Local Youths Discover Human Bones in River

BONES OF AT LEAST TWO SKELETONS FOUND

While swimming in the Milwaukee river at the village beach on Tuesday, a group of local boys made a startling discovery when they came across a large number of human bones imbedded in the river bottom.

The boys accidentally stepped on the bones while swimming. To satisfy their curiosity, the youth brought the objects to the surface and found that they were human bones. They then started an intensive search and brought up 100 or more bones during the afternoon before they discontinued their search.

The boys who "fished out" the bones are Brian Ludwig, Rick Eichstedt, Mike McClain, Tom Bohn and Jeff Lawrenz. Other smaller children at the beach also joined in the exciting search. The boys dripping wet, first brought the bones to the Statesman office, carrying them in their arms. We received a jolt, too, to see the boys come walking through the front door with a skull, jaw with teeth and other bones under their arms. We informed the group to take the bones to Chief of Police Roland Pledl.

On Wednesday morning the larger bones were laid out and pieced together on the sidewalk in front of the municipal building where they were viewed by District Attorney Robert Kauffman, Coroner Bob Boltz and other officials, also including County Patrolman Don Mertens, Chief Pledl, the writer, and Eugene LaMarche, high school biology teacher, whom the boys also took a box of bones.

The collection of bones included a skull, jaw bone and teeth, hip socket bones (indicating the bones were from at least two persons), upper leg and lower leg bones, upper and lower arm bones, finger bones, ribs, neck bones, vertebra bones and many other smaller bones. The assorted bones, numbering in the least 100, filled two cardboard cartons.

There was no way of telling how old the bones are but they are well preserved. It is not known whether they are the bones of Indians or white men. Coroner Boltz took the bones to send to the state laboratory at Madison to have them checked for possible age, identification, and how long ago they were deposited on the river bottom.

The jaw, teeth, skull and bones of one of the skeletons indicate it was a very large person. Matching bones of the other one are smaller, indicating they could be those of a woman or younger person. The teeth remaining in the jaw are sound and well preserved with only "one cavity" (and no gold).

The reason the bones were first discovered now is believed to be because the river was dredged late last fall. At that time the gates were removed from the dam and the water level was very low to build a concrete wall on the river bank at the Eddie Backus

Miss Browne Feted for 39 Years of Teaching Here



Miss Margaret E. Browne, whose 40 years of teaching service in the business education department, 39 of which were spent in Kewaskum High school, culminates this year with her retirement, has been honored by civic and high school organizations for her service to the community.

The senior class presented her with a silver tea service. The teachers of the district—and the school board also gave her special recognition. At last week's Kiwanis club dinner meeting the program was dedicated as "Miss Browne Recognition Night." The club presented her with a portable radio. Invited to share in the recognition event were the Kewaskum Woman's club and Junior Woman's club. Representatives of both clubs were present, among them former students of Miss Browne. She was presented with a "daisy money tree" by the senior club and a savings bond by the junior club.

Some of the tributes paid to Miss Browne at the dinner in-

cluded such as, "teacher, counselor, citizen... we will miss you... devoted life to teaching... taught by example... taught respect and earned respect... taught neatness... possessing an even temper... put a student down without raising her voice," etc.

One former student injected humor when she spoke of Miss Browne's favorite expression to gum-chewing student: "The gum-chewing student and the cud-chewing cow—there is a difference I will allow—it's the intelligent look on the face of the cow!"

When all the tributes had been spoken, Miss Browne responded in part as follows: "It was my honor and privilege to have been a part of your school and community and invited back to teach so many years. I have seen both grow by leaps and bounds. My thoughts and my heart will always be here." She was given a standing ovation.

Miss Browne was instrumental

in forming the student council, and homecoming activities came into being after that. She organized and continued in charge of the annual senior class trip to Chicago. She was senior adviser and handled graduation details.

Miss Browne will make her home in Harvard, Ill., from where she came to Kewaskum 39 years ago after her retirement. She has no special plans except to play bridge, do church and hospital volunteer work, and be with surviving members of her family in that area.

home and to remove debris from the river. The river was dredged at the beach to make it deeper for swimming. Apparently the bones were uncovered by the dredging machine. As this was late in fall, no one had gone swimming since until this week when the weather got hot. That is when the discovery was made.

Chief Pledl checked through back village files and found no trace of anyone reported missing and never found or drowning and the body not being recovered in the river. It will probably take some time before any report is received from the state laboratory concerning the bones.

