Local Man Hurt When His Car Is Struck by Train

ALVIN KREWALD ESCAPES DEATH IN CROSSING CRASH

Alvin Krewald, 41, 111 Prospect st., Kewaskum, was injured when his car was struck by a Chicago and North Western passenger train at the Kettle Moraine dr. crossing to the rear or east of Lighthouse Lanes bowling alley south of Kewaskum at 6:57 p. m. last Friday. The crossing is located a short distance east of Hwy. 45.

The mishap occurred when Krewald's auto, traveling in a generally westerly direction across the tracks, was struck in the right rear by the southbound train. The impact swung the car around, throwing it against the railroad crossing marker on the west side of the tracks, breaking it off. The vehicle was badly damaged in the crash with the right rear of the car sheared off by the impact.

Krewald was reported to have suffered extensive lacerations to his forehead, head injuries, and lacerations to his arms and abrasions and contusions to his knees. His condition was reported "good" at the hospital earlier this week.

It was reported that Krewald did not see the approaching train until he was on the tracks. The crossing is marked by cross-arm wooden markers but does not have flasher signals or warning bells. The train was delayed approximately a half hour by the mishap. A deputy at the scene indicated that Krewald was en route to his home in Kewaskum at the time of the accident. He is employed at Sierra Grinding Wheel, Inc. at Jackson.

Gene Prouty, the train engineer, said the train was traveling about 40 miles per hour prior to the crash and that he applied the emergency brakes when he noticed the car was not going to stop. He estimated the train was traveling about 25 miles an hour when the crash occurred.

Man Hurt in Boltonville Mishap

Kenneth W. Slater, 32, of R. 1, Cascade, incurred a laceration over his right eye when the truck he was driving left STH 144 south of the Sheboygan-Washington county line north of Boltonville at 11:58 p. m. Saturday. The vehicle went off on the right shoulder and came back on the highway, then crossed over the road and went off on the left side, striking an electric pole and continuing into the field. The driver said he was blinded by the lights of an approaching car on a curve. He was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum rescue squad's ambulance.

Lee Theusch Named To Attend Science Training Program

Lee H. Theusch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Theusch, Kewaskum, and a student at Kewaskum Community High school, has been named among a group of 56 gifted students in science to attend a National Science Foundation training program this summer at Lawrence university, Appleton.

The program is directed by Dr. David M. Cook, assistant professor of physics at Lawrence, under a NSF grant of \$25,125. Dates of the session are June 17 to Aug. 9. Purpose of the course is to provide high ability, science-oriented high school students with a stimulating educational experience supplementing their regular work and to encourage them to seek careers in science.

Students have been selected from 25 states throughout the nation to attend the residential program.

Auto Is Damaged In Blaze Monday

Kewaskum firemen answered a call at 5:20 p. m. Monday to extinguish a burning 1965 Corvair on state-owned land in the Kettle Moraine State Forest, located on the former Louis Backhaus farm south of Hwy. 28 about two miles east of Kewaskum. Owner of the car is Wayne D. Tolonen, R. 2, Kewaskum.

Tolonen said he drove to the area to do some target shooting. He shut off the motor and while he was removing the gun from the back seat of the car, he said he heard a sizzling noise and saw the car was smoking and on fire. After throwing several handfuls of sand on the blaze, he ran for help to summon the fire department.

Tolonen believed it is possible that gas leaked from one of the carburetors, the car backfired and caught fire. The motor and wiring burned out, carburetors melted, and part of the interior and tires were damaged. No estimate of the damage was given.

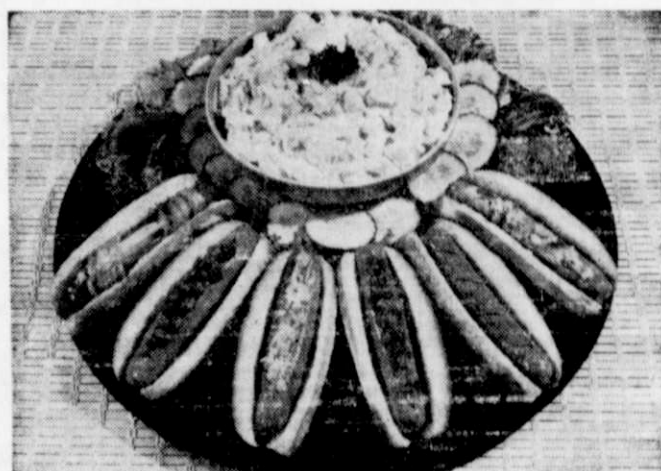

Although Kewaskum copped the Scenic title conference, medalist honors went to Steve Hales of Germantown who shot a 39 and 40 for a total of 79 to gain top honors.

The golf squad is coached by Joe Harlow, who is assistant pro at the West Bend Country club during the summer months.
