Barry Beimborn, 18, '67 Kewaskum Graduate, Killed in Crash at Wayne

AUTO STRIKES 2 TREES, DEMOLISHED IN MISHAP

The 25th traffic fatality of 1967 in Washington county was recorded early Monday when a rural West Bend youth was killed in a crash at Wayne.

The victim of the mishap was Barry F. Beimborn, 18, of R. 6, West Bend who graduated in spring with the 1967 class of Kewaskum Community High school, of which he was a very popular and well liked member.

Barry was reported driving north on County Trunk Hwy. W, according to the sheriff's department report of the accident, and apparently missed the four-way stop sign at the intersection in Wayne Center. The vehicle continued about 500 feet north of the intersection with County Trunk Hwy. H when the driver lost control of his light car and it careened off the left or west side of the road and struck two trees and rolled over at the north end of Wayne in front of the Salem United Church of Christ school property. The car was demolished in the crash.

The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance was called but Beimborn was pronounced dead at the scene and the body was taken to the Schmidt Funeral home in West Bend. The mishap reportedly occurred after midnight, at about 12:39 a. m. Monday. Beimborn, who was alone in his car, died of chest injuries.

Another driver, also traveling north on CTH W, apparently narrowly avoided becoming involved in the accident. Gene L. Krause, 22, of R. 1, Fredonia, was also northbound on CTH W when he said he "saw lights going around in front of him" according to the sheriff's department report and braked sharply to avoid colliding with the Beimborn vehicle. Krause's car also reportedly went into the ditch but he was not injured. However, his vehicle was damaged.

Beimborn's death raised the highway total in the county to 25 for 1967 or just seven less than the total fatalities for the entire year in 1966. The fatality was the first one in November in Washington county.

Barry F. Beimborn was born at Port Washington on Jan. 2, 1949. He grew up in the town of Farmington and attended Holy Trinity school in Newburg. On completion of his elementary education he attended Kewaskum Community High school, graduating this year. He was an employee of the Gehl Co., West Bend.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Waldemar Beimborn of R. 6, West Bend; two sisters, Joanne at home and Joyce (Mrs. James Warnkey) of West Bend; a brother, Douglas, at home; a brother-in-law, a nephew, uncles, aunts and other relatives and friends.

Visitation was at the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend, after 3 p. m. Wednesday. Parish rosary was at 8 p. m. Funeral services were conducted at 9 a. m. Thursday at the funeral home and at 9:30 at Holy Trinity church, New-

Mrs. F. E. Nolting Is Found Dead, Victim of Stroke

Mrs. F. E. Nolting, 57, owner and manager of Nolting's Beauty Shop in Kewaskum many years, whose husband is a well known Kewaskum dentist, was found dead in her car parked in a wayside along Hwy. 41 near Hwy. 167 in Washington county about 3 p. m. Saturday, Nov. 4. Apparently she was the victim of a cerebral hemorrhage, according to the family physician.

According to Robert Boltz, county coroner, who investigated, Mrs. Nolting apparently was stricken as she drove south on Hwy. 41 and pulled off the highway at the wayside when she felt ill. She was enroute to Milwaukee to meet her daughter. It was reported that when Mrs. Nolting failed to arrive in Milwaukee a call was sent out later to the state traffic patrol to search for her car, which was found at the wayside by a state patrolman. The victim apparently had died some time before she was discovered.

Mrs. Nolting, the former Evelyn Heiden, was born Dec. 5, 1909, at Milwaukee, a daughter of the late Edward and Clara Kaemerling Heiden. Her marriage to Dr. Nolting took place in Milwaukee on Oct. 15, 1932, and she had been a resident of Kewaskum since that time, a period of 35 years.

Survivors include her widower, two daughters, Pamela (Mrs. Gerald Voss) of Wauwatosa and Jennifer Nolting, a student at the University of Wisconsin at Madison; two sisters, Mrs. Ellen Tocco and Miss Norma Harrmann, both of Milwaukee, and one brother, Charles Harrmann, of Milwaukee.

Mrs. Nolting was a member of Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum.

Funeral services were conducted on Tuesday, Nov. 7, at 2 p. m. at Peace United Church of Christ with the Rev. Daniel Schowalter officiating. Interment was in Wisconsin Memorial Park, Milwaukee. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home from 3 p. m. Monday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services on Tuesday.

Open House Held At \$100,000 Seed Warehouse Here

NEW DAIRYLAND CO. PLANT HOST TO DEALERS, PRESS

Open house at the new \$100,000 warehouse, seed processing plant and office rooms of the Dairyland Seed Co. on Hwy. 45 just south of Kewaskum was held from 10:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. on Saturday, Nov. 4.

The open house was the first showing of the new modern Dairyland facilities and was limited exclusively to the various Dairyland dealers, members of the press of this area and their wives, plus a few guests. Test plots were also visited. Refreshments were served at the warehouse, following which guests were invited to a smorgasbord at The Wigwam restaurant. The open house was also the occasion for citing area dealers for sales achievement.

