River Dam Here Being Repaired, Water Lowered

HUNDREDS OF FISH TAKEN; RIVER BED TO BE CLEANED

The Milwaukee river dam just south of the swimming beach in the village park was opened Monday to permit maintenance and repair work on the dam, both above and below the water level. Village officials reported that cement had broken up in places and minor repairs now can avert more sericus ones in the future.

The retaining plates on the dam were pulled, lowering the water level of the river more than five feet, and leaving shallow water or dry spots at places on the river bed. Hundreds of dead carp and other rough fish were removed and local youngsters and grown-ups alike wading barefoot or with boots on had a real "ball" catching the fish left swimming around in the shallow water. They were spearing the fish, stepping on them, shooting them, raking and shoveling them out and even catching them with bare hands.

During this time of low water level village workers, members of the local sportsmen's club and Boy Scouts will clean debris from the muddy river bed, beginning at a point about three blocks north of the Main street bridge and working south toward the dam. The low water uncovered an unbelievable number of bottles, tin cans, tree limbs and branches, tires, rocks and other debris tossed into the river from the bridge and along the shoreline.

The lowered water also allowed Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Backus, Jr. to remove the old stone retaining wall on the river bank alongside their property at 418 Main st. It will be replaced by a new wall to be constructed. A large tree was also removed from their property along the river.

While the river bed is dry at the spot, the stones, rocks and timbers of the old river dam which formerly dammed the water at the Backus property, were removed with bulldozing equipment. 

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



Indians Upset by Slinger, 13-7, on **Costly Fumbles**

OUTPLAY, OUTGAIN OWLS 2 TO 1 BUT STILL LOSE

Four fumbles, two of them very costly, two interceptions and a doubtful call by an official resulted in the Kewaskum Indians being upset by Slinger there Friday, 13-7, in the opening Scenic Moraine conference game on the Owls' new football field. It was the Indians first defeat after beating Horicon in their non-conference opener the week before.

It was surprising how Kewaskum could lose while completely outplaying the Owls and outgaining them from scrimmage by a 2 to 1 margin and picking up 15 first downs to Slinger's 6. The Indians had the better of it all the way around except in scoring. They gained a total of 255 yards to only 144 for Slinger, including 135 yards rushing to the Owls' 75 and 120 yards passing to Slinger's 39. Kewaskum completed 8 out of 15 passes to the Owls' 2 for 7. but had 2 intercepted compared to none for the winners. Kewaswas not forced to punt once in the game while Shinger punted 9 times.

But the Owls took advantage of four Indian fumbles. Two of the fumbles were costly and came at the most inopportune times. They came on the Slinger one and two-yard lines to deprive Kewaskum of apparent scores. These, combined with the two intercep tions and a controversial call which was ruled a lateral pass, but which many considered an incomplete pass and perturbed Ke waskum fans, won the contest for the Owls.

On this pass play, considered an incomplete pass but ruled a lateral, Slinger's Ken Franz picked up the loose ball and scampered 25 yards for the first score. Chuck Kranz passed to John Bablitch for the second Owl score after the ball had been tipped by at least two Kewaskum defenders in another hard luck play. This gave the Owls a 13-0 halftime cushion.

Coach Joe Harlow's Indians finally hung onto the ball long e nough to score in the final period on a 15-yard pass from Quarterback Marv Tanck to George Martin. Al Bohn, who rolled up 86 yards in 13 carries for Kewaskum,

ran for the extra point. Jim Manthei averaged about 7.5 yards, adding around 50 yards rushing and Manthei and Jim Schuster each caught three passes. Tanck was cited by Harlow for his fine play calling, Allen Theusch ! for his line backing (along with


