482 Ballots Cast Here in Election Tuesday; Voters Follow State Trend

McCARTHY, NIXON RUN FAR AHEAD

Voting in the Presidential Preferential balloting in the village followed the county and statewide trend in Tuesday's Spring Election, returns indicated. A total of 482 votes were cast in the village, about half of the potential, which was considered a good turnout.

On the Republican ticket Richard M. Nixon tallied 184 votes in the village with Ronald W. Reagan getting 9 and Harold E. Stassen 5. There were 7 scattered votes for other candidates and 1 for none of the names shown on the ballot. The vote in Washington county was Nixon 5,454, Reagan 689 and Stassen 347.

On the Democratic ballot the vote for Sen. Eugene McCarthy and President Lyndon B. Johnson also followed the state pattern. In the village McCarthy totaled 165 votes while Johnson got 71, even though he had withdrawn his name as a candidate for reelection. Robert Kennedy got 35 write-in votes and there were 2 votes for none of the candidates. McCarthy was the top vote getter of all presidential candidates on both tickets in the state. In the county McCarthy polled 4,909 votes, Johnson 2,442, Kennedy 776, Wallace 76 and Humphrey 28. The later three were write-ins.

Kewaskum electors re-elected all three incumbent trustees, who were unopposed. The results were: Raynor Herriges 421, Myron Perschbacher 418 and Elmer Yoost 421. Herriges and Yoost tied for the most votes.

Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, chairman of the Washington county board, was re-elected as a supervisor to the board with 443 votes. He was unopposed.

On the judicial ballot, Leo B. Hanley, the only candidate to be voted on for the state supreme court, received 411 votes locally.

Village voters kept in step with a statewide trend as they voted heavily in favor of four constitutional amendments in the election. On the question of setting a uniform retirement date for circuit judges and supreme court justices the local vote was 324 yes and 65 no. On the question providing for temporary appointment of former circuit judges and justices with eight years of service the vote was 310 yes and 72 no. On the referenda providing for the removing the restrictions on forestry lands the margin was smaller with 265 yes and 117 no. The fourth question on a change in the state constitution to permit the legislature to meet in regular session every year won by a 330 to 58 margin.

Movie Star Paul Newman Talks at Dem Smelt Fry

COUNTY PRESS INVITED; CAMPAIGNS FOR McCARTHY

A call from Senator Eugene McCarthy's Wisconsin headquarters Saturday invited members of the press of Washington county as special guests to cover the visit and address by famous Actor Paul Newman, who appeared in person at the county Democratic party's annual smelt fry at Richfield Sunday afternoon in behalf of Sen. McCarthy's campaign for the presidency. Editor and Mrs. Harbeck were present and were among the few who had the pleasure of shaking hands and exchanging greetings with Mr. Newman.

Actor Newman and members of his party stopped off at Richfield at 3 p. m. while on a tour of the state campaigning for Sen. McCarthy. Announcement of his visit was not publicized beforehand to avoid a crowd, especially among teenagers, from gathering at the place. Newman addressed about 300 persons who were participating in the smelt fry at the time.

Newman said he liked McCarthy as a "man of incredible guts, dignity, and grace and I believe in everything he says. He is a man of integrity, honesty and courage with qualities for a President." Newman also made mention of McCarthy's helping the farmers obtain higher prices, among other things. Before taking the stage, Newman took time to sample a fish or two with a slice of rye bread and a bottle of what Milwaukee is famous for while standing at one of the tables.

Actress and television personality Phyllis Newman also was active in the state campaigning for Sen. McCarthy over the weekend. Miss Newman is seen as a "regular" on the Johnny Carson TV show and others. She visited Beaver Dam Monday, Milwaukee, Lodi, Portage, Racine, Kenosha and other cities.

McCarthy's good showing in the county may also, in part, be attributed to the work of many college students. Last weekend 200 students from four universities came to the county and knocked on some 15,000 doors as well as distributing McCarthy literature. The girls knocked on Kewaskum doors Sunday afternoon.

