





GRAFTON, PEWAUKEE SHARE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Kewaskum Indians wound up their Scenic Moraine conference season Friday night at home by beating the Campbellsport Bells, 12-9. The win gave the Indians an overall 4-4 record and 3.4 in the conference, good for a three way tie for fourth place with Campbellsport and Random Lake.

In other final contests, Grafton and Pewaukee both won to wind up with identical 6-1 records and share the conference champion Schuster 7th in ship. Grafton blasted German- Scenic Scoring town, 33-7, and Pewaukee barely defeated stubborn Random Lake 7-0. In the remaining game North Fondy belted Slinger, 33-0, to take third place.





Campbellsport, which had gained over 300 yards on the ground the week before against




