Winners of J. O. Reigle Scholarships are Announced

TEACHER RETIRING AFTER 38 YEARS HERE HONORED

"My thoughts and heart will be always here," was the closing remark made by Miss Margaret E. Browne in a brief talk she gave after accepting a gift from President Dick Edwards at a special recognition night in her honor given by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at their Monday night meeting at Hon-E-Kor.

Miss Browne retired at the end of the school year after 39 years of teaching service, 38 of which were in Kewaskum High school. She intends to spend her retirement in her home town of Harvard, Ill. but promised she will return to Kewaskum, the village in which so many years of her life were spent and devoted, frequently.

Three representatives of the Kewaskum Woman's club as well as three from the Junior Woman's club were guests of the Kiwanis and also presented gifts to Miss Browne. Several other guests, including the press, also were introduced.

President Edwards said in part of Miss Browne, "It is a sad occasion when she leaves after spending a lifetime giving sunshine. Miss Browne has been an institution in Kewaskum. It is hard to believe she is leaving."

Songs sung included two in Miss Browne's honor. One was "My Wild Irish Rose" and another was a special one composed for

Mrs. Donald Koerble presented Miss Browne with a doisy money tree and extended her best wishes. As you can see there are many in our small group here tonight. Miss Browne, as you know, our class of 1938 is holding our 30th class reunion next month and we are counting on you to be

there as our guest. We are going to miss you Miss Browne, do come and visit our community often. Thank you again."

Koch then turned the meeting back to President Edwards, who presented Miss Browne with a gift from the club before adjourning the session. He thanked Miss Browne for returning to Kewaskum so many years to teach. To which she replied, "It was an honor and privilege to have been invited back to the community."

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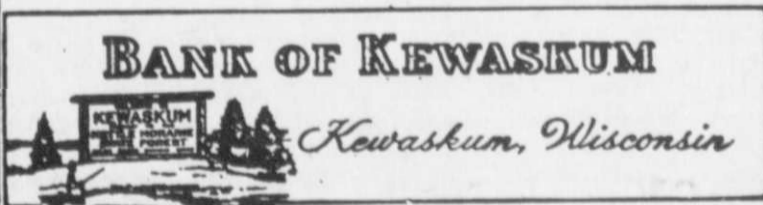
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Four Injured In 2 Crashes

Roecker, 20, R. 3, Campbellsport, and a companion were injured early Sunday morning when Roecker apparently fell asleep at the wheel and his car left Hwy. 28 about one mile east of Hwy. 41, and struck guard rail posts and went through a ditch and came to a stop in a field.

Three Charged In Hon-E-Kor Break-in, Others

Credited this week with solving six break-ins and thefts in the county area was action of an alert county patrolman who investigated when he spotted "something amiss" at a Boltonville service station.

Officer Karl Fickler early last Thursday noticed a broken window at the Erwin Degner station at Boltonville and investigated. He found James P. Gruber, 19, of R. 1, Kewaskum and formerly of West Bend inside the building.

Gruber was charged with burglary and bond set at \$5,000 when he appeared before Judge Robert J. Stoltz in county court later Thursday. An attorney was appointed for Gruber and the case was adjourned until Monday, May 27. He was being held in the county jail in lieu of bond.

Further investigation by the sheriff's department under Chief Investigator Allen Becker resulted in the apprehension of two other area residents. Richard T. Hahn, 21, of West Bend and Kenneth Quaas, 18, of R. 1, Kewaskum, and formerly of West Bend.

The three were also charged with burglaries Apr. 20 in the town of Jackson, May 7 at Hon-E-Kor Country club in Kewaskum where cash and liquor were taken.

May 7 in the town of Trenton, May 7 at the West Bend Country club. Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman said that Hahn and Quaas were also charged with burglary at the Boltonville feed mill which allegedly occurred while Gruber was in the filling station.

Bond for Quaas and Hahn was also set at \$5,000 and counsel was appointed for them and their hearings also set for May 27. All were being held in the county jail pending their appearance in court. The district attorney said that charges against at least two of the individuals may also be preferred against them by Ozaukee county authorities.

Late Monday morning the court adjourned the case against the three when they appeared in Judge Stoltz's court until Tuesday, June 4, to give attorneys an opportunity to meet with their

clients prior to their reappearance in court.

BOARD GIVEN TENTATIVE APPROVAL FOR RESERVOIR

Regular Meeting May 6, 1968

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present except Trustee Wietor.

The minutes of the previous two meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Freehauf, seconded by Trustee Kral and duly carried.

A request to establish a street in the Ramthun Addition was heard from Mr. Dean Roe. No action was taken pending a recommendation from the village engineering firm.

