ORDINANCE No. 6 An Ordinance Establishing Rules of Conduct in County Park Areas

WHEREAS, the Washington County Park and Planning Com-mission is charged with the responsibility of operating, constructing and maintaining County parks in Washington County; and

WHEREAS, the said Washington County Park and Planning Commission deems it appropriate that rules be promulgated cover-ing conduct in County parks.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County Board Supervisors of Wash-ington County does ordain and establish the following:

SECTION 1. Definitions

(a) The term "Public Grounds" shall include all public parks owned or operated by Washington County.

(b) The term "vehicle" shall include any motor vehicle, bi-cycle, snowmobile, motorcycle, trailer, wagon, horses or any other means of travel.

SECTION 2. Unlawful Conduct. It shall be unlawful for any person to commit any of the following acts in or upon any public grounds in Washington County.

(a) To park any vehicle upon such public grounds except within the limits of clearly marked parking areas.

(b) To operate any vehicle upon such public grounds except upon clearly marked public roadways.

(c) To operate any vehicle upon any roadway within the limits of such public grounds at a speed in excess of fifteen miles per hour.

(d) To park any vehicle or to loiter or lounge in or upon such grounds between the hours of eleven o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning except as allowed by permit issued by authority of the Washington County Park and Planning Com-mission

(e) To carry, keep or use any firearm, bow and arrow, sling-shot, trap, gun or other shooting device upon such public grounds.

(f) To soil, deface, injure, damage, upset or destroy any build-ing, fence, fountain, bench, table, receptacle, fireplace, tree, bush, flowers or other object situated, used or kept upon such public recently. grounds.

(g) To dig or break up the ground surface in any public grounds except in areas specifically designated as camp-grounds and upon issuance of a permit by authority of the Washington County Park and Planning Commission.

(h) To build any fires upon such public grounds except in fire-places or other suitable facilities provided for that purpose; or to dispose live embers of any fire except that fires may be permitted in areas specifically designated as a camp-ground and upon issuance of a permit by authority of the Washington County Park and Plan-ning Commission.

(i) To leave, throw or **break** any bottle, box, refuse can or other object in the lakes or streams, or at any other place upon such public grounds except in clearly marked refuse receptacles provided for that purpose.

(j) To take, have or keep any dog or cat upon such public grounds except upon a leash.

(k) To set off fireworks of any kind except when a public display permit has been issued by proper authority in accordance with the Wisconsin Statutes. Public fireworks displays may be con-ducted upon issuance of a permit by authority of the Washington County Park and Planning Commission.

(1) To engage in any athletic contest, game or activity, such as hardball, softball, football, soccer, etc., whereby large areas of public grounds are usurped by the participants to the exclusion and at the peril of injury to others, except in areas specifically designated for such activity

(m) To fail, refuse or neglect to obey the regularly posted rules and regulations of the County Park and Planning Commission for the use or enjoyment of any facilities upon such public grounds.

SECTION 3. Penalties. Any person who shall violate any pro-vision of this ordinance may be punished by a forfeiture of not more than \$250 together with the costs of prosecution, and in case of de-fault of payment of such forfeiture and costs, by imprisonment in the county jail for a term not exceeding thirty days.

He stated that Federal Grants had been reduced and there-tore expected aids would not be realized as had been expected. He stated that such grants had been cut back sharply, and because other institutions of learning had been granted aids, those planned for the West Bend Center had been reduced about \$134,000.00. This would mean that the county would be obligated to pay an addi-tional \$80,594, and the city would be obligated for an additional amount of \$53,729.00. Mr. Brown introduced Dr. Harry Maxwell, newly assigned dean of the university center at West Bend to the board. Dr. Maxwell stated that the university site was one of the most beautiful sites in the State of Wisconsin. He stated that he has had office space provided in the Court House Annex, and since plans were to open the university for college students, he would that although this was a university for college students, he would like to make it a community project where adults would find courses like to make it a community project where adults would find courses offered in other fields. He also suggested that the board would con-sider the development of a wilderness park in a portion of the park area where nature would develop freely and naturally, so that students in biology and botany could study nature, insect life and plant life in a natural state.

APPEARANCE, JAMES BROWN, AND DR. MAXWELL

Mr. Armin Schwengel, a representative of the Conservation De-partment, was called upon to explain proposed wildlife projects. Mr. Schwengel stated that last year the board did appropriate \$2,000.00 toward a wildlife project in the Town of Jackson, of which amount the state would reimburse the county in the amount of \$1,000.00 out of the Fox Bounty account. He suggested that the board consider a continuition of the same type of project in 1098. For this consider a continuation of the same type of project in 1968. For this reason he had appeared before the Budget and Finance Committee for an appropriation of \$3,000.00 in the 1968 Budget. Again the state would refund to the county an amount of \$1,500.00. Several members would retund to the county an amount of \$1,500.00. Several memory of the board inquired regarding the renewal of the fox bounty program. They felt that because of the increased number of foxes, it was more difficult to find other wild game such as pheasants and rabbits. Mr. Schwengel stated that the bounty system did not prove successful wherever it had been tried, and natural diseases and natural enemies would be the only way to curtail the fox population.