An open house for the public will be held from 2 to 5 p. m. at the Dairyland Seed Co. this Saturday, Nov. 11.

Oliver Vogel of Jackson was recognized by Orville Strachota, president of Dairyland Seed Co. Strachota said, "It is the dealer, filling his customer's personal needs, that has caused our company growth and dealer organization to expand to its present 500 dealers."

Founded in 1907 as a local seed dealer processor, the company has evolved from a side operation of a country store to a most complete seed processing and marketing facility. The new facility comes 60 years after the firm was started at the crossroads community of St. Kilian, about eight miles west of Kewaskum, according to Strachota.

The firm now has 500 farmer dealers in Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota. It has nine employees — including Mrs. Strachota, mother of six—and seasonal help.

Originally known as Strachota Seed Co., it was founded by the Strachota's father, Simon, and uncle, Andrew Strachota, who later withdrew from the business. Seeds were accumulated by local growers, sold to a processor and carried in the store, Strachota said.

Strachota, 48, dropped out of Marquette university at the end of his third year, when his father died. He worked for his mother from 1940 to 1946, then bought out the business. He operated the enterprises, which included the store, a tavern and the seed business, for 10 years, selling the tavern and store and concentrating on seeds since 1955.

The company was incorporated four years ago and set up its dealership program.

The company's history, Strachota said, spanned the years when Washington county was a major producer of white Dutch clover. The product later went out of style as a lawn and pasture ingredient, although some was sold to Germany where high moisture gives it better growth. The price dropped with the production, according to Strachota.

Strupp, Village Native, Is WEA President-Elect

Jerome N. Strupp, who was born in Kewaskum and attended local schools, now a Fond du Lac junior high school principal, is president-elect of the Wisconsin Education association, being elected to that post at the annual convention of the group held in Milwaukee Thursday and Friday, Nov. 2 and 3. Strupp is a son of Mrs. Olive Strupp, now of Oshkosh, and the late Roman Strupp.

John Hafemann, a teacher from West Bend, is the incoming president of the association, effective Dec. 1. Other officers are: Clem J. Crowley, Racine science teacher, first vice-president; R. G. Hein, Waukesha superintendent of schools, second vice-president, and Merlin A. Helstad, Greenfield social studies teacher, third vice-president. Miss Mary Maslowske and Frank B. Wallace were elected to the executive committee and David Schultz, Racine vocal music teacher, was re-elected as the WEA director on the executive board of the National Education association.

Strupp, 40, won over Gary K. Johnson, a Beloit social studies teacher. He had campaigned vigorously for the president-elect post in the last eight weeks, visiting as many local teacher associations as possible and writing to others.

After his family moved from Kewaskum to Oshkosh, Strupp attended Oshkosh public schools and he earned his bachelor of science degree at Oshkosh State in 1949. That fall he started teaching mathematics at Roosevelt Junior High school. He later transferred to social studies. He was made assistant principal at Roosevelt in 1959 and in September, 1960, took over as principal. He has been Woodworth principal since 1962.

More than 22,000 Wisconsin educators attended the WEA convention and were alerted to new advances in education and the issues and problems facing the teaching profession in the coming year. The convention theme was "Education in a Space Age."

Speakers included Milwaukee Mayor Henry Maier, State Superintendent of Public Instruction William Kahl, Gov. Warren P. Knowles and Mrs. Elizabeth Kootz, president-elect of the National Education association from Salisbury, N. C., a Negro.

SCHOOL DISTRICT ACCEPTS PROPOSAL TO PROVIDE SITE

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club's swimming pool committee met with the board of education of Kewaskum Community schools at its regular meeting last Monday night to determine if the school board was interested in having a swimming pool provided on the high school grounds. An offer to build a swim pool was made by the Kiwanis if the school district would provide the site and assume associated costs.

Heading a delegation from the Kiwanis club, Robert Zarlting made this proposal: If the Kiwanis club were to provide an Olympic-size swimming pool, at an estimated cost of \$75,000, would the school district provide the site, the foundation, locker room facilities and needed plumbing? The proposal was gratefully and unanimously accepted. Other Kiwanis representatives were Dr. E. G. Edwards, Burns Nelthorpe and Wayne Rimmel.

Zarlting pointed out "the recognized need" for a swimming pool in the community and explained that the pool would serve the district through a school athletic program and a recreation program. He said his group felt the high school is "the most logical place" for the pool, inasmuch as there is space available for it as well as for locker facilities.

Funds to provide a pool have been growing steadily from the profits realized from the live turkey shoot which local Kiwanians, with the help of hundreds of area residents, have sponsored annually for the past 15 years. The proceeds of the shoot have supported many community youth projects. Five years ago the club provided tennis courts on the high school grounds. It would be primarily funds from this turkey shoot project that would finance a pool.

