Youth Is Killed In Train Crash North of Village

GORDON KUTZ, 19, VICTIM OF TRAIN-JEEP COLLISION

A rural Campbellsport youth was apparently instantly killed in a railroad crossing accident at 10:30 a. m. Saturday when the Jeep he was driving collided with a Chicago and North Western freight train on Maple Drive in the town of Auburn near County Trunk Hwy. V, about three miles north of Kewaskum.

The victim of the mishap was Gordon Raymond Kutz, 19, of R. 3, Campbellsport, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kutz, who live on a farm near the scene of the accident. The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance was summoned to but its services were not required as Coroner Frank Decker of Fond du Lac county pronounced Kutz dead at the scene of the crash.

The youth was thrown 18 feet into a ditch after the Jeep he was driving collided with the southbound, diesel-powered train. Coroner Decker said Kutz died at the scene of multiple injuries. The Jeep was demolished.

Officer Ralph Martin and Undersheriff Ray Howard of Fond du Lac county investigated the accident. Officer Martin said that the youth was traveling northwest on the road which crosses the railroad tracks at a sharp angle. The crossing is obscured and has no signals. It is only marked with crossarm wooden markers.

Kutz apparently did not see or hear the approaching southbound train. Martin said that the Jeep was pushed back from the tracks about 17 feet but remained on the road. He said it appeared that the front of the 1953 model Jeep collided with the right front corner of the engine pulling 176 freight cars.

The officer said that the diesel engine sustained minor damage. The engineer, H. Gilbert of Des Plaines, Ill., said that he was traveling at about 40 miles an hour at the time of the collision. A.D. Larsen of Des Plaines was the conductor.

The death was the 10th fatality in Fond du Lac county in 1968.

Born July 23, 1948, in Campbellsport, the son of Henry and Florence Schultz Kutz, the youth had been an employee of Regal Ware, Inc. of Kewaskum.

Survivors include his parents; two brothers, Pfc. Leo Kutz in Germany and Harvey at home; six sisters, Shirley, Eleanor, Darlene, Dorothy, Elsie and Linda, all at home, and a grandmother, Mrs. Herman Kutz, of the town of Osceola.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the Two-hig Funeral home, Campbellsport, with the Rev. Paul Kehle officiating. Burial was in the Waucousta cemetery. Visitation was from 2 p. m. Tuesday.

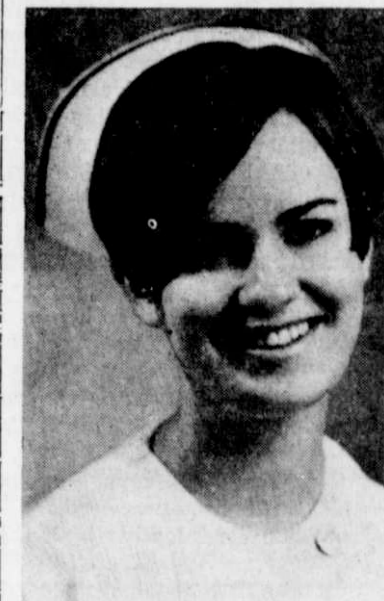

Plan Flood Damage Survey Along the Milwaukee River

The Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission today announced that an historic flood damage survey along the Milwaukee River and its major tributaries will be mounted within the next several days. As part of this survey, interviewers will conduct a house-to-house canvass in those portions of Fond du Lac, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, and Washington counties which have in the past been subjected to flooding by the Milwaukee River and its major tributaries.

The purpose of the interviews will be to determine both the direct and the indirect cost of damages inflicted upon the residents by past floods. The direct cost of damages to buildings, crops, household furnishings, automobiles, and other personal property items will be determined. The interviewers will also attempt to establish indirect flood cost, such as wages lost due to absence from work, and the cost of cleaning up property after the flood recedes.

The flood damage survey is part of a cooperative comprehensive planning program undertaken by the five county boards. The program is aimed at developing practical solutions to the water-related problems of the Milwaukee River watershed.

Kurt W. Bauer, executive director of the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, in making the announcement said, "Although many factors will enter into final recommendations for flood relief measures, the results of these interviews are important considerations in comparing flood damage cost with the cost of possible flood damage control proposals. We would, therefore, greatly appreciate the cooperation of those citizens who are contacted by our interviewers."

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present except Trustee Freehauf.