The chair called upon Mr. Robert Boltz to comment upon the report of the coroner. He stated that he was alarmed about the large number of fatalities on the highways, but statistics did prove that the number of deaths per million miles traveled had been reduced over the last few years. He also commented upon a resolution that would be presented that would provide for a monthly salary to be paid to the coroner. Moved by Mr. Geib, seconded by Mr. Kratz, that Report No. 24 of the Coroner be approved and filed. Motion carried.

WASHINGTON COUNTY GUIDANCE CENTER

To: The Honorable Board of Supervisors of Washington County Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am happy to report that during the past year the guidance center has made further progress both in terms of providing service for a larger number of clients as well as extending the preventive programs on a community basis.

With the assistance of the Mental Health Association, we have initiated a Volunteer Program that looks quite promising. Regular meetings with members of the Clergy have promoted mutual under-standing and led to more effective and cooperative methods for behavior the disturbed rearrow helping the disturbed person.

Seminars between members of our staff and the Department of (Public Welfare) Health and Social Services has led to a better coordination of our efforts as well as more effective service to pa-tients whose problems impinge upon both agencies.

Our individual and group psychotherapy programs remain quite active. We are attempting, more than ever before, to clearly define the goals of such treatment in advance and structure the treatment process, as much as possible, in the direction of achieving maximal results in the shortest time possible. By doing so we make such treatment available to larger numbers of people and focus more clearly on the specific problems involved.

The Aftercare Group continues to provide follow-up care for those patients who have been hospitalized in the recent past.

The guidance center has been participating also in establishing new class for the emotionally disturbed children in the West Bend School System.

The activities of the volunteers are varied and range from clerical assistance and record keeping, to actual participation during the treatment session. In addition to work within the clinic, there "Listening Ear", (a volunteer the patient can call when he is troubled in between clinic appointments), and such activities as a picnic between the volunteer and patient's families, and public events such as car races and movies

The program is being carefully studied and evaluated. This Spring and Summer, research was conducted by students, to see if the benefits of the program could be measured. This venture is still quite young and will need to stand the test of further time. But it can be said now that a program such as this is workable in an outpatient mental health clinic, and that the volunteers have been of very real help to our patients. In some cases it has allowed the therapist to reduce the frequency of visits, and there are signs that recovery is being accelerated. The research was conducted through interviews with the volunteers and the patients involved, following a schedule or questionnaire developed by the staff and state resource personnel.

There will undoubtedly be further expansion of this program, and evaluation will be more complete and informative by the next annual report.

Volunteer Program

During this past year the Guidance Center has embarked on volunteer program designed to make use of community talent on behalf of our patients.

This program is viewed not as a substitute for Center help, but as a supplement to it. I refer to such things as close friendship versus the objective therapy relationship, home visits, nights out, etc.

A long range objective is to bridge the gap between the patient and his community, and to help the citizens to become more inti-mately involved with the center by actually participating in the helping process. It is also hoped that this increased knowledge will helping process. It is also hoped that this increased knowledge will gradually eliminate the fear and stigma of emotional illness.

The program is sponsored by the Washington County Mental Health Association which publicized it and actively recruited the unteers

The initial group consisted of 16 individuals from throughout the county, all of whom, except one, were female. The name given to the group is "GUIDEERS"

With the assistance of the State Volunteer Coordinator, this group was put through a series of 5 training sessions, conducted by the resource person and the Guidance Center staff. This training consisted of basic education as to the nature of emotional illness, types of treatment the Guidance Center offers, its role in the system of health and welfare agencies, a survey of the normal develop-mental processes, and lastly, but perhaps most importantly, the use of one's self in helping another person.

The coordination of the program is under the clinic administrator. The assignments of specific volunteers to patients was done by the therapist on the case and that therapist provided the supervision necessary to the volunteer in helping the patient.

APPEARANCE, ALICE IN DAIRYLAND

Another continuing project of University Extension is to keep all persons informed about the use of, and dangers of using, chemi-cals in producing food. It has become an accepted fact that chemicals are practically mandatory in this business of agriculture, to keep quality and quantity adequate. Current information and recommen-dations of the University of Wisconsin College of Agriculture are passed along to dealers and producers through all media.

The 4-H livestock projects are concerned primarily with pro-duction and management. The projects involve feeding, selection of breeding stock, record keeping, and other activities. Dairying continues to be the project with the most interest in Washington County, with 104 members enrolled in 1967. There is probably a finer dairy show at the Washington County Junior Fair than there is at some state-fairs, because these boys and girls have some ex-cellent animals. There were 19 4-H members enrolled in the beef project, 10 in sheep, 24 in rabbits, 19 in poultry, and eight in swine.

