## River Dam Here Being Repaired, Water Lowered

**HUNDREDS OF FISH TAKEN; RIVER BED TO BE CLEANED**

The Milwaukee river dam just south of the swimming beach in the village park was opened Monday to permit maintenance and repair work on the dam, both above and below the water level. Village officials reported that cement had broken up in places and minor repairs now can avert more serious ones in the future.

The retaining plates on the dam were pulled, lowering the water level of the river more than five feet, and leaving shallow water or dry spots at places on the river bed. Hundreds of dead carp and other rough fish were removed and local youngsters and grown-ups alike wading barefoot or with boots on had a real "ball" catching the fish left swimming around in the shallow water. They were spearing the fish, stepping on them, shooting them, raking and shoveling them out and even catching them with bare hands.

During this time of low water level village workers, members of the local sportsmen's club and Boy Scouts will clean debris from the muddy river bed, beginning at a point about three blocks north of the Main street bridge and working south toward the dam. The low water uncovered an unbelievable number of bottles, tin cans, tree limbs and branches, tires, rocks and other debris tossed into the river from the bridge and along the shoreline.

The lowered water also allowed Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Backus, Jr. to remove the old stone retaining wall on the river bank alongside their property at 418 Main st. It will be replaced by a new wall to be constructed. A large tree was also removed from their property along the river.

While the river bed is dry at the spot, the stones, rocks and timbers of the old river dam which formerly dammed the water at the Backus property, were removed with bulldozing equipment. This dam washed out many years ago but the stones and timbers were never removed until now. Before the old dam went out the river above it was a veritable lake at one time.

The low water, debris, fish removal, old dam and retaining wall removal, new dam repairs and workers busy at the scene drew countless spectators to the river during the week. It was a new experience never before seen in the lives of Kewaskumites, no matter how old, who over the years just took for granted a river full of water flowing along without change.

## 'Colorama Week' To Be Promoted in Washington County

**PLANE RIDE OVER COUNTY, BUS TOUR OF K-M OFFERED**

Fall color in the Kettle Moraine will be viewed from the air during Washington county's "Colorama Week." The Washington County Beautification Council has announced that airplane tours will be offered to the public on Sept. 30, Oct. 1, 7 and 8. The tours open a month long campaign to make county citizens aware of the natural beauty around them and also of areas blighted by man. October has been designated "beautification and clean-up month."

The plane rides will cost \$3.50 per person and will be 25 minute trips over the southern half of Washington county. Each tourist will be given a map of the area with a list of points of interest. Mrs. Roger Sacia, West Bend, chairman of the "Colorama Week" committee, took a trial ride and reported that "it was easy to identify where you were over the county." The rides will originate from the West Bend airport on Hwy. 33.

Bus tours of the Kettle Moraine will also be sponsored on Sept. 30 by the beautification council. These will originate from the old court house in West Bend and cover 60 miles through the county's glacial forms with a guide in each bus. The tour will last three hours and cost \$1 per adult and 50c for children under 15. It will leave the old court-house at 1:15 p. m.

Anyone interested in taking either the plane or bus tour should make reservations with Colorama, Box 537, West Bend, Wis., 53095. Include the number of people in your party and a preference as to the day and time for the plane ride.

In addition to "Colorama Week" and the tours, the beautification council urges all residents to look around their own homes and places of business during October. If everyone cleans their own area of debris, old cars and machinery and dilapidated buildings the appearance of the county will be greatly improved.

## Corps of Police Reserves to Be Trained in Area

When they attended an informal meeting at the Kewaskum municipal building last Tuesday evening, men who serve as auxiliary police in the Kewaskum area heard about a new program that will train a corps of county police reserves. The meeting was held at the request of local Police Chief Roland Pledl.

Details of the plan were outlined by Paul Humbel, West Bend, who is in charge of civil defense in Washington county and is a member of the Wisconsin State Traffic Patrol, and by Sgt. David Backhaus, Kewaskum, of the Washington County Sheriff's Department. Backhaus has been appointed by his department to take charge of recruit training.

Plans for the program emerged from meetings between Sheriff Ray Jeffords and his committee, District Attorney Robert Kauffmann and the police chiefs from the villages and cities in the county.

"The purpose of organizing the corps of men," Humbel said, "is to organize and train ourselves to be better fitted in time of emergency. Though the program is still in its infancy, it is something that must be taken care of." In case of extreme trouble, the reserve police would be used "in the first impact," he said, explaining that "it takes time to assemble the National Guard."

The recruits will attend a federal-aid school, starting about Jan. 1, Backhaus said, and will be paid \$3 per hour while in school or while on active duty. Loss of time on their regular jobs will be made up by the county. Bonded and deputized, the reserve police will be protected by insurance and workman's compensation, he explained.

