Packed House Enjoys Packer Exhibition Here

GREEN BAY WINS GAME, 45-41; CAPP TOP SCORER

The pro champion Green Bay Packer All-Stars packed them in at the Kewaskum High school gym in their exhibition basketball game against the Kewaskum Educators Sunday afternoon. The capacity crowd of approximately 1,200 persons enjoyed every minute of the action, and there was plenty.

The Packers won the contest, 45-41, but were given a "scare" by the bandy, "slightly out-weighted" Educators, who appeared like a team of midgets against the giant Packers. For example: Defensive Tackle Jim Weatherwax, height 6-7, weight 260; Offensive Tackle Bob Skoronski, height 6-3, weight 250; Center Ken Bowman, height 6-2, weight 235. But fortunately the Packers brought "little" Offensive Halfback Elijah Pitts, only 6-1 and 210, and Defensive Halfback Doug Hart, 6-1 and 190. When the Packers made their appearance on the floor the Educators became heroes by just showing up.

The score was unimportant. It was the chance to see the world's champs at close range, cheer them, talk to them and pat them on the back that made a hit with the fans. That and the comedy, football tactics and other antics pulled off by the Packers kept the crowd in stitches.

The Packers should have had many more holding, illegal procedure and unnecessary roughness penalties called on them but the officials were very lenient. Frequently they neglected to dribble the ball when plowing through the line or around end. With the Packers trained and used to roughness, blocking, shoving and bodily contact, they really threw their bodies into the scuffle and a couple of the Educators came to rest in the bleachers.

On the other hand the Packers, especially Bowman and Hart, were clowns and enjoyed toying with their comparatively undersized opponents. On one play Bowman was called for traveling—he literally picked up Referee Augie Bilgo (pretty hefty himself), threw him over his shoulder and ran right out of the gym with him. Bowman returned wearing the referee's shirt and took over officiating temporarily. On another out-of-bounds call Hart wound up near the top of the bleachers sitting amidst a group of young ladies. When he returned to the floor he was wearing a pair of panties. Near the end of the game the Packers demonstrated a couple of football plays and tried to make a basket in point-after touchdown style by kicking the ball from formation. Also Coach La Marche threw in all 18 of his Educators at one time against the Packers. These were just a few of the crowd-pleasing antics.

Dick Capp was high scorer for the Packers and the game with 23 points. Hart made 8, Pitts 6, Weatherwax and Bowman 4 apiece and Skoronski 0. The Educators changed players and lineups continuously so none of them took

A brass sextet comprised of high school students played before the game and started things off with the National Anthem. The high school girls' drill team performed at halftime. Jackie Meyer and Kyle Seitz were cheer leaders dressed in football uniforms. Souvenir booklet-programs and posters in the Packer colors were sold at the game by Jr. Woman's club members and the FHA was in charge of concessions.

Firemen Busy, Answer 3 Calls

Kewaskum firemen were kept busy in answering three calls the past week, none of which was serious.

The firemen were called out at 2 a. m. last Thursday when fire apparently broke out in a dust collector unit in the buffing department at the Regal Ware, Inc. plant. Members of the plant fire brigade had the blaze under control by the time the fire department arrived. Firemen devoted their efforts to checking the plant for other possible fires and airing out the building, which was filled with smoke.

At 8 p. m. Tuesday firemen were summoned to a grass fire at the village incinerator property on the Kewaskum hill near the south village limits. The blaze is believed to have started from a rubbish fire started by someone near the incinerator. Firemen were out about three-quarters of an hour. There was no damage.

Again at 5:45 a. m. Wednesday the firemen were aroused when a grass fire which started along the North Western railway right-of-way spread eastward toward elevated propane tanks at the Regal Ware, Inc. plant and endangered them. Fortunately the firemen were able to extinguish the blaze before it reached the tanks or a serious fire and possible explosion might have occurred.