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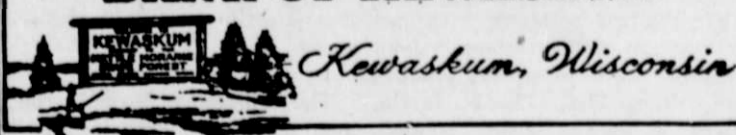
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Rites Held for Edward Schaefer

Funeral services for Edward F. Schaefer, 80, well known resident of 1205 Fond du Lac ave., Kewaskum, who died suddenly of a heart attack at his home on Wednesday, Mar. 27, were held at 2 p. m. Saturday at Peace United Church of Christ. The Rev. Daniel Schowalter officiated and interment was in the parish cemetery. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home from 3 p. m. Friday until 11 a. m. Saturday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

Mr. Schaefer, whose death occurred just nine days after that of his wife, was born Apr. 4, 1887, in the town of Barton, a son of the late Christ and Wilhelmina Prost Schaefer. He was married to Helene Klukas on May 10, 1911 by the Rev. H. Hoyer in St. John's Lutheran church, West Bend, and she predeceased him on Mar. 18, 1968. Mr. Schaefer was a dairy farmer in the town of Kewaskum for many years before retiring 25 years ago and moving to Kewaskum. He was a member of Peace United Church of Christ and served on the church council. He also served one term on the village board.

Surviving are one son, Armond Schaefer, of West Bend; two daughters, Evelyn (Mrs. Oscar Albert) of Horicon and Edna (Mrs. Art Sepersky) of West Bend; one daughter-in-law, two sons-in-law, four grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Otilie Techtmann of Milwaukee; two brothers, William and Elmer Schaefer of West Bend, and many other relatives.

FIREMEN CALLED TO SNUFF OUT TWO MORE GRASS FIRES

Kewaskum firemen answered two more grass fire calls over the weekend and both were extinguished with no damage resulting.

The first call came at 8:15 a. m. Friday, to a blaze at the Edward Kirsch property at R. 2, Campbellsport, in the town of Auburn. At 11:45 a. m. Saturday the firemen were summoned to a grass and dump fire at the entrance to Auburn lake. The local firemen

