Gebhard Strobel Killed, 3 Hurt in Crash Near Here

TWO MISHAPS ALSO OCCUR IN VILLAGE

An elderly Milwaukee man who was a native of St. Kilian was killed and three persons were injured in a one-car accident on Hwy. 28 about four miles west of Kewaskum early Monday morning. The traffic fatality was the 20th recorded in Washington county so far this year.

Fatally injured in the crash was Gebhard W. Strobel, 81, of 3244 N. 51st blvd., Milwaukee. He was dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. He reportedly suffered a fatal skull fracture, according to Coroner Robert Boltz of Washington county.

The sheriff's department reported the accident occurred about 12:30 a. m. when a car driven by Marcellus Strobel, 47, of R. 1, Kewaskum, traveling east on Hwy. 28 left the road and struck a tree and overturned when Marcellus apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

Seriously injured were Adolph Bishop, 78, of 4038 N. 25th st., Milwaukee, who incurred a broken hip and head lacerations, and Loretta Bishop, 75, same address, a sister of the victim, who suffered two broken legs and shock. Also injured was Marcellus, whose injuries apparently were not serious. Gebhard Strobel and Mrs. Bishop were removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. The victim and the Bishops all were passengers in Marcellus' vehicle. The latter, it was indicated, is a nephew of the crash victim.

Gebhard Strobel was born at St. Kilian and moved to Milwaukee in 1909. He was former head waiter at the old Kait restaurant in that city. In 1929 he began working for the old Gimbel's department store, retiring in 1949.

Survivors include his son Orlando, a brother, Norbert, Appleton, and two sisters, Mrs. Leo (Bal) Kaas, Kewaskum, and Mrs. Adolph (Loretta) Bishop, Milwaukee; six grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, one daughter-in-law, sisters-in-law, daughters-in-law, nieces, nephews and other relatives.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 10 a. m. in St. Catherine's Catholic church, Milwaukee, with interment in Holy Cross cemetery. Visitation was at the Zwaska Funeral home, Milwaukee, after 4 p. m. Wednesday.

TWO CRASHES IN VILLAGE

In a mishap which occurred at 2:45 a. m. Monday, a car driven by Kaye L. Kannenberg, 19, of 238 S. 15th st., West Bend, struck a car owned by Vernon Butz, which was parked at the curb at his residence on First st. about 30 feet west of Parkview dr. Miss Kannenberg was northbound on Parkview when she made a left turn onto First st. She cut the corner too short and was in the left lane when she struck the Butz vehicle with such force that the front wheel of the parked auto rested between the curb and sidewalk. Barn Destroyed, Cattle Lost in Fire Near Here

A large two-story barn filled with hay, straw and other farm crops, 14 head of livestock and some farm equipment were destroyed in a fire at the Jake Bruessel, Jr. farm on the Ridge rd., about three miles southwest of Kewaskum last Thursday evening.

The farm is owned by Mrs. Loretta Kirchner, who now resides in California. Mr. and Mrs. Bruessel and family are renters and live in the farm house.

Neighbors who saw smoke coming from the barn notified the Bruessels and the Kewaskum fire department was called at 6:15 p. m. When the 29 firemen arrived at the scene the blaze was already out of control. The fire apparently started in the upper area of the building.

Firemen concentrated their efforts on removing livestock and equipment from the barn and with the help of neighbors managed to save several animals, a flock of chickens, two tractors and a 1½ ton truck. The firemen also confined the blaze, keeping it from spreading to other nearby buildings. Freed livestock was driven into a field and the chickens were taken to a neighboring farm. A grain blower, four calves and 10 hogs were reported lost.

No estimate of the damage was available. Cause of the blaze is not known but Fire Chief Armin Oppermann said that it started near the roof where it is reported there were no electrical wires. Firemen remained at the scene until approximately 11 p. m.

Chaplain Wm. Mayer Home From Germany

Fr. William Mayer, formerly of Kewaskum, a chaplain in the U. S. Army, arrived Oct. 17 to spend a two week leave here with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Ours, and other relatives in the area after spending the past four years in Germany. Chaplain Mayer left Thursday for his next assignment at Fort Sill, Okla.

Fr. Mayer has served for the past 12 years as a chaplain in the army. He had served in Germany once before for several years and also in Korea for 13 months.

Fr. Mayer informed the Statesman that he is making plans to observe his 25th year in the priesthood about a month from now, early in December, at Holy Trinity church in Kewaskum.

Another mishap which occurred at about 3:45 p. m. Tuesday at 347 Main st. involved cars driven by Myron L. Ebert, 18, R. 2, Kewaskum, and Donald J. Schrauth, 20, rural Allenton. Local police reported that Ebert was pulling away from the curb in front of Miller Electric. He looked back to see if there was any traffic coming and did not notice the Schrauth auto, which was making a U turn in front of him, in time to avoid striking it. The left front of Ebert's car and right rear fender of the Schrauth vehicle were damaged.

