A rural Kewaskum woman was injured in an accident early Monday when the light foreign car she was driving left CTH A east of Kewaskum. The mishap occurred when an auto driven by Katherine C. Yearling, 42, of R. 1, Kewaskum, which was traveling west on CTH A got off on the shoulder and went into a side skid and into the ditch and rolled over. The driver incurred bruises on both legs, a chipped tooth and facial injuries.

Reelect Romaine Board Chairman

Members of the Washington county board of supervisors were sworn in for their new two year terms at the organizational meeting of the board last Tuesday at the county courthouse. Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, veteran chairman of the board, was reelected on the first ballot, receiving 24 votes with four scattered votes and one absent.

The supervisors included three new ones who were elected at the Apr. 2 spring election. Chairman Romaine welcomed all the reelected members and introduced the three new members, Ray Bast of Dist. 27 (Germantown), Neal C. Nicholson of Dist. 23 (Hartford's third ward), and Robert R. Rosenthal of Dist. 12 (T. Barton).

Following administration of the oath of office by County Clerk Anton P. Staral and introduction of the new members, the board got right down to work in anticipation of a long session and proceeded to elect a chairman. Chairman Romaine thanked the board for their vote of confidence, saying the two year term could be his last since he was not getting any younger.

A unanimous ballot was cast for Joseph Schmitz, Germantown supervisor, for reelection as vice-chairman of the board for two years.

The Kewaskum Woman's club met Saturday, April 20, and was entertained by George Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Martin, who spoke concerning his two month trip to Lima, Peru. He left Kewaskum June 29 for Lima, sponsored by International Youth Fellowship Exchange, and returned early in September.

His home in Lima resembled our American town house. The homes are built of brick and concrete low to the ground and close together because of the multitude of earthquakes in the area. Every few streets has a place for the children to play. Lima has 3½ million inhabitants.

George attended a Catholic secondary school whose program is regulated by the government and makes all subjects mandatory for the students. Uniforms are worn as the school costume. The school system is composed of 5 years primary school, 5 years secondary school and 1 year pre-school.

While in Peru George had the opportunity to see the state buildings, cathedrals, national palace, U. S. Embassy, mountains, as well as to meet many interesting people. His visit to Cusco, former capital of the Inca civilization, was a highlight. The Inca civilization is still seen in the many silver and gold crafted items made for sale.

KEWASKUM FIREMEN TO BE REPRESENTED

Representatives of the 22 member departments, including a large delegation of Kewaskum firemen, will attend the annual spring banquet of the Badger Firemen's association to be held at the Belgium Community Center at 6 p. m. this Sunday, April 28.

This year's banquet will be one of the highlights of activities in the organization's 75th anniversary year, the Badger association having been founded in 1893. Volunteer fire departments in a six county area, including Ozaukee, Waukesha, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac, Milwaukee and Washington counties belong to the organization.

United States Senator Gaylord Nelson will be the principal speaker at Sunday night's banquet. Awards for the association bowling tournament held earlier this year are also scheduled to be presented at Sunday's gathering.

Cambellsport will be host to the annual Badger Firemen's summer tournament this year, on July 3 and 4. The tournament contests will be held at 6:30 p. m. on July 3 with the annual parade slated at 12 noon on July 4. Chief Leo Dorn of New Holstein has been named one of the judges for the event with another judge scheduled to be named possibly Sunday night. In conjunction with the July 3 and 4 celebration, old and new fire fighting equipment will be displayed. Some of the equipment will date back to the turn of the century or before. Kewaskum firemen will again participate in the contests and parade. Besides the spring banquet and summer tournament, Badger association also holds an annual bowling tourney, spring and fall meetings.

