## Record Vote of 807 Cast in Village; 93 Local High Sen. Nelson Only Democrat Winner

### Schroeder, Humbel Winners in Only County Contests

All Republican candidates for national, state and county offices, except Jerris Leonard, who lost out to Sen. Gaylord Nelson in the contest for U. S. senator from Wisconsin, won over their opponents in Tuesday's General Election.

A record vote of 807 ballots were cast in the village of Kewaskum. This is 35 votes more than the previous record of 772 set in the last presidential election in 1964.

Gov. Warren F. Knowles led a solid slate of Republican candidates for state offices to victory in the election although Knowles' Democrat opponent, Atty. Gen. Bronson LaFollette, did not concede the election until Wednesday morning because of the closeness of the race.

Sen. Gaylord Nelson, incumbent U. S. senator from Wisconsin, was the only Democrat on the ticket to win. He easily defeated the GOP candidate, Jerris Leonard. In the Sixth District Congressional Race, Republican Congressman William A. Steiger handily defeated his Democratic opponent, John A. Race. Steiger was credited with 54 per cent of the total vote in the seven county district or 70,145 votes. Race, whom Steiger defeated in 1966, received 33 per cent of the vote or 43,292 ballots.

In the only contests on the county level Assemblyman Fred C. Schroeder was elected to his third term in the state legislature, defeating his Democratic opponent, Merlin Oeder. 15,173 to 6,362. In the sheriff's race, GOP candidate Paul Humbel won over his Democratic opponent, Hugh Carpenter, 14,720 to 7,166. All other GOP county officers were re-elected without opposition.

Tuesday's vote was also a record breaker in the county with 23,057 ballots cast. As usual in the county and village, Republican strongholds, GOP candidates ran ahead by about almost 2 to 1 margin.

## Adult Recreation Program to Begin At School Nov. 13

The Kewaskum Community schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 13 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne, at the Kewaskum Elementary school gymnasium.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc.

Beginning on Nov. 13 and 14, Wednesdays from 8:00-10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00-10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women. There will be no program operating during vacation periods or on days when the school is closed due to custodial work schedule conflicts. Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

## Driver Suffers Stroke at Wheel; Other Accidents

Oscar W. Krueger, 72, of 213 Elm st., Kewaskum, was rushed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at about 4:45 p. m. Saturday in the firemen's ambulance when he suffered an apparent stroke and collapsed at the wheel of his car. A report from the hospital Thursday indicated that his condition remains very critical.

Krueger was headed east on Elm st. which is a dead end street. Evidently he was on his way to his home which is the last one on the left side of the street. Krueger's car kept moving through the dead end and climbed a 10-foot embankment on which are located Chicago and North Western railway tracks. The auto continued almost to the top of the steep embankment and came to a halt in brush on the embankment almost up to the tracks.

Apparently when Krueger suffered the stroke his foot remained on the gas pedal as the rear wheels of his car continued to spin and the tires dug into the embankment. The left rear tire began to burn and a nearby resident, seeing the smoke, ran to the spot with a hand extinguisher and put out the blaze. Police and the firemen's rescue squad were called by a neighbor and the ambulance was rushed to the scene. Oxygen was administered to the victim enroute to the hospital.

Krueger had just been released from the hospital Thursday following treatment for injuries he suffered in another accident earlier that day. The mishap occurred on Fond du Lac ave. near the intersection with Clinton st. at 7:45 a. m. According to police, Krueger was northbound on Fond du Lac ave. when a car in front of him stopped in traffic to make a left turn. In order to avoid striking the vehicle, Krueger drove to his right to pass the car when his auto sideswiped a vehicle owned by Harold E. Haffermann, R. 3 West Bend, which was parked at the curb in front of Wally's Mobil station. The right front of Krueger's car and left rear of the Haffermann auto were damaged.

The local ambulance had just returned from transporting Krueger to the hospital when the attendants and police were called to CTH S about two miles north of Kewaskum for another mishap. A car left the highway and rolled over in a plowed field. Bonnie J. Nielsen of Waukesha was injured in the accident and removed to the West Bend hospital. In a chain of mishaps, a Washington county patrolman, while investigating the above accident, received another radio call to go to a third crash on CTH H.

