### Water, Water Everywhere, So Watch Out

The backyard swimming pool should be surrounded with a fence high enough and strong enough to keep out small children. The gate should be kept locked unless adults are present. Most drownings in home pools involve children under five.

Children playing with wheeled toys such as skates, tricycles or wagons should not be permitted near the pool.

Youngsters should not be allowed in the pool without adult supervision.

No child should swim in the pool alone.

Check your property-and also surrounding properties for - inadequately covered wells, cisterns and cesspool. Report waterfilled excavations in the area of your home to your local health and police departments.
