New \$220,000 - \$250,000 Indoor Swim Pool Approved by School Electors

Re-Elect Two Board Members, Approve \$1,317,036.50 Budget

VOTE TO AUTHORIZE BOARD TO TAKE OPTIONS ON LAND FOR FUTURE SCHOOL SITES

At the annual meeting of the Kewaskum Community School District held Monday evening, electors approved a new indoor swimming pool, re-elected two board members, adopted the proposed budget and voted to give the board authority to take options on land for future school sites as the main matters of business.

Electors approved the proposed swimming pool addition to the high school in conjunction with the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum's campaign and fund drive which will provide about \$75,000 toward the cost of the project. The overall cost is expected to reach between \$220,000 and \$250,000, according to Marshall Boyd, superintendent of schools.

Re-elected to the school district board were incumbents Richard L. Edwards (director) and Mrs. Eugene (Anne) Panzer. Mrs. Panzer received 165 votes and Edwards polled 145 votes. The other four candidates and their total votes were: Mrs. June E. Berg, 44; Fred C. Thomas, 29; Byron Gessner, 45, and Gerald Secor, 76.

Electors approved the proposed budget totalling \$1,317,036.50. This year's budget represents an increase of \$179,970.86 over last year. It will require a tax rate of \$20.67 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation, compared with \$19.71 of last year, an increase of 96 cents per thousand. The greatest share of the increase is attributed to higher salaries to 90 teachers, some of whom are part time, and the hiring of seven new teachers.

Electors also voted to give the board authority to take options on land for future school sites. The actual purchase of such sites would be required at a special electors' meeting.

Supt. Boyd pointed out the overcrowding student situation, especially at the junior level. He said all seventh and eighth graders in the district attend Kewaskum Elementary school, and the situation will be aggravated in the fall when some 60 seventh and eighth graders from private schools in the district will enroll.

The board of education, seeking a long-range, comprehensive solution, asked the State Department of Public Instruction to make a survey. Their recommendation is that planning should begin at once to purchase a site and construct a senior high school for grades 10 through 12. The present senior high school would then be utilized for grades 7 through 9.

The oldest section of the elementary school, now used by 7th and 8th graders, should be retained and plans should be developed to renovate that section to provide future adequate classrooms to absorb enrollment increases, the recommendation stated.

It was asked whether another story could be added to the pre-

sent high school. Boyd explained that the building was planned not to become a multi-story structure, and that is was designed to be used eventually as a junior high school. The question was also raised, if a junior high building can be erected on the present high school site. Boyd stated the high school is situated on 19 acres, and there is not more than one acre not in use.

Boyd also reported that in the five schools in the district, there is only one classroom not in full-time use, and that is in the Beechwood school. The projected increase covering the 12 grades in the next 10 years is between 400 and 500 students. He also said the crowding situation is critical as of now and added, "We can operate this way, but the time to act is now, not in two or three years when we are in a panic for room. Let us take a long range look at expanding, and in an orderly manner."

Saturday Mail Restrictions to Begin July 27

Because of the Congressional mandate to cut back federal employment to the June 30, 1966 level — including 83,238 for the postal service nationally and many in this area — mail service limitations will start locally July 27, Postmaster Koch said today.

The local postal head has been advised by Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson to comply with the cutback required by Congress under the recently-enacted tax bill (Public Law 90-364) by reducing some postal services and curtailing new hiring.

Curtailments as follows will take effect locally:

Effective July 27, all regular Saturday window service will be discontinued.

Postmaster Koch also noted that beginning July 1 all planned extensions of rural delivery were curtailed.

General delivery windows will be open for two hours on Saturdays from 8 a. m. to 10 a. m. to deliver mail to general delivery patrons and to firms that normally call for their mail at the post office. Residential customers who have received a notice that parcels are being held for them at the post office also may call for them at that time. No financial transactions will be made on Saturdays. The lock box section will remain open as usual from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. Both incoming and outgoing dispatches of mail will be made.

"This is not a matter of dollars but of people," Postmaster General Watson explained. "Under the manpower restrictions imposed by the tax bill, we simply will not have enough people to continue all postal services at their present level."

"Hopefully," Mr. Watson added, "Congress will correct this situation."

Jury Convicts Dombrowski in Murder Trial

Chester J. Dombrowski, 30, a former Chicago policeman, was convicted of first degree murder last Thursday by a circuit court jury at Fond du Lac in the death of another Chicago man. Judge Jerold Murphy ordered Dombrowski held without bond and set July 25 for a hearing on motions after the verdict.

