## Conduct Bus Safety Program at Schools

Kewaskum area schools are presently conducting discussions on bus safety. Booklets, which are being used in all grades, emphasize the need for good bus habits as well as desired kinds of behavior while on school buses.

Another part of the safety program will be actual practice of exiting a bus under simulated emergency conditions. FFA club members will assist in these emergency drills.

## Auto Hits Steps, Railing at Hotel

A 17-year-old Kewaskum youth was charged with leaving the scene of an accident after the auto he was driving struck the concrete steps and metal railing leading into the front entrance of the Glacier Inn at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. at 12:35 a. m. last Wednesday.

Local police reported the car was found and the driver apprehended at Hwy. 41 and CTH H about seven miles west of Kewaskum later. Officers followed a trail of water leaking from the damaged radiator of the car, which had to be stopped for lack of water in the radiator.

The police report indicated the youth was westbound on Main st. when he lost control of his vehicle. His car crossed the roadway at the safety island, mounted the curb on the left side of the street and struck the front steps and railing of the Glacier Inn, causing extensive damage to the railing and right front and windshield of the car.

The driver then backed his auto onto Hwy. 45 and attempted to leave the scene. When the youth was seen driving south on Hwy. 45, local police radioed to a county officer in the area since the Kewaskum police jurisdiction is limited to the village limits.

The youth and his parents were scheduled to come before Chief Pledl Thursday morning.

Two persons were injured early Monday in a one vehicle accident south of Kewaskum when a car driven by Anthony J. Bakes, 20, of River Hills, which was traveling east of Badger rd., apparently crossed Hwy. 45 and struck the embankment. Injured were Bakes who incurred severe facial cuts and a passenger, Joanne E. Zingsheim, 20, of West Bend, who suffered a cut mouth and a gash on her right leg.

## SCHOOL CALENDAR SURVEY COMPLETED

Nearly two hundred families of Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint District No. 2, returned the opinion questionnaire on school calendars from last month's newsletter, according to Superintendent of Schools Marshall H. Boyd.

Electors showed a preference for having school start a week prior to Labor Day by a vote of 118 to 80. A short spring recess has strong support as evidenced by a 153 to 45 vote in favor of a short recess.

## Man Charged With Reckless Use of Firearms

Reckless use of firearms in the village of Kewaskum was charged against Richard Kreif, 24, of R. 2, Kewaskum, when he appeared before Judge R. J. Stoltz in Branch 2 of Washington County Court on Tuesday. A two-month sentence in the county jail was stayed and Kreif was placed on probation for a period of 18 months.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl reported that Kreif used a 20-gauge shotgun to shoot at a dog in the yard of the home where he lives along Hwy. 45 near the south village limits. The incident was reported as occurring at 1:30 p. m. last Friday.

Kreif and his family are upstairs tenants in a home owned by Vincent Tyda. The Tyda family occupies the lower apartment of the home and their children were in the yard at the time of the shooting and were trying to coax their pet dog into the house.

Kreif told local police he knew children were in the yard. He said he did not see them but admitted hearing their voices. According to Chief Pledl the shot was aimed toward Hwy. 45, which is quite heavily traveled at that time, in the direction of the Johnson Trailer Court across the highway. Police retrieved the gun.

Also appearing before Judge Stoltz was Allen R. Roth, 28, of Hartford, who was fined \$75 for inattentive driving involving an accident. On Nov. 19 Roth fell asleep at the wheel of his car and drove into the garage at the Roger McKenna residence at 1195 Hillside dr. Two cars parked inside the garage were shoved through a rear wall.

Judge Stoltz also disposed of one disorderly conduct charge involving a local man and three local traffic charges Tuesday.

She was born July 28, 1897, in the town of Osceola, the daughter of the late Michael and Charity Romaine Calvey.

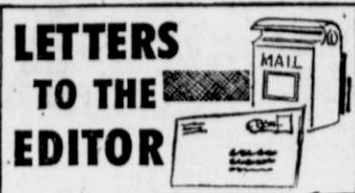
Survivors include her brother, Vincent Calvey, of the town of Osceola; four sisters, Mrs. Wil-

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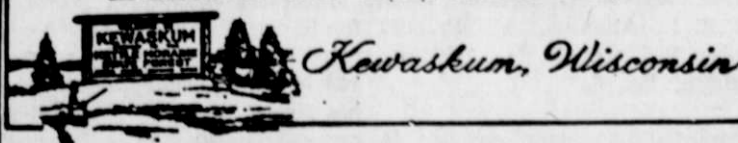
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## Village Board Accepts Bid for New Dump Truck

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## Retarded Children in Blue Ridge Are Taught to 'Play' by March of Dimes

Child's play has become serious business for two attractive youngsters living high in the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Unlike most children who can't wait to rush out of the house every morning, romping and make-believe don't come naturally to Eddie, 6, and Shirley Frazier, 7, of Crozet, Va.

The pity is that the Blue Ridge Mountains would seem a paradise for children's play. Tinkling waterfalls lift their music everywhere. Great oaks and flowers grow lavishly over the landscape.