At the suggestion of Trustee Perschbacher, the minutes of the May 6th meeting were amended to show that the proposal of Aring Equipment Company for a power tamper was not rejected but merely tabled pending the obtaining of additional information in such a machine and quotations from other dealers. In all other respects the May 6th minutes were approved as presented.

There were no appearances in opposition to the tavern license applications as presented. Therefore the public hearing on these applications was declared closed.

RESOLUTION NO. 68-2

A Resolution Approving Intra-County Mutual Aid Police Service

WHEREAS, it is not practical for either Washington County or the Municipalities located in Washington County to employ law enforcement personnel in numbers sufficient to cope with any emergency or calamity, and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that reciprocal agreements be entered into by and between the law enforcement agencies of Washington County, and,

WHEREAS, The Sheriff of Washington County, the District Attorney and the Chiefs of Police of West Bend, Kewaskum, Hartford, Slinger and Germantown have worked out a plan setting forth procedures to be followed in the event one law enforcement agency requests assistance from others, and,

WHEREAS, all regularly employed police officers in Washington County have been designated deputy sheriffs, and,

WHEREAS, the Sheriff and

respective Chiefs of Police have indicated a desire to participate under a mutual aid police service plan among and between the municipalities in Washington County:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Village of Kewaskum approves in principle the plan whereby the law enforcement agencies of Washington County entered into reciprocal agreements to provide mutual assistance in the event of civil disorder or natural disaster of such magnitude that the law enforcement unit of a particular municipality finds it impossible to handle under the authority of Section 66.30 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mutual Aid Compact attached hereto, marked Exhibit "A" and made a part hereto by reference be and it is hereby approved and that the Police Chief of The Village of Kewaskum be authorized to execute the same for and on behalf of The Village of Kewaskum.

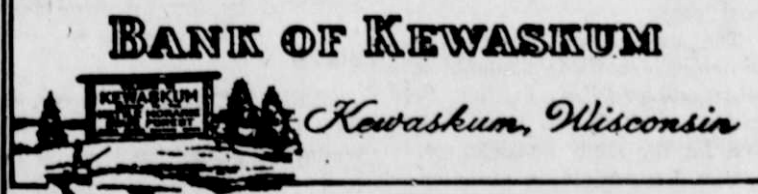

Guidance Center Is Granted \$7,700 In Federal Funds

GRANT TO COUNTY CENTER MADE FOR SPECIAL PROJECT

The Washington County Guidance Center has been granted \$7,700 in federal funds under Public Law 89-749 Section 314 (d) which is administered by the states, to undertake a special one year project.

Families on the center's waiting list will be asked to join mental health education groups conducted by a project associate. The groups will be formed around various problem areas as expressed when a family seeks help, age of the patient involved, marital status, and other groupings. Participation will be voluntary.

The project associate, who will lead the groups as discussion leader and a resource person, will work under the supervision of the guidance center staff. A person with a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology or sociology, is presently being sought for

this position.

Generally, it is predicted that the group participation will accomplish the following purposes:

1. Provide these families with new knowledge and perspective, to help them reassess their situation, and perhaps even avoid needing further service.
2. Enable them to accept treatment more readily and participate more actively in it.
3. Hopefully shorten the amount of treatment or counselling time necessary to resolve the problems.

Washington county's project will incorporate some of the features of a similar undertaking by the psychiatric Clinic Incorporated of Buffalo, New York, which has provided the center with a detailed summary of their project.

The families will be evaluated before and after the education groups to measure the benefits.

Most importantly, this project will fill the waiting period, which has been of growing concern to the staff, with constructive and helpful activity by and on behalf of the patients.

The center waiting list has continued to grow since the first of the year, with one and a half to two months often elapsing between application and the initial appointment at the center. Emergent and urgent cases are, of course, handled quickly and there is actually more turnover of cas-

es than was typical in previous years. The level of activity at the center is up to, and in some areas, beyond that experienced when the center was a bi-county operation, with Ozaukee county.

The center was denied expansion staff in 1968 despite predictions of an increase in requests, and considerable community support. The grant, therefore, is timely as a welcome way to do something immediately for the citizens needing the center's help.

The knowledge gained from the project will hopefully also be of benefit to other county clinics in the State and the mental health professions generally. Publications of the findings and outcome is part of the project plan.

