KEWASKUM FIREMEN TO BE REPRESENTED

Representatives of the 22 member departments, including a large delegation of Kewaskum firemen, will attend the annual spring banquet of the Badger Firemen's association to be held at the Belgium Community Center at 6 p. m. this Sunday, April 28.

This year's banquet will be one of the highlights of activities in the organization's 75th anniversary year, the Badger association having been founded in 1893. Volunteer fire departments in a six county area, including Ozaukee, Waukesha, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac, Milwaukee and Washington counties belong to the organiza-

United States Senator Gaylord Nelson will be the principal speaker at Sunday night's banquet. Awards for the association bowling tournament held earlier this year are also scheduled to be presented at Sunday's gathering.

Cambellsport will be host to the annual Badger Firemen's summer tournament this year, on July 3 and 4. The tournament contests will be held at 6:30 p. m. on July 3 with the annual parade slated at 12 noon on July 4. Chief Leo Dorn of New Holstein has been named one of the judges for the event with another judge scheduled to be named possibly Sunday night.