Marketing and Utilization

The University Extension office is very pleased that the 1967 "Alice in Dairyland" is a native of Washington County—Miss Kristin Williams, of Colgate. She won the district contest in the spring at Kewaskum, which was sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club, and went on to win the state contest at Green Bay. Since that time she has appeared in the county several times.

Other June Dairy Month activities included the annual banquet sponsored by farmers; the first annual Dairy Dance, sponsored by the Kirchhayn Trotters 4-H Club; plus other activities by other clubs. Speakers were made available during June to all civic clubs as requeste

Under the sponsorship of the Washington County Homemakers a "cheese festival" was planned and scheduled, which was open to the public. The primary purposes of the program were to acquaint women with the many kinds of cheese available on the market today, cooking with cheese, and the importance of cheese in the diet. "Alice in Dairyland", and Miss Jane Comings, American Dairy As-sociation of Wisconsin, were the main speakers at the event.

Home Economic

The home economics program is carried out largely through the county Homemaker activities. During the past year, under the direction of the county home economist, the program centered around these projects: Germany, Relaxing Leisure Time Activities, Laundry and Your Water Supply, and Yeast Breads.

Further study was done through the use of "package programs" concerning various aspects of homemaking which provided special interest information for a club, such as Social Security, Nutritional Meals, Let's Keep Wisconsin Beautiful, Who Protects Consumers, Music Appreciation, and Medicare. Workshops in special areas have been developed.

Approximately 800 women in 60 different clubs were involved in this program.

Early marriages and changing values are of great importance to the society today. A young homemaker newsletter, "Homemaking Notes", was developed as a means of acquainting homemakers with University Extension, and to aid them in solving problems which are typical of this age group. Family concern is also evident in 4-H programs, and home economics clubs, where special presen-tations were given by the home economist. Further emphasis in this area was made through the use of radio and newspaper releases.

A special workshop in money management was conducted, with emphasis placed on values of goals, food buying, credit, insurance, and investments. Money management helps were included in 4-H work, radio releases, and personal contact

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The youth development efforts of University Extension are made primarily through the 4-H program.

The total 4-H enrollment for Washington County was 1157. There were 466 boys and 691 girls participating. Home economics continues to be an important aspect of the program. There were 290 enrolled in the clothing projects, and 215 in foods and nutrition. Other projects which show a large enrollment are woodworking, with 178 members; crafts, 177; knitting, 163; horses, 95; dairy, 104. There are a total of 40 projects offered with an enrollment of over 2,000 in the various projects. Some of the members enroll in more than one project. than one project.

In addition to the individual projects in which the members work during the year there are also many group activities. These provide opportunities to learn to work together. A variety of ac-tivities insures an opportunity for all members to have something which they enjoy doing. Examples of activities include speaking and poster programs, music and drama festivals, county camp, coun-ty fair activities, demonstrations, health and safety activities, recrea-tion leadership, and community projects.

The boys and girls in Washington County 4-H clubs are guided by 348 adult leaders. These adult volunteers make it possible to have a wide ranging 4-H program. These leaders continually try to improve their leadership abilities by attending various informa-tional meetings and workshops conducted by the Extension staff. Thirty adults who were new to 4-H leadership attended a "leader-ship-in-depth" training course of four sessions. One of the new concepts being developed in leadership is the idea of a county "key leader". This is a local volunteer leader who becomes a specialist in a certain project or activity by reason of his background or in a certain project or activity by reason of his background or special workshops, and then conducts meetings and workshops for other leaders in the county. This enables a greater number of leaders to receive good information than if the Extension staff were to do it alone. In Washington County key leaders have been active in the crafts, dairy, horse, and tractor projects.

While the 4-H club members participated in many different kinds of activities, one of the most widely carried out activities was community beautification. Community beautification has been done by 4-H clubs of the county for many years; however, with the emphasis nationally by many organizations, the 4-H clubs have also given added emphasis in the last couple years. Some of the clubs started new programs while many others continued their ongoing activities. Here are some of the activities that have been reported by 4-H clubs by 4-H clubs.

This report is concerned with activities of University Extension of Washington County. The Extension agents will provide further information or more detail on any of these activities upon request.

tion and Manager

In this day of computerized agriculture it becomes increasingly more difficult for farmers to understand some of the reports that come to them. One of these that seems to cause a great deal of confusion is the new IBM soil test report. The University Extension office developed a program to teach people how to read them. About six meetings were held around the county for this purpose. Those attending included dealers as well as groups of farmers.

Computers are also available now for completing farm man-agement records and cow testing records.

The county swine breeders were active during the year. They had their usual carcass contest, with grading the hog on the hoof and following up to see what it graded on the rail. A new feature of this project in 1968 will be a feed efficiency program.

