High, Junior High and Elementary Schools to Open Next Wednesday

FRESHMEN, 7TH GRADERS TO REPORT DAY EARLIER

Teachers at Kewaskum Community High school will be reporting for in-service days next week. New teachers only will meet with the principal, Ernest Mitchell, Friday, Aug. 23, and all teachers will be meeting Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 26 and 27.

School will begin for freshmen at 1 p. m. on Tuesday, Aug. 27. Parents have been asked to bring students to school that day and buses will return them to their homes at 4 p. m. All students, including freshmen, will report on Wednesday, Aug. 28, at 8:15 a. m. for the first full day of school. Buses will run to pick up students and to return them home. The cafeteria will be serving lunch beginning that day.

Any high school students who are new in the district and have not registered, are requested to call the school and make arrangements to register before school starts.

New Teachers on Staff

Several new teachers will be members of the 1968-69 Kewaskum High school faculty. Michael Johnson will be teaching in the industrial arts and shop area and Mrs. Jeanette Vetter in the homemaking area to work with both junior high and high school students. Miss Beth Anderson has been added to the English department and Phillip Thurston to the social studies and science department because of increased high school enrollments.

George Allman is replacing Mrs. Barbara Wild as the senior English teacher. Neil Denniston replaces Lindley DeNamur as the boy's physical education teacher. Mrs. Beverly Hanson is replacing Miss Margaret Browne who retired last spring. Peter Ritter is replacing Miss Eva Heit as the German teacher. Paul Schoenberger has replaced Miss Shirley Ellsworth in the guidance department. Mrs. Barbara York has replaced Miss Louise Sundquist as the remedial reading teacher.

Junior High Orientation

Parents of all seventh graders attending the Kewaskum Junior High school are asked to have their children at the Junior High school by 1 p. m. on Tuesday, Aug. 27. At that time students will meet their teachers, become acquainted with their schedules, the building and some school policies. Student handbooks will be handed out and explained. Students will be taken home by bus at 4 p. m.

Eighth graders new to the system will be assigned some fellow classmate who attended Kewaskum Junior High school last year to help acquaint them with their schedules and the building. School policies and student handbooks will be explained to them on Wednesday, Aug. 28, their first day of school.

The Kewaskum elementary schools, which include the Beechwood elementary, Farmington elementary, Kewaskum elementary and Wayne elementary schools will open on Wednesday morning, Aug. 28, at 8:30 a. m.

Hot Lunches Begin First Day

Hot lunches will be served in all schools beginning on Wednesday, Aug. 28. Tickets for the first three day week will be 90c. Weekly tickets will be sold the last day of each week for the following week. Cost of the weekly ticket will be \$1.50 and daily tickets are 45c. At the elementary level, teachers will sell daily tickets to the students at the start of each class day.

EXPECTED ENROLLMENT OF 243 SLIGHTLY DOWN

Holy Trinity Parochial school will also open next Wednesday, Aug. 28, with Mass at 8:10 a. m. An enrollment of 243 pupils is expected, which is slightly down from last year's figure. The school now opens the same day as the public schools because of the bus service.

The staff of eight teachers will consist of four Sisters of St. Agnes and four lay teachers. All of the teachers are returning from last year except one, Mrs. Marguerite Lamers. She will be succeeded by Mrs. Harold King. Sister Mary George will return as domestic sister.

The room set aside in the new school structure for a centralized library has been furnished, and students will have the opportunity to avail themselves to its facilities during the coming year.

Dr. R. Wesenberg Named Pediatric Radiologist at UW

Dr. Richard L. Wesenberg, son of Mrs. Walter Wesenberg, 1538 Riverview dr., Kewaskum, has recently received the appointment of assistant professor of diagnostic radiology at the University of Wisconsin Medical Center, Madison. Dr. Wesenberg will be working primarily in the sub-specialty of pediatric radiology and as such will be the first pediatric radiologist at University hospitals.

Dr. Wesenberg is a 1955 graduate of Kewaskum Community High school, 1959 graduate of the University of Wisconsin (B.S.) and 1962 graduate of the University of Wisconsin Medical school (M.D.). He served one year of rotating internship at the Hartford hospital, Hartford, Conn., followed by a residency in diagnostic radiology at the U. W. Medical Center. From January, 1966 through June, 1966, he did a fellowship in pediatric radiology at the Children's hospital of Los Angeles, Los Angeles, Calif. He then completed his service commitment from July, 1966 to July, 1968 at the U. S. Public Health Service hospital, Baltimore, Md., where he was assistant chief of radiology until February, 1968, at which time he was promoted to acting chief of the Department of Radiology.

Bicyclist Hit by Auto, 3 Accidents At Overhead Here

Richard Kopping, 8, of R. 2, Kewaskum, was injured last Friday afternoon when he was struck by an auto while riding his bicycle on Hwy. 144 at Shalom dr. southeast of Kewaskum.

