B. R. Nelthorpe, 37, President of Local Bank, Dies

STRICKEN AT HOME EARLY LAST SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Burns R. Nelthorpe, 37, prominent Kewaskum resident, president of the Bank of Kewaskum for the past three years, passed away unexpectedly early Sunday afternoon, Oct. 20, after being stricken at his home with an apparent heart attack. He was rushed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

Mr. Nelthorpe was born in Milwaukee on July 6, 1931. He was a graduate of Wauwatosa High school and the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Before coming to Kewaskum in 1960 he was with the Milwaukee Company, Milwaukee, an investment firm, for several years.

He was a member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, the Kiwanis club of Kewaskum, the Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion, Delta Upsilon fraternity of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, the Cedar Lake Yacht club, and the Zoological Society of Milwaukee. Mr. Nelthorpe was a past president of the Washington County Bankers' association and was also a member of the board of directors of the West Bend Country club. He served his country overseas during the Korean conflict.

Mr. Nelthorpe married Susan Rosenheimer of Kewaskum at Peace United Church of Christ on July 9, 1955, who survives him together with a son, Burns E., age 10, a daughter, Wendy, age 8, his mother, Mrs. Lucille Nelthorpe, of Milwaukee, two sisters, Mrs. Nadine Prevetti of Oconomowoc and Mrs. Nancy Leven of Wind Lake, Wis., his mother-in-law, Mrs. John Reis of West Bend, his brother-in-law and sister-in-law, John and Jean Schumann of Wauwatosa, nieces, nephews and other relatives. His father, Burns O. Nelthorpe, preceded him in death two years ago and his father-in-law, Maurice W. Rosenheimer died one year ago.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at Peace United Church of Christ with the Rev. Dan Schwalter officiating. Interment was in the Rosenheimer family cemetery at Slinger. Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post No. 384 of Kewaskum conducted military rites at the graveside. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home from 6 to 9 p. m. Tuesday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services on Wednesday.

Campbellsport Youth Killed, 6 Injured in Crash

4 OTHERS LOSE LIVES IN NEARBY WEEKEND CRASHES

A Campbellsport youth was killed early Saturday in a two car collision between Elmora and Campbellsport. The accident occurred at about 1:50 a. m. on County Trunk Hwy. W south of Campbellsport.

Killed in the crash was Dennis Buddenhagen, 18, of 244 Railroad st., Campbellsport, the driver of one of the cars involved in the collision. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac.

Joseph Karoses, 18, of R. 1, Campbellsport, a passenger in the Buddenhagen auto, suffered cuts. Susan Kahut, 20, of R. 6, West Bend, another passenger, incurred a broken leg and back injuries. Sylvester Neis, 25, of 508 E. Main st., Campbellsport, the driver of the other vehicle, suffered head cuts. Three passengers in his car were also injured, suffering cuts. They were Roger Koehler, 18, of R. 3, West Bend; Joan Rohlinger, 20, of 417 Forest st., Campbellsport, and Rosanne Schill, 21, of 257 E. Main st., Campbellsport. All were taken to St. Agnes hospital.

Buddenhagen was the son of Henry and Betty Karoses Buddenhagen. He is survived by his parents, five sisters, Joan and Mary, Fond du Lac, and Jill, Beth and Lisa, all at home; his grandparents, Mrs. Joseph Karoses, Campbellsport, and Mrs. Lilly Buddenhagen, West Bend, and a great-grandfather, Joseph Karoses, Sr., Plymouth.

Funeral services for Buddenhagen, a 1968 graduate of Campbellsport High school, were held at 11 a. m. Tuesday at St. Matthew's church Campbellsport, the Rev. Warren Schmitt officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

Three Grafton young men, Richard Diener, William Erickson and James Schwenner, all 21, and all of whom returned recently from military service, were killed in a single car crash at Grafton, also early Saturday, when their car crashed into a tree. A Hartford youth, Willard F. Christman, 18, was killed early Monday in a single car crash on Hwy. 144 (Kettle Moraine dr.) in Slinger when a car in which he was a passenger went out of control and rolled end over end. The driver of the auto, Roger Puls, 22, Grafton, suffered severe lacerations to the face and neck and possible ankle injuries.

