## Man Found Slain Here Identified

### Victim Found Beaten, Shot on Nearby Farm Is Chicago Man

#### Murderer Is Being Hunted By Authorities

The body of a man, beaten and shot in the head, found on a vacant farm near Kewaskum Tuesday afternoon was identified by authorities Thursday afternoon as that of Herbert McKinney, age 26, of Chicago. The slain man was identified by fingerprints taken of him.

Chicago police notified the Fond du Lac county sheriff's department Thursday morning that they interviewed two of McKinney's sisters, Shirley and Tina, who lived with McKinney. They said they had gone to a tavern with McKinney and his girlfriend at 8 a. m. Saturday. The three women left him there and returned to the McKinney home. That was the last they saw of him, they said. They reported him missing Tuesday morning.

Chicago police said McKinney had one arrest on his record—on May 15, 1965. The charge was criminal damage to a northside tavern, but the case was dismissed 10 days later.

The victim, who was nude except for a short-sleeved pullover T-shirt, was found face up atop a pile of rubble on a seldom-used dump area in a lovers' lane field on the farm about 100 yards from County Trunk S, 1½ miles north of Kewaskum, a short distance north of the Washington-Fond du Lac county line, according to Sheriff Harry E. Rozek of Fond du Lac county.

State crime laboratory technicians, Chicago, Fond du Lac county, Washington county and local authorities and reporters all descended on the area within hours to probe various fronts in an effort to identify the killer and his victim. Much of the time the authorities were headquartered in Kewaskum.

The slayer beat his victim at least twice about the face with a blunt instrument and then shot him at close range just in front of the left ear.

Fond du Lac county authorities, acting on an anonymous telephone tip and information received from Washington county police, located the body around 3 p. m. Tuesday. They withheld confirmation of a murder and information concerning it until Wednesday. Washington County Sheriff Raymond W. Jeffords said that "a West Bend citizen told us we might find a body on that farm."

The farm is listed in the county plat book as owned by C. & B. Dombrowski of Chicago, who it was reported formerly lived there. The 140 retired acres on the farm are not cropped and apparently the property is visited frequently by the Dombrowskis. Sheriff Rozek said there are several Dombrowski brothers. The family rents out the farm house and has

placed the rest of the farm in the federal land bank program.

A 30-year-old Chicago police officer, said by authorities to be a relative of the family which owns the farm, was arrested Monday night on a charge of driving while intoxicated after his car missed a curve and struck a tree on Hwy. 45 about two miles north of Kewaskum.

He appeared in Washington County Court Wednesday before County Judge Robert J. Stoltz and was released after furnishing \$300 bond, according to authorities. A court appearance on the charge was set for Oct. 4.

Sheriff Jeffords said that during the investigation of the accident his men turned up the lead on the body. The man was injured in the crash and treated at St. Joseph's hospital in West Bend, where his room was kept under guard until Tuesday afternoon when he was transferred to Washington county jail. The man reportedly asked to make a statement to police while at the hospital but after conferring with an attorney changed his mind. The man was also reported to have been seen in Kewaskum places Monday night.

Chicago security police were sent here to work on the probe. State Crime Laboratory technicians assisted Fond du Lac and Washington county authorities Tuesday and Wednesday in the investigation and fingerprints of the dead man taken by the technicians and police were distributed around the area, to Chicago authorities and to the FBI in an attempt to identify the victim.

Sheriff Rozek reported earlier that there were no known missing persons in the immediate area but that there were two individuals missing in Chicago who matched preliminary descriptions of the dead man.

An autopsy disclosed the man died from the bullet wound and that he had been dead for some 20 hours before his body was discovered. He had no identification, clad only in the T-shirt. Rozek said he appeared to have been dragged about 30 or 40 feet and dropped on the pile of rubble. The body was taken to the St. Agnes hospital morgue in Fond du Lac.

There were indications that the shooting did not take place where the body was found as there was no blood in the area. Authorities believed he was murdered elsewhere and his body was transported to the local farm where it was dumped.

Sheriff Rozek impounded two cars at the Fond du Lac Safety Building garage. One, a 1960 model, was found in the farm driveway. The other, a 1967 model rented from a Chicago agency, is the one involved in the Monday night accident.

