## Kewaskum Has Large Enrollment of 32 Students at UW County Campus

### Total Enrollment Of 387 Exceeds All Predictions by 50%

99 HIGH SCHOOLS, 15 STATES, 5 COUNTRIES REPRESENTED

Where did they all come from? University officials and students alike at The University of Wisconsin, Washington County campus, were astounded last Friday when registration figures revealed that enrollment exceeded all predictions by more than 50%. A total of 387 persons, approximately 156 part-time, 231 full-time, registered for 46 different courses being offered at the university this semester. It was originally estimated by the Coordinating Committees for Higher Education that the campus would open its doors with 250 students. The unexpected large enrollment necessitated the addition of new faculty members, bringing the total to 24, 15 full-time, 9 part-time.

A total of 99 different high schools from five different countries and 15 different states in the United States are represented on the campus. In addition to the United States, students have graduated from high schools in Korea, Hungary, Mexico, and Yugoslavia. In the United States students represent the states of Alabama, California, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Washington, and Wisconsin. Students who graduated from high school this past spring represent 30 different high schools both in and out of state. Many students date their high school graduations back to the 30's, 40's, and 50's; one student graduated in 1915.

The largest number of students, 144, or 37% of the total enrollment, are graduates of West Bend High school. Next largest enrollments are from Kewaskum and Hartford high schools with 32 and 31 students, respectively. Other schools with large representations are Germantown 21, Slinger 16, Cedarburg 9. Of particular interest is the surprisingly large number of students from the Milwaukee area — 22 different high schools and 36 students.

Registration has now been completed. However, students may still register this week for band, chorus, orchestra, and speech 100 (Theatre Laboratory).

## Bids for Expanded Water Facilities Opened by Board

At the regular monthly meeting of the village board Monday evening Sept. 9, bids for expanded water facilities were opened. The project includes a ground level reservoir, a fire pump and enclosure for Regal Ware's new office complex; an additional gas driven booster pump in the existing pumping station on Tower st. and needed electrical work. Bid recommendations will be given the board.

The purchase of gates and a steel fence to encircle the village sewage treatment plant was authorized by board members. The purchase will be made from the U. S. Steel Corp. at a cost of \$2.72 per foot.

The contract for bringing the extended portion of Tower st. to grade level was awarded to Harold E. Mueller Excavating Co. of R. 2, Campbellsport. The project includes removing approximately 1,200 yards of earth.

Members of the board will view an area near Regal Ware in regard to sidewalk replacement. There was also a discussion on the possibility of abandoning some unused alleys. No action was taken by the board.

The board reviewed a sewage assessment charged against Ramthun Hardware, Kewaskum, for the fourth quarter of 1967 and members agreed to reduce the charge by 50 per cent. Assessment is calculated on the basis of water consumption and it was felt the water meter was inaccurate at the time.

## Honeck Delegate At National Legion Session

R. KOHN ALSO ATTENDS, STEALS THE PUBLICITY

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Honeck returned home from New Orleans, La. where the former was a delegate of the second district of Wisconsin at the national convention of the American Legion held from Sept. 6-12. Ralph Kohn of Milwaukee, a former Kewaskum resident, and a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of Kewaskum and his wife Gladys, also attended the sessions. Honeck and Kohn rarely miss a national convention.

Lee reports a very successful and enjoyable convention. He said it was the first time that President Lyndon B. Johnson and all three presidential candidates, Hubert H. Humphrey, Richard M. Nixon and George C. Wallace, all appeared and spoke at the convention. Lee reported that he was especially impressed by President Johnson's speech. When asked how the presidential candidates rated among the southerners and Legionnaires, Honeck stated they seemed to give Nixon the edge over Humphrey and that Wallace was not too popular in the South.

Out of the fifty thousand Legionnaires attending the convention, Kewaskum Legionnaire Ralph Kohn stole the publicity show. A large, close-up picture of Ralph eating a hot dog which he had purchased from a vendor on Bourbon st., appeared in the Thursday, Sept. 12, issue of the daily newspaper, the New Orleans Times-Picayune. Ralph was just set for his first big bite when the photographer snapped. Lee could also have been on the picture but he shied away from the camera when he questioned the purpose the photo would be used for. He was surprised to see Ralph's picture spread out in section one of the paper the next morning.

