Elect Seefeldt Chairman of Co. Park Commission

Alfred H. Seefeldt, R. 1, Kewaskum, clerk of the town of Kewaskum, and veteran member of the county park commission, was elected chairman of the commission at its regular meeting last Thursday evening at the courthouse in West Bend.

Seefeldt succeeds Dr. C. M. Herman of Allenton who recently resigned. Seefeldt will fill the unexpired term of Dr. Herman which ends July 1, 1969. The chairman normally served for one year.

A new member of the commission, Lee Fickler of rural Kewaskum, also took his seat on the commission at last week's meeting. He was named to the commission at the last county board session.

County Receives \$801,182.49 Share Of State Taxes

State Assemblyman Frederick Schroeder (R—West Bend) today announced that Washington county has received \$801,182.49 as its share of over \$51,000,000 sent to the municipalities and counties in Wisconsin by State Treasurer Harold Clemens.

The payment represents the second of three to be sent to Washington county as its share of the state corporate and individual income taxes, according to Assemblyman Schroeder.

One additional check is still due. It will be mailed to the municipalities and counties on Nov. 30 to complete the total income tax payment for this year.

Car Rolls Over, Deer Killed in Accidents

An auto driven by Suzanne M. Strachota, 23, of St. Kilian rd., R. 3, Campbellsport, was badly damaged in an accident on Hwy. 28 near the intersection with Hwy. 45 at the north village limits at 5:50 p. m. Wednesday. Local police reported that Miss Strachota turned west onto Hwy. 28 from Hwy. 45 and due to the road being slick by heavy rain she lost control of her vehicle, which left the highway on the left side, knocked down a highway marker, went through a fence on the Nick Stoffel farm and rolled over onto its top. The car came to rest about 300 yards west of the intersection. The driver escaped injury.

An eight point buck deer was killed at 10:56 p. m. Sunday when it crossed Hwy. 45 about 1 1/2 miles south of Kewaskum in front of a car driven by Ned Sengpiel, 53 Kewaskum, who was northbound. The animal crossed the highway from west to east. Sengpiel said he could not avoid hitting the deer.

Colorama Bus, Air Tours of County Planned

The Washington County Beautification Council has again planned COLORAMA tours for October, for the public to see areas of Washington county.

Two guided bus tours — one in the northern part of the county, and one in the southern part, are planned for Saturday afternoon, Oct. 19. The buses will leave from and return to the courthouse annex (old courthouses), 320 Fifth ave., West Bend. All who wish to participate may report to the bus promptly at 1:00 p. m. 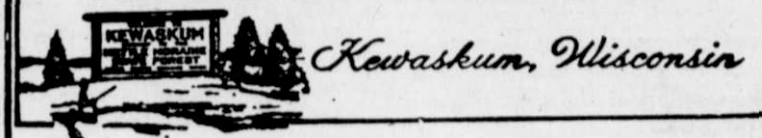

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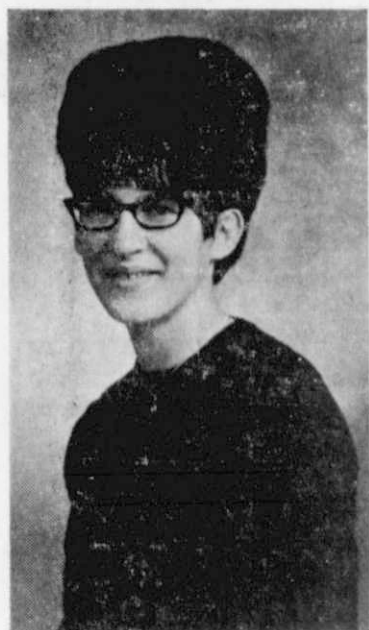

Red Cross Unit Sends 200 Ditty Bags to Vietnam

Mrs. Elmer Eisenman, production chairman, reports that among the 650,000 ditty bags to be sent to Vietnam by the American Red Cross, to be distributed at Christmas time, 200 will bring cheer to servicemen from the West Bend chapter.

The local quota was shipped to the Field Director — American Red Cross, Headquarters 1st Infantry Division, APO San Francisco 96345. Ten boxes each containing 20 Christmas green ditty bags were shipped by parcel post.

Each ditty bag contains a diary-type calendar, deck of cards, cigarette case, five small kitchen size plastic bags, package of writing paper with pencil and self-seal envelope, small 1½ ounce vacuum packed candy and peanuts, six wash and dries and a holiday greeting card.

Since the shipments will be handled a number of times under

extremely difficult conditions before ultimate disposition is affected, it was requested that packing directions be followed accurately.

The ten corrugated cartons, 275 lb. test stock, were donated by Badger Packaging Corporation, R. 2, Kewaskum. Delivery of the filled cartons to the post office was made through the courtesy of Ted Lauck Chevrolet Co. Each weighed 47 pounds.