Firemen from other volunteer departments throughout Washington county were kept "on the jump" the past week as grass fire alarms were turned in. Ordinarily grass fires in February are rare but there has been a scarcity of snow this winter and the ground is bare. Fire chiefs in the area issue warnings to residents to be extremely careful when starting rubbish fires, especially on windy days, as sparks and embers can be carried long distances and set fires. Hazardous conditions are prevalent this winter due to lack of snow cover and extreme dryness.

Two Youths Hurt In Area Mishap

Two 18-year-old youths from this village and area were quite seriously injured in a one-car accident which occurred Friday at 5:20 p. m. on Hwy. 45 at Thiemer's curve about one mile north of Kewaskum.

Robert Barber, R. 1, Allenton, and Kenneth Kudek, Kewaskum, were traveling south on Hwy. 45 when the driver lost control of the car on a curve and went off the road into a ditch and hit a culvert. The 1967 model auto rolled and skidded on its top, throwing the two youths out of the vehicle.

The vehicle was demolished. Which youth was driving the car was not immediately determined by investigating officers. The two injured youths were taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, by Kewaskum and Campbellsport ambulances.

MARKS PEAK OF ANNUAL HEART FUND CAMPAIGN

Heart Sunday, Feb. 25, will mark the peak of the annual Heart Fund drive in Wisconsin and states throughout the nation. Local volunteers will canvass homes in Kewaskum township to seek support against the country's number one killer, diseases of the heart and blood vessels.

Arnold Amerling, R. 2, Kewaskum, who heads the campaign here said that each volunteer will call on the homes of neighbors in February to accept the gifts for the Heart Fund and to distribute a pamphlet giving valuable information on the heart problem.

"The collection will augment the total already received in the first half of the month-long campaign which supports the expanded research, education and community service programs of the Wisconsin Heart Association," Amerling, township chairman,

said.

"The 1968 Heart Fund goal for the state has been set at \$842,000 and I urge residents to give generously for every heart in their family so that this goal might be realized," he said.

