Dombrowski Sentenced to Life Jail Term in Slaying Case

Chester J. Dombrowski, 31, a former police officer of Chicago, was sentenced to life imprisonment last Thursday in the slaying of another Chicagoan, Herbert L. McKinney, 27, last September. Sentence was imposed by Circuit Judge Jerold E. Murphy at Fond du Lac, who ordered Dombrowski confined in the state prison at Waupun after denying a request by Dombrowski's attorney for a new trial.

On July 18, Dombrowski was convicted of first degree murder by a circuit court jury at Fond du Lac. The jury found him guilty in the slaying of McKinney, whose badly beaten body, with a bullet wound in the head, was found in a farm field atop a pile of rubble on a seldom used dump area in Fond du Lac county approximately 1 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum last Sept. 12. The farm on which the body was found was owned by Dombrowski and a brother.

The body was found as the result of an investigation of an auto accident in which Dombrowski was involved just south of the Fond du Lac-Washington county line on Hwy. 45 north of Kewaskum on the night of Sept. 11. Dombrowski was arrested by Washington county authorities on a charge of drunken driving but this charge was later reduced.

Attorneys for Dombrowski had asked for an order dismissing the murder charge and for a judgment of acquittal or an order to set aside the verdict and grant a new trial.

While being held in jail at West Bend on the driving charge, Dombrowski resigned from the Chicago police force. He was later arrested in Chicago at O'Hare airport, where he was then employed. The arrest was made following his indictment on the murder charge by a grand jury at Fond du Lac.

The life term is mandatory in a conviction on a first degree murder charge. His attorneys said following the sentencing that an appeal of Judge Murphy's decision denying the motion for a judgment of acquittal notwithstanding the jury verdict could be anticipated. Atty. David Leichtfuss, one of the two attorneys who handled the defense, said the family is anxious to appeal and that he expected that the procedure will be decided upon in the very near future.

Dombrowski had pleaded not guilty to the charge of first degree murder following his indictment. No motive for the killing has ever been publicly established. Throughout the trial attorneys for Dombrowski had stressed a lack of proof regarding venue in the case, claiming the prosecution had failed to establish that the murder took place in Fond du Lac county.

Judge Murphy, in giving his verdict, stated, in part: "This court came to the conclusion . . . that regardless of the fact that a considerable amount of the evidence, facts and circumstances . . . were circumstantial . . . the cumulative effect . . . led this court to conclude beyond a reasonable

doubt that the defendant committed the crime with which he was charged. This court was convinced beyond a reasonable doubt, and apparently the jury came to the same conclusion, that the decedent was not only shot in the 1960 Dodge located in Fond du Lac county, but also died in the 1960 Dodge in Fond du Lac county, thus establishing venue beyond a reasonable doubt though based upon circumstantial evidence . . ."

Judge Murphy directed Sheriff Harry E. Rozek to take Dombrowski to Waupun the same day (Thursday) sentence was imposed.

New Vocational School in West Bend Approved

BUILDING ON NORTH SIDE OF CITY TO COST \$950,000

A new Vocational school to be located in West Bend has been approved by the District No. 10 Vocational, Technical and Adult Education board. H. J. Von Valkenburg, district director, announced today that a 26,500 square foot facility would be constructed in West Bend to provide occupational training and adult education to residents of the district.

The site for this school is located north of the West Bend city limits between Hwy. 45 and the River road. The one-story building will be of conventional construction and is designed to house the

seven occupational training programs approved last September by the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education for development in the West Bend school.

These seven programs are: machine operation, auto tune-up and servicing, small engine repair and servicing, sales and service merchandising, mechanical drafting, general clerical training and stenography. The school will also include a complete home economics department with a foods laboratory and a sewing laboratory which can also be used for general purpose class rooms. An individual and small group instruction area is planned in the facility to enable adults to study subjects of their choosing on a semi-independent basis through the use of programmed instructional materials, teaching machines and prepared audio-visual materials.

In approving the plans for the new West Bend Vocational-Technical school the District No. 10 VTAE board also approved a budget for this school not to exceed \$950,000.00 and authorized the architects, Mark F. Pfaller Assoc. Inc. to proceed with working drawings and building specifications which are to be completed by Oct. 1 of this year. It is anticipated that the West Bend Vocational-Technical school will be completed and ready for classes by September, 1969, according to Lee Flanders, area co-ordinator of the local school.

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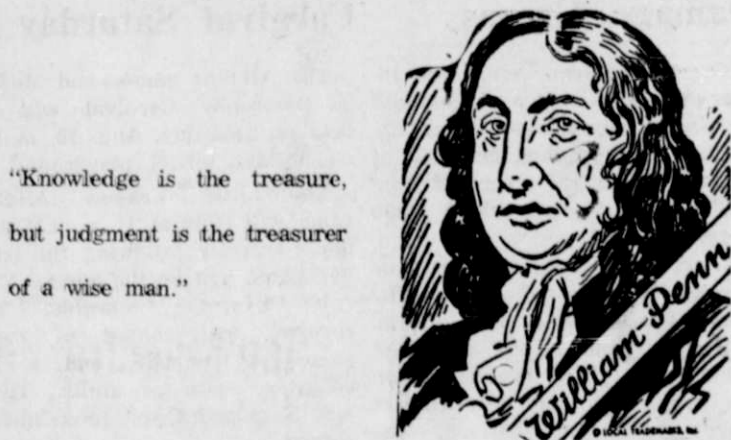
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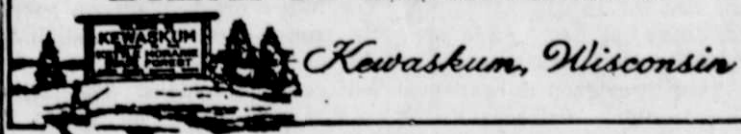
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29th Seefeldt Family Reunion Held Here Sunday

Health Mobile Unit Open to Public Today

DIABETES TEST ADDED TO SERVICES OFFERED

A finger tip blood test for diabetes is now a part of the services offered in the State Board of Health Mobile Survey Unit which is in the Kewaskum area during the week of Aug. 6 through Aug. 9. It was located at the industrial area for the employees the first part of the week and open to the general public on Aug. 9.