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

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

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Indians Upset Slinger in Last Game, Finish 5th

Playing one of its best games of the season, a fired-up Kewaskum team upset favored Slinger here in the final contest of the season here Friday night, 19-12. The Owls had held third place with a 4-2 record prior to this game. The win boosted the Indians to fifth place in the final standings (3-4). It was also parents' night and parents of the varsity players were introduced between halves.

The stalwart Kewaskum defensive team played solid football all season while the offense sputtered in most games. But Friday the offense equaled the performance of the defense and the combination of the two playing good football was too much for Slinger.

The Indians got off to a bad start when Mark Eichstedt fumbled the opening kickoff and Slinger recovered on the Kewaskum 40 yard line. The Owls drove downfield and scored on an 11 yard run by Glen Konrath. The attempted pass for the extra point failed. Following this opening TD the Indians settled down and held Slinger in check the rest of the way.

They came flying back when Jerry Engeleiter returned the Owls' kickoff to Kewaskum's 41. The Indians then drove 59 yards for a score capped by a 5 yard run for the TD by Engeleiter. The key play in the drive was on a 4th down and 8 situation. Quarterback Lee Rammer (the third one used by the Indians this season) passed to Bob Fellenz for a first down and Engeleiter ran it over on first down. The extra point was good on a pass from Rammer to Ronnie Theusch.

In the 2nd quarter the Owls had 2 reasonable drives going. One was stopped at the Kewaskum 18 by a toughened defense on passes batted down by Perry Koth and Fellenz. Slinger lost the ball on downs. In the 2nd drive Slinger advanced to the Kewaskum 10 but a pass by Mark Monroe was intercepted by Leo Gundrum at the goal line and he brought it out to the 13. Two plays later Engeleiter broke free for a 42 yard run around end to the Owl 39

yard line. Then an option pass from Koth to Ron Theusch covered 18 yards to the Owl 25 and a first down. Rammer completed a 6 yard pass to Koth on the 19 when the half ended, 7-6.

Early in the 3rd quarter Monroe completed a 5 yard pass to Larry Rettler but on a tackle by Perry Koth, his brother Randy Koth stole the ball on Slinger's 35 yard line. Kewaskum drove to the Slinger 1 yard line but on 3 plunges into the line they failed to get into the end zone. The Owls moved the ball out to the 11 and a first down. But on the next play a Monroe pass was intercepted by Steve Stern on the 15 and he carried it in for a TD. The try for extra point on a run failed.

Slinger returned the kickoff to the Indians' 20 yard line and on 4th down and goal to go from the 2, Konrath sliced over for the score. John Bahlitch tried to run over the extra point but was stopped a yard short. This made it 13-12, Kewaskum.

Following the kickoff after the TD, Kewaskum was faced with a 3rd and 8 situation on its own 42. Rammer threw a 10 yard pass to Koth, who broke loose to Slinger's 9 yard line on a 60 yard play. This was the big play of the night. Two plays later Engeleiter scored from the 7. He was hit at least twice but kept driving into the end zone. Rammer completed a pass to Fellenz in the end zone for the extra point but an official said Rammer's knee was on the ground and the score didn't count.

Slinger then had the ball for 3 plays and was forced to punt. Shortly after, Koth was roughed up on a 4th down punt and the Indians kept possession when the Owls were penalized. Instead of punting again Koth, for some reason, tried to run the ball for a first down and didn't make it, giving the Owls possession on Kewaskum's 48. Slinger immediately

completed a pass for 12 yards and a first down. Then on the last play of the game Monroe was chased back to his own 45 but he lofted a pass to Rettler, who took it into the end zone for an apparent touchdown. But there was a flag on the play with the Owls being charged with holding and punching, and the play was called back as the final whistle sounded, giving Kewaskum a 19-12 win.

On defense Stern did a stellar job as he intercepted a pass for a touchdown, recovered an unintentional outside kick and made quite a few good tackles. Perry Koth and Fellenz covered the ends well. Monroe, leading conference passer who usually made 300 yards in the air per game, was held to 6 completions for only 30 yards. Monroe completed only one pass for a one yard loss in the first half.

On offense, Engeleiter gained 94 yards in 14 carries, while Koth had 56 in 10 carries. Koth also caught 4 passes for 64 yards. Ron Theusch caught 2 for 25. Rammer did an outstanding job quarterbacking. Although he was injured twice, he remained in the game. Kewaskum gained 275 yards to Slinger's 155 and the Indians chalked up 15 first downs to 8 for

the losers.

In other final games, Grafton won its 7th straight without a defeat to retain the championship, whipping Campbellsport, 34-7; Pewaukee dumped Germantown, 25-6, and North Fondy blanked Random Lake, 27-0.
