Schools Open With Record Enrollments of 603 in High School, 1,088 in Grades

NEARLY 2,000 ATTEND SCHOOL IN DISTRICT

Kewaskum Community High school and elementary schools in the district opened last Wednesday with record enrollments for the 1968-69 school year. Enrollment in high school totaled 603 students and those in the elementary schools totaled 1,088. Of this number, the largest total is enrolled in the Kewaskum Elementary school with 638. The largest increase is in the 7th and 8th grades where about 60 pupils were added from the parochial schools in the area that closed.

Adding the enrollment of 249 pupils at Holy Trinity school to the public schools figure of 1,691 brings the total number of children attending school in the Kewaskum school system to 1,940, very close to 2,000.

The enrollment in high school includes 163 freshmen, 152 sophomores, 149 juniors and 131 seniors. These figures taken on opening day do not total 603 but more have enrolled since then.

Enrollment in the elementary schools is: Beechwood 115, Farmington 227, Kewaskum 638 and Wayne 108. The 638 enrollment in the Kewaskum Elementary school is divided into classes as follows: Kindergarten, 55; 1st grade, 49; 2nd, 59; 3rd, 53; 4th, 50; 5th, 48; 6th, 52; 7th, 137; 8th 135.

Holy Trinity Has Enrollment of 249

Holy Trinity Catholic school also opened last Wednesday with an enrollment of 249 pupils, a decrease of seven from last year. Thirty-three pupils started school in the first grade, nine fewer than last year, which accounts for the decrease in enrollment.

The enrollment by grades follows: Grade 1, 33; grade 2, 40; grade 3, 34; grade 4, 32; grade 5, 30; grade 6, 29; grade 7, 29; grade 8, 22.

Primary Election Tuesday, Sept. 10

A minimum of interest has been shown so far in the Primary Election to be held next Tuesday, Sept. 10. Polls in Kewaskum will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. in the municipal building. Voters in the town of Kewaskum will cast their ballots at the Labor Center in the village at the same hours.

Lack of interest in the election on the local level is attributed to the fact that there are only two contests—for the nomination for county coroner and for the state assembly post on the Republican ticket. These contests and state races could, however, attract a good turnout to the polls.

2 Fires Caused by Wiring, Lightning

Kewaskum firemen responded to two night calls this week, one of them an auto blaze and the other caused by lightning striking at a home.

At 12:05 a. m. Tuesday firemen were summoned to extinguish a burning 1959 model Ford car owned by Otto Bartelt, Jr., which was parked outside his residence in New Fane. The interior of the auto was ablaze when firemen arrived and the entire interior burned out so that the vehicle was almost a total loss. The car had been driven earlier and was parked outside the home about 9 p. m. Monday. It is believed the fire started from a short in the wiring.

At 11 p. m. Wednesday firemen were called to the Earl Kluever residence at 1226 Meadow lane, where lightning is believed to have struck the rotor of a TV antenna during a thunderstorm. The bolt followed wiring outside of the home and into the basement. Wiring, a fuse box and a spot on the basement ceiling were scorched and burned and the house was filled with quite a bit of smoke.

Two Cigarette Machines Stolen, Sign Theft Fails

LARCENIES, VANDALISM AT 3 PLACES ON 3 NIGHTS

Kewaskum police were busy the past week investigating two cases of larceny and one of vandalism which occurred at three separate places during three different nights. The weekend previous a prowler was apprehended and three out-of-town youths driving a convertible car were charged with indecent exposure.

Police Chief Roland Pledl reported that two pranksters were foiled in an attempt to steal a village roadside sign about 10:15 p. m. Saturday. Police Officer Dennis Scott received a complaint that two men were attempting to remove an official "Welcome to Kewaskum" sign at the northeast village limits on Riverview dr. He arrived about two minutes later and observed the men standing in a ditch on the east side of the road.

Officer Scott interrogated the young men, aged 22 and 23, and learned that they were from Plymouth. They admitted they had been drinking and were trying to take down the sign for a souvenir. The sign was still hanging sideways on the post on only one loose bolt. Scott apprehended the pair and booked them for disorderly conduct. They posted \$25 bond and are scheduled to appear in county court on the charge Sept. 17.

At approximately 4:50 a. m. Monday, Sept. 2, Kewaskum police received a tip from a citizen of the area who was awakened by a scraping noise that two thieves were making while removing a cigarette machine from the Ours Coin Operated Laundry at 409 Main st. According to the report, the pair dragged the machine out of the building and placed it in the trunk of a 1962 or 1963 maroon Chevrolet sedan and drove off, heading east on Hwy. 28.

