Local Voters to Cast 5 Ballots in Spring Election

THREE VILLAGE TRUSTEES TO BE ELECTED TUESDAY

There will be a choice of candidates on several levels and four referenda ballots to be voted upon in the spring election Tuesday, Apr. 2. On the local level voters will have five ballots to mark and polls in the village will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. at the municipal building.

Kewaskum will elect three trustees with all three incumbents candidates for re-election and all three unopposed. The candidates are Raynor Herriges, Myron Perschbacher and Elmer Yoost. The three remaining trustees on the village board hold over in office for another year.

Voters in Washington county will cast ballots for a complete slate of county board supervisors to fill the 29 seats on the board. In district 9, the village of Kewaskum, E. M. Romaine will be a candidate for re-election. Romaine is chairman of the county board of supervisors.

Voters will also cast ballots on four state referenda issues, for a justice of the supreme court and in the presidential preferential primary at Tuesday's election.

The referenda issues, briefly, concern a uniform retirement date for supreme and circuit court judges, to permit former justices and circuit judges to serve temporary appointments by the chief justice in circuit courts, to permit additional appropriations for state forestry purposes, and to permit the legislature to meet in regular session oftener than once in two years.

Leo B. Hanley is the only candidate to be voted on as a candidate for the state supreme court.

Voters will have an opportunity to express their preference in the presidential primary. Harold E. Stassen, Ronald W. Reagan and Richard M. Nixon are candidates on the GOP ballot or a candidate's name may be written in while Lyndon B. Johnson and Eugene J. McCarthy will appear on the Democratic ballot or the name of a candidate may be written in.

Chicago Man Is Charged in Local Slaying

Chester Dombrowski, 30, a former Chicago policeman, was being held in the Fond du Lac county jail this week on charges of murdering another Chicago man whose body was found in a dump area on a farm field 1½ miles north of Kewaskum last September.

Dombrowski, who was now employed at O'Hare International airport in Chicago, was arrested there at 1:25 a. m. Tuesday after a grand jury at Fond du Lac eight hours earlier indicted him in the Sept. 12, 1967 slaying of Herbert L. McKinney, 27, a machinist's helper. McKinney's body, showing marks of a beating and with a bullet hole in the head, was found on a farm owned by Dombrowski and a brother, Bernard, about 100 yards from County Trunk "S", a short distance north of the Fond du Lac-Washington county line between Kewaskum and New Fane.

On furlough from the Chicago police force at the time of the slaying, Dombrowski was arrested on a drunken driving charge after his rented auto hit a bridge and went into the ditch on Hwy. 45 about two miles north of Kewaskum. The body of the slaying victim was found on the farm the following day following investigation of the car accident and information was obtained at that time. The drunken driving charge was later reduced in court in Washington county and Dombrowski forfeited bond.

Dombrowski waived extradition during a hearing Tuesday in Chicago before Joseph A. Power, presiding judge over the criminal division of Cook county circuit court and was brought to Fond du Lac. He was to be arraigned later this week, it was indicated.

Annual Round-up For Kindergarten Pupils April 2-3

BEGINNING 1ST GRADERS SHOULD ALSO REGISTER

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of either prospective kindergarten pupils or beginning 1st graders who have not attended kindergarten in the Kewaskum school district will be held during the day on Tuesday, April 2, and Wednesday, April 3, from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school he will attend. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1968 and for 1st grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1968. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to fill out the child's health record. If you know of any new families in this district that have children eligible for kindergarten or 1st grade, please pass this information on to them.

Richard E. Zarling, director of elementary education, should like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on either of these two days for kindergarten of first grade so that they may plan for them.

