## Exchange Student Suellen Reigle to Leave for Chile



The Kewaskum Foreign Exchange Student committee has been informed that Suellen Reigle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Reigle of Kewaskum, has been chosen as Kewaskum's exchange student to Chile for the summer months and will be leaving in a few days. As part of the International Fellowship program, a student from South America will live with the Reigle family for three months next winter.

Suellen will live with the Washington Canas family in Santiago, capital of Chile. Santiago has a population of approximately 639,546 people. Mr. and Mrs. Canas have eight children, five boys and three girls, ranging from ages 6-20 years.

While in Chile, Suellen will attend a Catholic French private school directed by nuns with the three oldest Canas daughters. Upon returning to Kewaskum in September, she will be a senior at Kewaskum High school.

On June 7 a farewell picnic was given for Sudy Reigle and Han Doorenbosch at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Peterson. Han is Kewaskum's 1967-68 AFS student. She will leave Kewaskum on June 28 for a tour through the eastern states before returning to her country, the Netherlands. Han has been living with the Orville Kern family this year.

## Boys Recover Human Bones in River Here



While bathing in the Milwaukee river at the village beach last week, a group of local boys recovered the bones of at least two adults, believed to be Indians, from the bed of the river. After finding the first bones the youths continued the search and in all recovered more than 100 bones and bone fragments. A story on the discovery appeared in last week's issue.

The swimmers found a skull, jawbone with teeth, three large leg bones indicating that at least two persons were buried in the area, and numerous other leg, arm, hand, rib and other bones. All of the bones were taken to the State Crime Laboratory at Madison for study on possible age and identification.

It is believed that the bones

may be those of Indians who camped on the river bank many years ago and probably come from an Indian burial plot. The river was widened in the vicinity to provide a larger swimming area and the plot was probably overrun by the river waters since. Dredging operations were also carried out last fall in the stream and it is believed that these brought the bones to the surface of the bed of the stream, resulting in the discovery. None of the teeth were filled and the bones apparently had been buried for a long time.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl notified Coroner Robert Boltz, Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman and Chief Investigator Allen Becker of the sheriff's department of Washington county, who visited

the scene of the discovery. Shown in the top photo examining the bones, left to right, are Eugene LaMarche, Kewaskum High school biology teacher, to whom the boys took some of the bones, Becker, Kauffman and Pledl. Kauffman is holding the jawbone with some teeth still intact and in a good state of preservation. The skull and other bones are seen on the sidewalk in front of the municipal building.

The lower photo shows several of the group of boys in the water at the spot where the bones were recovered, with a view of the river dam and walking bridge and a partial view of the beautiful village park in the background. ## Bonne Belle Motel Building 4-Unit Addition

The Bonne Belle Motel on Hwy. 45 at the south village limits, on May 1 started building an addition of four units on the north side of the present motel, increasing the size of the building to 10 units. Completion of the addition is scheduled for late summer.

Air conditioning has been installed in the original six units and will also be included in the new addition.

## Vandals Break In, Cause Damage At High School

A break-in and vandalism at Kewaskum Community High school which, according to Chief of Police Roland Pledl, occurred sometime between 9:15 p. m. Friday and 6:45 a. m. Saturday, was being investigated this week by Kewaskum police.

Ervin Fellenz, a janitor at the school, discovered the break-in was made when he reported for work Saturday morning. Chief Pledl reported that entrance was gained by breaking a door glass at the northeast rear entrance. The door was then unlatched.

The vandals broke a two by three-foot glass in the door leading to the audio-visual room. There the projection wheel was torn off and controls were damaged. A six by three-foot glass was broken in the door leading to room 608. Chief Pledl said total damage is not known.

Fellenz found the door at the southeast entrance ajar and Pledl believed it was used for the exit. The chief stated he obtained finger prints and that an investigation is underway.

Paul F. Humbel, Washington county Civil Defense director, reported Thursday that a "tornado alert" in the county area, including Kewaskum, will be held at 10:30 a. m. Monday, June 17. Cooperating communities in the county will sound their fire sirens for three to five minutes when such an alert is conducted.

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## Rural, Business Response Lagging In Cancer Drive

Expected response from rural areas and business has not been keeping pace with individual donations in the neighbor-to-neighbor program of Washington county's annual American Cancer Crusade, according to Warren Coultas, West Bend, Crusade chairman.

Coultas said an appeal has gone out to rural residents and all business firms in the county detailing the importance of their support to help bring us all closer to the day when the fight against cancer can be won. The chairman urged that business continue its strong support, as it has given to the American Cancer Society in past campaigns.

