## Promote Richard Reigle to Head Regal Ohio Plant

SUCCEEDED AT LOCAL OFFICE BY McCLARRAN

Richard "Rich" V. Reigle has been promoted to the position of vice president and general manager of Buckeye Ware, Inc., Wooster, Ohio, a division of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, according to an announcement by James D. Reigle, president of both companies.

Simultaneously, it was announced that Charles "Chuck" W. McClarran was promoted to succeed Reigle as premium sales manager in the Kewaskum home office of the cookware and appliance manufacturing firm.

## Manzar Atabaki Of Iran to Be New AFS Student Here

TO ARRIVE ABOUT AUG. 11. RESIDE AT EDWARDS HOME

The Kewaskum AFS chapter has been informed that Manzar Sahebjam Atabaki of Iran will be the AFS student for 1968-69 and will reside with the Richard L. Edwards family in Kewaskum.

Manzar lives in Tehran, the capital of Iran, formerly Persia, which has a population of 1,590,000.

On May 22, Manzar was 18 years old. She is one of five children and has two sisters and two brothers. Her father is a major general in the army and her mother was head mistress of a school but now devotes full time to being a housewife.

Manzar attended Reza Sha Kabir High school and has studied English for 6 years, 6 hours a week. She is interested in many sports which include swimming, tennis, skating, volley ball, bicycle riding and skiing. Her religion is Islam, which is the religious system of Mohammed.

Iran is a 2,500 year old nation with a population of 19,798,000. It lies in southwestern Asia between the Caspian Sea and the Soviet Union on the north and the Persian Gulf to the south. The area of Iran is 629,343 square miles, about one-fifth that of the United States. Most of Iran is a high plateau, about 4,000 feet above sea level.

About 80 percent of the people of Iran depend upon agriculture and grazing for their livelihood. The oil fields of Iran are among the richest in the world and rank 4th in world oil production.

Iran is a constitutional monarchy governed by a shah with a cabinet headed by a prime minister and a two-house legislature. The title shah comes from an old Persian word which means "mighty one."

Manzar will arrive in Kewaskum from Iran approximately Aug. 11.

## Firemen's Picnic, Parade Attended By Thousands

EVENT HUGE SUCCESS; WINNERS ANNOUNCED

Many thousands of persons again witnessed the beautiful parade and attended the firemen's picnic in the village park Sunday and the tnnual event was another outstanding success. A large crowd also attended the affair Saturday evening.

The firemen were blessed with beautiful sunny weather but it was a little too hot with temperatures soaring into the low 90's. Several performers and spectators passed out during the parade and in the park in the afternoon and rescue squad attendants were kept on the run. The heat also kept some persons from coming to the park and caused others to leave earlier than usual.

Kewaskum is famous for its excellent parades and this year's was no exception. The parade lasted more than an hour and a quarter and people stood several deep all along the line of march to view it. At some spots the streets were jammed with people so that there was barely space for the marchers to pass. The parade featured 13 bands, drum and bugle corps and drill teams and also included numerous comic units, business organizations and children's floats, ancient cars, orchestras on trucks, firemen and equipment, Legion squads, baton twirlers, smaller musical groups, individuals, horses, etc. All told there were close to 1,000 persons participating in the parade.

The park also was a mass of people throughout the afternoon and evening. Stands were kept busy, especially the beer garden and other refreshment stands as well as the hamburger and brat stands. In the torrid weather, picnickers drank refreshments like they were going out of style. Free entertainment was provided Saturday evening and most of the day Sunday and everyone enjoyed

Rex Whitmore of the swine testing station at East Troy, and with the state pork producers council, talked about the idea of "Nickels for Profit." With this program each farmer who raises pigs would set aside one nickel for each adult pig and two cents for each feeder pig that he produced. This money would be used for disease research, control and eradication; to improve marketing, for legislative support, barrow shows, and so forth. It would also be used for product research, including advertising. Whitmore said that the biggest problem facing swine breeders right now is synthetic pork. It is a problem that can be solved only by swine breeders doing an intensive job of promotion.