According to the sheriff's department report of the accident, a southbound vehicle driven by Barnadine Mueller, 20, R. 1, Random Lake, was traveling south on Hwy. 144 when the Kopping youth, also traveling south, turned onto Shalom dr. in front of the approaching vehicle.

It was reported that Kopping was one of four bike riders who were traveling south along the shoulder of the highway. The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Kopping, suffered bumps and bruises. He was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, for treatment. His condition was later reported as satisfactory.

Four other accidents, three of them in the area of the overhead bridge on Hwy. 45 just north of the village, were reported the past week. Several persons were injured in the mishaps.

An auto driven by Harry Krueger, R. 2, Kewaskum, was reported involved in an accident at the overhead bridge Saturday night. Kathy A. Fischer, R. 2, West Bend, a passenger in his auto, was injured in the mishap and was transported to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. Details on the accident were not available.

Leroy A. Meyer, 24, West Bend, suffered a cut on the back of the head and complained of chest pains following an accident on the Hwy. 45 overhead bridge early Wednesday. Meyer and two witnesses were not available.

Tools Taken Here Found in \$50,000 Cache Near Pipe

A cache of stolen property which may total \$30,000 to \$50,000 or more which was stolen in five or more counties including the Kewaskum and Washington county area was discovered in Fond du Lac county last week. A resident of that county was charged with receiving stolen property as a result of the investigation.

Val Meske of Fond du Lac county is charged in the alleged thefts. He lives about two miles south of the community of Pipe on the east shore of Lake Winnebago. The loot was reportedly located in an old building at Pipe and in a garage, shed and basement of Meske's home on Lake Winnebago.

A \$6,500 portable compressor which was stolen from the building site of The Samaritan, new Washington county hospital and home, was among items taken in this area. Pictures of the large compressor, which is mounted on wheels and can be towed behind a truck, were reported instrumental in leading to the discovery of the loot. The pictures of the missing compressor were widely circulated by the West Bend police department throughout the state in the hopes that it could be located because of its large size and the fact that it is an unusual piece of equipment.

Authorities in Fond du Lac county placed the Meske property under surveillance and located the compressor and other items. Meske was charged with receiving stolen property and appeared in court at Fond du Lac on the charge. Later he was freed on bond. Meske also operates a used car lot in Milwaukee, authorities reported.

The loot found in Fond du Lac county included power tools taken from the Wunderberg Ski Tow near Kewaskum and tools taken from a construction site at the Town Line school in the town of Richfield. Items at this construction site and also from The Samaritan were owned by Nelson Construction of Racine.

Other items found at Meske's property included new power tools still in packages, tires, TV sets, outboard motors, lawn mowers, riding mowers, electric generators, welding equipment, jacks, water pumps, boats and motors and other items.

Most of the loot was obtained in thefts in Washington, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Milwaukee and Waukesha counties it was indicated. West Bend and county authorities as well as Fond du Lac and other counties are busy making inventories of the items and attempting to locate the owners.

Monday morning it was further stated that a warehouse in Milwaukee is also being checked as possibly housing additional loot.

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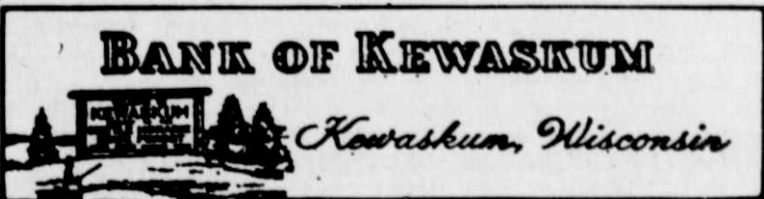
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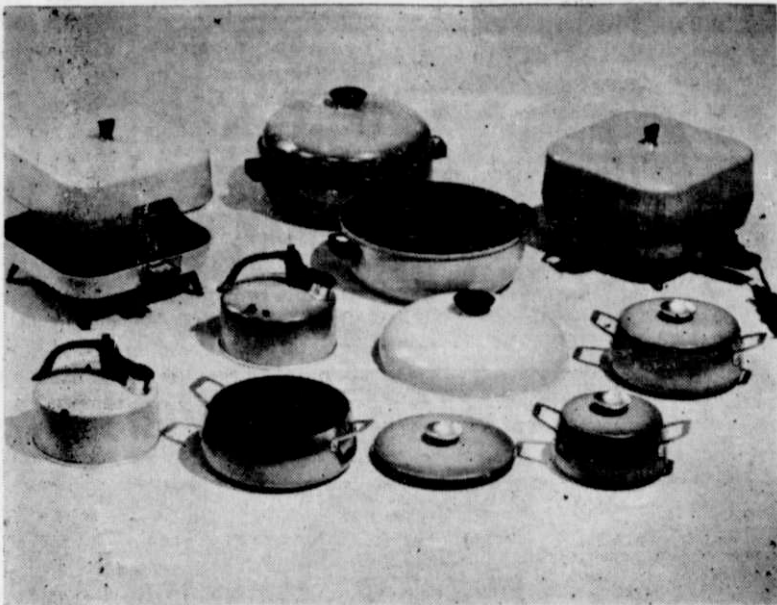
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4 Area Teenagers Attend Red Cross Leadership Center