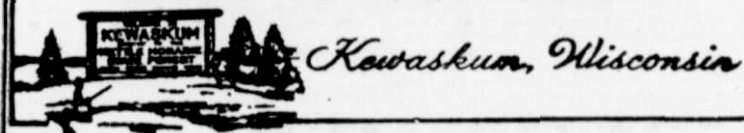

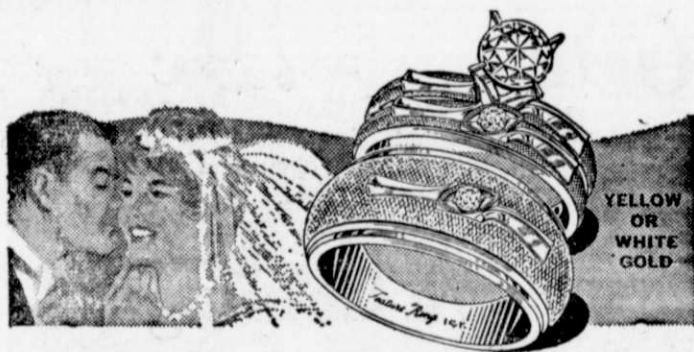

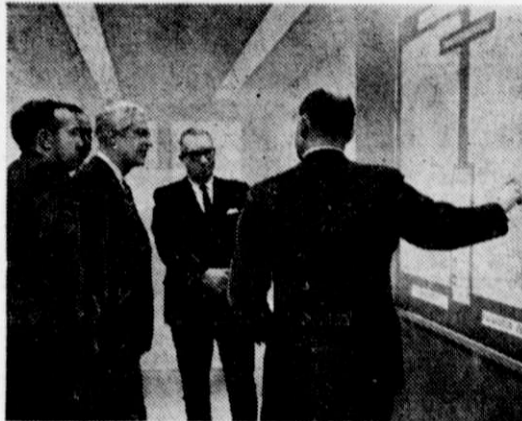

HOST SLINGER IN LAST GAME FRIDAY EVENING

The Kewaskum Indians beat themselves again Friday night at Campbellsport, where they were upset by the Bells, 18-0. Campbellsport had won only one game previously and the victory gained them a tie in the standings with the Indians (2-4).

Two blocked punts deep in their own territory which were recovered by Campbellsport gave the Bells two easy touchdowns and the third was another gift which came about when for some unknown reason receiver Mark Eichstedt touched a punted ball on the ground (instead of catching it or falling on the ball) and the Bells recovered and ran the ball over for a touchdown from Kewaskum's 35 yard line. The Bells also were aided by some questionable calls by the officials.

The Bells scored two touchdowns in the second quarter and one in the third period. All of the tries for extra point failed. Besides the above mentioned TD scored on the punt to Eichstedt, the Bells' first touchdown on a blocked punt came in the second period. Perry Koth's punt from his own end zone was blocked and recovered by Campbellsport on Kewaskum's three yard line. They scored two plays later. The TD resulted after the Bells while they still had the ball got the Indians in the hole on what Coach Harlow protested to the officials was a free first down. the third quarter but penalties again prevented them from scoring. The Bells' third TD in the third quarter was scored when on fourth down Koth had a punt blocked on his own 25 yard line. Dennis Jacak picked up the ball and ran it over. After several minutes of debating the play, the officials allowed the touchdown.

In the fourth period Rammer completed a 32 yard screen pass to Jerry Engeleiter but the play was called back and the Indians penalized.

Offensively Kewaskum dominated the game, making 11 first downs to the Bells 5. Only three of the Bells' first downs were earned. Kewaskum's total yardage was 211 compared to only 129 for Campbellsport. The Indians had 80 more yards called back because of penalties.

Koth stood out both ways. On offense he caught 6 passes for 65 yards and on defense he covered end Tom Breitzman well, limiting him to one reception. Jeff Schleif also played well on defense and Rammer did a good job passing. Chuck Muckerheide made good yardage carrying the ball.

The final game of the season will be played tonight (Friday) with the Indians hosting a strong Slinger team (4-2) at 7:30. This will be parents night. Fourteen seniors will be playing their last game, namely Koth, Engeleiter, Muckerheide, Eichstedt, Bob Feltenz, John Reysen, Dan Marx, Tom Staehler, Schleif, Les Kaschner, Bill Butz, Steve Schaefer, Carl Freehaus and Chuck Theusch. The freshmen team lost their last two games, dropping a 21-7 decision to North Fondy last week and losing to Slinger, 19-0, Tuesday. They wound up with a 2-3-1 record.

The JV's split their last two games, losing to North Fondy, 12-0, and beating Slinger, 6-0, Tuesday. The JV's ended up with a fine 4-1-1 record. The team is comprised of sophomores, plus 6 juniors. The juniors are Syl. Schoofs, David Schaub, Glen Staehler, Clarence Clemme, Greg Arndt and Bob Schuppel.

In other games last weekend Grafton won its 6th straight over Germantown 31-6, Pewaukee trounced Random Lake, 25-7, and North Fondy blanked Slinger, 13-0.
