## Mrs. Newton Rosenheimer Dies Sunday

LAST CHARTER MEMBER OF KEWASKUM WOMAN'S CLUB

Mrs. Newton W. (Linda) Rosenheimer, nee Holley, 79, a resident of Kewaskum for 53 years, passed away Sunday morning, Jan. 28, at the Cedar Lake Home for the Aged, where she made her home for the past 2½ years. She had been ailing for the past two years.

Mrs. Rosenheimer was born April 4, 1888, at Marshfield, the daughter of the late John and Mattie Babcock Holley. She moved to Antigo with her parents at an early age. She graduated from Antigo High school, attended Milwaukee Downer college for two years, and later graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1911. Before her marriage she was a teacher at Kewaskum High school and Antigo High school.

Her marriage to Newton W. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum took place at Antigo on June 24, 1913, and the couple resided in Kewaskum until going to Cedar Lake Home about 2½ years ago. Mr. Rosenheimer preceded her in death at the home on Aug. 25, 1966. One daughter, Patricia, predeceased her on Feb. 25, 1930.

Surviving are a daughter, Linda (Mrs. Robert Kroncke) of Kewaskum; a son-in-law, Robert G. Kroncke; three grandchildren, Robert N. and Mary Kroncke, students at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and Kathleen Kroncke, a senior at Kewaskum High school; a sister, Mrs. E. C. Johnson, of Fort Wayne, Ind. Another sister, Miss Harriet Holley, predeceased her.

Mrs. Rosenheimer was the last living charter member of the Kewaskum Woman's club, a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, and the Women's Guild of the church, and a member of the DAR of Antigo.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Jan. 31, at Peace United Church of Christ with Pastor Daniel Schowalter officiating. Interment was in the Rosenheimer family cemetery at Slinger. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home from 3 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

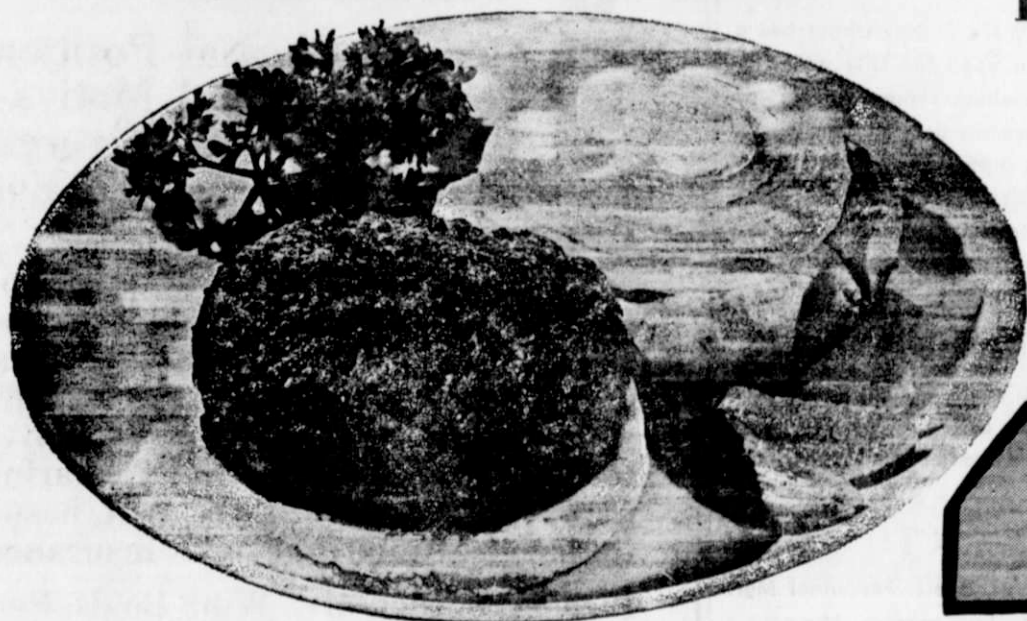

Chase served as a company commander in the Combat Engineers in Germany from 1954-56; earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Marquette University in 1954 and his Master's in business management in 1962 from the same school. Active in community and state affairs, he was a member of the Governor's Task Force for Improved Expenditure Management (Kellet committee), a member of the National Education committee of the Budget Executives Institute, and is president of the Holy Angels congregation Confraternity of

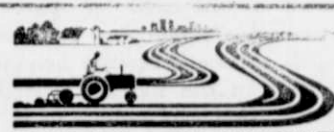
The result of this program was a comprehensive science curriculum for the schools. The new program will be used beginning with the arrival of the new textbooks.