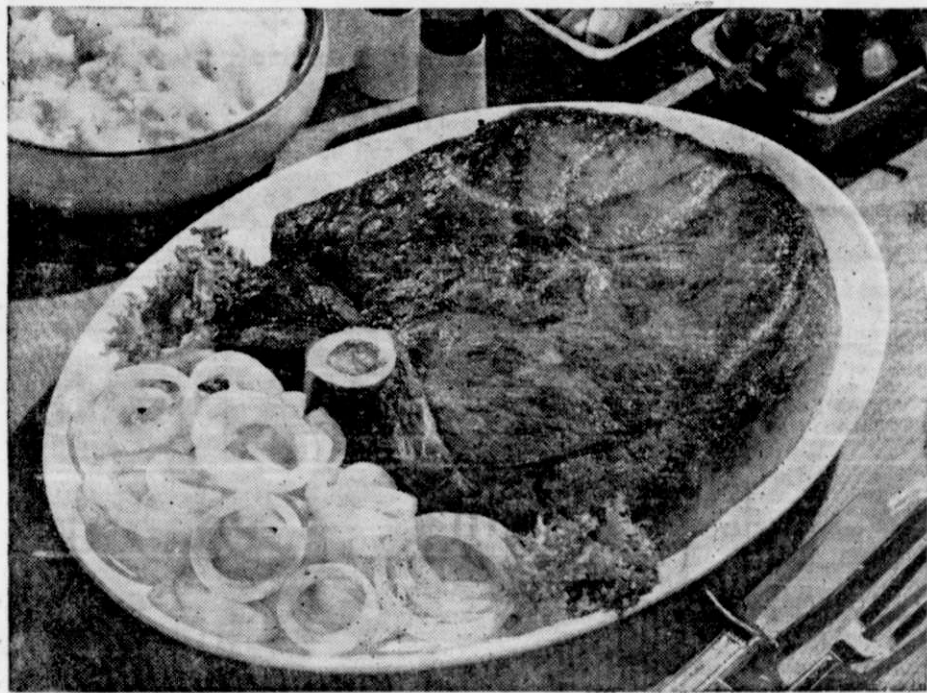

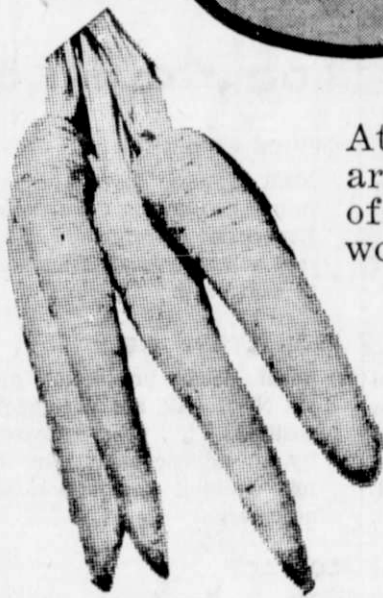

Registration for first semester classes at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus will take place on Sept. 11-12, according to Paul Kegel, director of student affairs.

All part-time and special students are to register on Wednesday evening, Sept. 11, between 7:00 p. m. Water, Water Everywhere, So Watch Out

Water is a two-faced element in the summertime. Is your family going to see the good face that refreshes and benefits in the hot months? Or is it going to see the bad face that causes nearly 7,000 drownings in a year, many of them on home premises in swimming pools, bathtubs, wells, cisterns, and cesspools.

The Council on Family Health offers safety measures to help your family avoid the common errors that lead to accidents associated with water.

The backyard swimming pool should be surrounded with a fence high enough and strong enough to keep out small children. The gate should be kept locked unless adults are present. Most drownings in home pools involve children under five.

Children playing with wheeled toys such as skates, tricycles or wagons should not be permitted near the pool.

Youngsters should not be allowed in the pool without adult supervision.

No child should swim in the pool alone.

Check your property—and also surrounding properties for—inadequately covered wells, cisterns and cesspools. Report water-filled excavations in the area of your home to your local health and police departments.

It does not require a large body of water to constitute a hazard, says the Council, a non-profit organization sponsored by leading members of the drug industry to promote home safety and family health.



An adult in the bath should avoid touching electrical appliances or connections. Some shocks can be lethal.