The apple crop for 1967 in Washington County is not good. This is due primarily to a very cold spring, when the apple blossoms were not pollinated. The county apple growers association has been very active, however. They prepare and carry out their own program during the year.

- -Cut brush and picked up litter around the wayside
- around Firemen's Hall and planted -Continued landscaping flowers.
- Planted trees and shrubs in the park.
- -Planted trees at the various members' homes. -Purchased and planted a large tree for the new public school. -Planted flowers in the planter at the public school.
- -Each 4-H family was given a packet of flower seeds to plant near their home
- Members painted mailboxes.
- -Raked Firemen's Park.
- -Cleaned and maintained lawn at the 4-H club house.
- -Cleaned up and painted buildings in the village park.
- -Provided litter cans for the park.
- -Erected and dedicated flagpole to the village
- -Maintained neglected cemetery.
- -Planted flower bulbs and shrubs around the school.
- Planted multiflora rose as a wildlife cover.
- -Planted 4,000 trees to serve as windbreaks, wildlife shelters, and forest plantations.

This is indeed an impressive list of accomplishments. In a true se, however, these are only means to a greater end. The final aim the leaders in conducting youth programs is the development of youth into good citizens of their community. In commenting on the community beautification activities, one of the leaders wrote, and we quote:

"It is our hope that we can instill a love of beauty in these young people, so that when they are adults, beautification and con-servation will be a way of life, and not a special activity." Leader training meetings for 4-H home economics projects were conducted by the county home economist, to help channel informa-

tion back to the club members

Considerable effort in youth development also goes into work-ing with the schools in the area. This is primarily in conservation techniques, and the formation of the Kettle Moraine. First we show slides in the classroom, and then take the class on a field trip where they have a chance to see the land forms, and see conservation practices at work on a farm.

Community and Resource Development, and Public Affairs

The Washington County Beautification Council has been or-ganized through the University Extension office, and it has de-veloped with a great deal of enthusiasm. The council now numbers

about 40, many of whom were recommended by members of the County Board. Mrs. Glenn Peters is chairman; John Lamm, vice-chairman; and Mrs. Thomas Rosenberger, secretary-reporter.

The council has very ambitious ideas, which involve a complete survey of Washington County, and developing methods of improv-ing those areas which are suggested for improvement. Good help has been identified and is available, and we expect to see a great deal of interest and enthusiasm for the work of the council of the part of all citizens of the county.

One of the main countywide activities of the council so far has been COLORAMA. This was a series of tours to see the Kettle Moraine at its colorful best, and to learn more about the formation of the area. of the area

A 60-mile bus tour of the county was held in which 35 people participated. Air tours were given on two successive weekends, and 113 people took part in these, to fly over the Kettle Moraine and see how beautiful it really is. The council and the University Extension agents felt this to be a very successful project, and one which created good publicity for the activities of the council.

Water is a natural resource which must be used well to keep the supply in line with the increasing demand. Washington County Homemakers chose to explore this topic in relation to use in the home. Through this project they hoped to learn to become aware of today's water problems, to understand the implications of water pollution and to learn what effects detergents and other household products might have on the water supply products might have on the water supply

Help was obtained from the State Board of Health as well as Culligan Water Institute on both organization and presentation of the project. The information has also been presented to several civic clubs and other organizations throughout the county.

University Extension agents are also active in the Washington County Fair, which is presented in another report.

The Chairman called upon Mr. Hovland to present the report of the County Fair. Mr. Hovland commented upon the receipts and disbursements of the last fair, and he concluded by showing slides that exemplified the exhibits, aerial photographs of the fair, and types of exhibits most popular at the fair. He also stated that as with everything else problems do arise and solutions are under consideration. Moved by Mr. Schmahl, seconded by Mr. Black that the report of the Fair be approved and filed. Motion carried.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

OF WASHINGTON COUNTY

It is necessary to report to you at this time regarding our budget for the year 1968. At no other time previous to this, has it been necessary for the Welfare Department to present a budget which represents as high a rate of increase as it does this year. There are three basic factors that cause this increase. One is growth of popu-bilion and another the second s lation and another is proliferation of program through legislative change and the third is inflation. All of these have contributed greatly to an expanding caseload and to an increase in expenditures.

The evidence of population growth is recognized quite simply when you compare Washington County's 1960 population of 46,000 to today's estimated 53,000. The pressure from this growth has caused a need for many varied types of existing institutions to grow and expand. Churches, schools, business enterprises, libraries, law en-forcement agencies, all of these are growing. It is inevitable that this growth would effect the Welfare Department and that it will have a continued influence in the future.

The influence of inflation is obvious. We see it in salaries and we see it in other costs. The purchasing power of the dollar is de-creasing and thus, there is a need for more dollars, not only for salaries, but also to pay for goods and services that are purchased by the Department for the people on its caseloads.

