A report from the hospital Thursday indicated that his condition remains very critical.

Krueger was headed east on Elm st. which is a dead end street. Evidently he was on his way to his home which is the last one on the left side of the street. Krueger's car kept moving through the dead end and climbed a 10-foot embankment on which are located Chicago and North Western railway tracks. The auto continued almost to the top of the steep embankment and came to a halt in brush on the embankment almost up to the tracks.


Spoerl Member Of UW Bands