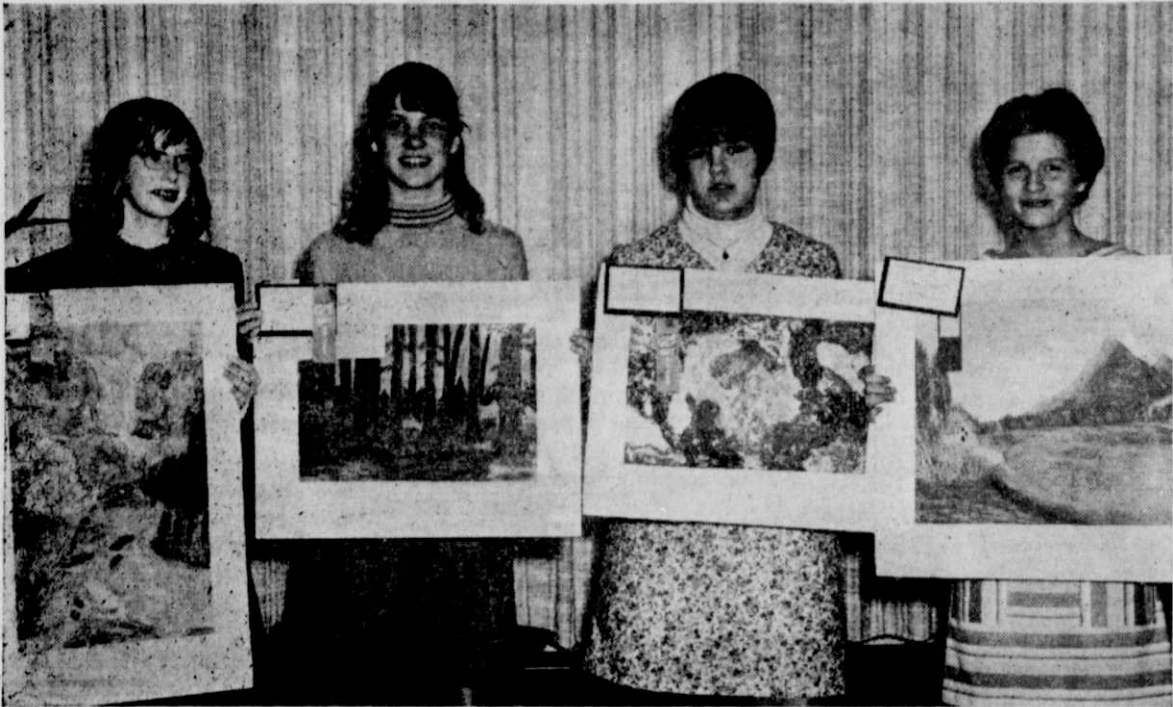

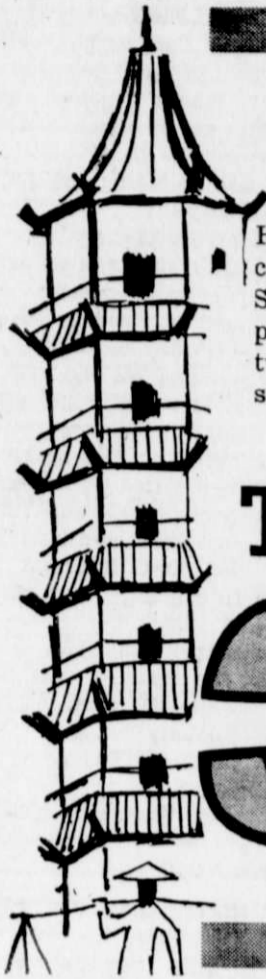

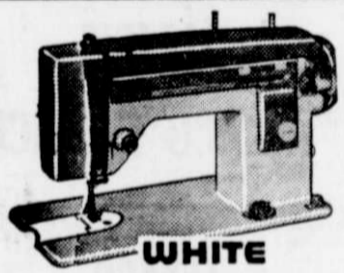

GOP Fund-Raising Dinner Attended By Crowd of 400

GOV. KNOWLES TOPS LIST OF DIGNITARIES PRESENT

A large crowd, estimated to be at close to 400, filled the Holy Angels auditorium in West Bend last Tuesday evening at the fund-raising dinner of the Washington County Republican Organization. The theme of the dinner, "Forward in '68" was reflected in the cheering and optimistic audience and the unprecedented number of GOP dignitaries, office-holders and candidates who were in attendance.

Todd Heil, general chairman of the event, planned the swift-moving program which was notable for its rally atmosphere from beautiful red, white and blue hall and table decorations to the gay music provided by a really "swinging combo" from Goodrich High school in Fond du Lac. The chairman was aided by a committee of nine hard-working volunteers and members of the Young Republicans.

Louis Ceci, a GOP candidate for attorney general, acted as master of ceremonies for the dinner. He introduced State Senator Jerris Leonard, majority leader of the state senate and candidate for the U. S. Senate. He congratulated the GOP "team" of office-holders and workers and promised to serve, if elected, with all his capabilities. Newly-appointed State Treasurer Harold Clemens, filling the vacancy left by the death of Dena Smith, promised to be a hard-working candidate and a careful custodian of the taxpayers' money. Popular Secretary of State Bob Zimmerman drew applause when he described his job as "the best in the world" and after six terms is seeking a seventh with the aid of a "power-packed Republican team."

Sixth District Congressman William Steiger spoke of his appearance before the group as a "homecoming." He urged the workers to plan for victory in '68

with belief and commitment. In reference to recent troubles of the U. S. he said "I pray we can change what is happening." Steiger described the challenges which must be faced and said he looked forward to working with the "Knowles team." Lt. Knowles he said that "no one but Knowles has the background needed to carry out the accomplishments already attained and those of the future."

was delivered by Rev. Jerome Ziegler of Holy Angels church and the benediction by Rev. Victor Hackbarth of Trinity Lutheran church. The pledge of allegiance was presented by Dick Claus, honorary member of the Young Republicans.

Labor Dispute May Delay Some Local Telephone Services

General Telephone Company of Wisconsin customers at Kewaskum may experience some delay in placing out-of-town calls as a result of the current labor dispute between the Communications Workers of America and the Bell System operating companies.

Jack Richardson, district commercial manager for General Telephone, pointed out that General Telephone is not involved in the labor dispute in any way. However, Richardson explained, while General Telephone provides the local telephone service in this exchange, out-of-town telephone traffic is routed through Bell's Wisconsin Telephone Company toll office at West Bend.

As a result of the labor dispute, operator-assisted calls, such as person-to-person, collect, credit card or station-to-station out of town calls where direct distance dialing is not available, may be delayed. However, direct distance dialed calls should not be affected.

Customers may assist in keeping such delays to a minimum by using direct distance dialing whenever possible, and by placing operator-assisted calls during off-peak periods, especially during the late evening hours. When operator-assisted calls must be placed during the day, customers should have the correct telephone number of the party they are calling to speed placement of the call.