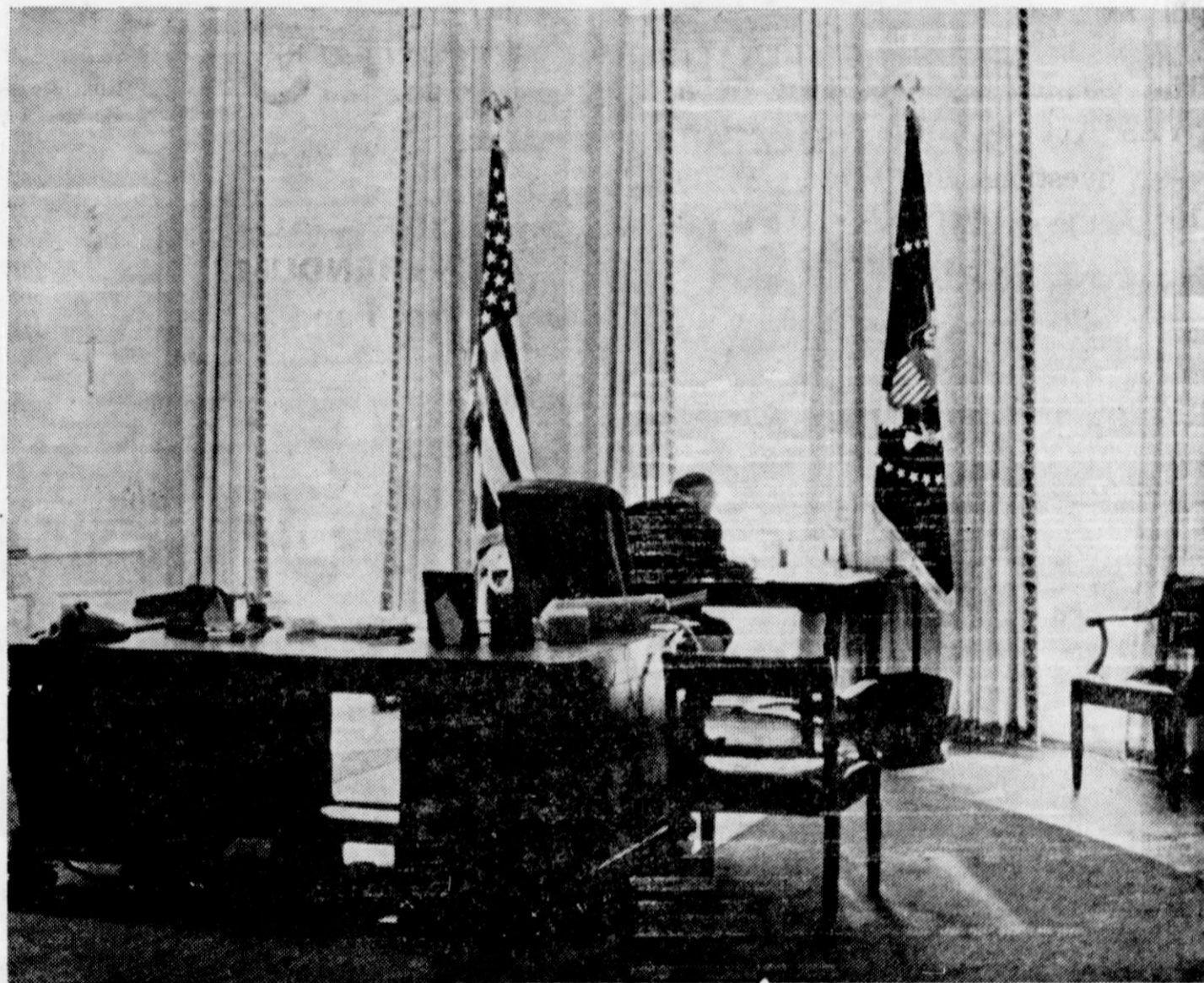

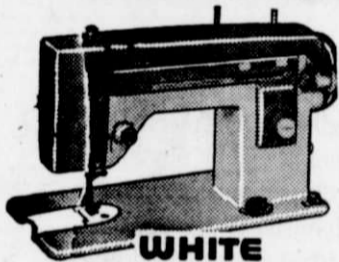

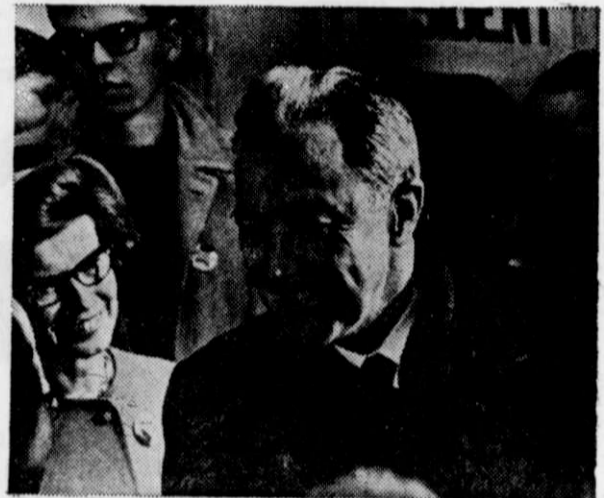