Dark spots which appeared to be blood were found in the latter car and Crime Laboratory representatives were to test samples of

### Kewaskum Driver Gets Jail Terms

Myron J. Prescott, 23, of R. 1, Kewaskum, was sentenced to two consecutive terms in Washington county jail when he appeared before Circuit Court Judge Milton L. Meister in West Bend Tuesday. He got three months for fleeing an officer and a month's jail term for operating a vehicle without a driver's license.

Police Officer Dennis J. Scott of Kewaskum reported that at 1:12 a. m. Tuesday he observed Prescott's car headed south on Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45). He was traveling at a high rate of speed, with tires squealing and without headlights, Scott said.

The patrolman pursued the auto speeding south at speeds up to 105 miles per hour to about one mile north of the West Bend city limits, where, after Scott had radioed ahead, a roadblock was set up by two West Bend police cars and Prescott was arrested.

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'Okinawa' Topic  
Of Woman's Club

FALL LUNCHEON  
DATE ANNOUNCED

Mrs. E. A. Norton, Sr. presented slides and narration concerning life on Okinawa at the Saturday, Sept. 9, meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club. Mrs. Norton's son spent 18 months on the island in 1955 while in the army.

The excellent slides showed all aspects of the island, land surfaces, vegetation, native and army life. Okinawa is a coral and volcanic ash island in the Pacific. The climate is hot and humid and has frequent typhoons which cause the vegetation to be sparse and stunted. Obtaining fresh water is a major problem and all rain water is collected for drinking and cleaning purposes.

Naha is the island's chief city and port. Shops are quite primitive and wares, chiefly oriental, are displayed daily on the coral streets. The homes in Naha are built very close together and each family raises its own food, especially rice, sweet potatoes and bananas. The native homes are not very substantial, have rice straw roofs and no electrical or plumbing facilities.

Okinawa had to be completely rebuilt after its destruction in World War II. It is now an important air base and has many fine educational and recreational facilities for use of the service men stationed there.

At the business meeting it was decided that all future programs for the 1967-68 season will be held in the Peace church educational building. The fall luncheon scheduled for Sept. 23 at 1:15 will be held there also. Any member not intending to be present must no-

it Wednesday afternoon to determine if it resulted from the auto accident or the murder.

Both cars carried Illinois license plates. They were searched Tuesday after a warrant was issued by Judge Hazen W. McEssy of county court Branch 2. The judge Wednesday morning issued a search warrant for the buildings on the Dombrowski farm and authorities continued their search of the area where the body was found in an attempt to turn up clues and the murder weapon. According to Rozek, searchers thus far have turned up little. Some members of the Kewaskum fire department were called to the farm Wednesday night with their lighting plant to furnish light for the crime laboratory technicians, who worked into the night.

The dump area where the body was found is reached through a lane in a field located between County Trunks S and G.

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Two Chicago homicide division detectives were also sent to Fond du Lac to determine what, if any, du Lac connection the dead man had with Chicago and a detective from the Chicago police internal investigation department was sent to West Bend to investigate the arrest of the patrolman.

Although the victim was badly beaten about the head, Rizek said a preliminary report from the crime laboratory indicated that he was alive after the beating. The shot in the head was apparently to finish the victim off, officials said. The body was in a good state of preservation, Jeffords said, indicating that the man was killed recently. Ray M. Burleton, chief deputy of the Fond du Lac county sheriff's department, said "his eyes were so terribly blackened that we didn't realize that he had been shot until the autopsy."

Earlier, police found a white sock, blood spattered brown paper bag and a bloody steel file about 30 feet from the body. A blood splattered car seat also was

found, along with a single slug, possibly from a .38 caliber weapon. The slug, along with the other evidence, was turned over to technicians of the state crime laboratory at Madison. McKinney was found with his head pointed toward the bottom of a deep, wooded ravine where the trash heap was located. Farmers apparently have dumped rubbish there for years.

The farm house is rented by Merlin Norscog, 42, a cheese maker who lives there with his wife, Eleanor, 41, and their five children. The farm buildings are rented to a farmer who stores equipment.

The 1960 Dodge found on the farm had been involved in an accident Sunday near New Prospect, Burleton said. The auto had been towed back to the farm.

