated from the Kewaskum Community High school.

Five Persons Are Killed in Area Crashes

3 OF VICTIMS ARE YOUTHS, TWO ARE FROM WEST BEND

Five persons, three of them youths, including two from West Bend, were killed in five separate crashes in the surrounding area over the weekend.

An accident at 6:26 p. m. Sunday resulted in fatal injuries for Frederick H. Westerman, 17, of 607 W. Decorah rd., West Bend, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyril J. Westerman. He was a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Westerman of Kewaskum and a nephew of Harold Westerman of the town of Wayne.

Injured in the mishap were Patrick S. O'Meara, 18, who incurred cuts and other injuries, and Terrance Michels, 18, who suffered cuts on his face, arms and abdominal injuries. Both are from West Bend.

O'Meara was reported as the driver of the car which was traveling south on Hwy. 144 and left the highway on the Wallace Lake curve about .01 of a mile north of the Wallace Lake rd. and apparently rolled over and struck a tree. It was believed all three youths were thrown from the vehicle. Westerman reportedly was pinned under the car which came to rest on its wheels after also striking a tree.

All were taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital and Westerman was removed to Milwaukee Lutheran hospital later where he died shortly after 11 p. m. of head injuries.

Westerman was an outstanding athlete at West Bend High school where he competed and won awards in football, baseball and track. His latest award was received only Saturday as a member of the West Bend High school baseball team which was runner-up in the state WIAA tournament held in West Bend. He was named to the Southern Little 10 all-conference 1966 football team and won many first place awards in track as well as numerous other awards during his high school career. He would have been a senior this year.

Surviving are his parents, a brother, Robert, at home; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Emil Hartmann of R. 1, Allenton; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Westerman, Kewaskum and other relatives. Funeral services were held at St. Frances Cabrini church, West Bend, at 10 a. m. Wednesday with burial in Holy Angels cemetery.

Elmer R. Schaefer, 18, of R. 1, Allenton, was killed early Monday morning when his southbound auto apparently went out of control on CTH WW about three-quarters of a mile north of Hwy. 33 and careened into the ditch and struck a utility pole and came to rest on its roof. The car was demolished. Schaefer was reported thrown from the vehicle in the crash. The crash apparently occurred at approximately 1:45 a. m. The wrecked car and crash victim were discovered about 5:43 a. m. Monday.

rest.

We spent three days in Paris. The city is just beautiful. The whole city is made up of buildings which are hundreds and thousands of years old. The amazing part is that these very old buildings are preserved so well. The whole city is much cleaner than any of the cities in the U.S.A. The people too are very neat and clean and very handsome. The people were very nice to us but not nearly as friendly as the English people are. Of course it was a little hard talking to them when most of us didn't know a word of French. I'm really looking forward to seeing Paris again when we come back in September. Right now I'll try to get some sleep. It's kind of hard trying to fall asleep because it first gets dark at about 10:30 or 11:00 p. m. here.

July 21, 1967

We're enjoying ourselves more all the time. Last week we found out they have a student club at the camp, which is for students from all over the world who work at Butlin's. Through this club we've met people from Sweden, Holland, Austria, Scotland and even two students from Hong Kong. We have meetings every Monday night. This Monday we're having a musical program in which the students will bring music of some sort from their respective countries. Every Thursday we go together in cars to some interesting spot around Minehead. Last Thursday we went to Dunkery Beacon,

which is the highest point in Exmoor. From the top you can see 14 counties in England. We've seen just about all of Somerset county now and plan on taking a ferry over to Wales next Tuesday. This will only cost about 15 shillings or \$2.10. (We've finally mastered the English currency system, which is much harder than our easy decimal system).

We plan to work for four weeks yet and then around Aug. 15 take off for the northern part of England, then across to Scotland, and then take a ferry to Ireland. We spend a few days in Ireland and then take a ferry back to Liverpool, England. We'll move on to London and spend about five days there before we leave for France.

