Woman's Club Hears Superintendent of Plymouth Schools

Eldon Amundson superintendent of the Plymouth school system for 15 years, spoke Saturday, Oct. 14, at the meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club. Amundson had the opportunity to go to Russia in April of 1966 among thirteen other superintendents from the United States to study the Russian educational system. They spent five weeks touring schools for children of all age levels and were able to take pictures and obtain much more accurate information than is generally available.

Basically the Russian school system is typical of that of any country, it promotes the philosophy of the government. Although the communists claim there is equal opportunity for all children, their system is quite similar to the European schools and especially bright pupils are given special tutoring during their stay.

About 85% of the women in the cities hold a job outside the home, therefore children can be enrolled in nursery schools at six months. From six months to six years this non-compulsory schooling is available for 5½ days a week. At age seven compulsory education begins for an 8-year period. Subjects taken during this time are all required and homework for children between the ages of 10 and 15 averages three to four hours daily. A total of 37% of the Russian national budget is designated for education and the teachers are held in high regard, their authority never being questioned.

Fifty percent of the children are finished with formal education after the 8-year program. The remaining may continue to enter either the university, technical school or vocational school. At Moscow University 42 thousand are enrolled in the various colleges. The language department is very advanced and any student taking a foreign language will have all his subjects taught in this language. Approximately five to eight percent attend college in Russia as compared to 25% in the U. S.

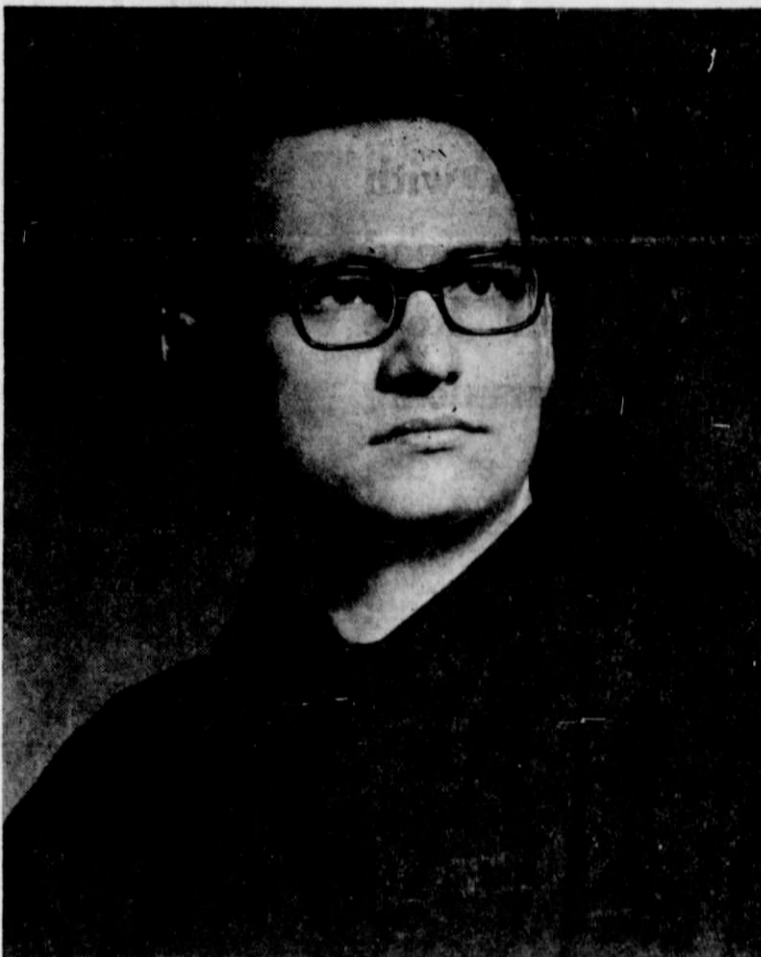

Allenton Man Killed in Town Of Wayne Crash

3 VEHICLES COLLIDE IN VILLAGE ACCIDENT

A rural Allenton resident died at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, early Monday morning of injuries suffered last Sunday night in a two car crash at the intersection of Hwys. 41 and 28 in the town of Wayne west of Kewaskum. The traffic fatality was the 23rd in Washington county for 1967.

Fatally injured was Frederick Wendborne, 58, of R. 1, Allenton, in the crash, which occurred about 10:25 p. m. Sunday as the Wendborne vehicle was traveling west on Hwy. 28 and apparently crossing Hwy. 41 when a northbound car driven by Lawrence Mader, 23, Menasha, collided with it in the intersection. The sheriff's department report indicated that the Mader auto struck the other vehicle broadside.

Wendborne is reported to have suffered a crushed chest and died early Monday at the hospital. Also injured in the accident was Celeste Wendborne, 61, wife of the crash victim, who reportedly suffered a possible skull fracture, chest injuries and cuts; Ronald Schmidt, 23, Menasha, a passenger in Mader's car, who incurred head and ankle injuries and cuts, and Mader, who suffered head injuries and bruises.