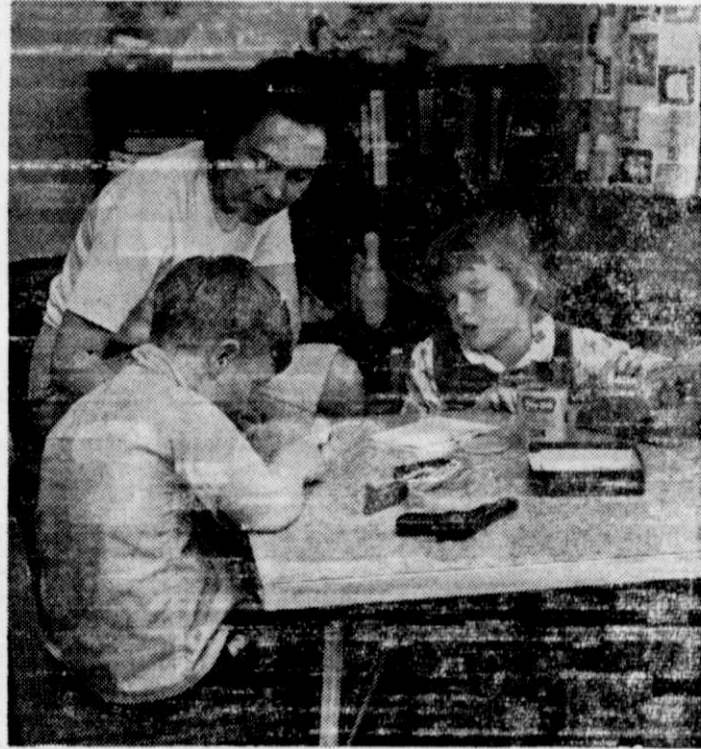
This brother and sister actually have to be taught how to play and have fun. These recreation lessons are part of their treatment at the March of Dimes Birth Defects Center at the University of Virginia School of Medicine, Charlottesville.

A visitor to the Frazier's weatherbeaten home, a cinder-block-and-shingle cottage hidden in the mists of the mountains, learns quickly why "play" is a word without joyous meaning for Eddie and Shirley. The reason they don't try to pet the nearly tame doe grazing close by, or romp around with stray cats and dogs, is that they are mentally damaged.

"When they aren't having their head spells (convulsions)," explains their mother, Mrs. Josephine Frazier, as she performs her chores, "they just sit around staring. Why won't these kids play?"

Blonde and blue-eyed Eddie and Shirley both suffer from several birth defects. One is an error in their metabolism, the vital process by which food is transformed into energy. Another is cerebral palsy, a lack of muscular control caused by brain damage. Aside from these problems, the children neither see nor hear well. Shirley can babble, but she cannot speak words.

From the Frazier home it's like entering another world as you cautiously drive down

the precipitous road into Charlottesville, where the March of Dimes Birth Defects Center is located. Here the sun-filled recreation rooms for the young patients, and the unflagging optimism of the staff of pediatricians, speech and recreation therapists, psychologists and social workers, contrast sharply with the gloom at the Frazier cottage 5,000 feet up in the scudding clouds of the Blue Ridge.

Dr. Marilyn H. Grundig, one of the staff psychologists, sees the Frazier children for purposes of training when Eddie and Shirley and their mother slip down their mountain peak and journey into Charlottesville for check-ups.

"What we are doing here,"

she explains, "is preventing Eddie and Shirley from slipping further into retardation. We have brought Eddie along to the point where he is educable. In time to come, he'll be a reasonably useful citizen."

"Shirley is not educable, but the wonderful thing is that we have brought her along to the point where she is trainable. That's to say she can be taught self-care. Progress has been made possible by teaching these two handicapped children how to relate to others here. You might say that they are being taught to play by themselves and to play with others. This is of enormous importance in the prevention of their further withdrawal from the real world."

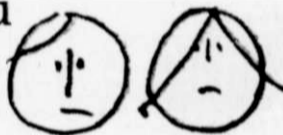

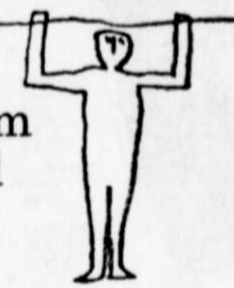

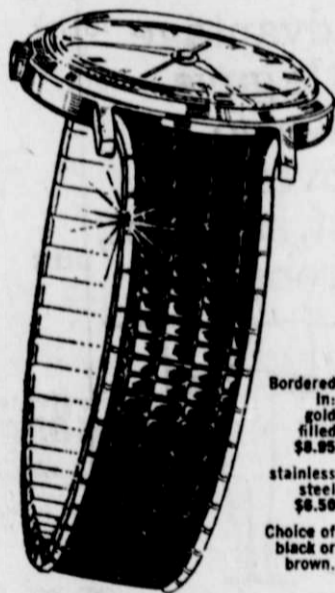

# Are you holding up the U.S. Mail?

People hold up mail service for themselves and for everyone else by not using Zip Code on their mail.

Their mail has to be sorted and re-sorted several times along its route. A single unzipped letter can slow up the mail at 6 post offices!

But when your letter has Zip Code, postal workers can sort it faster and send it more directly to its destination.

They will use modern electronic machines that "read" Zip numbers and sort mail fifteen times faster than was possible before.

1. Always add Zip Code to every address you write to. If you don't know the number, call your post office or look it up in their Zip Code Directory. Local Zips can be found on the Zip Map in the business pages of your phone book.
2. Add Zip Code to your return address, too. That makes it easy for others to Zip their mail to you.

The post office must handle over 200 million new pieces of mail a day. Don't hold it up. Use Zip Code!

### HOW ZIP CODE WORKS

Suppose the Zip Code is 60635. The "6" says it goes to the Midwest. The "06" narrows it down to Chicago. The last two digits—"35"—pinpoint the local post office. This eliminates many handling procedures. The letter is sorted faster, and sent more directly to its destination.
