Mobile Health Unit to Return Here on Sept. 3

The State Board of Health mobile survey unit returned to West Bend this week and will return to Kewaskum next Tuesday, Sept. 3, according to Mrs. Betsy Schultz, West Bend city public health nurse.

X-rays to detect tuberculosis and other lung and heart abnormalities, a blood pressure reading and a check for diabetes will be offered free of charge to adults. These simple tests will take only a few minutes and undressing is not required. People who are aware that they have diabetes or high blood pressure should inform the mobile unit staff and not take those tests.

Persons planning to take the diabetes test should eat a snack or meal about an hour and a half but not more than two and conc half hours ahead of time.

Salvation Army Drive Underway PETERSON IS CHAIRMAN

OF LOCAL SERVICE UNIT

L. N. Peterson, chairman of the Salvation Army local service unit in Kewaskum, announces the annual fund raising campaign started on Aug. 27. A portion of funds raised in the area is retained by the local committee for local use for such items as: lunch money, milk, fuel, food, clothing, dental and optical purposes among a few.

The funds reserved for state and national services are set aside for canteen service for emergency work such as in Washington D. C. where law enforcement officers, army and national guard were served 3,000 gallons of coffee, 15.000 sandwiches and 500 gallons of soup. In Richmond, Ind. at a recent explosion which claimed 45 lives, the Salvation Army was on the scene in minutes. A total of 6 Salvation Army vehicles were on the job with three canteens serving rescue workers.

At the recent Braniff airline crash in California where 84 crew and passengers were killed, a Salvation Army canteen with a contingent of 30 volunteers served over 200 relief workers and highway patrol, beverages and food. They remained on the scene on a 24 hour round the clock basis in shifts until the rescue was completed, assisting in identification and notification of next of kin.

At the recent Kentucky tornado area, the Salvation Army provided clothing and furniture to victims as well as operating emergency canteens for the rescue teams. Four large canteens were brought into service together with 12 station wagons with auxiliary supplies, serving coffee, doughnuts and sandwiches to rescue workers and more than a thousand sufferers.


I feel that any man should make an effort for public office if he feels personally qualified, but he should win his following on his personal merit rather than mud-sling half-truths against his opponents.





A family dinner followed the ceremony at Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country club. Mr. and Mrs. Weiss will make their home at Kewaskum.







Facsimile Ballot Notice Of September Primary Election September 10, 1968

TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY

Notice is hereby given of a September Primary election to be held in the several precincts in the County of Washington, on the 10th day of September, 1968, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a partisan primary; the elector shall select the party ballot of his choice and make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.


The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall he allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.