Two other accidents occurring in the village and nearby area were reported this week. In a mishap at 3:25 p. m. Tuesday, police reported that an International tractor driven by Alvin P. Schulz, 57, of R. 2, Campbellsport and owned by Sylvia Maedke of the same address, swerved and sideswiped an auto owned by Paul E. Winkler, Jr., 260 Ivy place, West Bend, which was parked in a marked parking stall on Fond du

### Learning Goes On for a Lifetime

Once upon a time, not so long ago, a student went to school and learned enough to last a lifetime. But nowadays, anyone who stops learning at any age is a dropout.

American Education Week is scheduled for observance by the Kewaskum Community Schools November 10-16. This is the annual visit-the-schools week in which more than 30 million parents participate.

Most teachers nowadays, try to teach youngsters techniques for learning, rather than just facts, since the facts the student learns today may be obsolete 10 years from now.

Thousands of young adults have already realized this. Each year about 25 million of them go into adult education activities, mostly of a vocational or recreational nature.

By and large these adult students are already well educated. Statistics show that a college-educated executive, housewife, or professional person with a family income of more than \$7,000 a year is six times more likely to be in an adult education program than is a grade-school-educated, blue-collar worker with an annual income of \$4,000.

Statistics like these, show a need for schools to instill in those least likely to go to college a love of lifelong learning, as they are the ones who probably could profit most from formal adult courses in later years.

The theme of American Education Week this year is: "America Has a Good Thing Going — Its Schools." Sponsored annually by the National Education Association, The American Legion, the

National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and the U. S. Office of Education, AEW will emphasize each day of the week specific contributions the school makes to society: Sunday, Nov. 10: "Stimulate Moral and Spiritual Values;" Monday, Nov. 11: "Strengthen the Nation;" Tuesday, Nov. 12: "Aspire to Quality Teaching;" Wednesday, Nov. 13: "Provide Equal Opportunity;" Thursday, Nov. 14: "Foster Lifelong Learning;" Friday, Nov. 15: "Promote Economic Prosperity;" and Saturday, Nov. 16: "Strive for Healthy Personality Development."

### Mary Lou Burg Speaker at Delta Kappa Gamma Meet

#### LAVERNE HRON SERVES AS CHAPTER PRESIDENT

A meeting of the Alpha Beta chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma was held recently in the library of the Slinger High school. Delta Kappa Gamma is an honorary society for women teachers. La Verne Hron, a fourth grade teacher in the Kewaskum Elementary school, is chapter president and other local teachers are members.

The speaker was Mary Lou Burg of West Bend, Democratic National committee woman for Wisconsin, who is also general manager of radio station WYLO. She is one of 50 national committee women who act as a liaison between the state Democratic party and the national party. She is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

Miss Burg spoke on the under-

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lying problems that faced all three political candidates for the office of president. She specifically outlined the record of Hubert Humphrey enumerating the bills he initiated and sponsored.

Results of a recent survey show interesting facts about the average voter who voted in November. A profile of the average voter includes the following: (1) His median age is early or middle 40's. (2) 70% of all voters will be 35 and older. (3) There will be more women than men. (4) 9 out of 10 will be white. (5) He will be relatively affluent middle class or higher. (6) He will be urban or semi-urban. (7) Politically he will be "middle of the road."

The Democratic convention was referred to as "the Siege of Chicago." Miss Burg pointed up the trying circumstances under which delegates were trying to carry on the business of democracy. It was a sad reflection on the entire country, for it reflected all the disquietude, hostility and violence which unfortunately has become a part of our times. Astringent security measures were surely needed for only a matter of months earlier, both Robert L. Kennedy and Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. had been assassinated. Violence, however, is not entirely new in our country. History shows how Jackson usually carried arms, and how Lincoln was assassinated.

The problems of racial strife, crime, poverty, over-populated cities (partly because of the trek from rural to urban areas) and the war in Vietnam are the problems which face each candidate for the presidency. The speaker felt we should not yield to the feeling of doom, because in looking back over history, there was hardly a time when there was not some insurmountable problem to be faced. We found solutions. We did then and we can today. One of the ways we can help is to exercise our right to vote.

Dr. Robinson replied that the problems are too urgent, we cannot wait 15 or 20 years to let the present generation be in position of leadership before we can start to work on today's pressing social problems.
