## Schroeder, Boltz Are Nominated in County; Only 192 Votes Cast Here

Assemblyman Fred Schroeder and Coroner Robert Boltz were nominated in the only county level contests Tuesday as Washington county residents turned in a light total vote of 6,486 ballots. Only 192 ballots, or about one-fourth of the potential, were cast in the village of Kewaskum.

The county vote followed the state pattern with only a small fraction, possibly 30 per cent in the county casting ballots. The contests for state assembly and coroner generated the most interest locally. Schroeder, candidate for his third term in the assembly, showed much strength, carrying every precinct in the county except one. Unofficial returns gave Schroeder 3,231 votes compared to 1,171 for L. Donald Riley of Hartford and 259 for Charles E. Dickenson of Colgate. Coroner Boltz readily defeated his GOP opponent, Richard A. Burg of Slinger, by a vote of 2,761 to 1,765.

State-wide, candidates who were nominated and will oppose each other in the November election are: Governor—Warren P. Knowles (R) and Bronson C. La Follette (D); lieutenant governor—Jack B. Olson (R) and Taylor Benson (D); secretary of state—Robert C. Zimmerman (R) and Darryl D. Hanson (D); state treasurer—Harold W. Clemens (R) and Charles P. Smith (D); attorney general—Robert W. Warren (R) and Richard D. Cudahy (D); U. S. senator—Jerris Leonard (R) and Gaylord Nelson (D). Opponents for representative for congress, sixth district will be William A. Steiger (R) and John A. Race (D).

Complete unofficial totals for the county slate candidates follows:

## Fr. Ralph Fellenz To Be Ordained, Read First Mass

### MASS SET AT ST. MICHAELS SUNDAY

Rev. Ralph Fellenz, O.F.M. Capuchin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Fellenz, R. 1, Kewaskum, will be ordained to the priesthood by the Most Rev. Frederick W. Freking, bishop of La Crosse, on Friday, Sept. 13. The ordination ceremony will take place in St. Mary's church, Marathon, Wis., at 9 a. m.

Father Fellenz graduated from St. Michael's Parochial school, St. Michaels, in 1956. The next fall he entered St. Francis seminary, Milwaukee, to study for the priesthood. He entered the Capuchin Order in 1961.

He received his college degree from the Capuchin seminary of St. Mary, Crown Point, Ind. in 1965, and for the past three years he has been studying theology at the Capuchin seminary of St. Anthony at Marathon.

Father Fellenz will offer his First Solemn Mass at St. Michael's church, St. Michaels, on Sunday, Sept. 15, at 11 a. m. It will be a Concelebrated Mass (Mass celebrated simultaneously by a group of priests). Fr. Richard V. Fellenz, his brother, and Fr. Adrian Staehler, O.F.M. Capuchin, will concelebrate the Mass with the newly ordained priest. Fr. Ignatius Staskunas, pastor of St. Michael's parish, will be deacon and Dennis Van Beek, a student at St. Francis seminary, Milwaukee, will be sub-deacon. Fr. Myles Matenaer, O.F.M. Capuchin, of West Bend, will be chantor and commentator.

Following the mass, dinner will be served for family and relatives in the parish hall. There will be Solemn Benediction at 2:45 p. m., followed by a reception for the public in the parish hall.

After a short visit with his family, Father Fellenz will return to the Capuchin seminary of St. Anthony to finish his last year of the theology.

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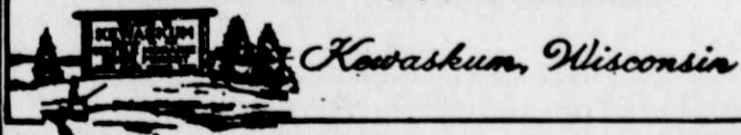

### Milwaukee River Survey Group in County Meets

The team captains of the Milwaukee River Survey group in Washington county met last week to review progress. This survey of the river starts from the Fond du Lac county line to Newburg, on both the east and the west branch.

Some of the things which the teams have found are dumps a-

long the river, where the debris was falling into the river, including tin cans, tires, etc. They reported finding one overstuffed chair and a mattress lying half-submerged in the water, and every other kind of debris that can be imagined.