Local police arrived shortly after receiving the call and the county sheriff's department was immediately notified but a search of the area failed to uncover a trace of the vehicle and thieves. Chief Pledl said he obtained some good finger prints at the scene. Kewaskum police and the sheriff's department are continuing the investigation for the men.

John Pelletier of Fond du Lac, owner of the machine, said the device is valued at \$150. It was estimated that it contained about \$30 in coins.

Another larceny occurred sometime between 4 and 5:30 a. m. on Wednesday, Sept. 4, at the A & W Drive-In on S. Fond du Lac ave. where another cigarette machine was taken. The machine stood outside of the drive-in on the east side of the building and was not anchored.

Police Officer Don Hlavaty, who was on duty, stated that he drove his squad car past the A & W at approximately 3:50 a. m. and at the time the machine was still intact. The stolen machine, with cigarettes and cash removed, was discovered by a resident of the area the same evening on a private drive about 75 feet east of Kettle Moraine drive and she no-

Girl Scouts May Sign Up Sept. 11; Leaders Needed

All Girl Scouts—Brownies, Juniors and Cadettes—may sign up at either the Kewaskum Elementary school cafeteria or Holy Trinity school basement on Wednesday, Sept. 11, at 3:45 p. m.

Leaders are again needed for all three troops. If you are interested in helping in any way please call and volunteer. If your time is limited you may wish to volunteer as an assistant leader or as a consultant, or simply as a volunteer driver or typist to be called on as needed.

An attempt is being made to help leaders in every possible way in order to make their job more flexible and less demanding.

It is desired for each leader to have an assistant leader or two, if possible. In addition a list of special consultants is planned, who will volunteer their help in special areas such as singing or dancing, homemaking, crafts, camping knowledge, games and sports. These people will not be asked to participate in the entire Girl Scout program but only as their talents may be needed.

Help has been received in the past by high school age girls who have been scouts and have camping and scouting experience. Their help has been invaluable and it is hoped to have a list of girls for the leaders to call upon.

A leader is not expected to be talented or experienced in every area. Her job is mainly to plan and organize the activities and to arrange for the necessary help. Previous leaders are available to help new leaders begin their year and may be called upon during the year as a consultant. Reading material is also available and helpful.

The Brownie troop consists of girls from 2nd and 3rd grades. Brownies meet in a group and learn the basics of Girl Scouting. They learn to work and play with others and prepare for the junior level.

Juniors are girls from 4th, 5th and 6th grades. They work in small patrols, elect their officers and leaders and plan their programs with the assistance of the adult leader. Badge work begins at this level and can be worked on individually, in patrols, or as a troop, depending on the special interest of each girl.

Cadettes are girls from 7th, 8th and 9th grades. These girls are ready for more advanced activities and projects. They may make long range plans and carry them out with limited supervision.

Senior Scouts are girls from 10th, 11th and 12th grades. These girls do not work with a leader but with an advisor, and work and plan activities at a more adult level. While there is not an organized senior troop at this time, one can be set up if enough girls are interested.

Girl Scouts are sponsored by the Kewaskum Woman's club. Leaders need not have a girl in

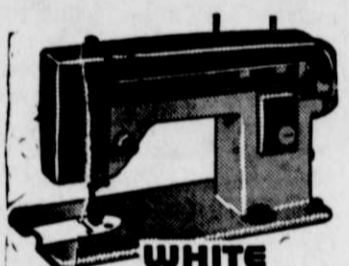

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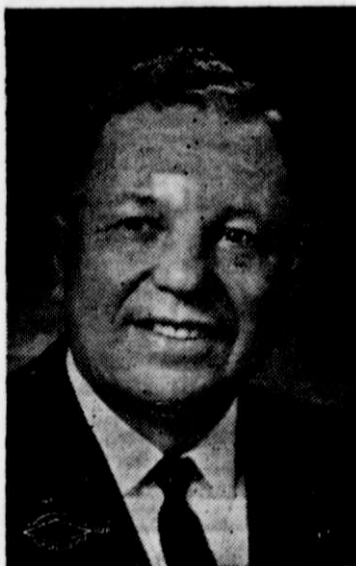



Facsimile Ballot Notice Of September Primary Election

September 10, 1968

OFFICE OF WASHINGTON COUNTY CLERK

TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY

Notice is hereby given of a September Primary election to be held in the several precincts in the County of Washington, on the 10th day of September, 1968, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a partisan primary, the elector shall select the party ballot of the candidate's name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

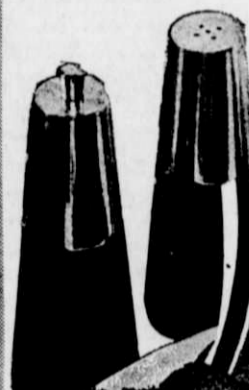
