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State Youth Project Contest Sponsored By Women's Clubs

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Training Program
For Samaritan Home
And Hospital Staff

Washington county hospital and home is about to enter a new phase in development as completion of the beautiful new Samaritan Home and Hospital in West Bend steadily draws nearer.

The completion date of the new building is scheduled for May 28, 1968, Supt. Arnold Korth said. Progress to date, however, has been ahead of schedule and it is anticipated that the new structure will be finished before the contracted date. Korth pointed out, however, that furnishing and equipping the building will also take time before it is finally ready for occupancy.

Mrs. Norman Justl, R.N., director of Hospital Staff Development at the Samaritan Home and Hospital, which is carried out under a federal grant, has provided considerable information of general interest.

The new home and hospital will be located in one building with the upper two floors devoted to the home for the aged or geriatrics and the lower two levels housing the hospital facilities.

A joint cafeteria will be located on the lower floor with a beautiful view of the Milwaukee River to the southeast and an excellent view of West Bend and the old courthouse to the southwest.

Mrs. Justl reports that a training program for all employees has been instituted to provide a staff of well-trained personnel. All new aides attend a basic orientation program and then branch into a basic orientation in psychiatry.

Because of the complete involvement of the workers, all employees are continuously being trained in greater depth and a definite educational plan is set up each year.

At present John C. Jorgensen, a registered physical therapy consultant from the state division of health, district No. 3 at Fond du Lac is engaged in teaching the care of the stroke patient. A film was used for introduction and

now demonstrations and practice of proper body mechanics and lifting and the importance of correct bed positioning are being stressed. Mr. Jorgensen will visit the home and hospital twice a month for four months.

Dr. Maurice Monroe of Hartford visits all patients three times a week and accepts 24 hour call for emergencies.

Dr. William Timken, West Bend dentist, also visits the patients twice a week.

Annual physicals, examinations, chest x-rays, lab tests and Evaluations are carried out by the medical and dental departments.

Dr. Charles A. Cahill, visiting psychiatrist, makes complete rounds, interviews and written evaluations.

The staff keeps abreast of all new developments and visits other institutions and attends seminars pertaining to the needs of the hospital and home.

Indians Laced By First Place Grafton, 37-6

HOST BELLS IN LAST GAME ON DAD'S NIGHT FRIDAY

Awed by the thought of playing powerful Grafton, perennial football and basketball leader in the Scenic Moraine conference, Kewaskum was pounded by the Blackhawks there Friday, 37-6. The win allowed the defending champion Blackhawks to maintain their first place tie with Pewaukee and dropped the Indians into sixth place.

Bill Peshel was back in form for Grafton and that spelled bad news for Kewaskum. The Blackhawk halfback, who had been held in check a week earlier by North Fondy romped through the Indians' defense. Peshel was Grafton's leading ground gainer with 141 yards in 15 carries and hiked his season's rushing total to 874 yards in all games.

Peshel scored three of Grafton's six touchdowns. He scored his first TD late in the first quarter on a 4 yard run, another on a 41 yard run, and the third on a 1 yard plunge. Other Blackhawk TD's were made by Tim Gleason on an end around run, Tom Varow on a 19-yard pass completion and Scott Anderson scored the last one on an end around play. Kewaskum's loney touchdown resulted from a 4 yard run by Jim Manthei. The score at the half was 19-0.

The touchdowns gave Peshel a remarkable 87 points for six Scenic games and he now has an excellent chance of passing the century mark in individual scoring. Jim Schuster of Kewaskum is tied for fourth place in scoring

with 30 points.

A strong wind, recorded at 35 miles an hour, hampered Kewaskum's usually productive passing game and the Indians were only able to complete 1 of 15 passes for a mere two yards.

Kewaskum had other opportunities to score but was stopped on the 19 yard line in the first period and on the 26 yard line in the third quarter. Al Bohn was the leading rusher for the losers with 70 yards in 18 carries. Defensively Sophomore Russ Gavin looked real good for the Indians and he dropped Grafton's quarterback for a couple of losses. Marv Tanck also played well defensively, intercepting two passes, one of which was called back because of a penalty. Marx broke up a couple of other pass attempts.

Grafton made 14 first downs to 9 for Kewaskum and netted total yardage of 337 compared to 153 for the Indians. The winners made 267 yards rushing and Kewaskum 151 and 70 yards passing to only 2 for the Indians. Grafton completed 3 of 10 passes, Kewaskum 1 of 15. Three Indians passes were intercepted as was only 1 of the Blackhawks'. Grafton was penalized 40 yards, the Indians 25.

