Previous Donors Urged to Register For Blood Bank

FIRST TIME DONORS NEEDED AT CLINIC

There are several former blood donors who have not called for their reservation for the blood bank, March 28. Your donor record is needed the day of the clinic and your name must be had in advance to get these records. Please call 626-2264 or 626-2131 NOW.

The hours for the blood bank this year were chosen to accommodate more people. It is hoped that the second shift workers will donate blood BEFORE going to work and the first shift workers AFTER finishing work. With the hours from 12 noon to 5:30 p. m., everyone will have an opportunity to come.

Kewaskum is a member of the West Bend Community Blood Donor club. The blood bank program has saved the community approximately \$250,000 but only about 10 per cent of the residents have accepted the challenge so far to be charitable and contribute.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer for the village and town of Kewaskum, pointed out that all blood transfusions are given because the patient is in need of blood to preserve the life they still have retained after surgery, childbirth or severe accident. When these sick people need help, Dr. Edwards stated, there is no time to wait for the long processing procedure that makes a unit of blood ready for the sick patient to receive.

Dr. Edwards urges every healthy man and woman to give a unit of blood now because of the dire need. When 90 per cent of the residents have given one unit of blood, there will be plenty of blood available always, he indicated.

All residents of Washington county except those who live in Polk, Erin, Hartford and Richfield townships are eligible to contribute blood at the center. Residents between the ages of 18 and 21 must have their parents' written consent.

Degree Awarded To Allen Koepke

Allen C. Koepke, R. 2, Kewaskum was awarded the Bachelor of Business Administration degree by the University of Wisconsin at Madison as the first semester of the university's 1967-68 school year closed recently.

A total of more than 1,700 students received their bachelor's and higher degrees at the end of the fall-winter semester, bringing to almost 177,000 the total number of degrees granted by Wisconsin's university at Madison during its 118-year history since its first class of 20 students met on Feb. 5, 1849. The complete list of degree recipients for the past semester was just released by the university registration and records office following final compilation of all grades of all the students.

Of the total receiving degrees at this time, more than 800 were granted their first or bachelor's degrees, and about 900 received their higher degrees including 629 master's degrees, 22 doctor of law degrees, and 267 doctor of philosophy degrees.

Firemen Called to Grass, Regal Fires

Kewaskum firemen were called out at 1 p. m. last Thursday when two grass fires broke out simultaneously along the North Western railroad tracks south of the village. The first grass fire was burning just beyond the village limits while the second one started about a half mile farther south along the tracks near the Dairyland Seed Co. building. The firemen split up into two groups to extinguish the two blazes. It is believed that the fires were caused by a passing train. There was no damage.

At 4:30 p. m. Monday the firemen were summoned when fire broke out in a buffing machine at the Regal Ware, Inc. plant. The

blaze was confined to the machine which was damaged and the plant was filled with smoke, forcing most employees on the second shift to leave the building. The plant fire brigade had the blaze under control when firemen arrived.

Woman Hurt in Local Collision

Cars driven by Miss Edna Krueger, 52, of R. 2, Campbellsport, and Helmuth Schwichtenberg, 29, of R. 3, Campbellsport, collided at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. at 2:30 p. m. last Wednesday.

According to the police report, Miss Krueger was southbound on Fond du Lac ave. and was making a left turn onto Main st. She said

a northbound semi-trailer truck turning right onto Main st. obscured the Schwichtenberg auto which was traveling behind the truck. The two cars collided in the center of the intersection.

Miss Krueger complained of chest pains and suffered a knee laceration and was told to see a physician.

Marvin Martin At Governor's Conference

Marvin Martin, civil defense director of Kewaskum, participated in the Governor's Conference on Community Preparedness for Natural Disasters in Madison on Mar. 6.

He was one of about 300 persons at the annual program arranged by the staff of civil defense education from Wisconsin State University, Stevens Point.

Highlights of the program were addresses by Gov. Warren Knowlton; Endicott Peabody, former Massachusetts governor and now assistant director of the Na-

tional Office of Emergency Planning; and Madison Mayor Otto Festge.

The 1968 outlook on floods was discussed by personnel from the U. S. Weather Bureau at Truax Field, Madison, and by members of communities who have had experience in fighting major floods. A team from Sauk county presented a skit to show proper ways of reporting and receiving tornado alerts. Workshops were staged throughout the afternoon on recovery agencies and financial assistance, flood fighting, civil defense organization for natural disasters, civil defense in civil disorders and civil defense education.

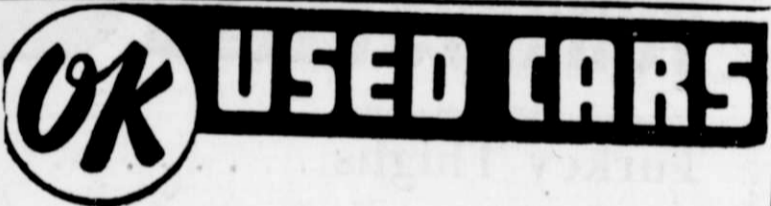

H. Jakubiak Dies Of Heart Attack Driving Truck

TWO AREA WOMEN ALSO SUMMONED

An autopsy report revealed that a 45-year-old rural Campbellsport man was fatally stricken with a heart attack Saturday afternoon when the pickup truck he was driving was involved in a Fond du Lac county accident.

Henry R. Jakubiak, R. 3, Campbellsport, was pronounced dead at the accident scene, having died of a heart attack about 1 p. m. Jakubiak was headed south on the River Road, one mile northwest of Ashford when his truck ran off the roadway and into the yard of the Gerald Marquardt farm. The truck struck a piece of farm machinery before coming to a stop.

Fond du Lac county officers who investigated the accident reported that only the front end section of Jakubiak's truck was slightly damaged.

The deceased was born Jan. 26, 1923, in Milwaukee and married the former Genevieve Kranski Oct. 26, 1943 in Northland. He was a veteran of World War II.