The line includes alfalfa and forage seeds, hybrid seed corn and twine. It has its own seed breeding program for legumes and corn and maintains a 15 acre test plot at the plant here.

The new facilities, in a steel clad 80 by 260 building, which has 21,120 square feet of floor space, include several types of cleaning mills. There is a "rice mill" in which rough coated cockle seeds are picked out by a series of mohair rollers, a gravity separator over which seeds are agitated, and a magnetic separator, which uses steel dust coatings applied while the seed is moistened and which stick to such weed seeds as buckhorn and dodder.

A vane operated packer has a heat sealing unit to close the bags. Processed and unprocessed seeds are stored on pallets for easy movement.

Curfew Ordinance For Children 1-16 Adopted by Board

HOUR SET AT 10 O'CLOCK WEEKDAYS, 11 WEEKENDS

Regular Meeting October 2, 1967
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tassar presiding and all board members present except Trustee Freehauf.
The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried.
Norbert Serwe and Willard Lynn appeared before the board to inquire what the village's policy is regarding dancing in taverns. The board advised that they would confer with the Police Department on the matter.
Superintendent Oppermann was instructed to clean the river bed of debris during the time the park dam is being repaired.
The board scheduled a meeting for October 23rd to prepare the 1968 budget.
The Crichton Corporation of Milwaukee was authorized to repair the baffles in the incinerator at the quoted price of \$2,390.00.
The Village Attorney was instructed to prepare a "no burning" ordinance with an effective date of January 1, 1968.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 67-3 TO RECREATE SECTION 14.22 TO REPEAL SECTION 14.22 RELATING TO CURFEW:

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum do enact as an Ordinance the following:

Section 1. Section 14.22 is hereby repealed.
Section 2. Section 14.22 is hereby recreated.

SECTION 14.22 CURFEW:
No minor child between the ages of 1 and 16 years shall be allowed on the streets or sidewalks in the Village after the hour of Ten (10) o'clock P. M. on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of each week and after the hour of Eleven (11) o'clock P. M. on Friday and Saturday of each week without being accompanied by either parent or guardian.

The parent or guardian of any child between the ages of 1 and 16 years shall be held liable for the violation of the above mentioned conditions of this section, jointly with such offending child. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this section shall forfeit not less than One (\$1.00) dollar nor more than Ten (\$10.00) dollars besides the costs of prosecution, and in default of payment thereof shall be

imprisoned in the County Jail of Washington County until payment of the same and of subsequent costs but not exceeding Ten (10) days.

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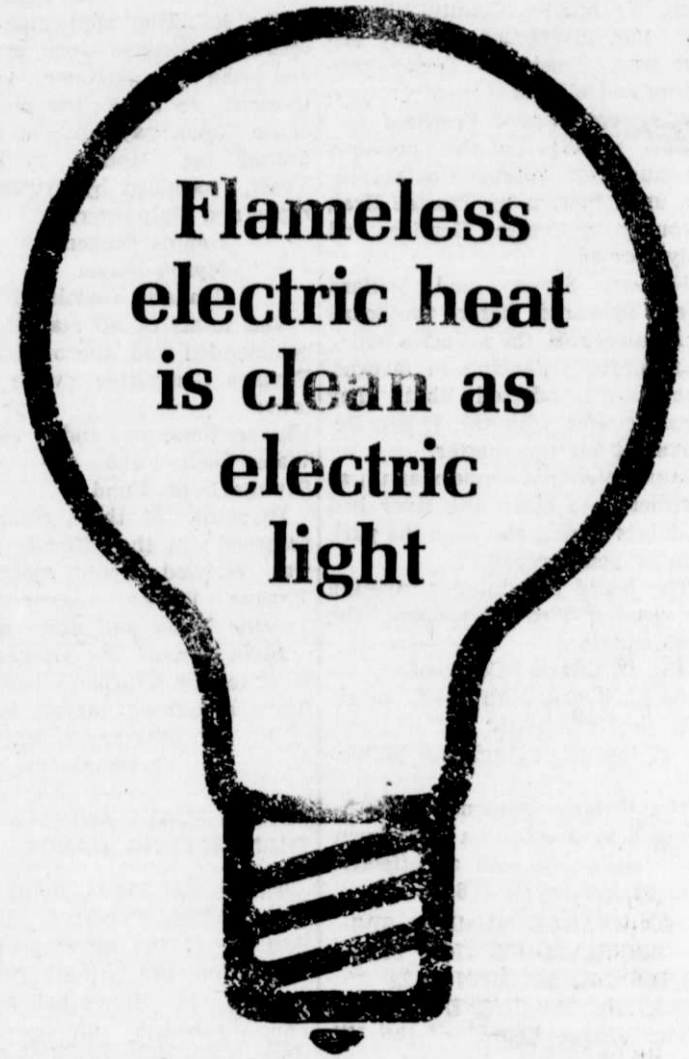
