Mobile Health Unit to Return Here on Sept. 3

The State Board of Health mobile survey unit returned to West Bend this week and will return to Kewaskum next Tuesday, Sept. 3, according to Mrs. Betsy Schultz, West Bend city public health nurse.

X-rays to detect tuberculosis and other lung and heart abnormalities, a blood pressure reading and a check for diabetes will be offered free of charge to adults. These simple tests will take only a few minutes and undressing is not required. People who are aware that they have diabetes or high blood pressure should inform the mobile unit staff and not take those tests.

Persons planning to take the diabetes test should eat a snack or meal about an hour and a half but not more than two and one half hours ahead of time.

The schedule of stops for the Mobile Unit follows: Thursday, Aug. 29—Decorah shopping center, West Bend, 9 a. m. — 12 noon and 1 p. m. — 4 p. m. Friday, Aug. 30—Decorah shopping center, West Bend, 1:30 p. m. — 4:30 p. m. and 5:30 p. m. — 8:30 p. m. Tuesday, Sept. 3—Sentry Food store, Kewaskum, 1 p. m. — 5:30 p. m. and 6:30 p. m. — 8 p. m.

The above schedule was particularly designed to accommodate all teachers and school personnel in this area. As a tax supported program, there is no charge for the Mobile Unit services.

Manzar left her home in Tehran, Iran on Aug. 9 and arrived in Kewaskum Aug. 14, traveling a distance of approximately 10,250

miles. Her flight from Tehran to New York took 22 hours.

Manzar's first impression of Kewaskum was that it was "very beautiful," very different from her country, and that the people are very friendly and seem to know everyone.

While in school in Iran, Manzar's favorite subject was mathematics and she plans to become an architectural engineer in the future. Besides speaking her native language, which is Tarsi, she speaks some Arabic and has a good command of the English language.

Iran has four seasons the same as we enjoy, but their temperatures range from 5 degrees below

O C. to 39 degrees above O C., which is from 27 degrees above O F. to 100 degrees above O F.

The Iranian people celebrate "Naw Raz" which means new day or the beginning of the New Year on April 10 of each year. This is the year 1347 in Iran.

Manzar's father is a major general in the Shah's Royal Army. Until last year her mother was head mistress in one of the schools. Her favorite foods are rice, chicken and beef. No pork is eaten since it is against her Islam religion.

While at home Manzar enjoyed going to the cinema when she had leisure time.

Salvation Army Drive Underway

PETERSON IS CHAIRMAN OF LOCAL SERVICE UNIT

L. N. Peterson, chairman of the Salvation Army local service unit in Kewaskum, announces the annual fund raising campaign started on Aug. 27. A portion of funds raised in the area is retained by the local committee for local use for such items as: lunch money, milk, fuel, food, clothing, dental and optical purposes among a few.

The funds reserved for state and national services are set aside for canteen service for emergency work such as in Washington D. C. where law enforcement officers, army and national guard were served 3,000 gallons of coffee, 15,000 sandwiches and 500 gallons of soup. In Richmond, Ind. at a recent explosion which claimed 46 lives, the Salvation Army was on the scene in minutes. A total of 6 Salvation Army vehicles were on the job with three canteens serving rescue workers.

At the recent Braniff airline crash in California where 84 crew and passengers were killed, a Salvation Army canteen with a contingent of 30 volunteers served over 200 relief workers and highway patrol, beverages and food. They remained on the scene on a 24 hour round the clock basis in shifts until the rescue was completed, assisting in identification and notification of next of kin.

At the recent Kentucky tornado area, the Salvation Army provided clothing and furniture to victims as well as operating emergency canteens for the rescue teams. Four large canteens were brought into service together with 12 station wagons with auxiliary supplies, serving coffee, doughnuts and sandwiches to rescue workers and more than a thousand sufferers.

In Vietnam the Salvation Army is now working together with Catholic Relief and Red Cross in the rebuilding of lives and materials, including schools. Food and clothing is being distributed by the Salvation Army.

Your contribution now during this annual fund drive is most important to the future welfare of those who depend so urgently on the continued support of Salvation Army.

The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.