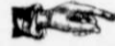

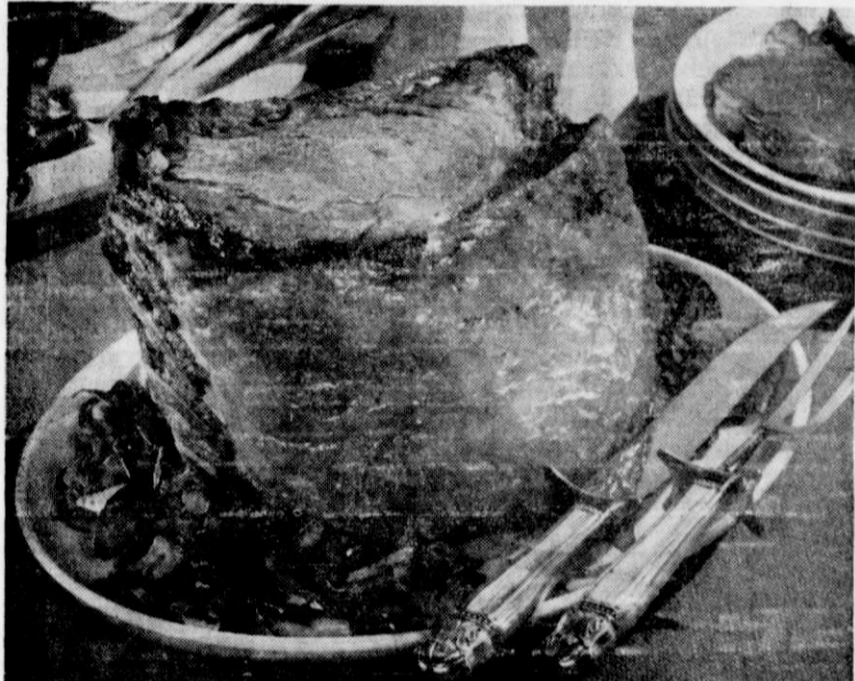

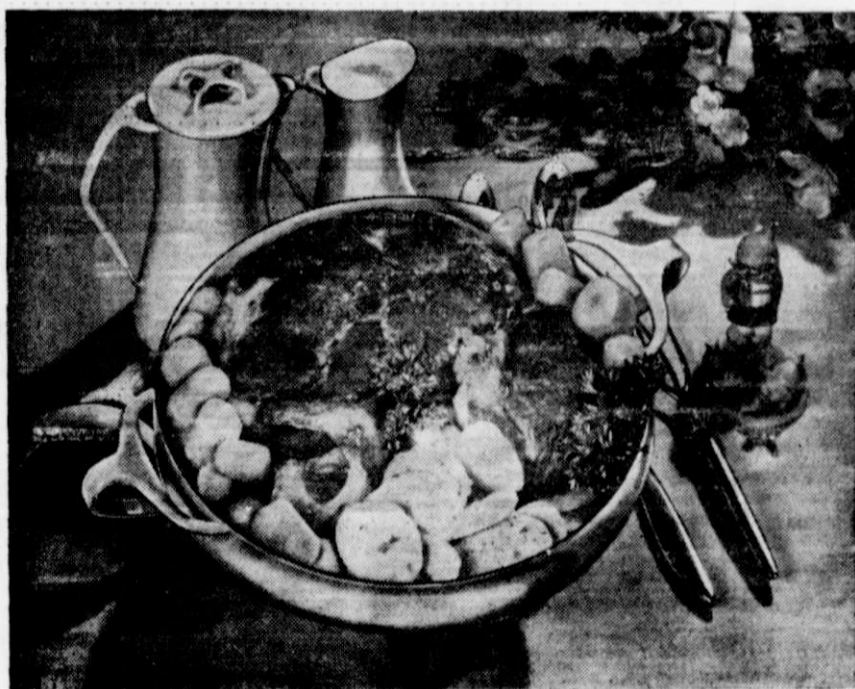

School Board Adopts New Science Program

BOYD REPORTS ON EXPECTED INCREASE IN ENROLLMENT

The School Board of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. District No. 2 met in the high school at 8:00 p. m. on Monday, January 22, 1968 with all members present.

Also present were Mr. Richard Zarling, Mr. Richard Schmahl, Mr. Roy J. Esser, Mr. Gerald Secor, Mrs. Norman Held and parents and school officials representing the following schools: St. Anthony, St. Mary's, St. John's and St. Peter and Paul.

Mrs. Zona Miske moved to accept minutes of January 15, 1968, meeting with the correction to add the second by Mrs. Miske on the motion by Allen Tessar to accept the contract for Mr. Ervin E. Uhlman, Jr. for the second semester in the elementary grades. Mrs. Anne Panzer seconded. Unanimously carried.

Mr. Schmahl, a science consultant for the first semester, presented the proposed science curriculum to the School Board. Mr.

Schmahl and Mr. Zarling elaborated on the proposal.

Allen Tessar moved to adopt the new science program. Mrs. Zona Miske seconded. Unanimously carried.

Motion by James D. Reigle that Mrs. Minerva Martin's status of long term substitute teacher be changed to regular staff for the second semester of the 1967-68 school year. Mrs. Anne Panzer seconded. Unanimously carried.

Spectators present inquired about the status of bus transportation to private schools outside the district for the 1968-69 school year. Present Wisconsin Statutes will require transportation to schools up to five miles beyond the district limits. The Board pointed out that they had already studied the matter and were in the process of making arrangements to transport approximately 177 students out of the district next year. This will total 415 private school students to be transported at a cost of about \$34,000.00 per school year. The Board noted that their proposed budget would reflect this increase in services.

Mr. Boyd also reported that an increase of about forty 7th and 8th graders and about 20-25 high school students was expected for the 1968-69 school year, plus the normal increases in grades K-6.

Mrs. Anne Panzer moved to approve payment of general fund invoices totaling \$11,096. James D. Reigle seconded. Unanimously carried.

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Indians Edged by Bells, Orioles in Final Two Games

The Kewaskum Indians brought their regular Scenic Moraine conference season to an end by losing two close games over the weekend, both at home. Friday night they were edged by Campbellsport, 58-57, and Saturday they gave conference champion North Fondy a surprising battle before losing by 7 points, 69-62. The double loss left the Indians with a 4-10 record and a fifth place finish.

