Ellsworth Prost Killed; Crushed By Road Roller

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR COUNTY WORKER MONDAY

Ellsworth Prost, 45, of 1007 Kilbourn ave., West Bend, a Washington county highway worker, was fatally injured Wednesday afternoon when a power road roller he was operating apparently flipped over and crushed him. Prost was a brother of Mrs. Walter (Betty) Giese of this village and a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Prost of R. 2, Kewaskum, where he formerly resided.

Prost was working on a black-topping project on County Trunk Hwy. M. about a quarter mile south of Fillmore when the accident occurred. The mishap happened about 1:25 p. m.

Prost was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, by the Newburg fire department rescue squad. He died shortly after arrival.

The victim is survived by his wife and three children. His oldest son is serving in the armed forces in Vietnam.

Friends may call after 2 p. m. Sunday at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home, West Bend. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Monday at Immanuel United Church of Christ, West Bend, with the Rev. H. W. Baumer officiating.

2 Local Girls Register for Studies at UW

This past week was the sixth and last of the university's summer registration-orientation program on the Madison campus. The program was established to help young people make their transition into university life easier both for themselves and their parents.

Under the program, the young men and women visit the campus for at least a day, often with either their mother or father or both parents, arrange for their housing if that is not already done, take some placement tests, meet some student leaders and faculty members, and register for their coming university studies.

The new students will be returning to the UW campus Sept. 9 to continue their orientation into university life. Their fall semester classes will begin on Monday, Sept. 16.

The delegates are committed to vote for Nixon on the first ballot due to Nixon's victory in the state in the primary preferential balloting.

Auto Destroyed By Fire in Odd Mishap Near Here

A brand new 1968 model car was destroyed by fire, except for the body, in an unusual mishap which occurred early Monday on Hwy. 45 a short distance south of Kewaskum when the vehicle suddenly burst into flames.

The driver of the car was Bernard Beaver of Waukegan, Ill. He and a young lady occupant escaped uninjured. It was reported that the car was parked on the shoulder of the highway about 1:10 a. m. Beaver said that when he opened the door, the car started burning. A village patrolman tried unsuccessfully to put out the flames with a hand extinguisher. The Kewaskum fire department was then called about 1:20 a. m. and the vehicle was enveloped in flames when they arrived. Firemen put out the blaze.

Police reported that Beaver was southbound when he noticed heat coming from the rear of the car. He and his passenger jumped out and the car oddly rolled backwards by itself off the highway, which is level at the scene, into the east ditch, coming to a halt at the outdoor sign welcoming visitors to the Kettle Moraine area, and striking the sign and a fence. Cause of the blaze was not determined.

Esser Attends Voc Ag Workshop At Eagle River

Vocational ag teachers from schools throughout Wisconsin met for their 19th annual resource workshop at Trees for Tomorrow Camp last week at Eagle River. Attending from Kewaskum was Roy Esser.

Enroute to Eagle River, the group stopped for a tour of the Mosinee Paper Mills and a study of how trees become paper.

M. N. Taylor, executive director, described Trees for Tomorrow's new teaching aids: a floating classroom for aquatic biology, new water tours, and six brochures on the uses of water.

On field trips from camp, the teachers visited Otter Rapids, first dam on the Wisconsin where they discussed the economic value of water to the area and the generation of electric power for the village of Eagle River.

Other field tours included: the U. S. Geological Survey Gauging Station at Conover; the Rainbow Flowage; Lac Vieux Desert, headwaters of the Wisconsin; and the Owens-Illinois Industrial Forest pine thinning plots.

Health Mobile Unit to Visit Village Aug. 6-9

DIABETES TEST ADDED TO SERVICES OFFERED

A finger tip blood test for diabetes is now a part of the services offered in the State Board of Health Mobile Survey Unit which will be in the Kewaskum area during the week of Aug. 6 through Aug. 9. It will be located at the industrial area for the employees the first part of the week and open to the general public on Aug. 9.

All persons over age 40, or those with diabetic blood relatives, or persons with a weight problem are urged to take advantage of the free test. However, persons who are aware that they have diabetes should not take the test. Diabetes is very easy to detect with a simple test. If the finger tip blood test shows an abnormal amount of sugar, the person is referred to his physician for more precise tests. Persons planning to take the diabetes test should eat a meal about 1½ hours and not more than 2½ hours before coming to the unit according to Mrs. Althea Miller, county supervisory nurse. A check list of what to eat may be picked up at Marx's Sentry store or the Bank of Kewaskum.

A sample lunch could be: Jelly sandwich (2 slices of bread), a large glass of milk, a serving of fruit or jello with fruit. Sample snack: Pie or cake with ice cream, a large glass of milk.

