Two New Full-Time Police Officers Sworn In



Two new husky patrolmen were sworn in as officers of the Kewaskum police department at the municipal building last Tuesday morning to serve the village on a full-time basis under the direction of Police Chief Roland Pledl.

The two full-time officers in our growing little city take the place of two previous part-time patrolmen, Marriner Frank, who passed away on Memorial Day and Kenneth Neldner, who resigned to devote his time to a full-time job. The expanded force of three full-time men provides complete 24-

hour police protection.

Village Commissioner William Martin swore in the new patrolmen and Village President Wayland Tessar and members of the village board were also present.

foot, 215 pound officer, has had two years experience as a member of the Beloit police force. Both are married and will make their home in Kewaskum with their families.

Local Army Capt. Annual Reunion Staehler Awarded of Rodenkirch Vietnamese Medal Family Is Held

Army Captain Joseph C. Staehler, son of Mr and Mrs. Joseph J. Staehler, R. 1, Kewaskum, received the Vietnamese Honor Medal, First Class, during recent ceremonies at Can Tho, Vietnam. Staehler's wife, Elfrieda, lives at R. 2, Kewaskum.

He earned the medal for his tour of duty as an engineer technical adviser, assisting the Can Tho post engineer in performing his mission. Under Staehler's efforts, the army said, facilities for newly activated units and a major rehabilitation program for units in the IV Corps zone have been realized. By visiting the most remote construction sites, he gave invaluable technical assistance to the Vietnamese specialists, officials said.

Staehler was stationed at Ft. Gordon, Ga. before arriving overseas in August of 1966.

The captain graduated in 1955 from St. Francis Minor Seminary, Milwaukee, and received his bachelor or science degree in 1960 from Marquette university, Milwaukee. He received his commission through the Reserve Officers' Training Corps program at the university.

Holy Trinity School Opens; Enrollment Up

253 PUPILS EXPECTED; STAFF IS INCREASED, NEW TEACHERS ADDED

To cooperate with the bus service now granted to parochial school children, Holy Trinity school is opening earlier than usual this year. Classes will be resumed today (Friday), Aug. 25, the same as the public schools. An enrollment of 253 pupils is expected on opening day, an increase of seven over last year, when 246 children reported.

The teaching staff at the school will be increased from six to eight teachers this term, one for each class. Classes will be taught by four Sisters of St. Agnes and four lay teachers. All but one of the sisters are new and two of the lay teachers are returning.

The staff of teachers and grades they will teach are as follows: Grade 8—Sr. M. Julaine, principal, who succeeds Sr. M. Concordia; Grade 7—Sr. M. Jeramy, who succeeds Sr. M. Concordia, who taught both grades last year; Grade 6—Mrs. Marguerite Lamers, who succeeds Sr. M. Cecelia; Grade 5—Mrs. Leonard Theusch; Grade 4—Mrs. Ervin Fellenz; Grade 3—Sr. M. Bernarda, who succeeds Sr. Andre; Grade 2—Miss Susan Schmidt, who succeeds Sr. Andre, who taught both grades last year; Grade 1—Sr. Margaret Mary. Sr. M. George, housekeeper, also is new.

School will open with Mass at 8:30 a. m. Friday. Bus drivers will be slowed up the first day with finding their passengers. After drivers are accustomed to their routes, they expect to have the children at school by 8 a. m. Mass will then be at 8:10 a. m. to accommodate those riding the buses. School will close at 3:20 p. m. for the convenience of the bus schedule. Parents are asked to remind their youngsters to obey rules for safety on the bus—no hands or heads out of windows, no changing seats or standing in a moving bus, silence at railroad crossing stops, cooperating with the drivers for the welfare of all, and in general being ladies and gentlemen.

Consultation Meeting August 15, 1967

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met at 1:00 p. m. in the council chambers of the municipal building for a consultation with Mr. Arthur Scholl of McMahon Associates, the village consulting firm, and a representative of the Walker Process Equipment Co. Also present were Supt. Armin Oppermann and sewage plant operator Marvin Schaefer.

Purpose of the meeting was to determine the cause and a method of correcting the odors from the sewage treatment plant.

Both Mr. Scholl and the Walker representative contended the odors were caused by the overloading of the treatment plant by periodic shock loads of undigestible wastes from some unknown source and that a series of B.O.D. tests would have to be taken to determine the source of the overload before a method of correction could be recommended.

Such tests, under the supervision of the Wisconsin Department of Resource Development, were authorized by the board and a full report will be made to the board by this department in the near future.