The roving reporter and photographer were interviewing merry-making Legionnaires at night on Bourbon st. and in the French Quarter on the streets, and in the famous night clubs and restaurants. The Honecks and Kohns just happened along at the time. Kohn was one of many Legionnaires from states all over the country interviewed.

After interviewing three delegates from Illinois dressed in formal attire who dined and visited a string of French Quarter night clubs, the reporter quoted them in the Times-Picayune as follows: "This French Quarter of yours is unique. It is dark and sometimes dingy but full of interesting entertainment. We'll be back for more of the same." Next the reporter came upon the Honecks and Kohns and the paper came out with this to say about Ralph:

"Ralph Kohn of Kewaskum, Wis. was less formally attired (tie and short sleeve shirt) and ate less elegant food. 'Great carnival town,' he said as he prepared to bite into a hot dog just bought from the familiar Bourbon st. push cart vendors. Kris Koerble, 9, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Koerble, 528 Habeck st., suffered a bruised right knee when the bicycle she was riding was struck by a car driven by Jack L. Rindt, 17, of R. 2, Kewaskum, at 4 p. m. Monday on Riverview dr. about 35 feet north of Main st., according to local police.

Rindt reported that he was southbound on Riverview dr. and as he neared the intersection with Main st. the girl on the bike rode out of the Herriges Oil Co. gas station driveway into the path of his car, which she apparently failed to see approaching. The bicycle was struck by the right front of the auto. The Koerble girl was treated by a local physician.

INCLUDES TROUT FISHING, TRAP AND ARCHERY RANGES

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its 16th annual Live Turkey Shoot on Sunday, Sept. 22, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, six miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

The Turkey Shoot is handled as follows: Large live turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

A live trout fishing contest is another attraction. It offers fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps all the fish he catches. An extra prize is offered for the largest fish.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns and ammunition. An archery target range and marksmanship contests have been added. Here's an opportunity for Robinhood admirers to test their skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

The following day the A4's once again hit enemy bridges, putting three out of commission.



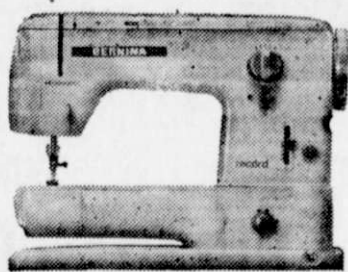

### 'American Nurse in Vietnam' Topic at Woman's Club Meet

The opening meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club was held Saturday, Sept. 14, with Miss Joan Blonien as guest speaker. Miss Blonien, who has spent eight years nursing in Vietnam, described the way of life in that country and showed slides. She was sent to Vietnam under the auspices of the Catholic Relief Service.

The Vietnamese are open, simple people who want to learn. They are a very primitive society with a barter system for trading and only the barest necessities of life. Their home consists of a hut raised a few feet off the ground on posts, with the fire wood beneath. A fire is maintained in the hut and the smoke keeps the mosquitoes away. This is a high malaria area.

Most of the people are illiterate, having a maximum of four years' schooling. The women cut firewood and carry water to store during the six month wet season. Temperature ranges from 70-80 degrees the major part of the year with one hot month, in the 90's, and one cold month in the 40's. There is no soap available, but the people keep their bodies clean. Clothing is not washed very often.

The Vietnamese people mature very slowly and rarely marry before their early twenties. Boys live in a large hut called the common house from puberty to marriage, to maintain a high moral standard.

Miss Blonien worked in a small hospital complex with only a minimum of equipment. Help from the army was available when needed. Dr. Pat Smith, noted woman physician, a few nurses and local people staffed the complex. Much sickness, dysentery, malnutrition, growths, malaria were ever present. 75% of the people died between birth and marrying age.

The business meeting conducted by President Mrs. O. E. Behnke stressed areas of work for the 1968-69 club year. The General Federation of Women's Clubs theme will be "Individual Involvement," how women may become involved beyond the home, to the community and state affairs. Mrs. Walter Bade was appointed representative to serve on the Senior Citizens board. Table collection was designated for the Salvation Army.