Kewaskum has a big game coming up tonight (Friday) at 8 o'clock when they host the Campbellsport Bells in the final game of the season. Neither team can go anyplace in the standings but the rivalry always makes this an important contest. The Bells have a 3-3 record and the Indians (2-4) can tie them with a victory. This will also be Dad's Night and the dads of the players will be introduced from the field. Seventeen seniors will be playing their last

game for Kewaskum's varsity. A win will also give the Indians an overall season's record of 4-4. Campbellsport has two good backs - Art Beck, who has been a starter since his sophomore year, and Tom Walch.

On Tuesday afternoon the Kewaskum JV's beat Germantown there, 13-0, to end their season and on Tuesday night at home the Indian freshmen lost to the Warhawk frosh, 23-0.

Slinger High school's cross country runners placed 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 8th and 9th to win handily the Scenic Moraine conference cross country championship on Tuesday, Oct. 17, at the Scenic View golf course at Ackerville.

Mark Bledsoe of Germantown won with a time of 11:53.5 for the 2.2 mile course. Ruben Oppermann of Kewaskum was 2nd with 12:05 and C. Lang, D. Lidington and A. Weninger took 3rd, 4th and 5th. Other scoring runners for Kewaskum were Jeff Schleif 7th, Ron Backhaus 12th, Glen Klug 13th and Ken Zehren 16th. Conference standings are: 1. Mark Bledsoe, Germantown; 5th,

Slinger 26; 2. Kewaskum 50; 2. Grafton 77; 4. Germantown 87; 5. Random Lake 146; 6. North Fondy 158. Campbellsport and Pewaukee were not represented.

In the JV match, Ken Ogi of Kewaskum won with a time of 13:12.9. He was followed closely by teammates John Backhaus and Don Mitchell to place 1, 2 and 3 respectively. Charles Battaglia, Steve Bremser, Tom Luedtke and Len Schmidt finished 5, 6, 7 and 8 which enabled the KHS JV's to compile 17 points to Grafton's 55 and Germantown's 74. Slinger and North Fondy did not have enough runners to comprise a team.

17 Schools Participate in Sectional Meet at Cedarburg

Franklin High school scored 58 points to win the cross country sectional at Cedarburg last Saturday, Oct. 21, and Union Grove placed 2nd with 98 points to qualify for the state cross country meet at Hartford tomorrow (Saturday). Slinger was a close 3rd with 99. Kewaskum ranked 7th among the 17 schools by scoring 202 points.

This ends the 1967 cross country season, during which Kewaskum defeated 36 schools and lost to 25. Last year the team had a 23-23 record. The JV's, on the other hand, amassed a record of 22 wins and 6 losses this year.

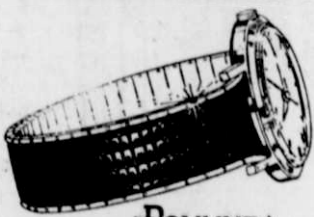
This event, which is sponsored by the Washington County Homemakers, is open to the public and everyone will be able to sample cheese, purchase cheese and also see Alice in Dairyland.

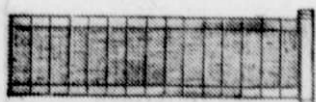
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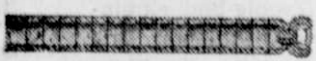
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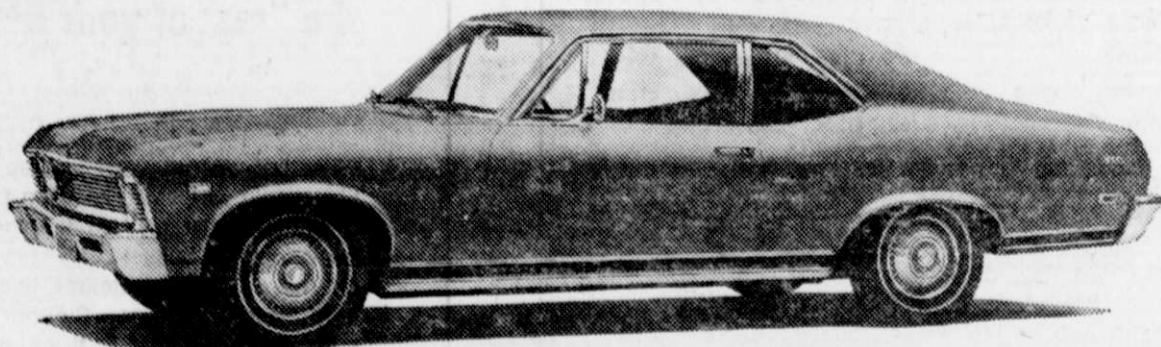
