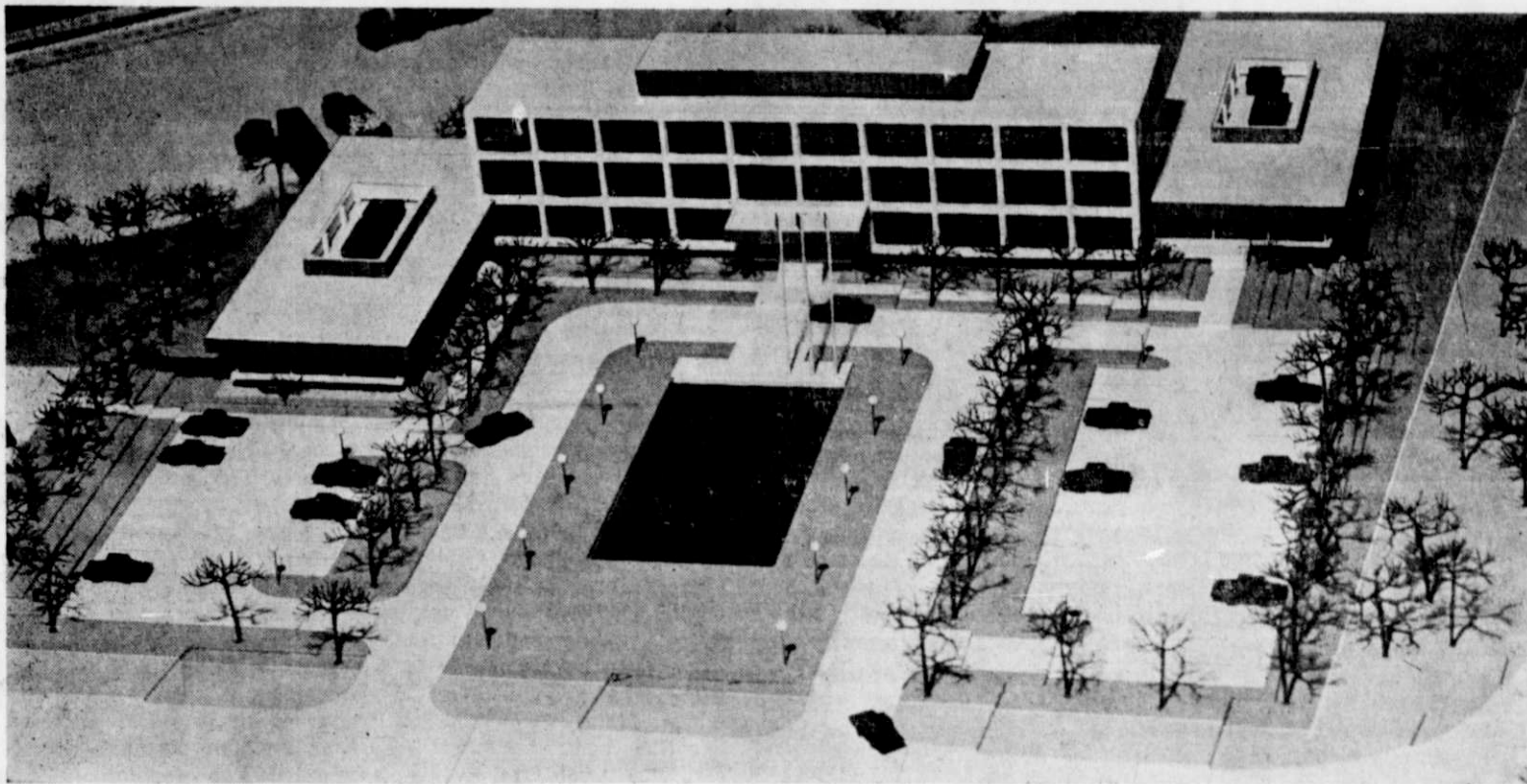

Expansion Will Total 50,000 Square Feet on 17-Acre Plot

SITE CHOSEN BECAUSE OF COOPERATION OF VILLAGE IN DEVELOPING PARK AREA

Regal Ware, Inc., has started construction on the first phase of an ultra-modern, three-unit Office Administrative Center on a 17-acre plot adjacent to its Kewaskum plant. The central Wisconsin location for the proposed expansion was chosen because of the cooperation of the Kewaskum village board in developing a natural park area contiguous with the office complex.