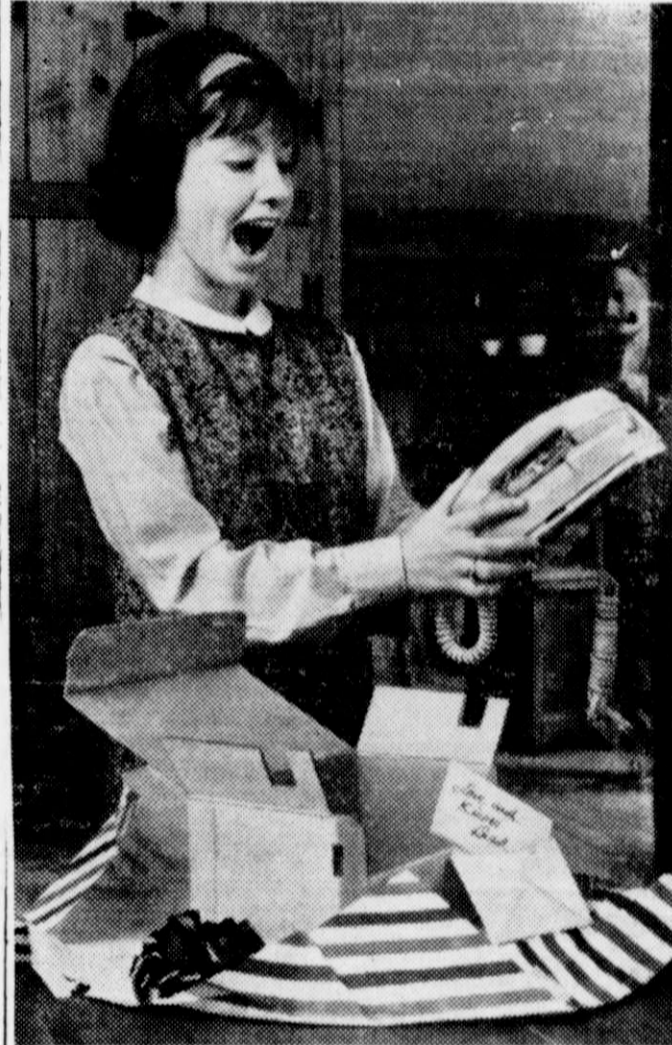
### CHICKEN BARBECUE AT BATAVIA SUNDAY

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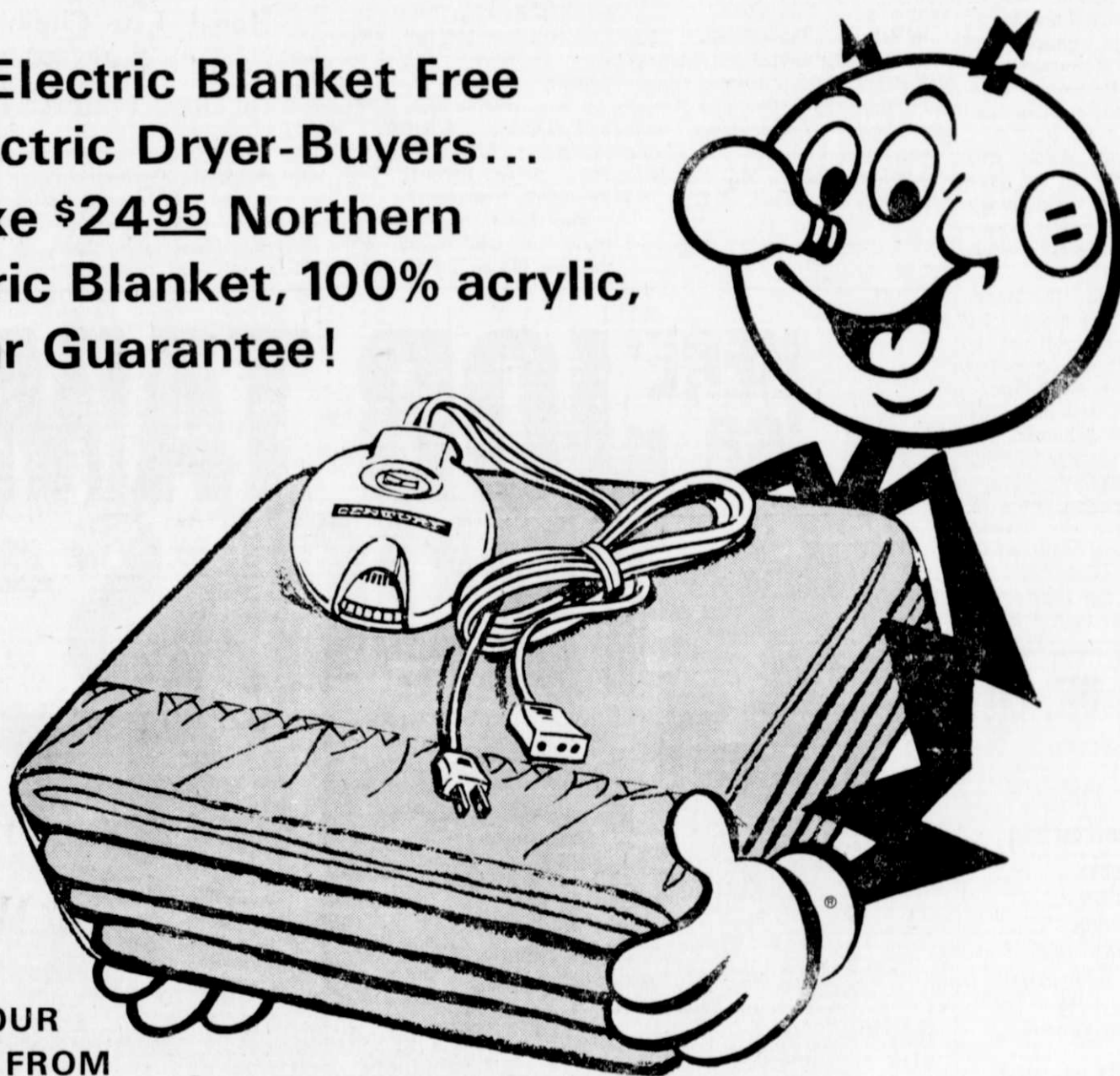