Special recognition is due Miss Pat Slesar of West Bend, a graduate of St. Norbert's college in sociology, who worked as a special assistant last summer and winter, 1967, in gathering information about similar projects, and who did much of the difficult and detailed work necessary to prepare such an application.

The center director and administrator have received wholehearted support from the guidance center board of directors in pursuing these funds, and it is a step in the direction of their stated purpose of making the center

readily accessible and responsive to the communities needs.

85 Women Meet; To Help With Mobile Health Unit Visit

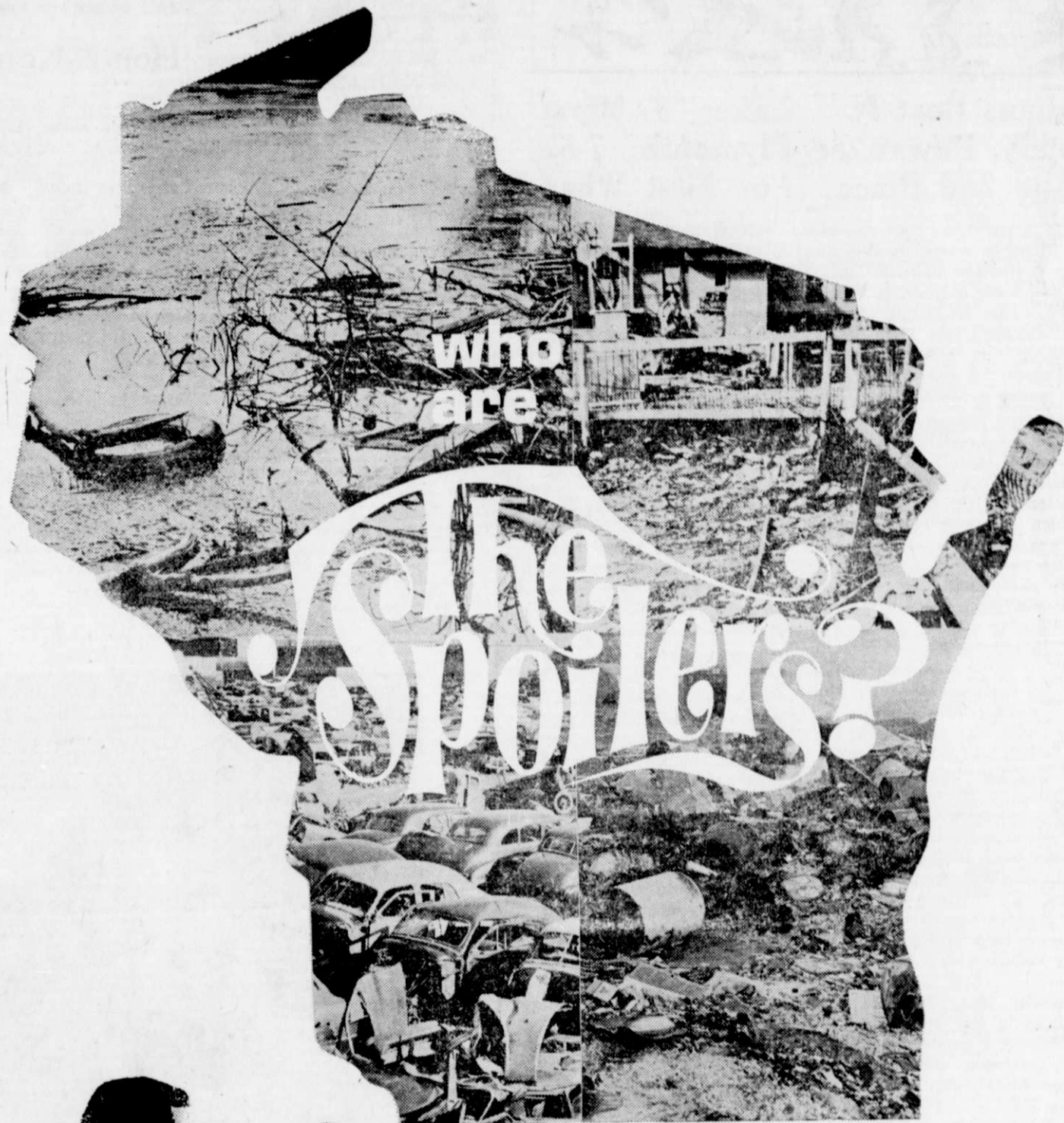