Two cars and a pick-up truck were involved in a mishap on S. Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45) on the Kewaskum hill about 300 feet south of the intersection with County Trunk Hwy. H at 1:25 p. m. Saturday.

The Kewaskum police department reported that Arthur Kutz, 22, of R. 3, Campbellsport, was headed north on Hwy. 45 when he reportedly drove the center line of the highway. His car struck the left front of a southbound pick-up truck driven by Glenn M. Coates, 16, of Hales Corners. The Kutz car then bounced off the truck and struck a car behind it driven by Dennis Scott, 29, of 244 Braatz dr., Kewaskum. The Kutz vehicle then veered off the left side of the highway and traveled 92 feet into a field before stopping.

Kutz and Coates, alone in their vehicles, both escaped injury. With Scott were his wife and two children. Two-year-old Kevin Scott received a bump on his head. According to the report, the Kutz auto was extensively damaged. Damage is estimated at \$300 to the truck and \$250 to Scott's car.

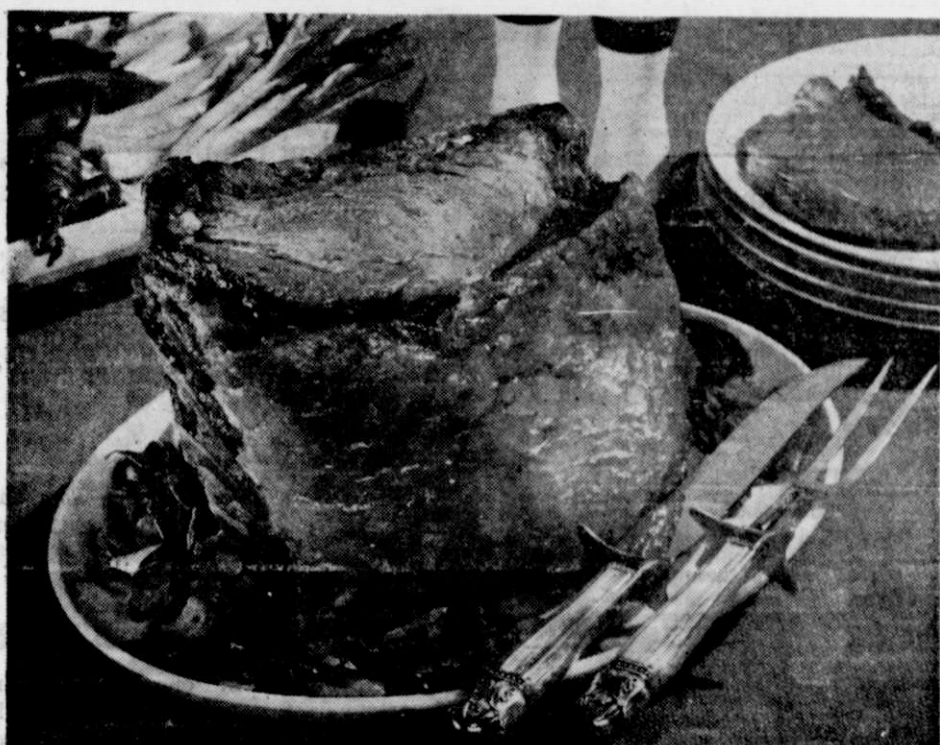

Indians Ruin Homecoming at Germantown, 12-0

GRAFTON'S 11-GAME STREAK SNAPPED BY NORTH FONDY

The Kewaskum Indians spoiled Germantown's homecoming Saturday afternoon by gaining a 12-0 scenic moraine conference victory to complete a full slate of football games last weekend. Three other games were played on Friday.

In a big upset Friday North Fondy stunned league-leading and defending champion Grafton, 13-7. Grafton's defeat snapped an 11-game conference winning streak for the Blackhaws. In other contests Pewaukee beat Campbellsport, 16-6, and Random Lake walloped Slinger, 40-19.

North Fondy's surprise win over Grafton and Pewaukee's victory threw the conference race into a three-way tie between these three teams (4-1) with two games left to play. Kewaskum, Campbellsport and Random Lake are next, all tied with 2-3 records, while Germantown and Slinger share the cellar with 1-4.

Germantown's Warhawks held Kewaskum scoreless until the last play of the first half. On that crucial effort, Marv Tanck tossed an 11-yard pass to Jim Schuster in the end zone, capping a 79-yard drive. The march also included a 30-yard Tanck to Schuster aerial.

Although outgaining the hosts by more than a 2 to 1 margin, the Indians didn't score again until the final period. A 72-yard march was climaxed by a 29-yard Tanck to Schuster touchdown pass play. The conversions after both TD's failed.