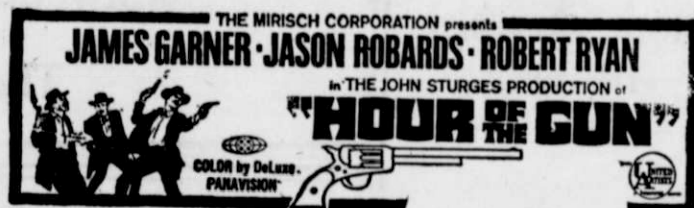

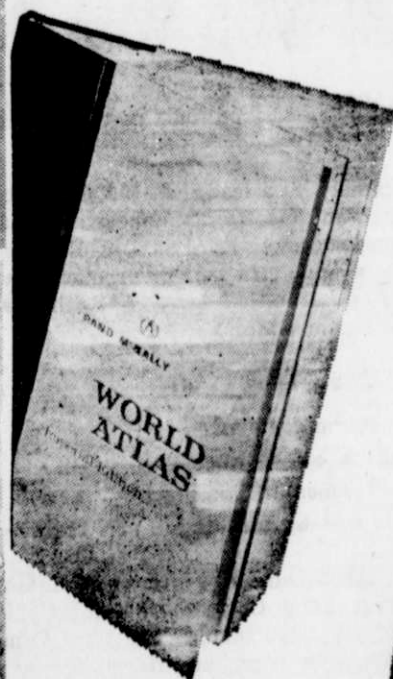

## Indians Scalp Random Lake In Opener, 19-0

**DEFENSE HOLDS RAMS TO 4 YARDS, 1 FIRST DOWN**

It was strictly no contest as the Kewaskum Indians romped over Random Lake in the Scenic Moraine conference opener here Friday night, 19-0.

The small Rams showed very little on offense as the huge Kewaskum line and stout defense held them to a mere four yards rushing, only one first down and this came on a penalty, and they failed to complete a single pass. Quite the opposite of the Indian offense which gained 321 yards, 295 yards by rushing and 26 passing, made 6 first downs and completed 2 of 6 passes.

At times, though, during defensive lapses, the Rams broke through the big Kewaskum offensive line to throw Quarterback Perry Koth. Some of the Indian linemen and their weights include John Reysen 245, Steve Schaefer 215, Dan Marx 210, Russ Gavin 205, Leon Schultz 185, Larry Bunkelman 185, Lee Theusch 185, Brian Sekeres 190, Bill Butz 185. Kewaskum also has a 190 pound end in Mark Eichstedt, 180 pound end Steve Stern and 175 pound end Tony Butschlick. Injured 205 pound fullback Mike Gutjahr didn't even get in the game due to an injury.

After a scoreless first quarter much of which was spent in exchanging punts as the defenses held, the Indians got on the scoreboard in the second period to lead 6-0 at halftime. Kewaskum added another TD in the third quarter and the final one in the last stanza to win, 19-0.

The Indians' first touchdown was set up when Leo Gundrum recovered a Random Lake fumble on the Rams' 36 yard line. A couple of plays later Koth, on a quarterback roll-out, took the ball in from the 23 yard line. The pass

for extra point failed. Kewaskum had an excellent scoring opportunity in the second quarter following a 50 yard punt return but the drive was stopped on a fumble recovered by the Rams.

In the third quarter the Rams kicked off. Five plays later the Indians scored after a 60 yard march. The TD was scored by Chuck Theusch on a one yard plunge. The big play in the drive was a 40 yard run by Jerry Engeleiter. Again the try for extra point failed and the score remained 12-0.

Chuck Muckerheide scored the final TD in the last period on a 20 yard run right up the middle which completely fooled the Random Lake defense. He shook off a couple of tacklers to get into the end zone. Muckerheide did an excellent job running and blocking as he filled in for injured Mike Gutjahr, which might have earned him a starting berth. Engeleiter ran for the extra point to bring the count to 19-0.

After this touchdown, substitutes took over for the rest of the game. Coach Joe Harlow praised his defense for doing an outstanding job as well as his offensive line for a fine job of blocking. On defense he singled out Russ Gavin, who made 11 tackles; Leon Schultz and Bob Fellenz, who recovered fumbles and returned an intercepted pass 30 yards, and Leo Gundrum, who intercepted a pass and recovered a fumble.

Engeleiter was the leading runner with 119 yards on 11 carries. He had runs of 40 and 33 yards and also had an 18 yard run called back.

Today (Friday) the Indians play an afternoon game at 4 p. m. on Pewaukee's new field. The Pirates will give Kewaskum a stiff test and this game should provide some idea of how strong the Indians rate this year. Pewaukee held title last week before losing in the closing minutes.