The third factor, proliferation of program, is of greatest con-n today and can be summed up largely in the term "Medical istance". We've heard much about this in the past and today, Assistance we see its effect in our department's budget.

The 1968 budget reflects the legislative changes adopted by the Wisconsin State Legislature in 1966. The changes are, for the most part, a result of the recommendations of Governor Knowles task force on the 1965 amendments to the Social Security Act and legislation was enacted as follows:

1. Medical care was extended to many people in certain in-come levels who were previously ineligible.

The former Health Assistance Payments Program is incor-porated into the medical program.

Medical coverage was extended to people over 65 in County Mental Hospitals.

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The effect of these changes is to involve the Welfare Depart-ment in the provision of medical care to over 800 individuals, when previous to the change in the law, we were involved with about 400. It is important to note at this point that about 35 of these cases are patients in the County Hospital and 20 are in other State Mental Institutions, and that the costs of these people are now included in the Welfare Department's budget.

Other legislative changes that were made include:

- 1. The removal of maximum grant limitations in Old Age As-sistance, Disabled Aid and Aid to the Blind.
- 2. The removal of the ninety day waiting period after divorce for Aid to Families with Dependent Children.
- 3. The removal of the mandatory period of need (three months) in Aid to Families with Dependent Children.
- Involvement of the County in more cases to which it must extend social services under the State's commitment to the Federal government

The result of these changes have been an increase in costs to the County for its share of the total expenses.

Basic to the changes in the law is the fact that the State of Wisconsin found itself in a position of being about 26th highest of all the states in terms of tax money sent to Washington and 49th of all the States in money received from Washington. The legislature and Governor Knowles felt a need to try and improve this position and the Wisconsin Medical Program helps in this respect in that it brings millions of federal dollars into the State. However, none of this money can be used to reduce fiscal effort on the part of either the State or the Counties. Thus, the only way to utilize this federal supply of dollars was through improvement of programs. Therefore, we see the involvement of the department in medical care to the aged in mental institutions and the needy families with children and to other marginal income groups.

Accompanying these changes in program is a new system of re-imbursement, which results in the various counties being charged according to their ability to pay. This is based upon a comparison of the mill rate of the county for its various welfare expenditures. The result of this is that Washington County pays 55% of the balance of costs after deducting federal reimbursement and other counties may pay only 20%. The State then pays only 45% in our County and up to 80% in other counties.

308 trips were made in behalf of the active cases to physicians, clergy, welfare department and other involved agencies and people.

The increased staff has meant that not only were more cases admitted to service, but also, that more visits could be made to each case. A family needs time to relate to someone. Until this confidence (rapport) is established, only the obvious or least confidential is shared.

Why doesn't a person with Diabetes follow his physician's orders? What are the true concerns and day-to-day problems of parents of a retarded or brain-injured child? Why does the person who had Tuberculosis find it so difficult to seek routine follow-up care? Why isn't the person who is recovering from a "stroke" more self-sufficient?

The nurse can put the facts together and form a tentative explanation, but cannot help until the individual is ready. Human nature tends to reject what it fears or cannot comprehend. As the individual is encouraged to "look at" his problem, understanding and acceptance does result. With understanding and acceptance, comes changes in behavior. This kind of "change" is more permanent.

Rehabilitation, as after a stroke or fracture, is slow and often discouraging. This person needs encouragement and reminders of progress that has been made, as well as supervision of prescribed rehabilitation activities.

The bedridden at home are usually of two categories: 1) the short-term post hospitalization or during an acute illness and 2) the long-term who have received maximum care at a hospital and return home rather than to a nursing home. These families need help to plan for the individual's care. Too much laundry, too much running back and forth, too many personal demands create excess "wear and tear" on the rest of the family. The public health nurse helps the family to identify the necessities of care and helps them to find the most efficient ways to perform these activities. She also helps the patient and his family to find ways to include the bedridden indi-vidual in normal daily activities. Often times, a visit once a week for three to four weeks, and then monthly, or every other month, is all that is required to help all members of the family adjust to their new role.

The newborn with an illness and the premature infant is always of prime concern to the public health nurse. An initial visit is made in each known instance, to determine need and the family's ability

Readiness Program

Each year, during early spring, a program of registration for children who will begin school in fall is planned. The classroom teachers, school specialists and administrators, and the public health

nurse participate. The purpose of this program is to obtain the necessary data for the schools, to discover the individual child's needs, and to help

the schools, to discover the individual child's needs, and to help parents plan for the preparation of the child for school. Beginning school is the first major emotional crisis the average child experiences. It is the first separation of child from family. Very often, it is an emotional crisis for parents, as well. The child who has been encouraged to meet his self-needs and has been pro-vided multiple opportunities for experiences, will adjust more rapid-ly and with less emotional upheaval. All children beginning school as well as students beginning

ly and with less emotional upheaval. All children beginning school, as well as students beginning high school, are expected to have a physical and dental examination. At that time, they are also expected to have a Tuberculin Skin Test and immunizations, as needed. All examination reports are reviewed by the public health nurse to discover physical limitations. Other public health responsibilities prevented the gathering of complete information this past year. The following results are totals from three of the school systems served:

Community Health Service

A community has characteristics ("personality") just as does an individual, family, or school. To be effective within the community, a public health nurse must be aware of the individual community's personality"-its needs, programs, organizations, leaders, et are the "resources" she brings together to serve the needs of family, school, and community itself. She identifies health needs and encourages local participation in prevention or correction.