All persons over age 40, or those with diabetic blood relatives, or persons with a weight problem are urged to take advantage of the free test. However, persons who are aware that they have diabetes should not take the test. Diabetes is very easy to detect with a simple test. If the finger tip blood test shows an abnormal amount of sugar, the person is referred to his physician for more precise tests. Persons planning to take the diabetes test should eat a meal about 1½ hours and not more than 2½ hours before coming to the unit according to Mrs. Althea Miller, county supervisory nurse. A check list of what to eat may be picked up at Marx's Sentry store or the Bank of Kewaskum.

A sample lunch could be: Jelly sandwich (2 slices of bread), a large glass of milk, a serving of fruit or jello with fruit. Sample snack: Pie or cake with ice

cream, a large glass of milk.

Other tests offered will be a blood pressure reading, chest x-ray and in addition a Pap test to detect cancer of the cervix. These tests are free, take only a few minutes time, the results are confidential. The mobile unit will be open to the general public on Friday, Aug. 9, at Marx's Sentry store from 12:00 to 3:00 p. m. and from 5:30 to 8:30 p. m.

All adults are urged to take advantage of this free public service.

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Rites Held for Ellsworth Prost, Accident Victim

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday, Aug. 5, at Immanuel United Church of Christ, West Bend, for Ellsworth W. Prost, 45, of 1007 Killbourn ave., West Bend, an employee of the Washington county highway department for 19 years, who was fatally injured on Wednesday, July 31, near Fillmore when a power road roller he was operating tipped over and crushed him. The Rev. H. W. Baumer officiated and interment was in Washington County Memorial Park. Graveside military rites were conducted by Kewaskum Robert G. Romaine American Legion post.

Prost was working on a black-topping project on County Trunk Hwy. M, about a quarter mile south of Fillmore when the mishap happened about 1:25 p. m. He was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, by the Newburg fire department rescue squad and died shortly after arrival there.

Deceased was born in the town of Kewaskum on Mar. 10, 1923, the son of the late Arnold and Margaret (Bloedorn) Prost. He married Marjorie Koepke at Salem United Church of Christ in Wayne on Sept. 6, 1947.

His wife survived him, together with three children, William, serving with the U. S. Army in Vietnam, and Gary and Sue Ellen at home; three sisters, Marcella (Mrs. Melvin Krueger) of West Bend, Earla (Mrs. William Maurer) of Brown Deer and Betty Ann (Mrs. Walter Giese) of Kewaskum.

Prost was a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion, Kewaskum.

Visitation at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home, West Bend, was after 2 p. m. Sunday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 o'clock Monday.

Herman A. Falk, 90, a lifelong resident of R. 2, Campbellsport, died at 4:30 p. m. Wednesday, July 31, at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, following an illness of two weeks. Mr. Falk was one of the Statesman's oldest subscribers. He subscribed to the paper continuously since 1908, a period of 60 years.

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WASHINGTON AND Small Business

BY C. WILSON HARDER

Consumers on the Hot Seat

The consumer, as usual, is right smack in the middle. His conduct is going to determine the fate of the present business turmoil of tight money, inflation, tax increases, inventory and unemployment fluctuations, wage demands and all the rest. So the economists say.

Whatever the consumer does, he is likely to carry much of the responsibility for what happens in the economy: whether we have a boom or a bust. Or both, in that order.

Ideally, consumer demand is supposed to remain so steady that the economy can grow without peaks and valleys. But it never does.

Last year, economists were upset because the consumer was not spending money fast enough. Retail sales slipped. Bank savings increased, inventories swelled, factory orders declined, threatening a recession. Economists reasoned that the consumer was worried about Vietnam and other tensions and had decided to save money for the uncertain future.

Economists called on the consumer to resume his spending habits, and stop saving so much. To the average American, whose banking account has never been much more than a status symbol, this was strange talk.

Spend, consumers were told, to keep the nation from a recession. Consumer spending did increase around the first of the year and the storm signals were hauled down.

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But now the word in economic circles is that consumers are over-doing it, that they are on a buying spree with credit expanding and savings contracting. Washington's economy managers are saying this new "boom" must be restrained, that the economy is getting overheated and that too much consumer demand could lead to a recession later.

The solution offered by the Administration is the tax surcharge, meaning "increase the taxes so the consumers won't have so much money to throw around." Strange, isn't it, that the tax increase was pushed a year ago when the situation was just reversed?

All this "spend" and don't spend" talk must confuse the average, hard-working breadwinner who is trying to satisfy creditors and keep the household reasonably well stocked.

Now, he's supposed to curtail his spending when prices are going up every day. Just buying the same old things costs more and more.

About 40 per cent of the current increase in Gross National Product—the total money spent on all goods and services—is the direct result of inflation, and another big part is due to increased government spending.
