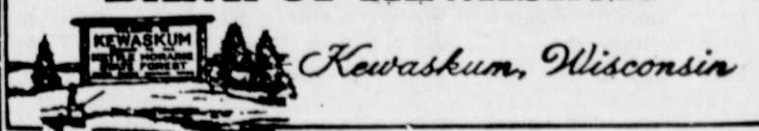

Six Injured in Two Accidents

Five persons were injured in a two car collision on Hwy. 45 south of Kewaskum at approximately 8:26 p. m. Saturday. The mishap occurred when autos driven by Sylvester Stern, 32, West Bend, and Paul Boegel, 21, Kewaskum, collided almost head-on according to the county sheriff's department. The Stern car was traveling south and the Boegel auto was reported northbound. The accident apparently occurred in the northbound lane, it was indicated. Further details of the crash were still undetermined earlier this week.

Injured were Sharon Scharf, 21, R. 1, Lomira, who incurred bruises; Boegel, severe chest pains; John Fleischmann, 21, R. 1, Campbellsport, severe lacerations to right leg; Barbara Scharf, broken

nose and left hand injuries, and Stern, lacerations to his head and bruises.

**SERIES OF COUNTY SESSIONS CONTINUES**

This prefix name use has been granted by Holstein-Friesian Association of America and has become a part of official breed records at the organization's headquarters in Brattleboro, Vermont.

More than 2,500 prefixes are registered Holstein breeders each year. Over 46,000 now on file are used to give distinctive names to homebred cattle. Reservation and use of these prefix names became an active membership requirement in 1965.

By using a prefix name for his animals, the pured Holstein breeder establishes a "trade mark" which is used in all published information concerning the performance of his dairy animals.

The origination of prefix names often stems from farm names, family name combinations, or unique geographical or historical features of the farmstead. Thus, the exclusive nature of each prefix is preserved in selecting a "one and only" term.

### Cedar Creek Restoration Is Success; Milwaukee River Next

Cedar creek is almost free of pollution after three years work by interested citizens. These and other details of the cleaning of Cedar creek were heard by more than 50 county residents at the seventh meeting of the Washington County Beautification council Jan. 30. Delbert Cook, chairman of the Cedar Creek Restoration council, showed slides and described the work of his group at the meeting open to all county residents at the courthouse in West Bend.

Cook said that his council was formed three years ago, and sponsored the first annual "Cedar Creek Clean-up Day" in Cedarburg in 1966. He recounted how the entire community cooperated, including the civil defense, the firemen and police, the park board, the American Legion, merchants and many more.

The student council recruited 350 of the high school's 700 pupils to help. Work started at 9 a. m. and ended at noon when lunch was served by the legion auxiliary. Each ten pupils were supervised by an adult and given a portion of the creek to clean. More than 20 truck loads of debris were hauled from the river. And according to Cook the only casualties were "one cut finger and one punctured toe."

Now Cook is joining forces with the Milwaukee river Restoration Council. They hope to form local councils covering the entire Milwaukee river water system. Apr. 27 has been set as survey day for the Milwaukee River. Cook emphasized that it takes only two hours to take the survey if enough people help. Each team is given a map of a section of the river and told what to look for.

Mrs. Glenn Peters, president of the beautification council, announced that Bob Stodola, county 4-H agent; Maurice Hovland, agricultural agent, and Art Lonergan, West Bend landscaper, would head the county's Milwaukee river survey committee. Mrs. Peters said that the council has set Apr. 21 to 27 as Community Pride Week. It is hoped that county resident will make a special effort

to plant trees, bushes, flowers or grass in their communities to cover blighted areas. Since the Milwaukee River Survey Day will be during Community Pride Week, Mrs. Peters thought it could be incorporated with the county observance.

Maurice Hovland gave each township representative a copy of their town map to be used in surveying the towns. He said he did not have maps of cities or villages available and council members from these communities should get them from the cities. Hovland also announced that trees and shrubs had been donated to the council and these would be available to local beautification committees for their projects.

Mrs. Willard Prost, town of Kewaskum representative, read an essay written by a 4-H member after viewing slides of the county. The 12 year old thought it would be nice to make a park out of the area used by the old depot in Kewaskum.

Council members reported on projects underway or planned. Cornelius Gundrum, chairman, town of Addison, said one mile of town road on Alpine dr. was set aside to preserve the natural growth along the road. This was done in compliance with a request by the conservation department that each town preserve one mile in its natural state. Frederick Schroeder, 6th district assemblyman, said he thought it would be wise to obtain the consent of property owners bordering the road.