The 15th annual Live Turkey Shoot sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at the Bar-N-Dude Ranch Sunday was the most successful ever held and set new records in attendance, number of turkeys taken, number of trout caught, and amount of business done at all stands. 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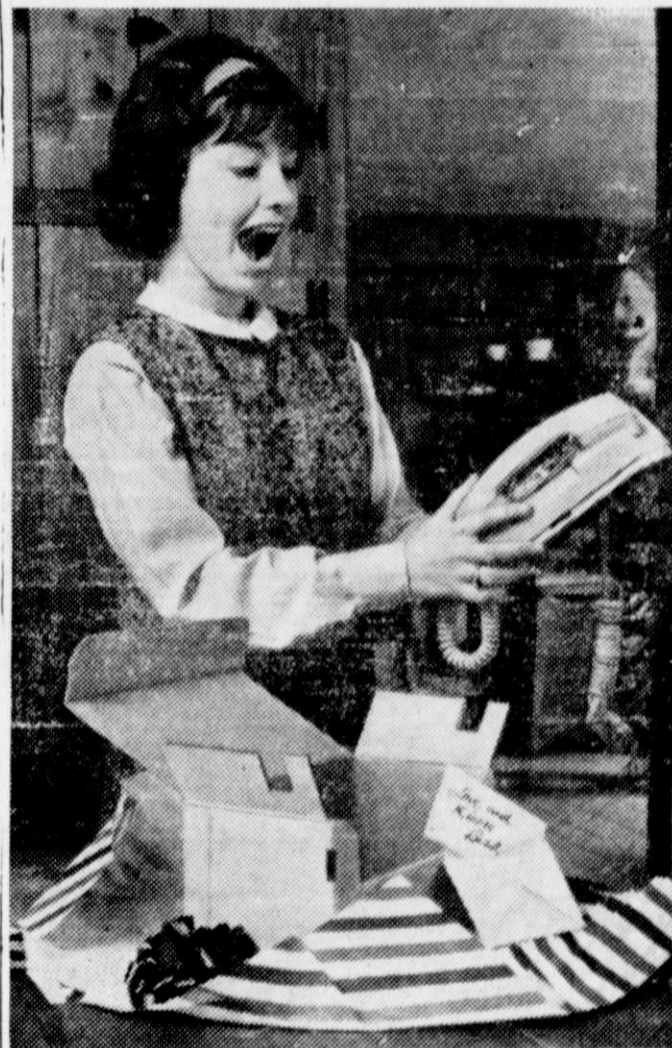
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## Indians Upset by Slinger, 13-7, on Costly Fumbles

**OUTPLAY, OUTGAIN OWLS 2 TO 1 BUT STILL LOSE**

Four fumbles, two of them very costly, two interceptions and a doubtful call by an official resulted in the Kewaskum Indians being upset by Slinger there Friday, 13-7, in the opening Scenic Moraine conference game on the Owls' new football field. It was the Indians first defeat after beating Horicon in their non-conference opener the week before.

It was surprising how Kewaskum could lose while completely outplaying the Owls and outgaining them from scrimmage by a 2 to 1 margin and picking up 15 first downs to Slinger's 6. The Indians had the better of it all the way around except in scoring. They gained a total of 255 yards to only 144 for Slinger, including 135 yards rushing to the Owls' 75 and 120 yards passing to Slinger's 39. Kewaskum completed 8 out of 15 passes to the Owls' 2 for 7, but had 2 intercepted compared to none for the winners. Kewaskum was not forced to punt once in the game while Slinger punted 9 times.

But the Owls took advantage of four Indian fumbles. Two of the fumbles were costly and came at the most inopportune times. They came on the Slinger one and two-yard lines to deprive Kewaskum of apparent scores. These, combined with the two interceptions and a controversial call which was ruled a lateral pass, but which many considered an incomplete pass and perturbed Kewaskum fans, won the contest for the Owls.

On this pass play, considered an incomplete pass but ruled a lateral, Slinger's Ken Franz picked up the loose ball and scampered 25 yards for the first score. Chuck Kranz passed to John Bahlitch for the second Owl score after the ball had been tipped by at least two Kewaskum defenders in another hard luck play. This gave the Owls a 13-0 halftime cushion.

Coach Joe Harlow's Indians finally hung onto the ball long enough to score in the final period on a 15-yard pass from Quarterback Marv Tanck to George Martin. Al Bohn, who rolled up 86 yards in 13 carries for Kewaskum,

ran for the extra point. Jim Manthei averaged about 7.5 yards, adding around 50 yards rushing and Manthei and Jim Schuster each caught three passes. Tanck was cited by Harlow for his fine play calling. Allen Theusch for his line backing (along with the entire defensive front wall) and Tackle Dave Ramthun for his blocking.

In other Scenic games Friday North Fondy shaded Random Lake, 7-0, Grafton exploded for a 33-0 win over Campbellsport and Pewaukee outdefended Germantown by the same 13-7 margin.

Tonight (Friday) at 8 p. m. the Indians play at Random Lake, which was narrowly nudged by North Fondy last week, 7-0.

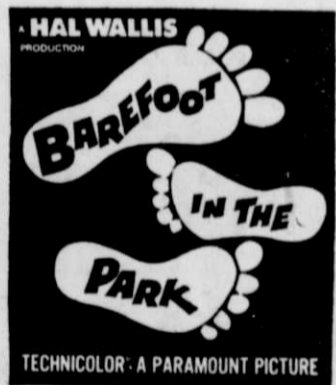
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## Annual Meeting, Election Is Held By PMPC Locals

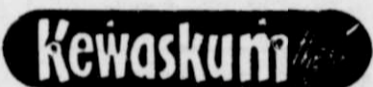