Chief of Police Pledl reported to the board that the probation period of Patrolman Scott will terminate as of May, 16th. Chief Pledl also reported that another request will be made to the County Highway Commission for a flashing red signal at the intersection of Main Street and River-view Drive.

The proposal of Aring Equipment Co. of Butler for a power tamper in the amount of \$495.00 was rejected.

A letter from the Public Service Commission giving tentative approval for the construction of

an additional ground level reservoir at pump station No. 1 was read to the board by the commissioner.

Two proposals for the replacement of the compressors at the sewage treatment tanks were reviewed by the board. No action was taken pending recommendation from the engineering firm.

The board members will attend a League of Wisconsin Municipalities regional meeting at Beaver Dam on May 23rd to hear members of the Governor's TAAR Task Force discuss the possible reorganization of municipal governing bodies in the state.

Payment of these claims, as recorded in the official record, was approved upon motion by Trustee Freehauf, seconded by Trustee HERRIGES and duly carried.

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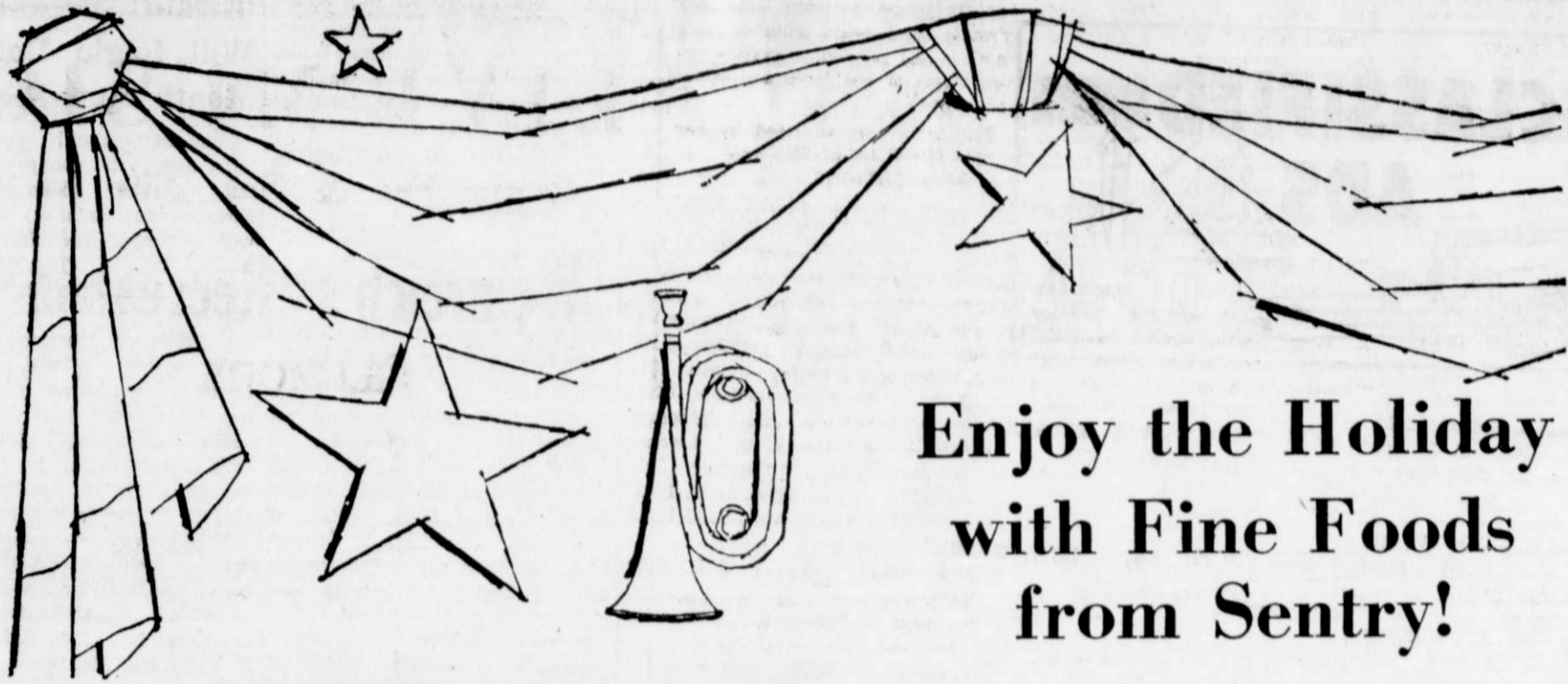

L. N. (Pete) Peterson, executive vice president and treasurer of Regal Ware, Inc., attended the 58th annual meeting of the national council as a representative of the badger council. He helped to work out local applications of the expansion plan known as "Boypower 76."

