Annual Firemen's Picnic, Parade to Be Held July 13-14

PARADE WILL FEATURE 13 BANDS AND DRUM CORPS

The largest crowd gathering event of the year, the annual Kewaskum firemen's picnic, will be held in the village park on Saturday evening and all day Sunday, July 13 and 14. Plans are all completed to make this year's affair the biggest and finest ever held. All that remains now is cooperation from the weatherman.

The Kewaskum picnic is noted for its excellent parades each year and this year's parade will again be the highlight of the event. The parade will be even larger than in past years and will feature 13 bands, drum and bugle corps and drill teams. Last year there were 11 musical units in the line of march. There will be between 600 and 700 marchers in the musical groups alone and more than 1,000 persons in all will participate in the parade.

The parade, which will be an enormous one, will begin at 12:30 p. m. sharp on Sunday. It will form on the high school parking lot and athletic fields, Regal Ware parking lot, and adjacent streets, and will proceed along Tower st., Second st., Fond du Lac ave., the length of Main st. and Riverview dr. to the park, a distance of about 11 blocks. All entrants in the parade are to be at the starting point no later than 12 noon.

As a special feature to offer parade spectators something new this year, the firemen have arranged for almost all new musical units in the parade which have never appeared here before. Only two or three which have participated in the parade before will return this year. Outstanding among the 13 musical organizations in the parade will be the Green Berets Marching Band of Janesville, consisting of 90 members, and the Racine Boy Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps, with 80 members.

The 11 other musical groups will include the St. Matthias Preps Drum and Bugle Corps (64 members), Chordaliers Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee (85 members), Rangers Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee (45 members), Militaire Cadets Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee (52 members), Bule Guards Color Guard Drill Team of Grafton (32 members), Port Washington Mariners Drill Team, Sheboyganites Drum and Bugle Corps of Sheboygan, three Germantown High school and elementary school bands, and last but not least, the Kewaskum High school band.

Besides the above bands, drum corps, etc., other parade highlights will include baton twirlers, drill teams, beautiful floats, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, American Legion posts, numerous comic entries, ancient cars, racing cars, clubs, organizations and individuals, other smaller musical groups and orchestras, scouts, 4-H clubs, riding horses, and many others. Floats are especially invited to enter the parade. Worthwhile cash prizes will be awarded to the best judged floats and children's en-

Entertainment will be provided in the park Saturday night and Sunday afternoon and evening. Music will be supplied by the Dale Matthies Combo Saturday evening. Immediately following the parade Sunday several of the bands and drum corps will perform in the park for approximately one hour or more. Parade spectators are urged to get into the park quickly to see as much of the performance as possible. This will be followed by a band concert on the park platform. Throughout the afternoon Bob Thorn and his band will furnish music in the beer garden for the patrons there. Sunday evening Syl Volm's orchestra will furnish music. This will provide plenty of music for the picnic.

The popular water fights will again be held starting at 6:30 p. m. Sunday with six to eight fire department teams from neighboring communities battling it out for the championship prize money. Spectators will get their fill of water fighting and the competition will be keen.

Featured again at this year's picnic will be a beer garden housed in a large tent for protection from the sun (we hope not from the rain), with tables and chairs for your comfort and rest. The beer will be served in pitchers by beer maids. Patrons can watch the entertainment, listen to the music and view the crowd while relaxing with a pitcher of brew. The beer garden was so crowded last year that it will be enlarged for the coming picnic.

Adding to the entertainment, there will be a variety of rides, concessions, refreshments and those famous brats and hamburgers. Stands in the park will operate continuously. Ninety-three valuable merchandise prizes will be given away. The firemen invite everyone to attend their picnic and have a real enjoyable time. Make your plans now and don't miss it. This is the big one!

'Mr. Red Cross' Brings Message To Annual Meet

RECOGNIZE MARVIN A. MARTIN FOR 25 YEARS AS FIRST AID INSTRUCTOR

The annual meeting of the West Bend chapter of the American Red Cross was held at St. Frances Cabrini gymnasium, West Bend, last week. The evening was noted and memorable for its spirit of dedication, progress reports of a hard local year's work, a delicious dinner served by the ladies of the church, awards, recognitions and an unforgettable speech by Russell Carlson of Oshkosh, "Mr. Red Cross" of his area.

Carlson assured his audience that "Red Cross people are the finest in the world in work and devotion." His theme was, "be an answerer, not an asker." He urged the gathering to "listen and help when people pray, are cornered or in need." He also spoke of "asking and protesting as part of life" and the fact that it is often necessary to protest injustice. Carlson mentioned that institutions are being shaken, that people are searching for meaningful solutions to problems. "Should the Red Cross keep in touch with the times? The answer is yes." He also noted that the U. S. was born of protest, and that the Red Cross itself was founded as a protest against the inhumanities of war.

Bend chapter not to lose faith in people or in younger people. While fully recognizing the need for change and growth he stated that for every agitator there are a thousand volunteers who do good and that there are 56 million volunteers now working in the U.S. "Are you listening to the problems of young and old? Are your leaders involved enough in real problems?" The perceptive message emphasized the speaker's faith in young people. He marveled at the incredible number of them who have fine ideals and "the guts to stick to them."