The "park-office" combination

is architecturally designed to preserve for the village the natural scenic beauty of the river-banked location. It will also form a picturesque setting for the local grade and high schools.

According to James D. Reigle, president of the cookware manufacturing firm, the Administrative Center will be constructed in three stages totaling not less than 50,000 square feet. The first stage, now underway, will house its vast electronic data processing facilities and related accounting functions. Expected completion date on this first 12,000 square foot unit is about Aug. 1, 1968.

146 Seniors to Receive Diplomas At Commencement Exercises May 31

ANNOUNCE PROGRAM, HONOR STUDENTS, GRADUATE LIST

One hundred and forty-six candidates of the 1968 senior class of Kewaskum Community High school will receive their diplomas at commencement exercises to be held in the school auditorium at 8 p. m. next Friday, May 31.

This year's class numbers 30 more members than last year's graduating class of 116 and exceeds the previous record-breaking 1965 class of 121 students by 25.

Jr. Woman's Club Wins 2nd Place State Award of \$300

The Kewaskum Junior Woman's club has won a second-place state award of \$300 and was presented with a large plaque for its student scholarship program and other aid to young people and educational facilities.

The award is one of three totaling \$1,000 made in Wisconsin this year through the General Federation of Women's Clubs—Shell Oil Company Education pro-

gram. The contest was open to all general and junior women's clubs in the state and there were 58 entries all told. The Kewaskum club also received other state awards. (See separate item on another page).

The newly-organized Kewaskum club, chartered in January, 1967, awarded its first scholarship, amounting to \$100, to a high school graduate. The award, which the

club plans to raise to \$300, is based on scholastic standing, financial need and other factors.

The club also contributed funds to the public library for the purchase of books, aided special education classes in the local schools and the Wisconsin Council for the Mentally Retarded and was active in the local American Field Service program.

Jr. Woman's Club Presented With Several State Awards at Convention

WIN SECOND PLACE \$300 STATE AWARD

On May 14, 15 and 16, the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs held their 71st annual convention at the Holiday Inn No. 2 at Madison. The convention was attended on May 15 by five members of the Kewaskum Junior Woman's club: Mrs. Edward J. Miller, Miss Honora Norton, Mrs. Marvin Perkins, Mrs. Norman Gruber and Mrs. Harvey Ramthun, Jr.

The agenda for the day was quite full, topped with a number of interesting and enlightening speakers.

The first speaker was Miss Diane Hull of Fond du Lac. Miss Hull, a very pleasant young woman, is a member of the Governor's Committee on Children and Youth. She spoke of the youth of today and that they are prepared physically and mentally to a higher degree than ever before. She said that in the nation's youth, we have many concerned leaders and they can do something for the communities' problems. In coffee houses or youth centers throughout the nation young people are discussing today's problems and what they can do about them. Miss Hull confirmed what many of Kewaskum's conscientious residents feel and that is the fact that Kewaskum needs a youth center.

Judge Wm. G. Callow, county judge of Waukesha, spoke during the afternoon session at the convention and gave a very enlightening talk about teenagers and the law. It was most interesting and educational for all.

In the evening the convention was honored with Dr. Jim Turpin, founder of Project Concern and author of "Vietnam Doctor." It is on the theory that there are "tools for winning a war other than material strength," that Dr. Turpin is dedicating his life.

Like all good Americans, Dr. Turpin realizes we have a job to do, but his method differs—medicines for those who are sick; food for those who are undernourished; uplift for those who

need moral assistance, and spiritual guidance. These are his tools.

The Kewaskum Junior Woman's club hopes that in the future they, together with all of Kewaskum, can join Dr. Turpin in his Project Concern and do their part in helping mankind.

