## Board Reviews Plans to Expand Water Facilities

PROJECT WOULD INCLUDE 200,000 RESERVOIR, FIRE PUMP AND BOOSTER PUMP

At their regular monthly meeting Aug. 5, members of the Kewaskum village board had explained preliminary plans for expanded water facilities as presented by Robert McMahon, engineer from Menasha, and the board authorized the taking of bids up to Sept. 9.

The project would include a 200,000 ground level reservoir at the Tower st. pumping station, a fire pump and a 500 gallon per minute booster pump. The expansion program would serve the new office complex now under construction for Regal Ware, Inc. as well as other areas.

To offset a possible traffic congestion problem on Tower st. when the new Regal Ware building is completed since school buses load in the area, it was decided by village board members as well as school board members in attendance to load school buses on Third st. as the school fronts on both streets. If the change does not solve the problem, further consideration to a proposal to widen Tower st. to alleviate the problem will probably be given.

Village President Wayland Tassar told the board and the members of the board of education that it will be known after a few weeks of school whether this will solve the problem. It was felt that the idea of loading buses on Third st. was worth trying before widening work on Tower st. is undertaken.

Trustee Myron Perschbacher was named by Tassar to the school site committee to serve when a location is chosen for a new senior high school in the village.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl told board members he had requested the Washington county highway department to install a sign on CTH H warning motorists they are approaching the village limits since additional land in the area was recently annexed. Driving speed at the point is 65 miles per hour and a sign to warn motorists to reduce their speed as they enter the village is needed, he said. There have been two accidents in the area recently, Pledl reported.

Other lesser business transacted by the board included favoring an additional yearly insurance premium, purchasing a set of used plumbing tools, adopting a resolution declaring intent to exercise special assessment powers on Tower st. and an ordinance restricting building permits, renting a pick-up truck, authorizing the police chief to attend a conference, and authorizing the purchase of 500 feet of fire hose.

## Exchange Student Sudy Reigle Sends Letter From Chile

Suellen Reigle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Reigle of Kewaskum, who is spending the summer months as Kewaskum's foreign exchange student in Chile, wrote the following letter home recently, describing Chile and telling of her experiences in that country:

Pedro de Villagra 2443  
Santiago, Chile  
July 29, 1968

I arrived in Santiago about 2:30 a. m. June 16th. After checking through customs, I was introduced to my family in a mob of people including a pick-pocket. Twelve other students came with me. But 28 came the next week. My family is Christian—20, Ignacio—18, Rodrigo—16, Foreto—15, Francisco—13, Gabriel—11, Maria Eugenia—10, Paulina—6, and Mario—18 (a cousin who lives with us during the week and attends the university).

We have 3 maids who wash cook and clean. The meals are marvelous. We eat 4 times a day. We have a tea and eat dinner at 8:00. Some of the food is equal to that in the United States but others are different and quite good for example empanadas. They are turnovers filled with meat or cheese.

I have just completed a tour to the south, to Concepcion and Chilian. I spent a week there. I have also visited Con Con, Vinadel Mar, Valparaiso and Cachagua. Valparaiso is a sea resort. The others are summer resorts on the ocean and very beautiful. Last week there was a very severe storm and after the gigantic waves I hear there was a lot of damage. They destroyed some of the coastal road and many houses. I have been visiting sights in Santiago. I expect to have a lot of pictures when I return.

I am attending a private girls school run by French nuns. The girls wear uniforms and the school rules are very strict. My classroom isn't finished because they are building on. Today we got electric lights. Eventually we will have heating too. But it isn't cold. Today it was about 70 degrees Fahrenheit outside and this is their winter season.

This year there hasn't been any rain. They say this is the driest year in 200 years. Without rain there is no snow in the mountains. When summer comes there won't be any water.

My family is very kind and I feel like another sister but I will be happy to get home again.

## 'Panther' on Loose in Kewaskum?

Police Chief Roland Pledl reports that an excited local housewife called him last Wednesday to report seeing a "panther" on the loose in the back yards and fields in the area between Fond du Lac ave. and the North Western railroad tracks near the creek on the south side of town. Several other neighboring housewives also reported spotting the animal.

To satisfy the women and his

own curiosity, Chief Pledl formed a one-man safari and went hunting for the animal with his trusty shotgun. He failed to see any sign of a "panther" or anything resembling one.

The same evening the husband of one of the women called the chief again stating that he also saw the animal. But he described it as being a big, fat over-sized cat.