Albert Schroeder, chairman, town of Trenton, and John Lamm, Jackson, a landscaper, described the removal of dead elms in Trenton. Schroeder also announced that poison ivy was going to be sprayed next spring. Don Sager

Campbellsport took the team championship in the Scenic Moraine conference wrestling meet held at Slinger Saturday with 104 points. Grafton placed second with 99 points, while Kewaskum copped third honors with 79 points. Other teams finished as follows: Random Lake 69, Slinger 49, Germantown 40, and North Fondy 27. Pewaukee did not compete in the meet.

The champion Bells and third place Indians each produced three individual champions in the meet. Kewaskum's champs who won all three matches were Leo Gundrum (127), Chuck Bindrich (165) and John Bonlender (heavyweight). These three local champions advanced to the regional meet at Port Washington Thursday and Saturday of this week. Bouts on Saturday at Port will begin at 12:30 and 7:30 p. m. The winners and runners-up in each weight will then advance to the sectional tournament at Brown Deer next Friday night and all day Saturday.

Bindrich, defending Scenic champion is undefeated this season and has a perfect 13-0 record in all matches. He looms as Kewaskum's leading contender to win in the regional and sectional meets. Bonlender owns a 9-2 record and Gundrum's record is 13-3-3 for the season. Tom Schmidt (103) of Kewaskum is also competing in the regional. He was a runner-up (second) in the Slinger conference meet, losing in the finals to Dick Averbeck of North Fondy, who won his second straight Scenic title in the 103 lb. class. Each wrestler has to win three matches before emerging as champion in these tournaments.

## Indians Lose to Grafton, Beat Random Lake

The Kewaskum Indians split two games played the past week, losing to Grafton, which now shares a three-way tie for first place, on the home floor Friday, 73-52, and besting Random Lake, which shares a three-way tie for last place, there Tuesday, 51-45.

Grafton had to turn on the steam in the second half to pull away to victory over the Indians. After a sluggish first half, the Blackhawks were ahead by only a single point at the intermission, 28-27. Then Grafton started to hit and pulled away, outscoring Kewaskum in the third quarter, 25-12, and in the final stanza, 20-12, to win by 21 points.

Mike Peterson, who snapped off 21 rebounds and scored 18 points for the second week in a row for the defending Scenic Moraine champions, paced the second half surge. Grafton hit 20 of 38 shots the last two quarters. The winners' Gruetzmacher was high scorer for the evening with 20 points, while M. Cebulski chipped in 14. High point men for the Indians were George Martin with 11 points, and Perry Koth and Marv Tanck with 10 apiece.

Kewaskum tightened its grip on fifth place with the win at Random Lake Tuesday. The Indians hit only 23 per cent of their shots (21 out of 88) but managed to outscore Random Lake, 12-6, in the final quarter to post the victory. The Rams took 26 fewer shots (62) and made 18 for a luke warm 29 per cent. Kewaskum led

at the quarter, 13-11, but trailed at halftime, 29-27.

Slinger romped over Random Lake, 92-54, and Germantown won over Campbellsport, 69-64. In other games Tuesday Grafton knocked over leading North Fondy, 70-68 (after leading by 18 points at one time) to throw the race into a three-way tie: Slinger got a battle from Campbellport but won 70-51, and Pewaukee barely nosed out tail-end Germantown, 55-54, in overtime.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians travel to Slinger to tangle with the team tied for first place.

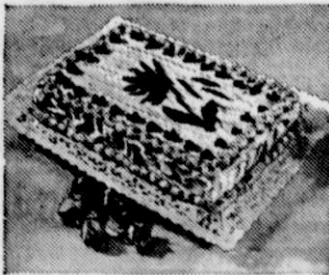
## Valentine "Card" A Sweet Reward



What mother doesn't treasure those homemade Valentine cards with big awkward letters that spell I LOVE YOU! Why not reward your child's "labor of love" this Feb. 14 with a sweet Valentine's Day card made from cake and decorated with sprightly red cranberries. (How's that for a clever card trick!)

**Count-the-Petals Cake:** Place a flat 1-layer cake on a big paper lace doily, then frost cake with fluffy pink frosting. Remove jellied cran-

berry sauce whole from a 1-lb. can by opening both ends and pushing sauce gently out onto a flat plate. Slice cranberry sauce into 1/2-inch slices. Cut 11 long thin petal shapes from the slices with a paring knife; place in center of cake to form a daisy's petals. In the same manner cut stem and petals for daisy from sauce. Use a small heart-shaped cookie cutter to cut hearts from remaining sauce; use them to form a border of hearts on the cake.



**Individual Valentine Cards:** Cut pound cake in 1/2-inch slices. Trim slices to oblong shape or cut into heart or other shapes. Spread each slice thinly with cream cheese. Slice jellied cranberry sauce into 1/2-inch slices. Cut hearts from sauce with cookie cutter; arrange on pound cake slices. See the illustration for other design possibilities.
