Barn Destroyed, Grain, Machinery Lost in Blaze

FIRE DEPT. ANSWERS TWO OTHER CALLS PAST WEEK

A small hay barn and combination shed was totally destroyed and an amount of grain and farm machinery lost in a fire at the Ray Schmidt home on Hwy. 28, two miles west of Kewaskum, Saturday. Kewaskum firemen were summoned several minutes before noon.

The barn was owned by Joe Karl of R. 2, Kewaskum, and the Schmidt family occupies the home on the farm. An amount of certified oats stored in the barn and a wagon owned by Loran Backhaus, Sr. of R. 2, Kewaskum, were lost in the blaze, together with a heater, equipment and tools owned by Schmidt.

Nineteen firemen responded to the call and some of them remained at the scene as long as three hours keeping the blaze under control and protecting other buildings from catching fire. There was a brisk wind blowing at the time. There was no chance of saving the building. Cause of the blaze was not determined.

Kewaskum firemen were also called out at 9:10 p. m. last Thursday when automatic controls on a 40-horsepower motor that operates the well in village pumping station No. 1 on Tower st. went out of control. Firemen were summoned when residents of the neighborhood reported smoke coming from doors and windows of the pumping station.

The motor burned out and workmen Friday morning were attempting to re-wind the motor or replace it if necessary. While operating on only one well, homes and business places experienced low water pressure.

The third call over the weekend for the fire department was at 12:50 a. m. Sunday when a car driven by David J. Hirst, 19, of 5411 N. Kent ave., Whitefish Bay, caught fire after it left the road and struck a tree on Hwy. 28 about 2½ miles west of Kewaskum. Firemen extinguished the blaze but the entire front end of the auto was burned. Hirst was injured in the crash. See details in the accident item in another column on this page.

Child Has Foot Wedged in Pipe

Joan Jung, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Jung, 631 Highland st., Kewaskum, had her foot become wedged in an uncovered five-inch water main when she stepped knee-deep into the pipe in front of her home early Friday afternoon.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl was called and he, with the assistance of William Martin, assistant fire chief, and a neighbor, Donald Ritger, of 612 Highland st., worked for a half hour to free the child. Most other members of the fire department rescue squad were out on a barn fire call at the time. Pledl said that the cast iron pipe is surrounded by concrete and it was necessary to first break the pipe and concrete piece by piece in such a way that portions of the concrete did not fall back into the opening.

After the pipe was opened enough to free the sobbing child's foot, she was able to walk home by herself. It was not known how come the main was uncovered.

Increase in Parcel Post Rates Oct. 19

Postmaster Harry E. Koch reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday, Oct. 19.

The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post. Postmaster Koch pointed out.

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law, Postmaster Koch explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail on a break-even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

2 Local Youths Seriously Hurt In Auto Crash

CAR DEMOLISHED, ONE OTHER YOUTH INJURED

Three Kewaskum teen-agers were injured, two of them seriously, in a two vehicle crash at the intersection of Hwy. 45 and County Trunk Hwy. D, several miles south of Kewaskum, near Light-house Lanes, at 10:23 p. m. Saturday.

According to authorities, the crash occurred when a car eastbound on CTH D driven by James W. Manthei, 18, 306 Third st., apparently failed to stop for the Hwy. 45 intersection and collided with a vehicle northbound on Hwy. 45 driven by Gary J. Woolman, 18, 1185 Hillside dr. The Woolman auto, a light compact car, was demolished. The front end of the Manthei auto was extensively damaged.

Seriously injured in the crash were Woolman, who reportedly suffered internal injuries, and a passenger in his car, Mary Butzke, 16, 1245 Roseland dr., who suffered a possible neck injury, contusions of both legs, fractured right collar bone and facial lacerations. Both were reported thrown from the car. Also hurt was David Milewski, 18, Kewaskum, a passenger in the Manthei car, who incurred lacerations of the forehead and face. Manthei and two other passengers in his car escaped injury.