Consisting of seven women and five men, the jury deliberated about five hours before finding Dombrowski guilty of the murder of Herbert L. McKinney, 27, whose body was found last Sept. 12 on a farm owned by Dombrowski and a brother in Fond du Lac county about two miles north of Kewaskum. McKinney had been badly beaten and there was a bullet wound in his head.

More than 20 witnesses had been subpoenaed from Washington county in the murder trial of Dombrowski, including several from Kewaskum. They included James Sparks, Mrs. Willard Klein, Willard Lynn, Anthony Vorpahl and Lawrence Galabinske. Others from the county included professional men, officials, sheriff's deputies and private citizens.

The body of the murder victim was found following an investigation of an accident in which Dombrowski was involved on Hwy. 45 just south of the Fond du Lac county line in Washington county on the night of Sept. 11 when his rented car left the highway. Dombrowski was charged with driving while intoxicated and held in West Bend, but the charge was later reduced. Dombrowski, who was on leave from his job at the time, resigned from the police force while being held in West Bend.

Sparks and Miss Betty Jean Naus of West Bend, also subpoenaed as a witness, came upon the scene of the accident scene north of Kewaskum. They stated they brought Dombrowski into Kewaskum and urged him to report the accident. They said he refused, fearing arrest for drunken driving. Some of the other local witnesses also saw Dombrowski the night of the mishap.

The defendant was later arrested at O'Hare International airport in Chicago on Mar. 26 after a grand jury at Fond du Lac indicted him in the McKinney slaying.

During the final summations of the case last Thursday Judge Murphy told the jury to disregard a statement by the prosecution that brought a defense motion for a mistrial. The statement, by Dist. Atty. Alexander P. Semenas of Fond du Lac county, inferred that a ballistics check of two pistols registered to Dombrowski would have proved one of them fired the bullet that killed McKinney. The judge denied the request for a mistrial. The defense argued during the seven day trial that the prosecution did not prove that the shooting occurred in Fond du Lac county.

that the Post Office Department agreed to the reduction in funds for the 1969 fiscal year that began July 1, and is not asking for a restoration of any money cut from its budget.

"The Postmaster General," Koch explained, "told us we could op-

erate within our budget and maintain postal services at or near their present level if we did not have to reduce employment to the June 1966 level." To make the overall cutback to the 1966 level, post offices have been ordered to fill only three out of four vacancies as they occur.

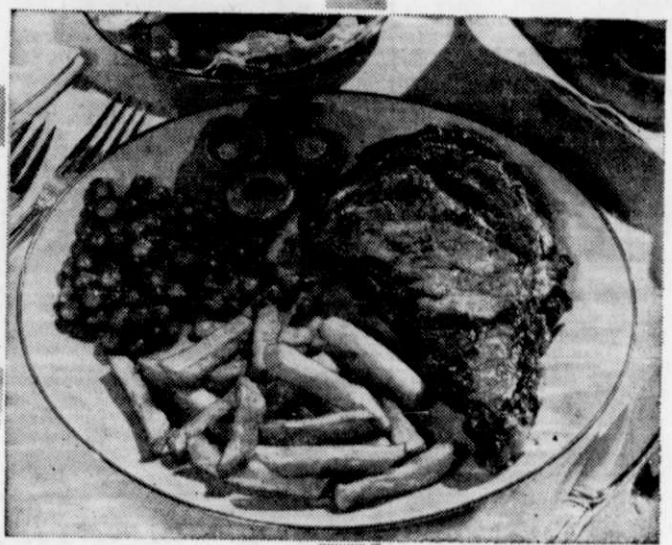

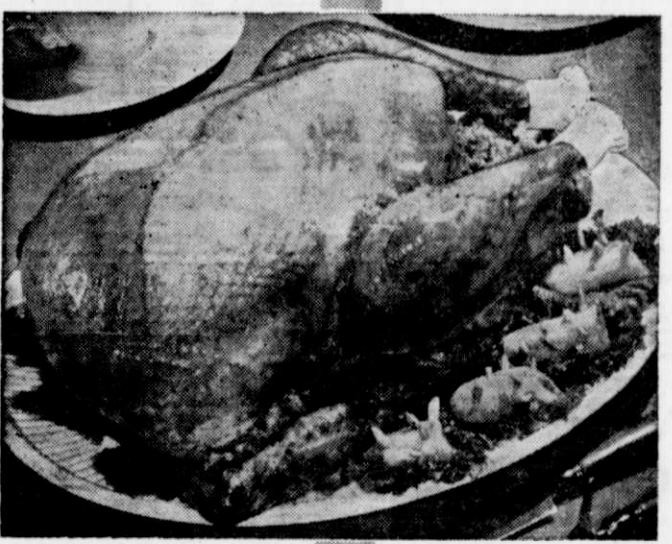