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## Indians Defeat Horicon, 21-14, in Football Opener

**OFFENSE MOVES BALL WELL, GRINDS OUT 340 YARDS**

A good crowd was on hand Friday night to see the opening of the 1967 football season in a game that featured the Kewaskum Indians and the visiting Horicon Marshmen of the Little Ten conference. The home town fans were treated to some fine football, good blocking, hard running and heads up defensive play which resulted in a well deserved 21-14 victory.

The Indians got on the scoreboard early in the first quarter as they took the opening kickoff and drove 80 yards for the score, which came on a three-yard run by Junior Mike Gutjahr. Al Bohn electrified the crowd with a 35-yard end run which set up this first score. The extra point try failed so the score was 6-0.

In the second period, the Indians added two more points on a safety when Tom Gundrum and a host of other Kewaskum defenders tackled Horicon's quarterback, Mike Splinter, in the end zone.

The Indians had another first half drive stopped on the Horicon three-yard line on a fumble and when the half ended Kewaskum was nearing another score on the Horicon 10.

In the second half the Marshmen got on the scoreboard following an 11-yard roll-out by Splinter. Kewaskum, unruffled, came back with a third quarter score on a 46-yard pass play from Marv Tanek to Jim Schuster.

Fourth quarter scoring included a three-yard touchdown pass to Dave Keith for Horicon and a 15-yard, six-point run by Kewaskum's Gutjahr. Bohn again set up the score on a 27-yard sprint around the end to the Horicon 15.

With the score 21-14 late in the

fourth quarter, Coach Harlow sent in some of the subs and they engineered a drive to the Horicon 18 before losing the ball on downs.

Game statistics showed Kewaskum gaining 340 yards (222 on the ground and 118 in the air). A staunch Indian defense, meanwhile, held the Marshmen to a minus 26 yards on the ground without a first down in the first half. The contest was more one-sided than the final score indicates. Kewaskum narrowly missed out on three other scoring opportunities.

Coach Harlow was pleased with the offensive line play and cited Dave Ramthun and John Reysen for some fine blocking. Dennis Terlinden shone on defense with seven tackles, including two when he dropped the quarterback for big losses. Bohn led the backs with 91 yards on 10 carries and Schuster hauled in two passes that covered 78 yards.

The Slinger game opens Scenic Moraine conference play today (Friday) at 4 p. m., followed by a game at Random Lake next Friday at 8 p. m.

In other non-conference openers reported, North Fondy blanked Gibraltar, 13-0; Columbus trounced Slinger, 33-6; Hartland Arrowhead bested Germantown, 19-0; Two Rivers shaded defending champion Grafton, 10-7 and Muskego beat Pewaukee, 33-7.