Five chapter members received recognition awards from the National Red Cross. Present chapter treasurer, Albert Schroeder, was cited for his Red Cross service as well as other services to his community. Mrs. Charles Schlegel, spy and pretty in her Red Cross volunteer's uniform, belied her age of 81. 4-H Club Alumni Award Presented To F. Schroeder

ASSEMBLYMAN ONE OF FOUR CITED IN STATE

State Assemblyman Frederick C. Schroeder (R-Washington county) was honored June 20 as one of Wisconsin's four outstanding 4-H club alumni. The award was presented Assemblyman Schroeder by State 4-H and the University of Wisconsin Extension Service.

Schroeder, native of Washington county, has served as assemblyman on the Wisconsin Legislature since 1964. Prior to that time he devoted 33 years to dairy farming. Twenty-five of these were in combination with a retail milk business.

Following a dinner at Gordon Commons Hall, Assemblyman Schroeder, in the company of his wife Molly, accepted the award at an honorary recreation program held at the Memorial Union theatre. A crowd of 1,200 persons thrilled to a performance by the 1968 Wisconsin State 4-H band and chorus.

Schroeder was a Washington county 4-H member for eleven years and was enrolled in the dairy project each of the eleven years. He has an excellent show record with dairy animals and one year exhibited a junior champion Holstein at State Fair. He was selected as outstanding county dairy member in 1924.

Offices held and committees served by the Washington county lawmaker include director and president of the Washington County Dairy Herd Improvement asso-

ciation; director and president of the East Central Breeders Cooperative; president of the West Bend Businessmen's association; member of the county ASCS committee for nine years and chairman for five years; and County Fair livestock superintendent. He has also held all offices in the Loyal Order of Moose.

As a member of the State Legislature, Assemblyman Schroeder serves as chairman of the Committee for State Printing, vice-chairman of the Committee on Agriculture and he is a member of the Committee on Manufacturing and the Committee on State Institutions.

Schroeder has hosted many 4-H and FFA training events on his farm as well as county 4-H dairy training meetings. He has assisted in supervising youth at both county and state fairs. While in the dairy farming business he established a reputation for quality cattle and sold animals throughout the country and to South America.

"Few, if any youth organizations have done so much for so many," Schroeder said in accepting his award. "I'm proud to accept this award, prouder yet to have once been a 4-H'er and to have had the opportunity in participating in its many wonderful projects and programs. The young people of the 4-H serve as an ex-

ample for the youth of today as the good citizens of tomorrow."

Motorcyclists Must Get Valid Driver's License

VALIDATION BEGAN JULY 1; MUST HAVE LICENSE SEPT. 1

The validation of driver's license for motorcycle operators began July 1, according to local drivers license examiners.

Recent legislation provides that no person shall operate a motor-driven cycle after Sept. 1, 1968, unless he possesses a valid operator's license which has been specifically endorsed for motor-driven cycle operation. This includes motor scooters.

Those who presently hold a valid operator's license may have their license validated for motorcycle operation if they can show to the satisfaction of the department that they have regularly operated a motor-driven cycle for a period of at least one year, either as an owner or full time operator of such cycle, and meets other

standards including information on the type of motorcycle, having driven a cycle minimum of 5,000 miles as a regular operator and payment of a \$2.00 fee. Motorcycle operators who qualify for the validation of their license should contact the local drivers license examiners. The registration certificate for the cycle should be presented to the examiner when reporting for validation.

Those persons who do not meet the requirements for validation will be given an examination for the validation of their license. The specific date on which testing will begin in this area will be after July 19 at appointments made by examiners. The examination will consist of their knowledge of traffic laws, vision and a skill test on their own cycle.

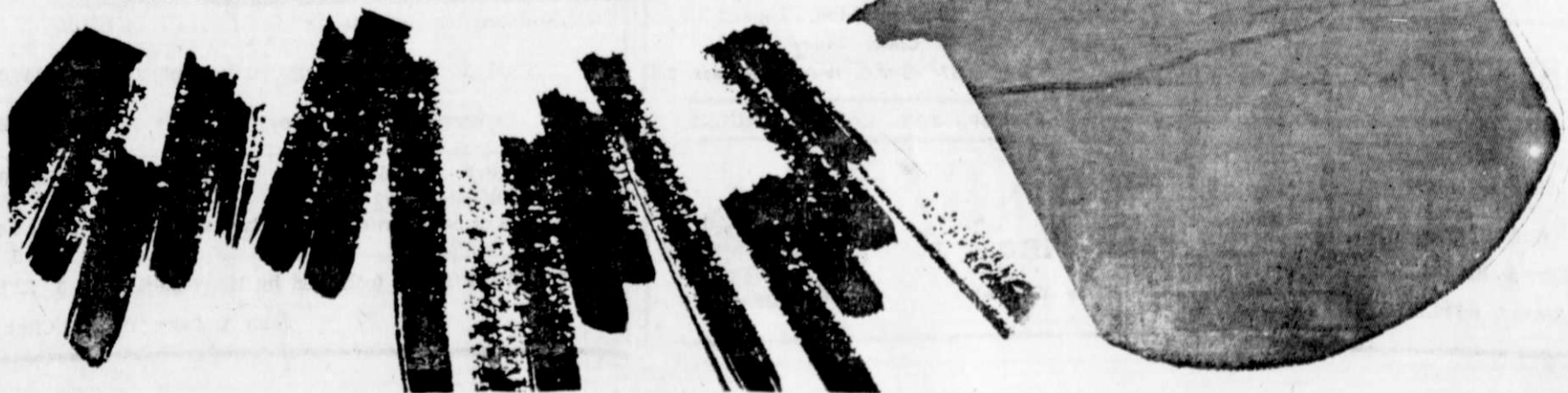