Communicable diseases are included here, rather than with family service. It is the one area of illness where rapid involvement of others can result

Two active Tuberculosis cases were admitted to a TB sanitorium for care. Patients were interviewed to discover contacts. (Contacts are associates to active communicable disease.) Those who live in this county received free follow-up studies. Contacts outside the county or within the city of West Bend were referred.

Two industries, plus all public school personnel participated in the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association's Tuberculin Skin Testing Program. Follow-up of questionable x-rays and positive tests was done by the public health nurses, in cooperation with local physicians and Rocky Knoll Sanitorium.

123 authorizations were issued for chest x-rays, and 83 for skin tests, at a cost of approximately \$450.00 total. These authorizations are signed by Judge J. Tom Merriam, and issued by the Public Health Nursing Service supervisor upon request of the family physi-cian. X-ray authorizations are valid at St. Joseph's Hospitals in West Bend and Hartford, and The Hartford Clinic; TBN Skin testings are authorized to be done by the family physician. These authorizations are issued: 1) for continuing supervision of past TBC or illnesses that predispose the individual to TBC, and 2) for differential diagno-sis where there is a history of Tuberculosis, its symptoms, or ex-posure to the active disease.

Major Communicable Diseases

12 known cases of Hepatitis, involving 2 different communities were followed. The source of the infection was traced and contacts were counciled to seek preventive care. 1 case of Salmonella with were counciled to seek preventive care. I case of Salmonelia with epidemiological study, and 12 cases of Rheumatic Fever and Scarlet Fever were followed. The public health nurse spoke to the class-mates of new cases to caution students to practice good health habits. Emphasis was placed on adequate apparel, avoidance of chilling, sufficient rest, and good nutrition. Classroom teachers en-couraged to be extra cautious about sending children home with sore throats and helping students keep dry and warm when outside. Fliese describing the signs and expenditors prevention and care for Fliers describing the signs and symptoms, prevention, and care for streptococcal infections were sent to the parents of classmates.

MINOR COMMUNICABLE DISEASES and Their Prevention

Children absent from school longer than normal, or who appeared unrecovered when returning to school, were seen or their parents were called upon by a public health nurse.

Prevention of communicable disease is possible by immunization, environmental control and/or controlling the active cases. In Germantown, a community-based demonstration clinic was planned and conducted in cooperation with the local health office, the Germantown P.T.A. Area Council; the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association, the State Board of Health, the Germantown Village Board, and the Public Health Nursing Service. 49 parochial and small school district teachers met for general orientation to the 1967-68 health program in August. Voluntary health groups displayed health education materials. The American Heart Association contracted services of local physicians who dis-cussed strep infections and Rheumatic Fever.

8 pre-school workdays with the public school teachers were at-tended by the public health nurses. At these meetings, the public health nurse described the 1967-68 health program and the outline of "Areas of Responsibility" in each school health program.

Washington County is still a rapidly growing community. Population has increased 20% since 1960. Much of the growth has come from the expansion of the Milwaukee Metropolitan Area, with many new residents commuting to work there. The net immigration since 1960 is approximately 9,650, almost double the amount between 1950 and 1960. Approximately 1,500 more persons commute outside the county to work in manufacturing than commute into the county to work in factories

The county has proportionately more young people than a typical Wisconsin county, especially in the "under 18" age group.

Manufacturing provides 42% of the employment opportunities; farming provides 13%; service employment is 35%, indicating that residents go outside the county for many services.

The Kettle Moraine hills and lakes lend themselves to multiple recreational facilities. New parks, camping facilities, and other outdoor recreational opportunities are being created each year, attracting people from outside the community as well as local residents

high school districts provide primary and secondary education for 13,318 students; parochial elementary schools serve another 4,397: a total of 17,715 students. 2 vocational schools and 1 sheltered workshop training facility serve the adult population.

25 dentists and 26 physicians are in practice in the county. 2 community hospitals have total bed capacity of 160. 2 nursing home facilities for personal care can serve 143. 2 nursing home facilities for extended care can serve 88. 1 county hospital can serve 205 mentally-emotionally ill and infirm.

The value of the new Court House and Jail was taken from figures supplied by the Office of the County Clerk.