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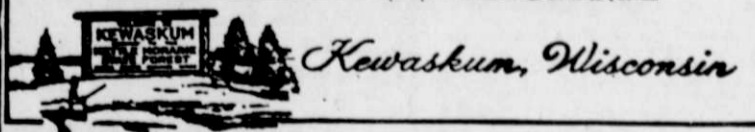
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Miss Weeks Bride of Maurice Shea

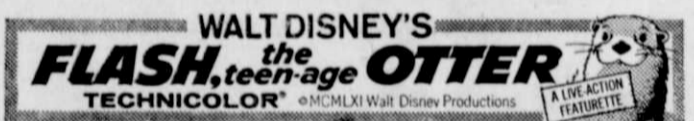

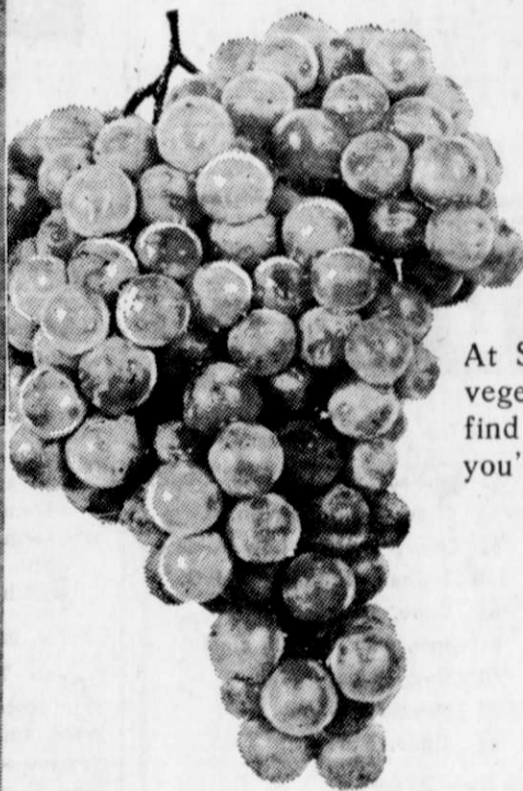

KEEP 'EM COMING

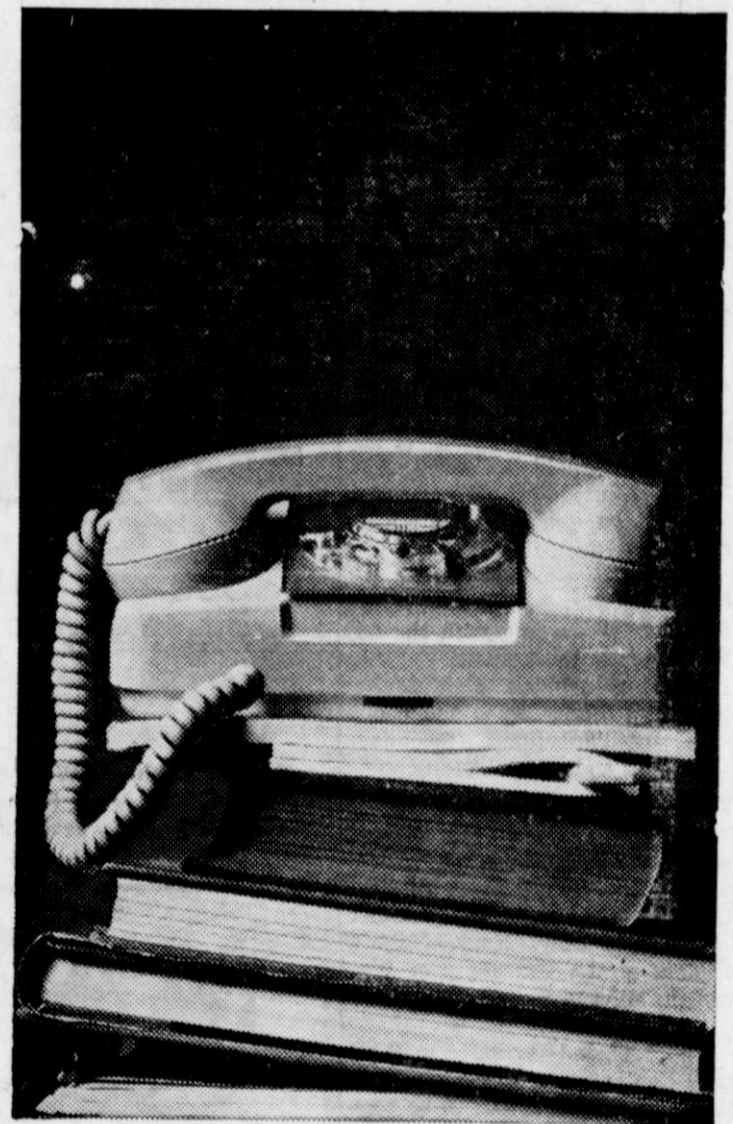
The reason why most gardeners plant annual flowers is that they want plenty of bright blossoms to give color to their gardens. While there always are many blooms at the beginning of the season, the problem sometimes is how to keep these flowers coming until frost.

It isn't hard to keep annuals blooming. Like other plants, they exist to produce seeds. Once these ripen, the plant's life cycle is ended. To prolong it you need only to thwart the plant's purpose.

The blooms you admire while fully open today will be well along towards becoming seed pods a week from now. If, instead of allowing them to mature, you keep the flowers picked as fast as they fade, the plant will continue to form flower buds right up to killing frost.

Of course it helps flower bud production and flower size if you keep the weeds under control, cultivate the soil close to the plants to admit air and water, and fertilize once a month during the summer.

But picking faded flowers, not just once but as a regular part of your garden maintenance program, will provide the garden with new blooms out of all proportion to what you might expect. And, of course, the flowers will be produced over a much longer period of time.



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