## Bones Found in River Here Are Those of Indians

A report received this week by Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum and Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman of Washington county from the State Crime Laboratory at Madison corroborated the belief that numerous bones and bone fragments found at the swimming area in the village park earlier this summer were those of Indians.

According to the report received, the bones were those of at least two Indians, one an adult male approximately 30 to 40 years of age and the other were the incomplete bones of a female of "childbearing age." A more precise age could not be given due to the fragmented condition of the female skeleton.

The bones will be retained until they can be presented to the Museum of Anthropology at the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

The bones were discovered early in June by a group of local boys swimming at the beach area. The boys unearthed at least 100 bones and fragments which were imbedded in the river bottom. The group accidentally stepped on the bones, which included a skull and jawbone with teeth among many others, while swimming. The bones, which were in a remarkable state of preservation, are believed to have been uncovered by a dredging machine which dredged the river in the swimming area last fall.

Regular Meeting  
August 5, 1968

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Yoost, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried.

Robert McMahon explained to the board the preliminary plans for an additional ground level reservoir at the Tower Street pump station. Bids will be accepted on September 9th.

The School Board members met with the Village Board to discuss the traffic problem at the elementary school during the period that the school buses are loading and unloading. It was agreed that school bus loading and unloading would be tried on Third Street rather than Tower Street before any street widening project is planned.

Mr. Eugene Bohn explained to the board the insurance appraisal recently prepared for the village. He explained an additional yearly premium of \$575.00 would be required to bring the insurance limits up to present replacement costs. The board voted in favor of this increase upon motion by Trustee Freehauf, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried.

The board decided to also review the village's fleet policy at its next regular meeting.

The board authorized the purchase of a set of used plumbing tools from Marvin Schaefer for a sum of \$253.05 upon motion by Trustee Wietor, seconded by Trustee Freehauf and duly carried.

**RESOLUTION NO. 68-3**

PRELIMINARY RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENT TO EXERCISE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT POWERS UNDER SECTION 66.60, WISCONSIN STATUTES OF 1965

RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

1. The Village Board hereby declares its intention to exercise its power under S. 66.60, Wisconsin Statutes, to levy special assessments upon property within the following described area for benefits conferred upon such property by improvement of the following streets:

All property fronting upon both sides of Tower Street from its intersection with School Street proceeding North. Said curb and gutter shall consist of approximately 560' on the East side of Tower street and approximately 616' on the West side of Tower Street.

2. Said public improvements shall include the installation of curb and gutter on both sides of said Tower Street to the grade established therefore in Ordinance

58-1 of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and recorded in the office of the Village Commissioner.

3. The total amount assessed against such district shall not exceed 50% of the cost of improvements.

4. The assessments against any parcel may be paid in cash or in installments as shall hereafter be determined.

5. The Village Engineer is directed to prepare a report consisting of:

a. Final plans and specifications for said improvements.

b. An estimate of the entire cost of the proposed curb and gutter improvement.

c. An estimate of benefits to be levied for each improvement as to each parcel of property within the assessment district of:

1. The assessment of benefits to be levied for each improvement.

2. The damages to be awarded for property taken or damaged by said improvement.

3. The net amount of benefits over damages or of the damages over benefits for such improvements.

4. The total assessment against each parcel.

5. Upon completion of such report the Village Engineer is directed to file a copy thereof in the office of Village Commissioner for public inspection.

6. Upon receiving the report of the Village Engineer, the Commissioner is directed to give notice of a public hearing on such report as specified in Section 66.60 (7), Wisconsin Statutes. ## Goose Hunting Applications Now Available

**MUST BE POSTMARKED BY MIDNIGHT AUG. 31**

Application blanks for 1968 federal Canada goose hunting permits have been shipped out to all Wisconsin county clerks, Department of Natural Resources field stations, and conservation area headquarters, the department at Madison has announced.

Applications must be postmarked before midnight, Aug. 31, in order to be considered either for the machine drawing for Horicon area permits or for permits for outside the zone. The latter will be issued automatically to unsuccessful Horicon zone applicants and to all applicants who specifically request permits for outside the zone. No Canada goose hunting will be permitted anywhere in the state without a permit.

Hunters who are successful in obtaining Horicon zone permits will be eligible to take one Canada goose. Four permits and tags will be issued for outside the zone, entitling hunters to take up to four honkers.

Applicants must have a 1968-69 Wisconsin resident small game or sportsman's license, or a non-resident small game license, and the license number must be entered on the application.