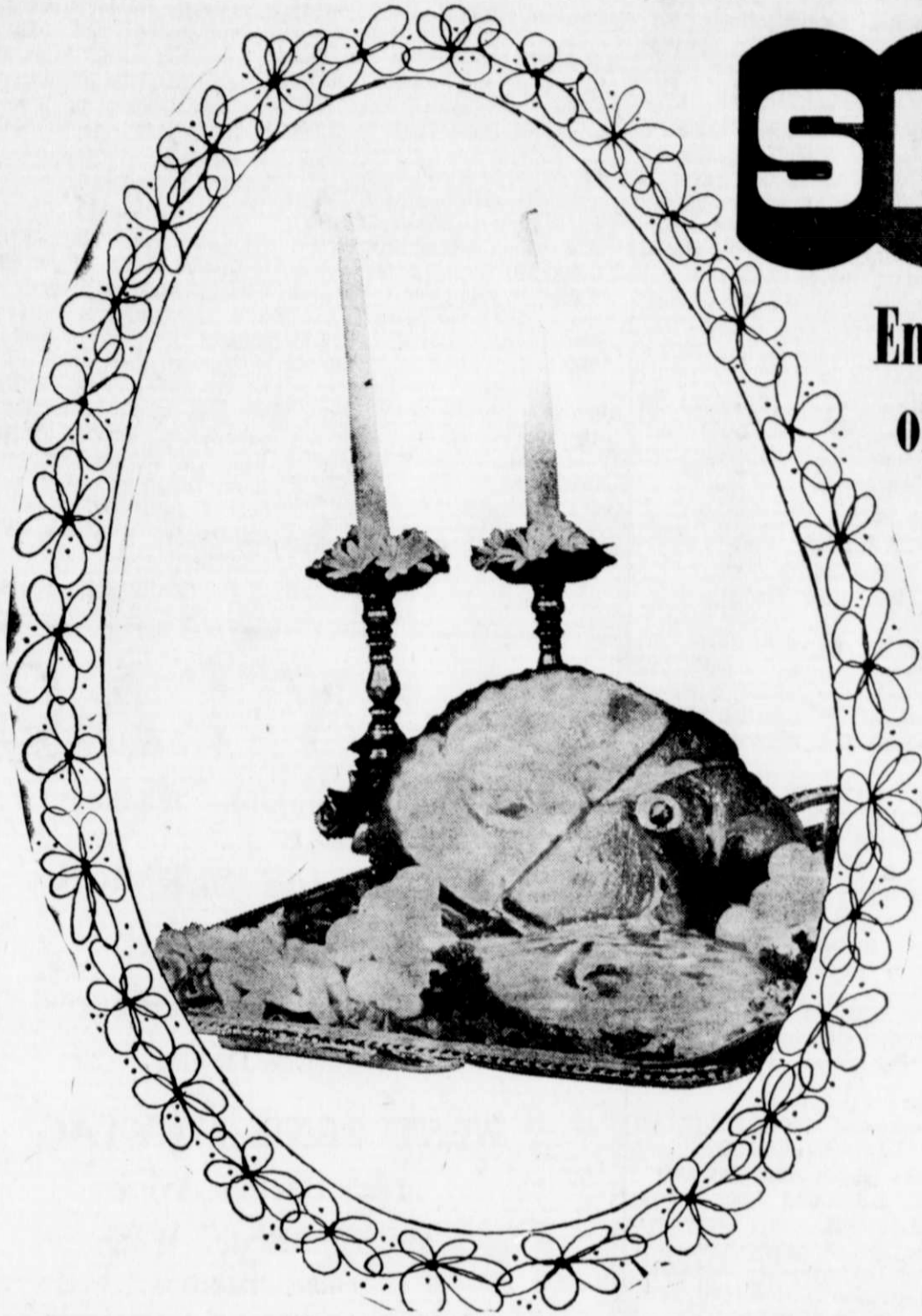

Village Plans to Buy Bilgo Land For Park Streets

BOARD WILL COOPERATE TO REDUCE RIVER POLLUTION

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tassar presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Heriges, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried.

The plans for the erection of a new home on Lot 19, Block 5, Roseland Hills addition No. 1, were approved by the board.

The board reviewed the complaint of Hervey Ramshun concerning an apparent excessive water and sewage bill for the 4th quarter of 1967. Complaint was re-

ferred to committee.

Village Attorney Roger McKenna presented to the board the survey of the Bilgo property north of Regal Ware which the village intends to buy for street and park purposes. Attorney McKenna also explained to the board the terms of the purchase agreement.

The board requested that the commissioner arrange a meeting with Mr. James Wren-Jarvis, State Regional Director of Resources, to give his opinions on the recommended improvements to the sewage treatment plant.

The commissioner was authorized to advertise for applicants for the position of sewage plant operator.

Mr. Gene Bohn recommended to the board that a complete appraisal of all village property be made by a professional firm to be used as a guideline for establishing limits for fire insurance. Upon motion by Trustee Freehauf, seconded by Trustee Kral and du-

ly carried, the board accepted the proposal of Industrial Appraisal Company of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, to make such an appraisal at a cost of \$1440.00

The board indicated it would co-operate with the Milwaukee River clean-up council in its efforts to reduce pollution of the river.

The commissioner was authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of curb and gutter.

The request of St. Lucas Church for a remodeling permit was tabled pending committee report as to set-back and side yard restrictions.

Village Attorney Roger McKenna presented to the board a copy of his letter denying refund of taxes to Geidel Realty and Willard Meyer and his reasons for such denial. The board approved the action taken by Mr. McKenna and ordered the letter placed on file in the clerk's office.

The Public Library's report to the state for the year 1967 was re-

viewed and placed on file.

The totals of all claims, as recommended and approved by the Finance Committee, were as follows:

Sewage Dept. Fund 7,459.51

Payment of these claims, as recorded in the official record, was approved upon motion by Trustee Wietor, seconded by Trustee Freehauf and duly carried.

Upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Yoost and carried, the board adjourned subject to call.