The Kewaskum Juniors were specially honored with a number of awards throughout the day.

They received a "100% Participation" award. This is given to the junior clubs who have met with the following requirements in the past year:

1. Conservation: donate to Trees for Tomorrow teachers scholarship.
2. Education: enter the club in the Shell Oil contest.
3. Fine Arts: have a club program on literature or drama.
4. Home Life: have a club program in one of the divisions of the home life department.
5. International Affairs: educate the public and give monetary support to Project Hope.
6. International Clubs: give monetary support to CARE.
7. Public Affairs: (a) donate to the Wisconsin Association for Retarded Children; (b) donate to local retardation center; (c) give monetary support to Mendota Women's club; (d) give monetary support to Mendota Fashion Nook; (e) support the 3 colonies; (f) participation of the club in operation healthy babies.
8. Attendance Requirement: club representation at the fall conference and district and state conventions.

The Kewaskum Juniors were also given special recognition for having won the "100% Participation" award in their first year after being chartered as a club.

The Sixth District president, Mrs. Fred Krez, presented Sharon Miller, immediate past-president

of the Kewaskum juniors, with a large red apple cookie jar as a remembrance of being chartered during the past administration. The apple is a reminder of the slogan of the president of the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs, "Even a child can count the seeds in an apple, but the wisest man cannot count the apples in a seed."

The day's activities were climaxed by the presentation of an award to the Kewaskum Junior Woman's club for having won the second place in the Shell Oil Co. Education Contest. The contest was open to all general women's clubs and junior women's clubs in Wisconsin. There were 58 entries all told. The club was presented with a large plaque and \$300 "for its outstanding assistance to the youth of the community." The one stipulation was that the \$300 be spent for education of the youth in this community.

Kewaskum can be very proud of the new club and its fine assistance to the community.

To help meet the need for constructive leisure-time program for young people in the community, the club donated \$300 to a fund drive for a permanent youth center and sponsored dances for teenagers, providing refreshments and chaperones for the events.

Members provided volunteer service to the children's health programs and were active in charitable and social service work.

The club contributed \$428 during the year for its first year programs, with the full membership of 36 women participating in educational and fund-raising projects.

Now in its sixth year, the GFWC-Shell Education Program includes three national awards totaling \$5,000 in addition to \$50,000 in cash available to state winners. First-place state winners receive \$500 and compete for the national awards. The Cedarburg Junior Woman's club, judged the most outstanding in Wisconsin for an expanded scholarship program and other efforts to stimulate an interest in learning among young people, has been entered in the national competition. The third-place state winner of \$200

was the Delavan Junior Woman's club.

Winning clubs use the awards to further their aid-to-education programs.

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
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Jeanne Reindl to Receive Diploma At Marquette U

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM GARBAGE & REFUSE NOTICE

Village Ordinance provides that all garbage placed at the curb for collection must be first drained of all excess water and securely wrapped in paper before placed in containers. Containers shall be approved refuse cans of either metal or plastic of not more than 30 gallons in size and weigh no more than 70 pounds when filled. Containers shall be fitted with a cover which is fly tight and water tight. Tin cans, glass, wire, metal, iron, explosives or other non-burnable material shall not be mixed with garbage. Garbage is collected Mondays and Fridays of each week and effective immediately all containers not meeting the above requirements will not be picked up.

All other refuse (non-burnable), grass, leaves, brush, etc. will be picked up every other Wednesday. Requirements for containers for rubbish is the same as for garbage. Placing of rubbish upon the street, at or near the curb except on days when collections are made, is prohibited.

The incinerator at the sewage treatment plant is open daily from 7:00 A. M. to 4:00 P. M. Monday through Friday and from 7:00 A. M. to 11:00 A. M. on Saturdays.

The village dump is locked at all times. Residents of the village, who wish to haul their own refuse, must pick up a key at the Municipal Building and sign for same. Key is available daily Monday through Friday 8:00 A. M. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M.