This year's annual meeting, held May 22-24 at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, was one of the most important ones in the 58 year history of the scouting movement. Chief Scout executive Alden G. Barber and Irving J. Feist, Newark, N. J., the newly elected president of the boy scouts, presented the long-range plan at the Friday morning session. It calls for a considerable increase in membership, a program of financial support to local councils, and is directed toward making scouting more relevant to the needs of boys of all races, creeds and economic status.

Young, Jr., executive director of the National Urban League spoke at the Friday noon luncheon. It was also announced on Friday, that ex-light heavyweight champion of the world, Archie Moore was joining the scouts national staff as community relations specialist. Archie will operate from his home in San Diego, working with boys in the inner-city.

Illinois Junior Senator, Charles H. Percy, was the principal speaker at the closing banquet Friday evening. 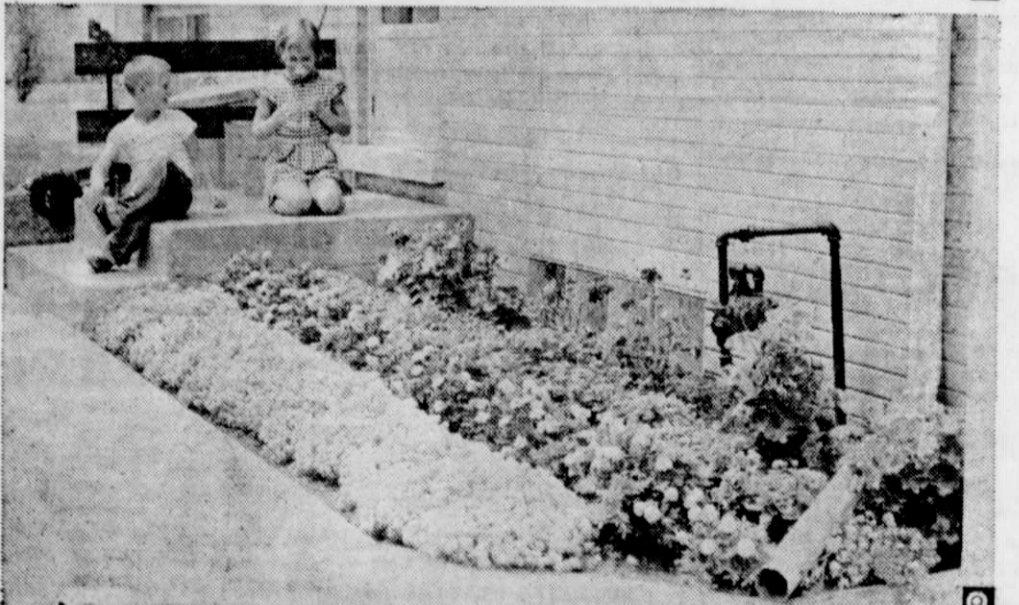
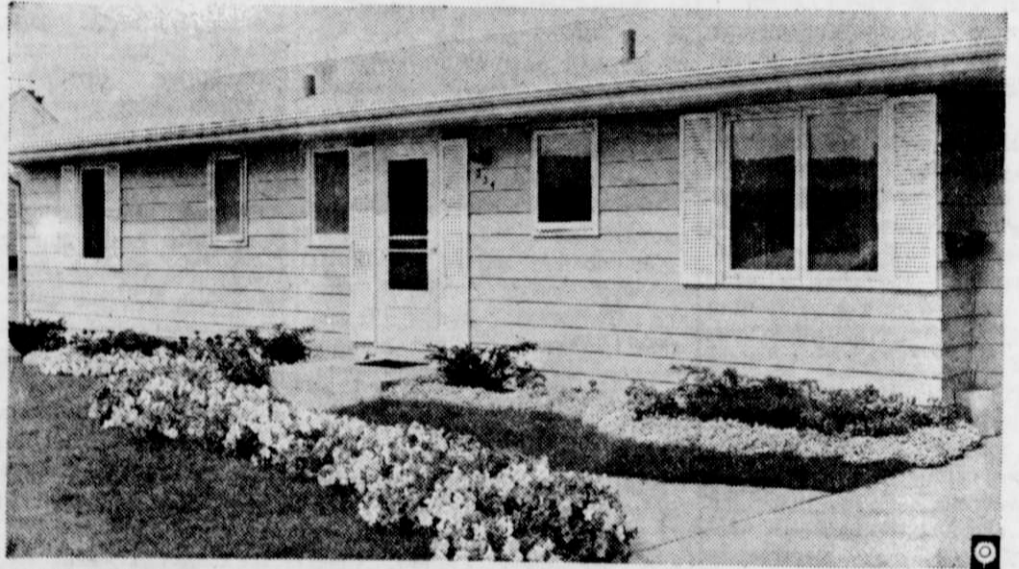
