Kewaskum Scout Speaks to Fond du Lac Kiwanis

JIM MANTHEI TELLS OF PROBLEMS AT JAMBOREE

James Manthei, a 17-year-old Eagle Scout from Kewaskum, recalls that "overcoming the language barrier" was the biggest problem he encountered while attending the Boy Scout World Jamboree in Idaho last summer.

He was principal speaker during a recent noon luncheon meeting of the Fond du Lac Kiwanis club at Retlaw Motor Inn.

Manthei, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Manthei, Kewaskum, was the only scout from the Badger Council to serve as a member of the host corps which arrived at Farragut State Park near Coeur d'Alene in advance of the approximate 13,000 scouts and leaders from 90 different countries.

Manthei said it was fortunate that at least one of the Japanese scouts he welcomed knew English. He described as a "weird experience" the meeting of foreign scouts "in the middle of the night" and at "all hours of the day" while faced with the language barrier.

"Most of them knew our language better than we knew theirs," said Manthei.

He explained that the "host corps" was an experiment last year at a World Jamboree. The advance corps was responsible for welcoming scouts, outlining their schedules and getting them acquainted with scouts from other countries.

The speaker showed colored slides taken on his trip which included a side excursion to Seattle, Wash., Victoria, Canada, and to a rodeo. Kent Schneider, Kiwanis club program chairman and scout Headquarters District executive, introduced Manthei, who is a senior at Kewaskum Community High school and the recipient of both the bronze and gold palms as an Eagle Scout. He also was awarded the God and Country Award.

Hron Named To County Committee

A committee of industrial purchasing agents and local government officials in Washington county has been selected to study the feasibility of intergovernmental cooperative purchasing efforts in the county, as a result of a recent county-wide meeting sponsored by the Hartford Public Affairs committee, with research assistance from the Public Expenditure Survey of Wisconsin.

The 10-member committee is charged with preparing a list of commonly used commodities, drawing up standard specifications, and making further plans for considering cooperative purchasing arrangements.

The meeting, sponsored by the Hartford citizens group, heard Green Bay Purchasing Agent Russell Petreat outline cooperative and consolidated purchasing arrangements followed in that area. Rindert Kiemel, Jr., research associate of the Public Expenditure Survey, Madison, explained the program under which localities can buy certain commodities through the state purchasing division and summarized results of a questionnaire the local officials had submitted earlier.





County Licensed 5,003 Dogs in 1967; Damages Reported

The total number of dogs licensed in 1967 in Washington county was 5,003, County Clerk Anton P. Staral reported this week.

The town of Richfield reported the greatest number of licensed dogs with 535, and the village of Germantown reported the next greatest number of licensed dogs with 498. The village of Jackson reported the smallest number with 21 licensed. Total receipts from all districts in Washington county were \$6,435.00.

The State Department of Agriculture supplies the tags and collects 5% of the total collections. Any other expenses, such as receipt books, dog affidavits, care of stray dogs at dog pounds, and dog damage claims are paid out of this fund.

Washington county paid out \$1,415.61 in dog claims, with the largest claim paid in the amount of \$360.00. Any injured or dead livestock must be viewed by the town board which fills out the claim. Any surplus in the fund over and above \$1,000.00 is refunded to the taxing district in proportion to their contribution. In 1967, a total of \$2,812.11 was

refunded to districts.

Must Get Licenses From Local Treasurer

Every dog owner must obtain a license for his dog from his local treasurer on or before March 1, 1968. Fees are \$1.00 for male dogs and spayed female dogs; and \$2.00 for female dogs. If no license is obtained by March 1, owners will be reported to the district attorney.

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Youth Lectures In County Are Well Attended

DRUGS, SEX AND OTHER PROBLEMS DISCUSSED

The Washington County Mental Health association and the Washington County Homemakers group have expressed gratification at the interest and attendance shown by area residents in a recent co-sponsored lecture series. The first lecture dealt with "Teen Agers and Drug Abuse," the second with "Psychological Problems of Teen Agers." Lively discussion and questions marked each meeting.

Dr. James Balistieri, director of adolescent services of the Milwaukee County Mental Health Center and recently appointed head of the Ozaukee Mental Health Clinic, explained the uses and abuses of drugs. The speaker suggested that the public tends to over-react to the problem. He noted that the use of marijuana has been known for 3,000 years and has been used to "escape reality" in much the same fashion as alcohol. According to Dr. Balistieri, danger results from the effort to escape. Marijuana, while not considered a narcotic is psychologically addicted. The use of LSD, developed in Switzerland in 1943, was described as a mind-distorting drug which throws the mind into temporary insanity.

Of great interest to the audience was the speaker's theory that drugs appeal to ineffectual and inadequate personalities who are unsure of their masculinity or femininity. He warned of amphetamine drugs which are sometimes called "pep pills" and become a real threat when used as so-called "reducing" drugs. Dr. Balistieri indicated that "glue sniffing" was more dangerous than any of the other drugs since it results in permanent mental and physical damage. He urged that the drug problem be handled at the local level since all of the drugs discussed are easily accessible. He added that LSD can be useful in mental health research and marijuana for easing the pain of terminal disease.

Second meeting in the mental health series began with a provocative film entitled "Girl in Danger." The movie told the story of a pre-delinquent badly confused girl who was helped by psychotherapy. With understanding help she finally learned to deal with her problems in a mature fashion.

