Board Approves Evening Classes For Area Adults

LATER OPENING OF SCHOOL DISCUSSED

At the meeting of the board of education of Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District held Monday evening, a 10-week adult evening education program was approved for residents of the district.

A recent survey among the residents revealed there is sufficient interest in the evening classes. Superintendent of Schools Marshall Boyd reported there were "well over 100" replies to the survey and that interest centered in the areas of art, sewing, shop and typing.

Courses in which there is the most interest will be offered and classes will meet at 7:30 p. m. from Jan. 11 through March 14. Instructors need not necessarily be trained teachers but skilled persons can be utilized, Boyd said.

Total cost of the program must be borne by the district, he stated, but pointed out that \$1,300 was allotted for that purpose in the 1967-68 budget.

Also discussed was the school calendar for the 1968-69 season. At the annual electors meeting held in July, some objected to beginning the school year in August, as had been the custom, and it was requested then that a survey be taken among parents before next year's calendar is set up.

The school newsletter will include a questionnaire asking if parents favor opening school in August, to end by or shortly after Memorial Day, or opening school after Labor Day and closing approximately June 11 or 12.

On the subject of spring vacation, the questionnaire will ask parents for their preference between a short vacation or at least a full week's spring vacation.

Board members denied the written request made in behalf of Ernest Pomahac of West Bend that he be compensated for inconveniences experienced when the deed to the former Fillmore school, which he purchased from the district, was delayed.

Boyd reported that he is unable to obtain a teacher to instruct the business education department while Miss Margaret Browne is recuperating from illness.

Local chairmen for the annual Retarded Children's Friendship campaign were announced this week. Clifford Stautz will serve as chairman and will be assisted by Mrs. Mary Ann Gruber as co-chairman.

Kiwanis Club Honors Two Outstanding Area Farmers



The Kewaskum Kiwanis club honored two outstanding area farmers at their Farm-City Night program on Monday night. They are William Thull and Gilbert Stoffel.

William Thull and family own a 297 acre farm on which they have:

- Developed 46 acres of contour strips.
- Protected 90 acres of woodland and wildlife habitat from fire and livestock.
- Converted 37 acres of steep cropland to grassland.

The Thull family is doing a wonderful job in conserving our natural resources.

The Gilbert Stoffel family al-

so operates a 297 acre farm. They have been working on their conservation plan since 1965. In this amount of time they have developed the following good practices:

- Developed 172 acres of contour strips.
- Established 24 acres on rented land.
- Removed undesirable trees on the recommendation of the state foresters and developed 3 acres of woodland.
- Developed 1 acre of grass waterways.
- Built 500 feet of diversion terraces.
- Built and developed two ponds for bass and trout and family re-

creation. Developed 2,800 feet of tile drain.

Both families were presented a plaque by Harold Ryan, the soil conservation agent of Washington county, on behalf of the Kiwanis club for their fine work.

The program for the evening ended with an excellent film and report by Del Cook of the Cedar Creek Restoration program.

Grand Jury Opens Investigation in Slaying Near Here

Opened Monday at Fond du Lac was a grand jury investigation into the slaying of a Chicago resident, whose body was found on a farm 1 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum near the Fond du Lac-Washington county line on Sept. 12.

The body, identified through fingerprints as Herbert L. McKinney, 27, a Chicago laborer, was found following the crash of a car driven by Chester J. Dombrowski, 30, Chicago police officer, on Hwy 45 north of Kewaskum in Washington county just south of the Fond du Lac county line. The Chicago police department has absolved Dombrowski of any connection with the slaying. McKinney was reported beaten and shot in the head.

The body was found on a seldom-used farm dump, face up and nude except for a pullover T-shirt, owned by Dombrowski and a brother Bernard about 100 yards from County Trunk S. District Attorney Robert J. Kauffman of Washington county said 15 witnesses from Washington county, including Kewaskum, had been subpoenaed to the investigation.

Car Hits Barricade, Runs Over Hydrant

Thomas D. Hanson, 20, of W150N7794 Hilltop dr., Menomonee Falls, was the driver of a car involved in an accident which occurred at 1 a. m. Friday at 1538 Fond du Lac ave. in front of the American Legion clubhouse.

Hanson was traveling south on Fond du Lac ave. when his auto struck a barricade guarding a fresh patch of concrete in the street. The barricade was guarded by cones, pot flares and flashing warning lights. Hanson then lost control of his vehicle, which crossed the highway, mounted the curb and ran over a fire plug. He continued across the lawn of the Legion grounds, then regained control of his car and drove back onto the highway. The driver left the scene only to return a few moments later.

According to Patrolmen Donald Hlavaty and Dennis Scott, who investigated, damage to the hydrant and barricade was estimated at \$300 and to the lawn at \$50. Damage to the right front headlamp and right rear fender of Hanson's car was estimated at \$600. He was charged with inattentive driving.

Local Man Has Car, Coat Stolen At Bowling Lanes

In connection with the theft of a car from the parking lot at Weiland's Recreation, 1022 S. Main st., West Bend, between 6:15 and 9:30 p. m. Tuesday, West Bend and Washington county police Wednesday morning were on the lookout for a blond-haired man with a long, crew haircut, about 5 feet, 10 inches tall, green eyes and weighing about 175 pounds, whom they wanted to question.

West Bend police reported that Merlin Dreher, 320 Main st., Kewaskum, reported his car, coat and car keys stolen at about 9:30 p. m. He told police that he had arrived at Weiland's bowling lanes at about 6:15 p. m. and had hung his coat, containing his car keys, near the door. When he was ready to leave at about 9:30, he discovered his coat missing. A check outside revealed that his car was also missing.

