Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1,10 under present counts for more than 80 per cent Woolman auto, a light compact of all parcel post, Postmaster car, was demolished. The front Koch pointed out.

most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law, Postmaster Koch explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail on a breakeven basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.
