

The opening meeting of the Officially Opened Kewaskum Woman's club was held Saturday, Sept. 14, with Miss the Catholic Relief Service.

The Vietnamese are open, simple people who want to learn. on Monday and Friday evenings. fee. They are a very primitive society The telephone number is 338-8011. with a barter system for trading and only the barest necessities of on posts, with the fire wood beneath. A fire is maintained in the hut and the smoke keeps the mosquitoes away. This is a high malaria area.

Most of the people are illiterate, having a maximum of four years' schooling. The women cut firewood and carry water to store during the six month wet season. Temperature ranges from 70-80 degrees the major part of the year with one hot month, in the 90's, and one cold month in the 40's. There is no soap available, but the people keep their bodies clean. Clothing is not washed very often.

The Vietnamese people mature very slowly and rarely marry before their early twenties. Boys live in a large hut called the common house from puberty to marriage, to maintain a high moral standard.

Miss Blonien worked in a small hospital complex with only a minimum of equipment. Help from the army was available when needed. Dr. Pat Smith, noted woman physician, a few nurses and local people staffed the complex. Much sickness, dysentery, malnu trition, growths, malaria were ever present. 75% of the people died between birth and marrying age