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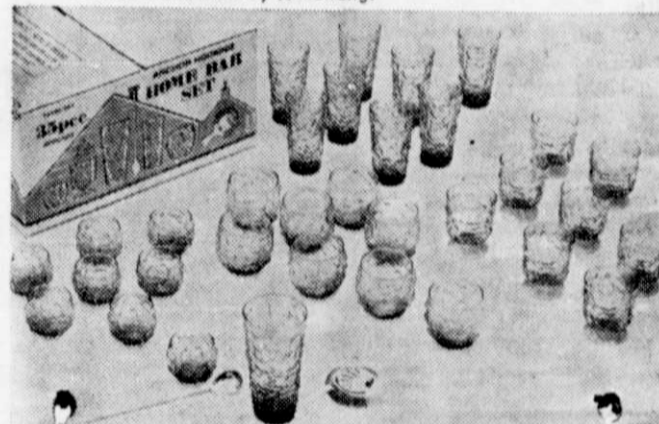

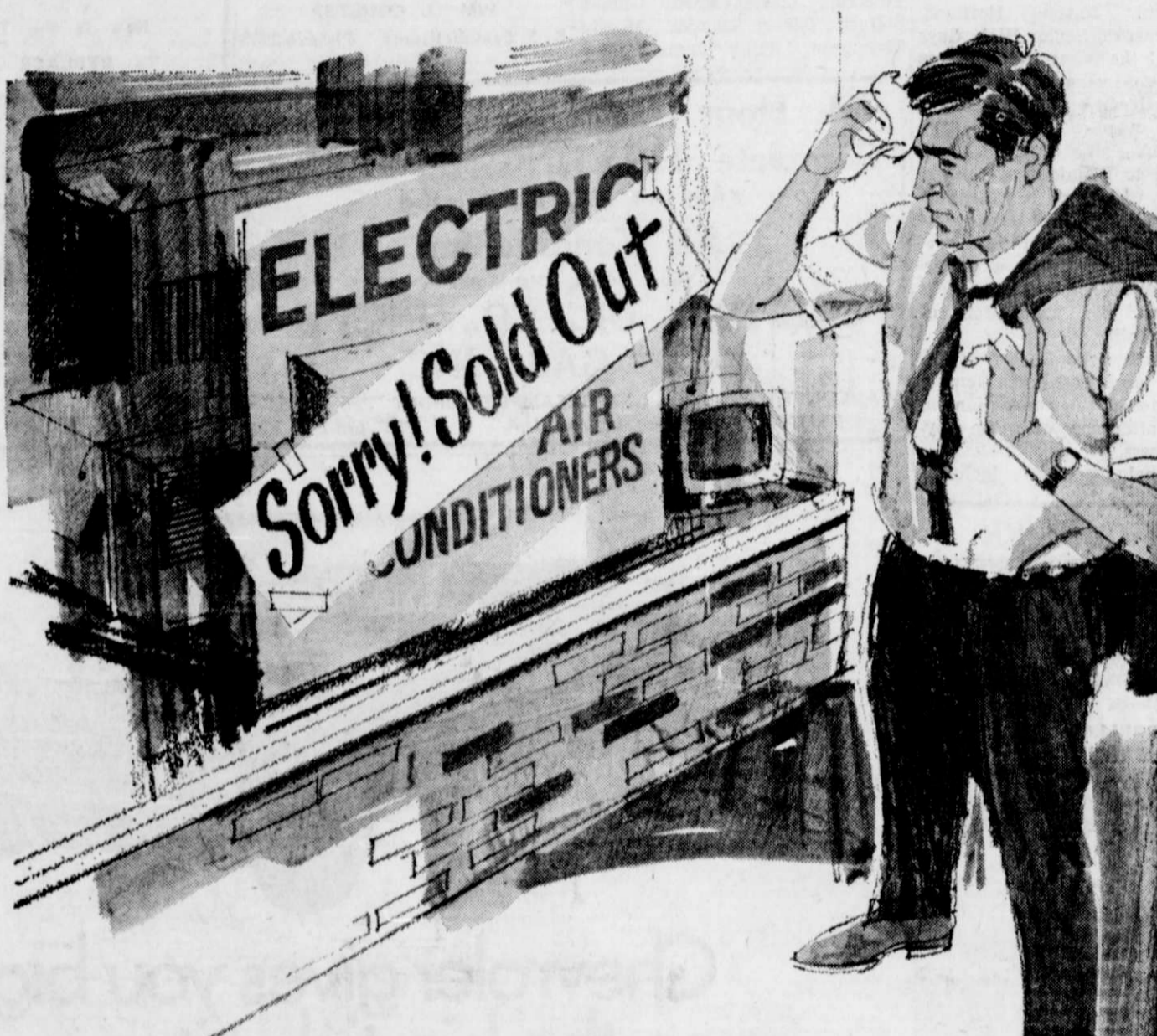
