# **River Here Are** Those of Indians

A report received this week by Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum and Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman of Washington county from the State Crime Laboratory at Madison corroborated the belief that numerous bones and bone fragments found at the swimming area in the village park earlier this summer were those of Indians.

According to the report received, the bones were those of at least two Indians, one an adult male approximately 30 to 40 years of age and the other were the incomplete bones of a female of "childbearing age." A more precise age could not be given due to the fragmented condition of the female skeleton.

The bones will be retained until they can be presented to the Museum of Anthropology at the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

The bones were discovered early in June by a group of local boys swimming at the beach area. The boys unearthed at least 100 bones and fragments which were imbedded in the river bostom. 