Support of all is essential to the success in the fight against cancer, but even more vital is the personal responsibility of everyone for an annual check-up, to locate cancer early, before symptoms appear.

"In no other disease does the patient himself bear so large a share of responsibility for recognizing the subtle first signs of cancer. In no other disease does the patient alone influence the outcome to so great a degree." These words from a new paperback book, *The Truth About Cancer*, by Dr. Charles S. Cameron, explain why the American Cancer Society has for so long urged people to go for annual check-ups.

Last year, about 45,000 Americans died of the most common internal cancer among both men and women—cancer of colon and rectum. A large number of these could have been saved if they had had regular physical examinations, including the proctoscopic examination of colon and rectum.

## Medical Self-Help Training Course to Be Held at School

Would you know how to handle an emergency medical situation—say a broken leg, a badly bleeding wound, an emergency childbirth situation? Could you trust yourself to do the right thing for yourself and your family in the event of a nuclear attack or a national disaster? You can learn the proper "survival methods" as well as how to handle emergency medical problems by enrolling in the Medical Self-Help Training Course starting June 20, and meeting each Thursday from 9:00-11:00 a. m. for a period of 8 weeks at the West Bend School of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education.

The course consists of 16 hours of intensive training in medical self-help measures. Among the subjects to be taught by trained instructors are radioactive fallout and shelter, emergency childbirth, infant and child care, nursing, fractures and splinting, bleeding and bandaging, artificial respiration, and personal hygiene and sanitation.

Officials are hoping that at least one member of each family in this community takes the course.

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course and persons wishing to enroll should contact the vocational school office, telephone 334-9131.

According to Marvin Martin, civil defense director, this course is open to all people of this area.

Dear Bill:

This is the day that President Johnson proclaimed for the mourning of Robert Kennedy, and the message I am about to write is intended to be a small contribution toward the betterment of our country, for which Robert Kennedy toiled to the bitter end. I am of the same opinion as Jim Murray, who wrote so effectively in the Milwaukee Sentinel about the horrible condition into which our glorious nation has deteriorated. He deplored the fact that in our country today we tolerate and condone everything that is bad. I fervently hope that the death of Robert Kennedy and the article by Jim Murray will trigger a deluge of letters upon our Lawmakers, our Public Officials, our Judges. We have stood silently by for too long and watched a very small minority of trouble-makers bring our mighty nation almost to its knees. How long will we continue to be the most foolish nation on the face of the earth? If I were a cartoonist I would draw a picture of an innocent citizen being robbed, clubbed, stabbed, and shot by a gang of hoodlums while a few self-sacrificing policemen attempt to protect the citizens but are being restrained by a group of Supreme Court Judges who are putting hand-cuffs on the policeman. I make this urgent plea to our decent and peace-loving citizens to write to their Congressmen and ask them to change our laws, and pass new ones, in accordance with the urgent requirements of our modern-day situations. OUR GOVERNMENT DOES NOT MOVE FAST ENOUGH TO KEEP UP WITH OUR RAPIDLY CHANGING TIMES. Is it any wonder that they don't get the job done when we repeatedly hear that our assemblymen and congressmen are "absent," or that they convene at 11 and adjourn at 2? I know there are millions of voters and taxpayers who feel exactly as I do, and I wish that more of them would stand up and be heard. In my opinion, fines should be increased about three or four-fold, and criminals in jail

should be made to work and pay for the destruction and other expenses that they have caused. Why should innocent citizens be required to pay for all the expenses caused by destructive rioters, anarchists, and murderers, who go practically scott-free?

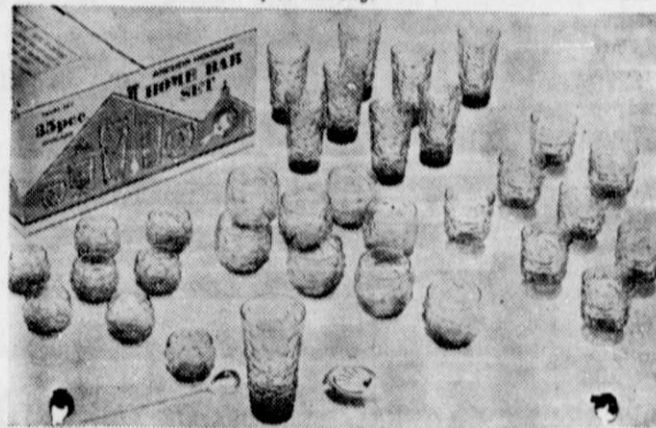

Kewaskum outhit the Lithias, 11 hits to 8 but miscues kept them from going ahead in the run department.