We're in the southwest part of England which is famous for its lovely scenery. One of the loveliest parts is the Exmoor, which is one of the largest national parks in England. There are many, many small villages around here which are thousands of years old. The buildings in these villages range

from small cottages to great castles. The houses are very different from houses in the U. S. Almost all of the cottages have names like Shanklin Bask, Dove cottage, the Lorna Doone, etc. The houses are very close together and don't have lawns like houses in America. They do have many flowers around them though and it looks very becoming. Some of the houses still have the thatched roofs of many centuries ago. We've also been to the holy village of Glastonburg, which was a shrine for pilgrims to come to in earlier days. In this village Joseph of Arimathea brought the chalice of the Last Supper. We also saw the Holy Thorn, which is a tree that blossoms only at Christmas time. This village is very historical too, either in fact or legend. It is where King Arthur is buried and where he was supposed to have fought many of his famous battles.

England really is just as I expected it would be. It's very much like the U. S. and yet altogether different. Every day proves to be exciting because every day we come across some interesting phase of England which we didn't know existed.

I'm learning to live with some of the customs of England. The cold doesn't bother me much anymore and I've even started to drink tea, although we bought some Maxwell instant coffee at one of the shops in Minehead.

**Here's Reminder for
Wisconsin Families**

The Bureau of the Census is sending post cards to all families who were mailed questionnaires last week for the Wisconsin Home Fallout Protection Survey. The cards are reminders to fill out and mail the questionnaires.

The bureau is conducting the survey throughout the state for the Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Bureau of Civil Defense.

Everyone who received a questionnaire is urged to return it in the self-addressed, postage-free envelope as soon as possible. The form should be returned whether you are a renter or a home owner, whether you live in a one-family home, or a house with two or more families, an apartment, or any other type of building.

The questionnaires were delivered to all addresses in one-, two-, and three-family dwellings within cities of 10,000 or more and within much of the metropolitan areas surrounding Madison and Milwaukee. Households in the remainder of Wisconsin are being called on by Census Bureau interviewers.

The questions are few and easy to answer. They're about the way your house is built. How many floors? What kind of roof? Does it have a basement? If so, what is

the height of the outside basement walls?

Based on your answers, an electronic computer at the Census Bureau will figure how much protection you and your family have at home. If you have a basement, the computer will figure the degree of fallout protection in your basement. A specially prepared Civil Defense booklet will be mailed to you. A label on the cover will bear the fallout protection factor (degree of protection) of the best parts of your basement. This information will be confidential to you and the Census Bureau.

If you do not have a basement, you'll receive a general information booklet on protective measures that can be taken by individuals and families.

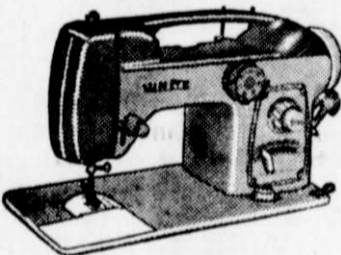
**7 Persons Injured

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Conditioning Garden Flowers



Beautiful New Century hybrid zinnias like these deserve a little extra care in cutting and conditioning to keep them in good shape for extra days. The article tells you what to do.

Being able to cut flowers from the garden and arrange them to ornament the house is one of the satisfactions of gardening. But doing so can be even more pleasing if the flowers last as long as they are capable of doing.

Matching water temperature to air temperature is the start of conditioning garden flowers. When you go into the garden to pluck them, take along a pail of water the same temperature as the outdoor air. Set each stem into the pail immediately after cutting.

The less time there is between the instant the stem is severed and that when the flower stem is immersed, the less time there is for air to enter the cells of the stem to dry them.

That's also the reason why, when ready to arrange flowers, you cut the stems under water if you need to shorten some of them. Plenty of moisture in

cells, but little air, makes cut flowers last longer.

In between cutting and arranging, condition your flowers further by setting the pail into which you inserted them in a cool, draft-free place for several hours. During this period, with stems well immersed, the blooms will become accustomed to indoor temperature and the stems will fill with water.

Try conditioning your garden flowers and prove to yourself that it pays in longer bloom life.