Woolman and Miss Butzke were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where they were still confined and their condition was reported as fair earlier this week.

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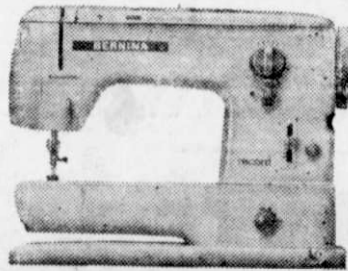

Stubborn Indians Lose to Grafton's Leaders, 14 to 0

UNBEATEN BLACKHAWKS GIVEN TOUGHEST GAME

Grafton's undefeated Scenic Moraine conference leader ran their string to five straight but had their toughest game of the season here Friday night before emerging with a hard-fought 14-0 victory over a stubborn improved Kewaskum Indians team.

The Indian defensive team played another outstanding game but the sputtering offensive unit gave up the ball on penalties, interceptions and fumbles. Kewaskum's strong defense held Grafton to only four first downs and 69 yards rushing, their lowest totals of the season.

In the very first quarter, the first time the Indians had the ball, a high pass from center slipped through the quarterback's fingers and he didn't get the punt off. Grafton took over and immediately took advantage of the break by scoring on a 36 yard pass play from quarterback Mark Cebulski to Mike Woods. Bruce Baertling converted the extra point to make it 7-0.

Grafton's second touchdown in the second period also resulted from a break when Chuck Muckerheide fumbled on his own 35 yard line. The Blackhaws recovered and Cebulski fired a 26 yard pass to Kenny Kurtz to the 10 yard line. Three plays later Kurtz ran the ball over the 6 yard line. Baertling again kicked the extra point which made it 14-0 and ended the scoring for the night.

Kewaskum had a good scoring opportunity in the second quarter after Ron Theusch intercepted a pass on about the 50 yard line and took it to the Grafton 20. Two plays later quarterback Mike Doherty passed to Perry Koth but the ball just slipped off of his fingertips and Grafton intercepted.

In the second half the Indian defensive unit took over and forced Grafton to punt seven times, several of them from deep in their own territory. The Blackhaws just couldn't move the ball against the stalwart defense in the second half but it was too late.

The Indians had another scoring opportunity in the fourth period when Grafton was forced to punt from their own end zone. Koth returned the kick to Grafton's 35 and the Indians moved the ball to the Blackhaws' 15 before Koth fumbled on first down. Koth's booming punts kept Grafton in the hole.

The Kewaskum defense held Carl Peschel, leading scorer and leading ground gainer in the conference without a touchdown and to only 46 yards in 15 carries. Grafton completed only 5 passes out of 23 attempts. The Indians had good pass coverage except for that one TD play in the first half. They also had a good rush on the passer. This speaks very well for itself considering Kewaskum was playing the undefeated

conference leaders. Jerry Engleiter was the leading ground gainer with the Indians yards in 12 carries. The Indians weakness was in their passing game, completing only 4 for 14.

On defense big 245 pound John Reysen did a bang-up job as did Ron Theusch, who filled in for the injured Jeff Schleif. Guard Leon Schultz did commendable work in rushing the passer.

In other contests last weekend, North Fondy edged Campbellsport, 7-0, over Random Lake won its first game over Germantown, 14-6, and Slinger won its fourth straight by blasting Pewaukee, 32-12.

Tonight (Friday) at 7:30 o'clock The Bells have won only one game but have been doing well lately, losing only 7-0 to North Fondy last week. The Bells are led by 220 lb. fullback Dennis Krueger and sophomore star Tom Breitzman, 6-1, who caught six passes against the Orioles. Kewaskum closes its season at home against strong Slinger next Friday night. Other games this weekend are Random Lake at Pewaukee and Slinger at North Fondy Friday and Germantown at Grafton Saturday. The Indians need a win at Campbellsport in an effort to gain third place in the conference.