Other donations included 200 paper pads — 6½ x 9½ with envelopes by the Washington County Publishing Company. The following business firms gave substantial discounts on merchandise purchased from them: Sentry Foods, Walter Wiedmeyer Candy Distributor, Leys Department Store, Seelman & Sons, Milwaukee, and Schultz Variety Store.

HOST GERMANTOWN AT HOMECOMING SATURDAY

Costly mistakes and penalties again were a big factor in the Kewaskum Indians' 21-6 loss at North Fondy Friday night. The win was the third straight for the unbeaten Orioles, who are tied for first place with Grafton. The tie will be broken when these two teams clash head-on this Friday.

The Indians moved the ball well and played North Fondy on pretty even terms in the first half. They led, 6-2, for a time before falling behind by a slim 8-6 margin at halftime. But mental errors, poor snaps from center to the kicker and frequent penalties kept them in the hole in the second half and gave the Orioles good field position.

North Fondy's sharp defense was a strong point in deciding the fracas. Don Doering, a defensive end, made the first big play for the Orioles. He caught Indian quarterback Perry Koth in the end zone for a first quarter safety and North Fondy went on from there to score once in each of the last three quarters.

Following the safety, Kewaskum took a 6-2 lead in the initial quarter when Jerry Engeleiter burst 41 yards up the middle for the Indians' only score.

In the second period Quarterback Joe Dumbaskas of the Orioles, who made his four completions count for 128 yards, passed to Chuck Cruz for 36 yards and a touchdown which made it 8-6 at the intermission.

In the third quarter Dumbaskas came back with a 32-yard strike to Steve Jaeger which gave the Orioles a 14-6 advantage. After working a quarterback sneak for 39 yards in the fourth quarter, Dumbaskas tried the same play for one yard and a TD and the extra point brought it to 21-6. Dumbaskas finished as the Orioles' top runner with 58 yards in four carries.

This week it's homecoming at KHS and the Indians will host Germantown in a Saturday afternoon game at 2 o'clock. (See front page item on homecoming details). Kewaskum and Germantown have identical 1-2 records and the two should be well matched.

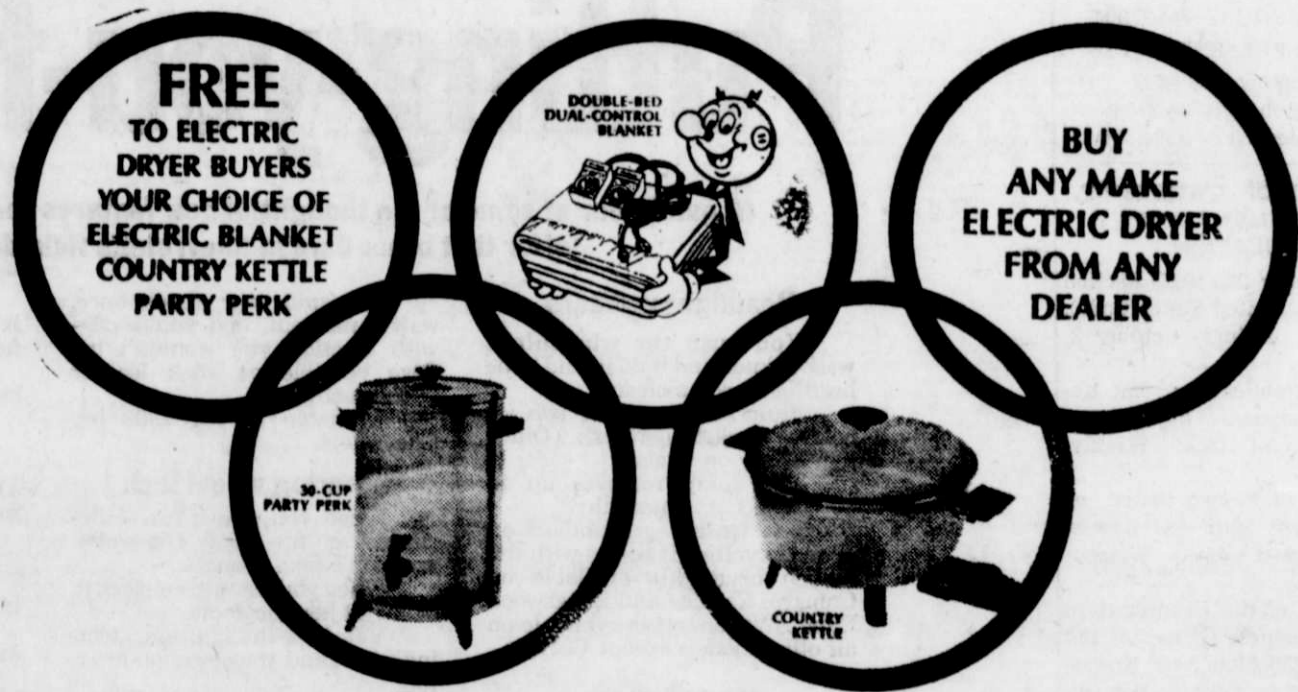