With reference to the 1958 appraisal, we feel it was good judg-ment on the part of the members of the County Board to have had this appraisal made as it helps to determine the replacement and net sound values of the respective County buildings. We again sug-rest that serious consideration he given to have a new appraisal gest that serious consideration be given to have a new appraisal made to bring values of County properties up to date. Such an appraisal could be used as a basis for bringing insurance coverages

Comparative Cost charts as furnished by Engineering Depart-ments of Insurance Companies show that building costs have in-creased approximately 2.65% since our last report. There is no apparent indication of a reversal of this advance in the coming months. To comply with the Fire Insurance Rating Bureau ruling, coverage must be raised to reflect the increased values as revealed in our analysis of building costs. These changes will be made effec-tive December 1, 1967. The new statement of values listing various coverages is attached to this report.

The appraisal referred to above did not include valuations of contents located in any of the above buildings listed. We again sug-gest that the various department heads report to your Committee as to the value of contents of the various departments located in the respective buildings so that the proper insurance be provided. It eliminates the removed farm buildings and includes those located on the Ridge Run County Park property.

The total insurance amount is blanket on all real and personal property of every description owned by the County; on personal property of others for which the Insured assumed liability prior to loss; on the Insured's liability imposed by law for loss to personal property of others, and on the Insured's interest in personal property belonging in whole or in part to others.

The building and contents "Statement of Values" are filed an-nually with the Fire Insurance Rating Bureau and is also used as a basis for the insurance

The writing of the insurance under this plan has not only pro-vided better coverage but has also resulted in a considerable premium saving to the County

Builders Risk policies provide coverage on the Home and Hos-pital (The Samaritan) now under construction. These policies insure against the hazards of fire, lightning, extended coverage, and van-dalism and malicious mischief.

A separate policy provides coverage on the Slinger Oil Tank Station. This policy written in the amount of \$15,000.00 uses the Oil Distribution Station form which provides coverage to "real and per-sonal property both above and below ground including underground tanks, contents of tanks, piping and connections, petroleum products, awnings, signs and metal smokestacks".

Public Liability Insurance

This coverage is written on a comprehensive policy form. It in-cludes Contractors' Liability covering highway operations; Owners' and Tenants' Liability on all County real estate, buildings, elevators; and Automobile Liability with the following limits:

Other Highway Equipment

This equipment is fully covered under a floater policy against loss by fire, lightning, windstorm, flood, collapse of bridges, collision, etc., regardless of location. This equipment is insured for \$760,875.00. Theft is covered subject to a \$100 deductible clause.

Radio Equipment on Cars, Guns, Cameras

There is a floater policy covering radio equipment in the amount of \$25,915.00 on sheriff's and police cars as well as 8 mobile radios of the Highway Department for full value, substantially as above. The radio tower and equipment in the concrete block control houses are included in the floater policy. There is also a floater policy covering guns of the sheriff's department in the amount of \$795.00. Camera equipment of the sheriff's department is insured for \$535.00 under the floater policy. Bonds for all County officials and employees are properly filed. It is suggested that the bonds for the Clerk of Courts and other qualified officials, whose offices are now handling additional funds, be increased to statutory requirements.

REPORT No. 30

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

I. Paul F. Humbel, Civil Defense Coordinator, hereby submit the report for the Civil Defense Department beginning October 1, 1966 ending September 30, 1967.

There were 81 conferences with individuals and groups. This included two Governor Conferences, one in February in Madison and the other in September at Lake Delton. Both being of two day duration.

I also attended a Civil Defense Managers School at Wisconsin State College at Stevens Point in June, a week of schooling that was an opportunity to learn more about my position as Coordinator and how to solve some of the problems involved.

I also attended Disaster Demonstrations at Waupun and Hartford as an observer and to help criticize the people taking part in hese mock accidents, the fire and first aid units practice as Civil Defense organizations in these activities

We, here in the county also aided the State in the state wide Home Fallout Protection Survey

We are now studying large buildings in the county to attempt to license and stock more public air raid shelters. In most of the schools in the county first aid classes are now being taught.

All Radiological Equipment was checked by the Health Department and placed in good repair again.

There are a few townships in which new Civil Defense Directors need to be appointed because the former director has moved out of the jurisdiction but this can be handled on a township basis and is not a problem of your group.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my local Directors and their municipalities for their cooperation in the past year and also thanks to you, the County Board Members and my committee. to the good experience enjoyed

The present liability limits appear to be adequate for most claims. We do know that claims are becoming more numerous since the waiver of immunity from tort liability on the part of municipal corporations with the emphasis being placed on increased liability limits for insurance coverages written on governmental units. We recommend an umbrella liability policy which would provide liability coverage up to \$1,000,000.00 in addition to the above listed limits. This latter policy would also pick up many other liability hazards in cases where the primary coverage is inadequate or contains ex-clusions for a specific claim or incident. This coverage is usually written with a \$25,000 deductible. We would be very happy at your request to have insurance company engineers make a survey of the County exposures and submit a quotation for your consideration. We recommend that the Board avail themselves of this additional protection.