Some of the team captains were most concerned about the industrial waste that is being dumped into the river, and feel this sort of thing should be stopped immediately. They reported areas where cows were allowed to walk down the river bank and into the water, and making it most undesirable for any use thereafter.

Oliver Fick, general chairman of the Milwaukee River Restoration Council, reported on the overall program, and some of the things that had been found in the river during the survey in Ozaukee county.

Two committees were appointed to study future action on private sewers dumping into the river, and to investigate the clean-up of physical debris. Actual problem areas will be charted on USGS maps and owners identified. The committees will attempt to

encourage people to be aware of the problem along the river, and to solicit assistance from those landowners and others to do everything they can to improve their part of the river.

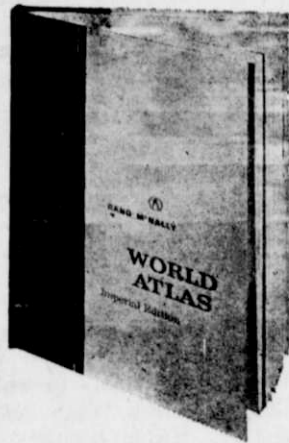

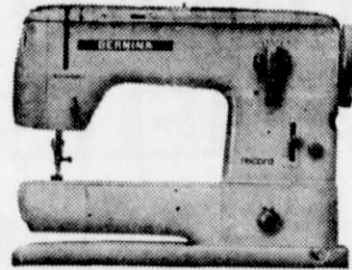
**WAYNE CRUSADERS**

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### Horicon Shades Indians in Last 1 1/2 Minutes, 13-7

In their opening non-conference football game of the season at Horicon Friday night, the Kewaskum Indians gave the Marshmen of the Little Ten loop a hard scrap before finally bowing in the closing minutes, 13-7.

In fact Kewaskum deserved to win but the Indians gave Horicon a gift victory. Both of the Marshmen's touchdowns were scored on breaks which resulted from Kewaskum mistakes. The Indians had possession of the ball most of the time, especially in the second half, but it seemed every time they got in good field position they lost the ball on fumbles, an interception or poor kick.

The first two quarters were dominated by the defense and the half ended 0-0, although the Indians failed to cash in on one good scoring opportunity. Horicon's first break came early in the third period when Kewaskum fumbled on its own 10 yard line. The Marshmen immediately took advantage of it when Tom Heide-man scored from a yard out. The try for extra point was no good and Horicon led, 6-0.

Steve Stern of the Indians ran back a blocked Horicon punt for 59 yards and a touchdown early in the last quarter. Chuck Theusch ran over the extra point to put Kewaskum ahead, 7-6. Kewaskum tried an on-side kick that didn't work but this score stood up and it appeared the Indians were on

their way to victory until the final minute and 33 seconds when, following a poor punt that gave the Marshmen good scoring position, Mark Pitzian hurled a pass of 22 yards to chalk up the Horicon win.

Horicon racked up 223 yards from scrimmage and Kewaskum 133, with the Indians having better success on the ground. Horicon made 9 first downs to Kewaskum's 7. The Marshmen completed 8 of 14 passes, while the Indians could connect on only 4 out of 15. The Indians had the ball for 68 plays and Horicon for 62.

After the Marshmen scored their winning TD with less than a minute and a half to play, the Indians still started another drive which was stopped when Fink intercepted a pass with 37 seconds left. Horicon then ran out the clock.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians open Scenic Moraine conference play by hosting Random Lake at 7:30 p. m. The Rams are rebuild-

ing and are not expected to be a contender this year. Grafton, Pewaukee and North Fondy are the teams pegged by coaches to dominate the conference race.

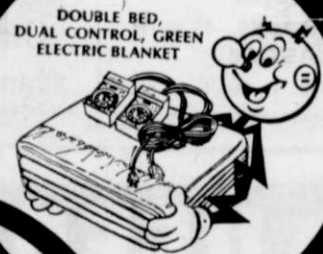
In the senior flight, Al Hron copped the championship by beating Ray Smith in the finals, 3-2.

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