Campbellsport's victory was their second over the Indians this season. The lowly Bells won only 3 games all season and 2 of them were over Kewaskum. The Bells won on Chuck Boegel's clutch shot from 10 feet out with just one second left to play after the Indians had scored what appeared to be the winning bucket seconds before. Kewaskum had opportunities to clinch it in the closing minutes but missed their shots and free throws.

Boegel was the man of the hour for Campbellsport as he handed the Bells a come-from-behind triumph. He finished with 25 points to take scoring honors. Walsh was next in line with 13. Top scorers for the Indians were Perry Koth with 20 points, and George Martin with 15. The Bells led at the half, 34-31, but the Indians surged ahead in the third period by outpointing the visitors, 17-10. Then Kewaskum blew it in the final quarter.

The Indians came close to upsetting the conference champions Saturday when they held them to

a 69-62 victory and proved very stubborn. The surprising Indians were ahead at the quarter, 12-8, but lost out in the second period and trailed at the intermission 33-25. They held the Orioles pretty even in the second half but couldn't overcome their lead. It is N. Fondy's first title in the 10-year history of the conference.

Jeff Semenas, who set a new single-season scoring mark for North Fondy with 375 points, finished the season in a flourish by bagging 35 points against Kewaskum. He scored 30 the night before against Slinger. It was largely Semenas who kept the Orioles ahead of the upstart-minded Indians as he sank 15 of 20 shots and 5 of 7 free throws. Kurt Urban chipped in 16 points. The Koth brothers, Randy, only a sophomore, and Perry, a junior, starred for Kewaskum by dropping in 23 and 15 points respectively for well over half of their

team's total. Dennis Yakautes and Urban dominated the boards for the Orioles as they pulled down 15 and 14 rebounds.

In other contests Friday North Fondy knocked Slinger out of a first place tie, 73-67, to clinch a tie for the title; Pewaukee gave North Fondy a big assist by upsetting Grafton, 72-71, pushing them out of a first place tie, and Germantown beat Random Lake, 67-60. Besides North Fondy's title-clinching win over the Indians Saturday, Grafton beat Campbellsport, 77-54, and Slinger trimmed Germantown, 101-64, as these two winners tied for second, and Pewaukee took care of Random Lake, 63-53.

This Friday and Saturday evenings the Indians are hosting and playing in the WIAA district tournament.

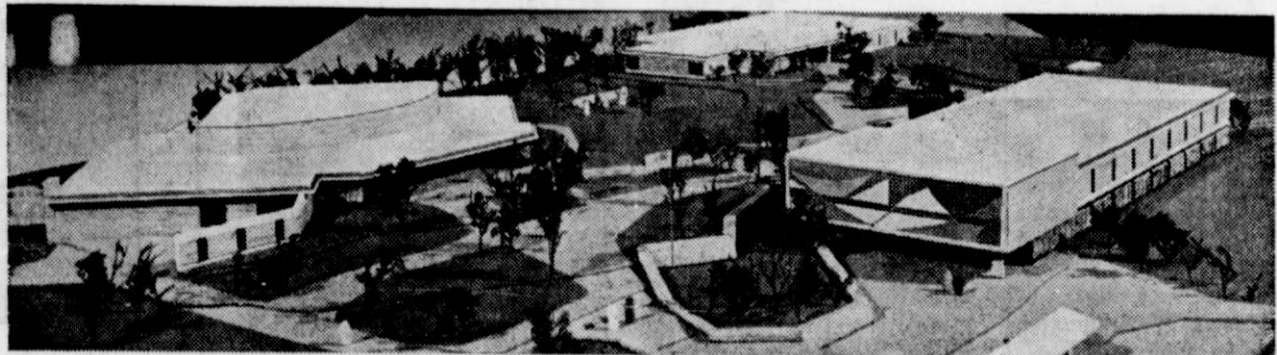