Workmen's Compensation

The County, to date, has again elected to provide their own workmen's compensation and employers' liability coverage.

The increased number of employees of the County over the years, may result in an increase in the number of claims. It is suggested that consideration again be given to having such coverage provided by a private carrier. If the County continues to provide their own workmen's compensation coverage, we would like to suggest that consideration be given to carrying excess coverage of \$1,000,000.00. This would be excess over \$25,000 per accident. We would be happy to obtain costs for you for such a program. The increased number of employees of the County over the

Windstorm and Hail damage may be added, if desired, at a rate of 10c per \$100.00. This coverage applies regardless of where the loss occurs. County owned cars have Com-prehensive coverage. There is no collision insurance on any of the County's cars or trucks. The total insurance on the automobiles and trucks is in the amount of \$390,080.00.

The total number of prisoners registered in the County Jail was 728 (an increase of 6 over the previous year.) Of this number 551 were male adults, 20 female adults, 116 male juveniles and 41 female juveniles. The total number of meals served to prisoners was 13,914 meals, an increase of 223 meals.

Sixty prisoners served time under the Huber Law. The amount of their earnings was \$16,913.69. \$5,385.00 was turned over to the County Treasurer for board, \$2,402.00 was paid for support of de-pendents and the balance was turned over to the prisoner upon his release.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The issues involving county departments of social services are much before us in the news of the day. Specifically, one should be concerned with the answer to the question of why there is an increase in various "welfare" costs in this time of prosperity. We should be concerned with what social service departments are doing with the monies allocated to them and what services are being provided to the people with whom they are involved. We should also be concerned with the processes involved in the administration of a department and the cause and effect relationship that Federal and State Legislation have upon a county social service department. Perhaps the major concern should be how can all segments of society be involved in working with people who have problems; some, because of themselves and some cause of the changing nature of the society in which they live. This report will attempt to give you some of the answers to the above questions.

SECTION 1. Establishment

There is hereby established a Board of Commissioners of the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Center.

SECTION 2. Membership

(a) The Board of Commissioners of the University of Wisconsin Washington County Center shall consist of 7 members; two of said members to be appointed by the County Board Chairman from the membership of the County Board of Supervisors; two of said mem-bers to be appointed by the Mayor from the membership of the Common Council of the City of West Bend, and the Dean of the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Center, who shall be appointed by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, and the Clerk of the City of West Bend and the Washington County Clerk. (b) The term of each member appointed by the County Board of Supervisors and the Common Council of the City of West Bend shall be for a term of 2 years, and the term of the member appointed by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin shall be during his term of appointment by the Board of Regents.

The initial appointment by the Board of Regents. The initial appointment for the members appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Common Council of the City of West Bend shall be for one member the term of one year, and for the second member a term of two years. Thereafter each member shall be appointed for a term of two years which appointments shall com-mence May 1, 1968 and shall be appointed thereafter in the month of May for a term commencing on May 1 in each year thereafter.

(c) Officers shall be the Chairman and Secretary. The Chairman shall be elected by the commission members at their annual meet-ing held in May for a term of one year. The Secretary shall be elected by the commission members at the annual meeting in May, for a term of one year.

VACANCIES shall be filled in the same manner as appoint-ments or elections for the full term, but a member so appointed shall serve only for the duration of the term of the member that he replaces.

SECTION 3. Organization

(a) The Board of Commissioners of the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Center, shall meet within 30 days after their appointment and shall organize and adopt rules for its own govern-ment in accordance with the provisions of this resolution.

(b) Meetings shall be held monthly at the call of the Commis-sion Chairman or a majority of the full Commission and shall be open to the public.

(c) A quorum shall be four commissioners and all action shall require approval of a majority of the full Commiss

(d) A written record shall be kept showing all actions taken, all resolutions, findings, determinations, transactions and recom-mendations made. A copy shall be filed with the Washington County Clerk and the Clerk of the City of West Bend, as a public record.

SECTION 4. Powers

The Board of Commissioners of the University of Wisconsin Washington County Center, shall have such powers as may be nec-essary to perform its functions and duties and to determine the necessary maintenance of said Center and shall report said recom-mendations to the County Board of Supervisors of Washington Coun-ty and the Common Council of the City of West Bend.

SECTION 5. Duties

The Board of Commissioners of the University of Wisconsin Washington County Center, shall have the following functions:

(a) To make a study as to a method and procedures for opera-tional maintenance of the University of Wisconsin Washington County Center.

(b) To recommend to the County Board of Washington County and the Common Council of the City of West Bend, such disburse-ments of funds as shall be necessary to provide for the operational maintenance of the University of Wisconsin Washington County Center