Investigating officers found Dreher's car parked in the parking lot of the Jackson motel in Jackson at about 12:30 a. m. Wednesday. The owner of the motel stated he could not associate one occupant of the motel with the cars parked in the parking lot. When officers aroused the man, he claimed that he had just started working for the Gehl Co. in West Bend and that a friend of his, whom he said also worked for the company, had taken his car to Milwaukee.

A check with the Gehl Co. concerning the employment of the two men could not be verified. Wednesday morning the company notified the police that no such men had worked there recently. When police returned to the motel to question the man they had aroused earlier, he had left.


With the theft of Dreher's car, another auto was left abandoned on the Weiland parking lot. Police discovered that this car had been reported missing in Milwaukee and it is believed that the same person who stole Dreher's car had abandoned the Milwaukee car on the lot.

Police requested any citizen noticing a man fitting the description given, and probably wearing a gray, waist length coat with two black vertical stripes in the front (Dreher's coat) to notify the Washington county sheriff's department or West Bend police.

Erickson Completes Training

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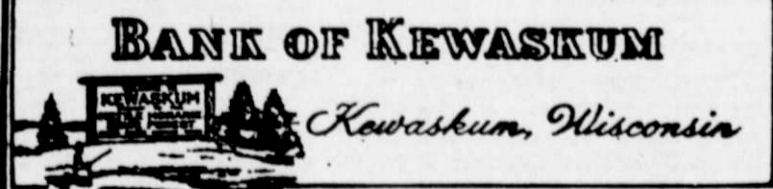

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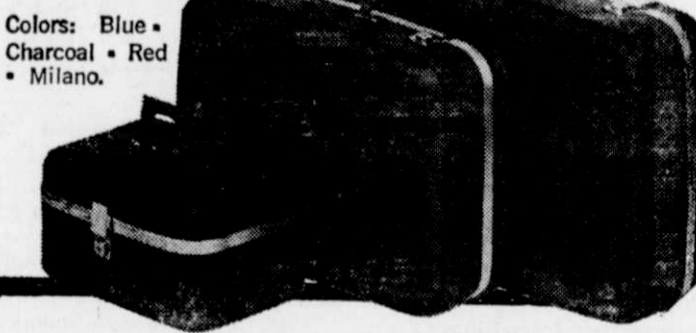
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Sr. M. Adelaide, Edw. Bingen Die

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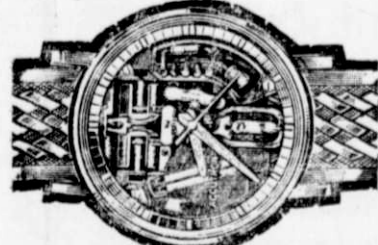

The Kewaskum Indians spurred in the closing minutes to beat Rosendale, 53-48, there last Tuesday night for their first victory in three non-conference games before opening the Scenic Moraine conference campaign at Germantown tonight (Friday). In previous tilts they had lost to Cedar Grove and Plymouth.

Kewaskum led Rosendale 15-13 at the quarter, 27-26 at halftime, and 42-38 at the end of the third period but the Dalers closed the gap in the final stanza and went ahead 48-47 with a minute remaining. Then the Indians rallied for the final six points of the game to win by a margin of five.

The Dalers' Jim Daehm was again a standout in defeat. He led all scorers with 22 points and helped himself to 10 rebounds. Mike Hoch chipped in with 10 points for the losers. Kewaskum used balanced scoring to offset the individual performance of Daehn. Three players scored in double figures for the Indians, who hit 23 of 51 shots from the floor. Pacing the winners were Al Bohn with 12 points and George Martin and Marv Tanck with 11 apiece.

The Indians again were out-pointed from the free throw line, 10-7. Poor free throw shooting cost them the game against Plymouth the week before.

Following the contest at Germantown tonight, Kewaskum will open its home conference season next Friday, Dec. 8, hosting Pewaukee.

Total Deer Kill in County Is 254

HUGE BUCK BAGGED BY JIMMY HAMMES

The final count of deer taken in the Washington county area during the hunting season which closed Sunday evening indicated that a total of 254 animals were registered at the five county points and in the field, Armin Schwengel, district game manager, reported.

This number compares favorably with the 266 over-all record total last year, especially when the extremely heavy kill of animals by moving vehicles on highways in the county this year is taken into consideration. Bob Lake, game warden, reported that close to 100 deer were killed in highway mishaps this year, especially in heavy traffic over weekends. Many of the deer were seen in herds of several animals crossing the highways when at least one of the deer in the group was struck. There were also many "near misses" by cars.

The number of animals tallied at the various registration points in the county were: Sheriff's department, 147; Hartford police department, 38; Del Frank's tavern, Jackson, 27; Tally Ho Inn, Thompson, 20, and Brietenbach's Resort on Hwy. 167, 17. There were also five deer registered by Bob Lake in the field.

While there were no hunting injuries reported in the county, there were several incidents of vandalism and damage from stray shots.

One of the biggest bucks reported that dressed out at 217 pounds, was bagged by Jim Hammes of 1318 Riverview dr., Kewaskum. The rack was a big one but consisted of only six points. The animal was weighed at Waupaca after Jim shot it three miles

north of Ogdensburg. Hammes also bagged a party deer. His party of five Kewaskum area hunters returned home with four bucks and one doe. The group also included Don Hammes, Bill and Myron Heberer and Marv Perkins.

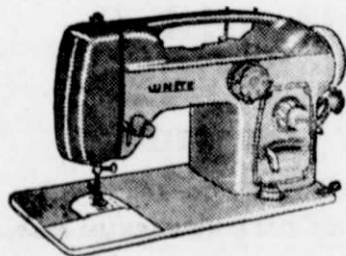
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