Schuster wound up with four receptions for 87 yards while Al Bohn hauled in four tosses for 23 yards. On the ground, the Indians were led by Mike Gutjahr with 62 yards on 14 carries and Bohn with 59 yards in 14 cracks at the Warhawk line. On the other hand, Kewaskum managed to hold Bruce Gengler to only 42 yards in 10 carries. Gengler had minus five yards in the first half but found some running room after the intermission.

Kewaskum had it all over Germantown in the statistics. They made 14 first downs to the Warhawks 6, 166 yards rushing to only 43 for the losers, 126 yards passing compared to 65, and 292 total yards to 113 for their opponents. The Indians completed 9 of 19 passes while the Warhawks completed 6 out of 15.

The Indians again have their work cut out for them today (Friday) when they play at Grafton in a 4 p. m. contest. Kewaskum has hopes of staging an upset over the

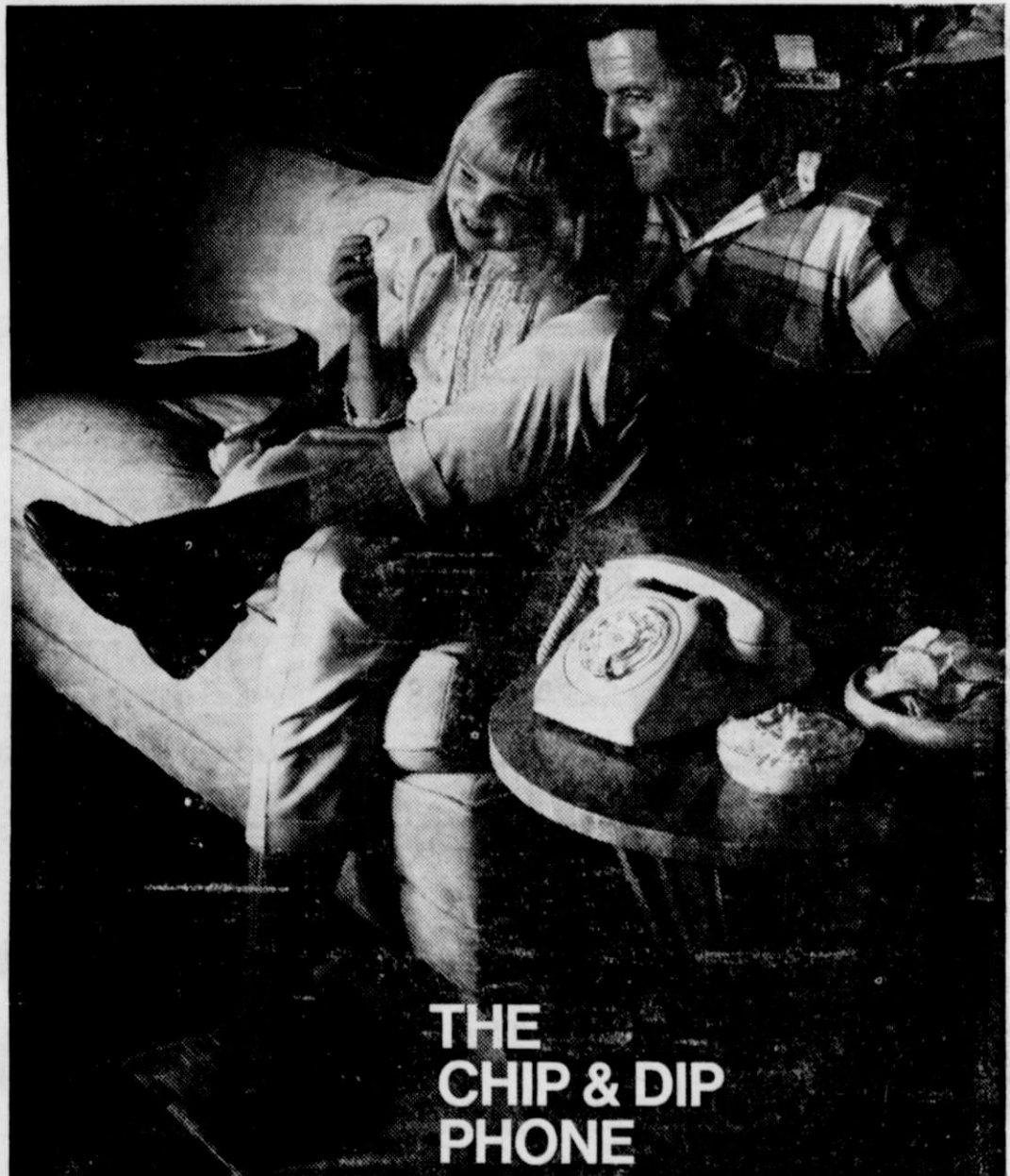

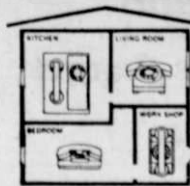