Other tests offered will be a blood pressure reading, chest x-ray and in addition a Pap test to detect cancer of the cervix. These tests are free, take only a few minutes time, the results are confidential. The mobile unit will be open to the general public on Friday, Aug. 9, at Marx's Sentry store from 12:00 to 3:00 p. m. and from 5:30 to 8:30 p. m.

All adults are urged to take advantage of this free public service.

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Our Police Chief Says

A thirteen year old girl, partially blind, lives in Kewaskum. You will see her crossing our streets—she will be carrying a red and white cane. Be sure and give her the right of way.

State Law 346.26: An operator of a vehicle shall stop his vehicle before approaching closer than 10 feet to a pedestrian carrying a cane or walking stick which is white in color or white trimmed with red and which is held in an extended or raised position and shall take such precautions as

may be necessary to avoid accident or injury to such pedestrian. The fact that such pedestrian may be violating any of the laws applicable to pedestrians does not relieve the operator of a vehicle from the duties imposed upon him by this sub-section.

Staring dulls a motorist's awareness. Rest the eyes by keeping them in motion; vary the focus to avoid fixed stare on any single object. In other words, don't stare at a girl in a miniskirt while driving, unless she is "in motion."

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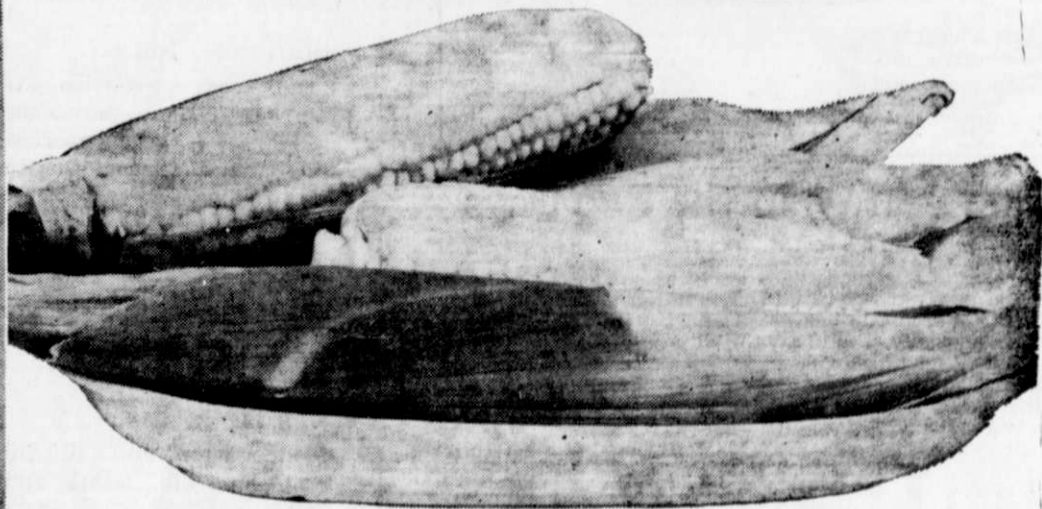

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Jigging Can Whip The Dog Days

By Tom Andrews

Jigging, a fishing method that's easily as old as the hills, is now riding a new wave of interest. You're not part of angling's "in" group if your tackle box doesn't hold a few basic jigging-type lures. Personally, I've always liked a sturdy red/yellow or white feathered lead-head jig for ocean use. My preference for inland lakes and rivers, however, is a "Lucky" Lujon—a hard bait to describe because it's so deceptively simple.

The Lujon is a sliver of forged brass with a few angles in the heavy (hook) end. Near the treble hook is an eye-catching pink plastic tab.

But you never judge a lure by its looks; only performance counts. And my old friend Art Schumann of Lockport, Ill., told me a story recently that really makes this point.

Seems Art and his family were fishing Rest Lake near Manitowish Waters, Wis., late last summer—and having the kind of bad luck that makes anglers think fish take vacations, too.

Just a bare handful of crappies were being taken near a floating bog anchored to an island in the lake. Then along came two guys with Lujons. Only nobody knew that's what they had. All anyone could see

was the walleys they started pulling out from under that bog!

"When they left with their limit that night, and the next, and the next," Art told me, "you can bet we were all worn to a frazzle trying to find their key to success."

Well, toward the end of the week the two men finally showed their audience the Lujons and told how they used them. They'd cast close to the bog, let the lure sink quickly in the 30 ft. of water there, then retrieve with a slow, rhythmic pumping action of the rods. With the lure still in 5-10 ft. of water, they'd stop reeling and just jig the Lujon till they got a strike. And they got strikes!

Says Art: "I've fished for too many years, and I've never seen such consistent success with an artificial lure during 'dog days'."

Maybe there's a tip there for all of us during July, August and September.