Kenneth Schermacher, guidance counsellor at West Bend High school, spoke on psychological problems of teen-agers. Heading the list of what teen-agers worried about was the problem of relationships with their peer group. Grades and rank in class also trouble them. Family relationships appeared to be more of a

problem to girls and their mothers. Sex attitudes and admiration or the lack of it from the opposite sex appear to be of great concern to the young people. Schermacher pointed out that two or three students a year become so depressed over a combination of the listed problems as to threaten suicide. These troubled young people are aided by the guidance center.

Several case histories illustrating teen-age problems were discussed by the speaker. He also explained techniques which do no good in reaching teen-agers. Ordering better behavior is not the role of a counsellor, getting to the source of the trouble is the objective. Giving advice is also a faulty procedure. Insight gained from conversation on five levels is the method usually employed. The audience response was extremely favorable to the policy of the schools which provides guidance for the emotional problems of young people.

Cedar Grove Wins Tournament Here; Indians Cop Consolation

WINNER ADVANCES TO WEST BEND REGIONAL

Cedar Grove of the Eastern Wisconsin conference won the championship in the WIAA District basketball tournament held in Kewaskum Friday and Saturday evenings. The Rockets defeated Random Lake in the championship finals, 74-52. The Kewaskum Indians took consolation honors by beating Ozaukee, 66-56, on the final evening.

Cedar Grove reached the finals by shading Kewaskum, 64-58, in the opening round Friday, in which game the Indians gave the champion Rockets a much tougher game than did Random Lake in the finals when they lost by 22 points. The Rams reached the finals by besting Ozaukee, 63-53, Friday.

In losing by only six points to Cedar Grove in the meet opener, the Indians fell behind in the third quarter, playing the Rockets on even terms the remainder of the game. Cedar Grove led by only one point at both the quarter and halftime, 13-12 and 29-28. During the third period lapse, in which they were outgunned, 18-11, they fell behind 47-39, but narrowed the gap again in the final stanza before losing 64-48. Mark Huenink was the big noise for the Rockets with 23 points, while George Martin's 17 paced Kewaskum.

In the second game Friday, Random Lake was ahead of Ozaukee until the end of the third quarter, when they tied it up. They led at the quarter, 20-16, and 35-29 at halftime. Ozaukee outscored Random, 12-6, in the third period to knot the score but the Rams overpowered them in the final stanza, 22-12. Dick Lied was high scorer with 23 points and Don Volesky paced Ozaukee with 15.

In the tourney finals Saturday Kewaskum and Ozaukee squared off for consolation honors. After a 13-13 first quarter tie, the Indians slowly pulled away to win by 10 points. Kewaskum was on top at the intermission, 30-28, 45-42 at the end of the third period, and finally 66-56. Kim Steffen of Ozaukee was the top point man with 20, while Jim Foerster was a new high scorer for Kewaskum with 18.

In the championship finals Cedar Grove had little trouble with Random Lake, leading them all the way before winning by a comfortable 74-52 margin. The Rockets were ahead 18-13 at the quarter, 38-29 at the intermission, and 55-42 at the close of the third stanza. Huenink again was the ace for the winners with 20 points. Lied with 17 points and Bob Wilk with 16, were best for the Rams.

None of the four teams in the district meet here had impressive records for the season. Cedar Grove had the best record with 6-11 and Kewaskum was second with 5-13. Random Lake's record was 3-15, while Ozaukee owned a poor

2-15 standing.

Cedar Grove was awarded a handsome trophy at the end of the tournament for copping the district championship. The Rockets competed in the Eastern Wisconsin conference, both Kewaskum and Random Lake in the Scenic Moraine conference, and Ozaukee in the Kettle Moraine loop.

Cedar Grove's district champs now advance to the regional tournament at West Bend this Friday and Saturday evenings. The three other teams in the meet are Kohler, Port Washington and Sheboygan South. Kohler won the Oostburg district tourney. Port beat West Bend 76-73, in a district playoff game at Port, and Sheboygan South defeated Sheboygan North in another district playoff tilt, 57-55. Kohler appears to be a top-heavy favorite in the tourney, judging from the season's records. The Blue Bombers have a very impressive 18-1 mark for the season, while Port has a 2-17 record and South 4-15. Cedar Grove's record now is 8-11 after the tourney games here last weekend. Kohler is the smallest school in the meet with only 156 students and South is the largest with 1,564, not including freshmen.

Indians Wind Up Season; Prospects For Future Bright

The 1967-68 basketball season has ended for the Kewaskum Indians. The squad wound up in fifth place in the Scenic Moraine conference with a 4-10 record. In all fairness to the team, it should be mentioned that three regular members of the squad at the beginning of the season were no longer with the team most of the remainder of the year.

In WIAA tournament play the Indians lost their opening game to Cedar Grove (tournament champions), 64-58, after a hard-fought battle and took consolation honors by downing Ozaukee, 66-56.

Valuable assistance was added by senior George Martin, leading scorer and rebounder, and Mike Smith, juniors Mark Eichstedt, Jim Foerster and Perry Koth, and sophomore playmaker Randy Koth.

The team was young and a strong contingent of underclassmen should make a title contending team for Kewaskum in the future. Eight members of the 12-man squad will be back next year. They are Eichstedt, Foerster, the Koth brothers, Jerry Engelleiter, Bob Fellenz, Bob Wilson, and Jeff Schleif. This plus the fact that the freshman team has good prospects, the elementary school has a strong team and the Holy Trinity school team won the Kettle Moraine Catholic grade school league championship this year make the future look bright for the Kewaskum Indians.
