Wayne Mill Completely Destroyed By Fire Early Saturday Morning Feed and Grain Also Destroyed; Records Saved

BLAZE FOUGHT BY FIREMEN FROM THREE DEPARTMENTS

The Wayne Milling & Supply feed mill building in Wayne at the junction of County Trunk Hwys. H and W about five miles west of Kewaskum was completely destroyed by fire early Saturday morning.

Cause of the fire was not determined. The blaze broke out shortly after midnight, at approximately 12:20 a. m. Saturday, apparently in the portion of the mill housing the mixer equipment, it was reported by Fire Chief Wilmer Herman of Kohlsville.

Embers from the burning structure, fanned by a brisk northeast wind, were reported carried as far as a mile and a half from the scene, endangering nearby buildings at a distance.

Primarily because of the danger from the flying embers, Chief Herman summoned aid from the Kewaskum and Allenton fire departments. An estimate of the fire loss could not immediately be made, the fire chief said, since the amount of feed and grain destroyed in the blaze was still undetermined. It was believed that some of such supplies might be able to be salvaged since they were stored in metal bins on the south side of the building, which remained standing.

The milling firm is presently owned by Robert Literski of Milwaukee, who took over the business several years ago, Chief Herman said. Ground and mixed feed compounds for farm animals were sold at the mill.

The mill manager, Robert Schraufnagel, who lives nearby, managed to gain entrance to the office portion of the building through the rear of the mill and saved most of the firm's records. Firemen from Kohlsville also assisted in saving office supplies when they arrived on the scene.

Fire fighters of the three departments kept the flames from spreading to a nearby car shed and large brooder and hatchery buildings on the property. Kewaskum firemen fought the blaze for nearly two hours, while fire fighters from Kohlsville remained at the scene until 9 a. m. Sunday. Remains of the structure continued to smolder all day Saturday and Sunday, but rain and snow eliminated possible further danger.

Flames from the fire knocked out a high voltage and telephone lines in the area and crews were busy Saturday restoring the damage. Chief Herman said additional help from the Kewaskum and Allenton fire departments was obtained through use of a new two-way radio installed in a Kohlsville truck only the day before and also through use of the two-way sheriff's department squad car radios which were at the scene. County and local squad cars halted and re-routed traffic and controlled spectators at the scene.

Regal Acquires New Plant in Mississippi

DIFFERENT PRODUCT FIELD ENTERED; WILL BE KNOWN AS REGAL SOUTHERN, INC.

Regal Ware, Inc. will enter a different product field as a result of a new plant acquisition according to an announcement by James D. Reigle, president of the Kewaskum firm.

Reigle stated, "This is a modest acquisition on the part of our company. The plant is the former Housewares Division of Norris Industries, Inc. located in Flora, Mississippi. It will enable Regal to enter marketing areas with new types of products. These include copper clad, aluminum clad and Teflon finished stainless steel items."

Regal will operate the Flora plant as a wholly-owned subsidiary. It will be known as "Regal Southern, Inc.," and will continue to be headed by its present management.

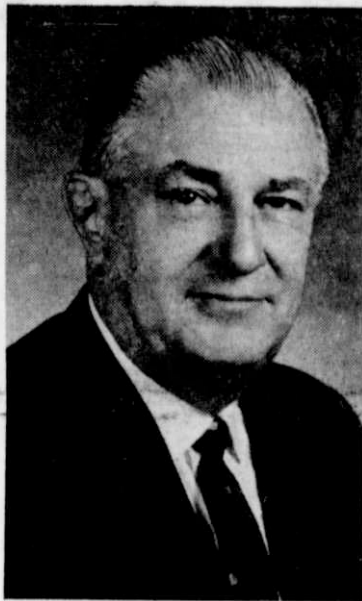
Name George Hess Regal Assistant To the President
